WORK GROUP RECOMMENDATIONS

COMMUNICATION AND COLLABORATION

1. **Issue/Problem: Local communities not made part of facility siting process.**
 - a) **Recommended Solution: Identify and implement best practices for public involvement in community siting decisions.**
 - b) **Recommended Solution: Ensure there is a clear understanding about role and jurisdiction of PSRB. Improve transparency in order to provide better information for all stakeholders to participate more fully in the current PSRB system (timely notice to ensure opportunity for timely participation). Provide PSRB with resources to conduct formal outreach and education program.**
 - c) **Recommended Solution: Mandate that local communities engage in “pre-planning” to identify areas and structures in their areas that they believe would be most appropriate for the siting of PSRB facilities. It would need to be understood that this process could not result in final decisions for siting but would provide a resource for successful siting decisions. The state should provide cities and counties with information about federal fair housing laws and the ADA to assist in this work.**
 - d) **Recommended Solution: Establish a “Meet and Confer” requirement to ensure that local government leadership has notice and an opportunity to provide input and coordination before DHS develops a secure residential treatment facility; improve the transparency of the siting process.**
2. **Issue/Problem: Lack of shared data about PSRB and siting programs.**
 - a) **Recommended Solution: Create a single DHS/PSRB information resource to provide real time information to all stakeholders on current and new developments about siting efforts.**

3. Issue/Problem: Lack of clear understanding between PSRB, providers and local law enforcement about how to manage and respond to on-site safety issues and incidents.

- a) Recommended Solution: Ensure that facilities have a practice of open, ongoing conversations with law enforcement and reporting protocols for on-site offenses. Policies and practices should be in place to encourage employees or administrators to utilize local law enforcement to protect residents and staff.**

- b) Recommended Solution: In order to ensure more effective application of existing law, DHS, in consultation with PSRB, should adopt statewide protocols for how providers and law enforcement officials partner and cooperate in: 1) reporting and investigating alleged crimes that occur at secure residential treatment facilities; 2) detaining residents of security facilities that are outside the facility without authorization.**

- c) DHS should lead and participate in an effort to adopt routine, statewide, joint training programs for law enforcement officials, District Attorneys, consumers (individuals who are or have been under PSRB jurisdiction), providers, victim representatives, city and county representatives, and PSRB staff to promote mutual understanding of the community mental health treatment system. Topics should include but not be limited to: notice provisions of existing law; authority and best practices for detention of individuals who unlawfully leave or fail to return to secure residential treatment facilities; protocols for reporting and investigating alleged crimes at SRTFs; circumstances when law enforcement officials can and should enter facilities; federal and state fair housing laws and the ADA.**

**POSITION ADOPTED BY THE OREGON STATE SHERIFFS' ASSOCIATION
AND OREGON ASSOCIATION OF CHIEFS OF POLICE
December, 2007**

As law enforcement administrators in the State of Oregon, our mission is to conserve the peace. Essential to conserving the peace is protecting the citizens we serve. Public safety has always been our number one priority. Yet, public safety is often as much about perception as it is reality. When our citizens do not feel safe, peace is difficult to maintain. It is under this premise that, collectively, we wish to address a dangerous situation which threatens to undermine the conservation of peace in Oregon.

The Psychiatric Security Review Board (PSRB) is now engaging in the implementation of a plan which resulted from a recent policy shift. This plan involves transferring forensic clients (those found guilty of a crime, except for insanity) housed at the State Hospital into group homes in various neighborhoods throughout Oregon. Many of these forensic clients have been convicted of serious and vicious crimes, such as murder, rape, assault and arson. Not surprisingly, as word of this plan is leaking out, citizens living near such homes are becoming extremely upset. We are concerned as well.

While we wish to be sensitive to the treatment needs of PSRB clients and are supportive of efforts to treat the mental illnesses which have contributed to their criminal activity, this plan still presents us with the dilemma of having dangerous criminals living in our neighborhoods. This situation poses both real and perceived threats of danger to our citizens. The real danger concerns recidivistic activity. Although this danger is statistically minimal, it is still real. Even one victim is too many. Perhaps more significant is the problem of perceived danger. Living next door to a dangerous and mentally ill criminal would be disconcerting at the very least. Maintaining one's sense of security and peace of mind under these circumstances must be extremely difficult.

