Attachment A - Federal Sequestration and Continuing Resolutions

On March 5, 2013, EPA Region 10 provided Oregon DEQ with some details of federal sequestration reductions, equal to roughly 5 percent of federal fiscal year 2013 funding. Since this letter was received by DEQ, both the United States House and Senate passed budget legislation that maintained the overall size of the sequestration budget reductions, but provided federal agencies some more flexibility in implementing the reductions. DEQ has not received any additional information in terms of whether the flexibility allowed by the budget legislation will change the distribution of reductions relayed in the March 5 letter.

The funding impact detailed in EPA's letter totals \$1,310,000 split between reductions affecting DEQ operations (\$498,000) and the Clean Water State Revolving Fund capitalization grants (\$812,000)

DEQ estimates that the impact of sequestration will be mainly felt in the 2013-15 biennium, as actual grant reductions will likely occur late spring or early summer, prior to the close of the federal fiscal year on September 30, 2013. DEQ plans to implement any one time or permanent federal funding cuts as part of its operating budget execution plan for the 2013-15 LAB, coordinating decisions regarding how to implement such reductions with other impacts to General Fund resulting from legislative session and any changes to Other Fund activities resulting from updated revenue projection.

Dear Dick Pedersen:

As you know, the American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012 mandates across-the-board spending cuts, known as sequestration, be ordered on March 1, 2013. As required by law, the President issued a sequestration order cancelling billions in budgetary resources across the federal government for the remainder of the federal fiscal year. Subsequent to that order, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Acting Administrator, Bob Perciasepe, sent a letter to your Governor addressing the importance of the agency's relationships with the states. It is also important that we establish and maintain direct communications about what these budget cuts mean for the agency, your state, and other stakeholders.

As a result of sequestration, the agency's overall budget will be reduced for the remainder of the fiscal year, impacting our employees and our programs. Programs such as the Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Funds, and grants for air pollution programs under Section 105 of the Clean Air Act, will be affected by a reduction in funding. In addition, the sequester will affect the amount of discretionary grant funding to States, including reductions in awards for Superfund, Brownfields, pollution prevention, wetlands program development, research and development and community work. In the face of these reductions, the agency is doing everything possible to protect mission-critical activities to the greatest extent possible. Should Congress take subsequent actions that change the level or nature of these reductions, I am committed to working closely with you to manage any changes affecting our State partners.

Enclosed with this letter is an estimate of the FY 2013 reductions for selected grants your department receives from the EPA. As you are aware, some EPA grants are competitive or are for other reasons not distributed by state at the beginning of the fiscal year. Those funds are not included in these estimates.

I thank you for your continued support and partnership with the EPA, and for your cooperation as we work together to manage these unfortunate circumstances. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me.
