SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Urges United States Department of Veterans Affairs to place greater emphasis on transitional housing for homeless veterans.]

Expresses support for United States Department of Veterans Affairs plan to end veteran homelessness and prevent future veteran homelessness.

JOINT MEMORIAL

To the President of the United States and the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled:

We, your memorialists, the Seventy-sixth Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, in legislative session assembled, respectfully represent as follows:

Whereas our veterans have performed admirably and bravely in defense of our nation; and

Whereas homelessness is a serious problem among veterans with, according to United States Department of Veterans Affairs estimates, 107,000 veterans facing homelessness on any given night; and

Whereas it is estimated that one out of three homeless men who are sleeping in doorways, alleys or cardboard boxes in our cities and rural communities has worn a uniform and served this country; and

Whereas while only eight percent of the general population can claim veteran status, nearly one-fifth of the homeless population are veterans; and

Whereas in addition to the complex set of factors that influence homelessness, a large number of displaced and at-risk veterans live with the lingering effects of post-traumatic stress disorder and substance abuse, which are compounded by a lack of family and support networks; and

Whereas although the United States Department of Veterans Affairs' specialized programs for homeless veterans served more than 92,000 veterans in 2009, this left more than 100,000 veterans who experienced homelessness and had to seek assistance from local government agencies and community- and faith-based service organizations; and

Whereas the United States Department of Veterans Affairs has numerous programs designed to help homeless veterans, and the department needs more flexibility in its approach to easing the homeless crisis among veterans; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

(1) We, the members of the Seventy-sixth Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, support

1 the plan of the United States Department of Veterans Affairs to end veteran homelessness in five
2 years and to prevent future veteran homelessness through a combination of permanent supportive
3 housing, transitional housing and increased collaboration with government and community partners,
4 consistent with the homelessness policy set forth in ORS 458.528.

5 (2) A copy of this memorial shall be sent to the President of the United States, to the Senate
6 Majority Leader, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, to the Secretary of Veterans Af-
7 fairs and to each member of the Oregon Congressional Delegation.

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