Making matters worse, the PSRB initiated their plan in virtual silence. Although they claim that public safety is foremost in their considerations for moving forensic clients into the community, the lack of communication with citizens, law enforcement and other community partners leaves us all to wonder. By all appearances, this silent plan seems to have been designed to avoid public controversy. As a matter of public policy, we believe this plan was ill-conceived and, frankly, wrong.

We encourage the PSRB to suspend the implementation of their policy, until this issue has been properly addressed with the public in an open and honest manner. We do not

wish to inappropriately insert ourselves into the treatment decisions of PSRB clients. However, when those decisions impact the peace and security of our citizens, we believe it is necessary and right for those citizens to be collaboratively involved in the planning process. To protect our citizens, we in the law enforcement community need to be involved in the process as well. It is local law enforcement who will respond to these locations when problems arise. We stand a much better chance of being able to protect our citizens when we know the potentially dangerous people living in our neighborhoods; know where they live and, know who we can contact for additional information in an emergency.

The fact that the PSRB has made a policy decision to transfer patients from the State Hospital into our communities is obvious. The reason why is not so clear. Regardless of the reason, however, we invite the PSRB to engage the public honestly about this issue. If the casual setting of a group home is more conducive to psychiatric treatment than the clinical environment of a state hospital, we're certain our citizens will understand. What we do not understand is the secret insertion of forensic clients into our communities and the stiff-arm we have received in asking for an explanation. Let's not forget that these clients were convicted of crimes and sentenced to lengthy terms of confinement, in order to keep them separated from the rest of society. If group homes are more efficient or effective for the treatment of these patients, then by all means build them. But we suggest building them behind the fences of State Hospital grounds; or at least in locations collaboratively chosen by all those affected.



RE: Fraudulent use of federal housing money

Dear Senator Grassley:

I have been forwarded an exchange of letters between yourself and Secretary Shaun Donovan of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (*attachment #1*). The letter deals with issues you discovered in the **Semi-Annual Report to Congress, April 1, 2009 through September 30, 2009**. While this report may or may not have been new to you, the report and its issues were not new to me.

Dating back to early 2005, my eyes were opened to this ongoing problem with Public Housing oversight and illegal activities when I was contacted by a woman whom I shall refer to as Caterina. She complained to me that she was a victim of retribution by housing officials because of her reporting of criminal activity in Section 8 Housing. I listened and informed her that even though she did not live in my County, I would nevertheless look into the matter because the housing officials were using my County's name.

Upon preliminary investigation I was told by housing officials that Caterina made all this up and she was unstable. Later Caterina contacted me and ask where I was in the matter. She begged me to, at least, talk to the City of Corvallis Chief of Police, Gary Boldizar. I did. That's when my journey into learning about the lies, deceit and corruption of not only HUD but also Oregon Housing Officials began. My conversation with the Chief was a blunt conversation about a long standing pattern of criminal activity. He also mentioned that I appeared to be the only public official to take an interest in these issues.

I contacted Congressman DeFazio, Senator Ron Wyden's staff and Senator Gordon Smith's staff. The only response I received was from Congressman DeFazio supplying me with statutes pertaining to Housing under Title 42 Chapt 135 (*attachment #2*). After further contact with both of Oregon's senator's staffs it was made clear to me that this was an issue the senators were not interested in pursuing. (*This policy continued with Sen. Merkley*). I filed a formal complaint a short time latter with HUD Undersecretary Floyd May (*attachment #3*).

In years following, I would be subsequently interviewed by HUD investigators and FBI officials. When I would do a follow up call I would usually get no record or status of the complaint. This also seemed to be a problem when requesting written confirmation vice verbal. Over the following years I was threatened by officials, lied to by officials, told to quit pursuing this issue by a Congressman's staff member and a U.S. Senator's staff member. I have been told that I had better be careful about whom I ask questions about and that the money involved is more important than a County Commissioner's job. I am currently under threat of lawsuit from a Portland public

housing law firm that receives Federal housing monies. Amazingly, some of this information was recorded in public meetings. The arrogance of some of these individuals can be jaw-dropping at times.

