WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Recognizes and honors achievements of Terri Jean Frohnmayer.

## **ISSUES DISCUSSED:**

- Golf career of Terri Jean Frohnmayer
- Reason she entered the United States Golf Association's Senior Women's Amateur Championship in 2011
- Proposed amendment

**EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT:** Corrects number of years that Senior Women's Amateur Championship has been held.

**BACKGROUND:** In a come from behind victory on September 15, 2011, Terri Jean Frohnmayer of Salem became the first Oregon woman to win the United States Golf Association's (USGA) Senior Women's Amateur Championship, defeating defending champion Mina Hardin. After winning the USGA Senior Women's Amateur golf title, she was named the 2011 Senior Women's Player of the Year by the Pacific Northwest Golf Association and the 2011 Golfer of the Year by the Oregon Golf Association; and recognized by the Marion County Board of Commissioners by designating September 28, 2011, "Terri Frohnmayer Day."

Playing golf since she was 13 years old, Terri's victory in 2011 marked the culmination of a successful career playing the game. At the urging of her mother, Terri joined the Mount Si High School boys' golf team because the school did not have a girls' golf team. She went on to play in the 1972 Washington State Women's Public Links tournament; 1973 United States Girls' Junior tournament; and 1974 Pacific Northwest Golf Association's Women's Amateur tournament. After leaving the game of golf for 24 years, she returned, once again, at the urging of her mother, competing in several tournaments, including the 2008, 2009 and 2010 Pacific Northwest Golf Association's Senior Women's Amateur tournaments, winning the 2010 tournament by nine strokes.

In addition, to her success on the golf course Terri is a successful small business owner and broker and real estate investor, and has served on a variety of boards and commissions, including the president of the Salem Area Chamber of Commerce.
