SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Urges United States Department of Veterans Affairs to place greater emphasis on transitional housing for homeless veterans.]

Expresses support for United States Department of Veterans Affairs plan to end veteran homelessness and prevent future veteran homelessness.

JOINT MEMORIAL 1 To the President of the United States and the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United 2 3 States of America, in Congress assembled: 4 We, your memorialists, the Seventy-sixth Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, in legis-5 lative session assembled, respectfully represent as follows: 6 Whereas our veterans have performed admirably and bravely in defense of our nation; and 7 Whereas homelessness is a serious problem among veterans with, according to United States 8 Department of Veterans Affairs estimates, 107,000 veterans facing homelessness on any given night; 9 and 10 Whereas it is estimated that one out of three homeless men who are sleeping in doorways, alleys 11 or cardboard boxes in our cities and rural communities has worn a uniform and served this country; 12 13 Whereas while only eight percent of the general population can claim veteran status, nearly one-fifth of the homeless population are veterans; and 14 15 Whereas in addition to the complex set of factors that influence homelessness, a large number 16 of displaced and at-risk veterans live with the lingering effects of post-traumatic stress disorder and substance abuse, which are compounded by a lack of family and support networks; and 17 18 Whereas although the United States Department of Veterans Affairs' specialized programs for 19 homeless veterans served more than 92,000 veterans in 2009, this left more than 100,000 veterans 20 who experienced homelessness and had to seek assistance from local government agencies and 21 community- and faith-based service organizations; and 22 Whereas the United States Department of Veterans Affairs has numerous programs designed to