Having said this, I would like to address, specifically, some issues you raised in your letter to Secretary Donovan on August 10, 2010. In Oregon, the Department of Housing and Urban Development, along with local Public Housing Authorities (PHA's) routinely and knowingly house predatory sex offenders and lifetime registered sex offenders. What I have learned is that in Oregon there is a total disregard for the Federal provision in your letter to the secretary. "*...any household that includes any individual who is subject to a lifetime registration requirement...*". The reference you made here is **Title 42 U.S.C. chapt 135 sub V sec. 13663**. By ignoring this statute, Oregon Housing Officials get creative and that a "household" is the name on the voucher and not individuals that live there. The federal statute clearly states "*...household that includes...*". I learned this when noting that registered sex offenders and violent parolees routinely show public housing as a residence on their registry papers filed with law enforcement.

I believe that the OIG number quoted in your letter that 2,094 to 3,046 HUD households have lifetime registered sex offenders. I believe this number is extremely under estimated. The OIG admits there are limited background checks and problems with "confidential" issues in the FBI data base. This, as you correctly stated, prevents removal of offenders from PHA's, especially if the PHA is involved in other criminal activities. As we know, the information on the FBI data base is only as good as reporting from local agencies operating under Federal authorities. If PHA's do not

conduct background checks, then how would anyone know the number of felons in housing? An example I would use to underscore this point is that the City of Portland, OR in as much as the same way as the San Francisco sheriff's office, does not report these offenses.

Unfortunately, here in Oregon as with other states, Quasi-government officials often thumb their nose at State and Federal laws if it's a means to a political end (i.e. child sex offender Neil Goldschmidt became US Secretary of Transportation and Governor of Oregon though the State's largest newspaper and law enforcement officials apparently knew about this crime all along and covered for him. The Oregonian newspaper would refer to his molestation of a 13 year old girl as a "relationship". This type of political mentality is what we are dealing with here.

Today, many States, including mine, are trying to empty out prisons and mental institutions to "save money". Some local officials do not agree. I realize that the two people that hang at the back entrance to my Courthouse talking out loud to voices in their head maybe considered a desirable situation by some, but what good does it do for society allowing those in need of help to wonder around aimlessly subject to all forms of victimization. When we start blurring the lines of mental illness, criminal activity, adjudication, felonies and disabilities, government becomes the partner in those person to person crimes.

I believe the main focus of the issue is the following question: How can felons and predatory sex offenders be placed in low income housing or section 8 housing. This issue, as I lay out here, is not exclusive to Oregon; most of it is two-fold.

Federal housing money is usually co-mingled into a State agency. It is then placed under control of appointees. This is the point at which states along with ALL federal agencies, start the "administrative skim". This generally runs 9-22%. In some cases it is more. Generally it is at this point when it is decided how monies are to be divided up. As the money is directed toward developers, vouchers and projects, they (PHA's) state the purpose is for "low income housing". The shame of this fact is that a lot of this money goes to subsidize larger more expensive luxury housing.

Example:

A disbursement is made to developers of Section 8 Housing for 7-10 years of use. The developer gains back 100 percent control of property back after that time because of the vacancy rate of Section 8 Housing and the PHA's come under pressure of developer to fill the units. To aide in this, background checks are not done and units are filled. This is the first issue. By doing this, agencies can direct individuals who are illegally in the United States to housing units along with criminals. Without the background check, then PHA's feel they are not in violation of Title 42 laws. When the numbers become too difficult to keep up, the PHA turns the property over to the developer. What the developer winds up with is a project that had no SDC's charged to him and has enjoyed all the tax benefits. The whole investment made by joe bag of doughnuts the tax payer is lost.

The second issue is the belief that we can offshore PSRB (*Psychiatric Security Review Board; this functions name is different state to state to manage felony issues*) patients into publicly funded housing under "group home" status. **Social Security Act**

sec.202 [42 U.S.C. 402] (x)(1)(A) forbids the use of the money for this because of the adjudication process of these individuals. By placing them on SSDI, the State and activists can unload costs on the Federal government while loading a lot of offenders into public housing. I would not that this is illegal under Title 42 U.S.C. chapt. 135. The problem is that these "group homes" are that they are default five person institutions. This violates Social Security Act under Title 42 and other federal laws. The part that bureaucrats and developers love is that by using the "group home" term, States can try to say it's a violation of HIPPA to reveal what they are being treated for, even though they were placed there after being criminally charged. The hole in that argument is that there was an adjudication process to institutionalize the individual. So in effect, some degenerates then becomes the protected victim. In Oregon, County Commissioners serve as the mental health authority and can gain access to this information. (*currently activists are trying to stop this*). When I learned about the placement of a murderer and a sex offender within 700 feet of a playground, myself and one of my current counterparts, Commissioner Roger Nyquist put an end to it. I have learned that the state will now do this on there own in violation of the state's own laws. This will enable the state to offshore urban offenders into rural areas. It's a great example of wealth buying policy.

Over the last few years, I have advocated clarity in State statute. This year I asked a Republican State Representative to introduce a bill on my behalf along with two state law enforcement organizations, to clarify that some of these PSRB patients include lifetime registered sex offenders who are not entitled to group home status under SSDI (*attachment #4&5*). These individuals in question are actually part of the

judicial system as described by federal and state law. What I have learned is that, obscured and clouded ethics tied to money is a bi-partisan thing. While I am writing this the Oregon legislature is working hard to skirt the law even more by passing HB3100, HB 2701 and SB 420 which are bills to direct state staff to violate federal law.

As the Lund Report (*a left leaning activist news letter related to public broadcasting*) admits, the goal of activists and legislators is to remove psychiatric criminals and sex offenders from jurisdiction under the judicial system and place them under a health authority. This would effectively remove a felony adjudication or conviction and release criminals under HIPPA to a SSDI/ HUD addiction group home.....think about that! No Parole. No Law enforcement notification. No local government notice. Under federal mental health parity guidelines it allows for cross county and state transport of these criminals with protections under HIPPA. Their housing then becomes a unit of low income HUD housing and unfairly exposes more poor children disproportionately to real dangers, abuse and deadly harm.

After a quick look at state and federal records one can conclude the money behind the lobbying and campaign efforts comes from federally mandated health parity groups and local government money. I even discovered my own county is guilty of this through organizational memberships and efforts. These funds appear to filter into political campaigns by way of memberships, hired lobbyist and 501(c)(3)'s. As a member of the Association of Oregon Counties, I have stood alone against this system. Shockingly, I continue to be alone on all policy votes in this area of protecting kids.

I started to work with the staff of State Senator Jason Atkinson in an effort to strengthen the laws that govern these issues to better protect our children and

communities. I have attached the legislative council rejection of legislation based on medical privacy (*attachment #6*). It appears to me that the predatory offender is more important to the political class than our communities and families. Again, this disrespect of citizens appears to be non-partisan.

Senator Grassley, I have the utmost respect for you and the point you made in your letter to the Secretary regarding your Constitutional duty of oversight. In your letter, you wrote in terms of months regarding criminal activity overseen by HUD. There was nothing new here. I am attaching an affidavit signed by a circuit judge in 2000 to illustrate a point. This affidavit was to confirm that he issued a stalking order on a felon. This was for a PHA. The offender never had any action to remove him from public housing, and continued his residency in section 8 housing. The point here is that all through the system ethical elected individuals such as ourselves are looked upon as an inconvenience and a joke. Since my sense of moral ethics precludes me from condoning participation in these housing scams, I assume that view will not change.

In light of all this, I would offer these suggestions as part of a solution:

- 1) Total misused and stolen funds in the report are almost two billion dollars for FY 2009. That's what we know about. I would suggest trimming 10 billion dollars off the top of FY 09's budget number and use that for FY11, That would be 10 billion less borrowed from China to support crime while leaving the bill to our kids.
- 2) Institute a 3 strikes policy for PHA's that fail to conduct criminal background checks. The 3rd strike results in a permanent loss of funds.

- 3) Make all development projects require that the local city or county governing body hold title on projects. Ban the use of 501's and NGO's. Local government officials tend to be more accountable directly to the public.
- 4) Require background checks and drug testing as a condition of employment for staff of PHA's that receive federal money. Include public health authorities. What's good enough for the military should be OK here.
- 5) Withhold all Medicare funds to states that try to defraud SSDI (as Oregon has) under sec. 202 [42 U.S.C. 402] (x)(1)(1), until such state is in compliance.
- 6) Start phasing out PHA's ability to enter into contracts without the signatures of a publicly elected governing body such as a city or county.
- 7) Clarify federal statutes so those under jurisdiction of criminal psychiatric care and judicial orders are not a protected class as suggested by Oregon legislative counsel in the attached letter.
- 8) Fund an investigation to look at the relationship between membership organizations, lobbyist, 501's receiving federal money and support of political campaigns.

Senator Grassley, I want to thank you for your time and interest in addressing this crucial and important issue. In my oath of office I am bound to protect the rights of the innocent of those such as citizens and children who find themselves in these HUD funded housing. In recent years I have found too few officials that feel this way. In Oregon, I am the only county commissioner who has spoken out against these

injustices. Sure, I don't get invited to parties anymore, but being invited to parties is not what I was elected to do.

I am writing regarding the enclosed bill draft to make you aware of two potential legal issues that may arise during the legislative process. Among other changes to Oregon law, the bill draft authorizes certain public safety officials to notify the community when a person found guilty except for insanity of a sex offense or of criminal homicide will be conditionally released from the state hospital. In addition, the bill requires the Psychiatric Security Review Board to input certain medical information into the Law Enforcement Data System. It is very likely that opponents of LC 1693 will assert that these provisions violate federal laws relating to housing discrimination and medical privacy.¹

¹ The Fair Housing Act (FHA) and the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, respectively. It is worth noting that current law allows law enforcement to release certain information about sex offenders, including residency, under certain circumstances. Presumably, these provisions do not violate the FHA because they apply to both persons convicted of a sex crime as well as persons found guilty except for insanity of a sex crime.

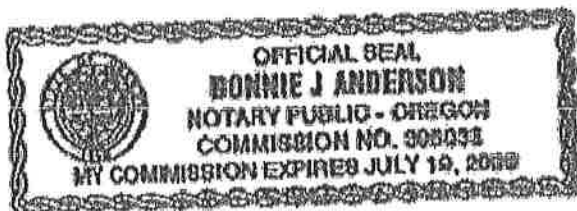

As the senior Senator from Iowa and ranking member of the Committee on Finance, it is my constitutional duty to conduct oversight of the Executive Branch, including the operation and activities of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD/Department). Over the past few months, I have sent a number of inquiries regarding serious problems with HUD programs. Many of the responses I have received thus far have been woefully inadequate, including the recent response regarding lifetime sex offenders residing in publically funded housing.

Specifically, on August 10, 2010, I sent a letter to HUD (*Attachment A*) regarding sex offenders living in federally assisted housing; but HUD's response on October 1, 2010, (*Attachment B*) did not answer my specific questions. I am more disturbed that HUD seems to be dragging its feet on rectifying the serious problem of sexual predators residing in PHAs, often without the knowledge of other PHA residents. According to the Department's response, HUD did not contact the National Crime Information Center until September 15, 2010, over a year after the HUD Office of Inspector General released its findings. Further, it appears that, absent Congressional prodding, much more time would have passed without any steps being taken to address the problem. Such a substantial delay on a matter as significant as addressing sexual predators demands an explanation.

Additionally, during the course of two briefings HUD provided to my staff regarding the database used by HUD to score Public Housing Authorities, my staff made inquiries about whether or not HUD maintains a list of the known sexual predators residing in PHAs and the method HUD employs to monitor sexual predators in PHAs. Unfortunately, the individual available on the phone, whom my staff believed was most familiar with HUD's databases, was precluded both times from responding to my staff member's questions. Accordingly, please answer the following questions:

- 1) Does the HUD database, Real Estate Assessment Center System (REACS), contain information about sex offenders living in public housing?
- 2) If REACS does not contain information about sex offenders living in public housing, please describe in detail where and how HUD maintains this information and how the Department provides notice to PHA residents in the event a known sex offender is residing in the PHA?

I look forward to receiving your response to the questions set forth in this letter by no later than November 9, 2010. As ranking member of the Committee on Finance, it is my constitutional duty to conduct oversight into the actions of the Executive Branch, including the activities of the Department of the Housing and Urban Development (HUD/Department). I am writing to inquire about lifetime sex offenders living in federally subsidized housing, some due to a legal loophole. It is essential that the Federal Government ensures the safety and security of public housing residents against such predators.

Congress included a provision in the Quality Housing and Work Responsibility Act of 1998 (the Act), which made it illegal for lifetime convicted sex offenders to be admitted to federally subsidized housing, to address rising concerns regarding the threats posed by sexual predators. Specifically, the Act states that "Notwithstanding any other provision of law, an owner of federally assisted housing shall prohibit admission to such housing for any household that includes any individual who is subject to a lifetime registration requirement under a State sex offender registration program."

The HUD Office of Inspector General (OIG) released an audit report (2009-KC-0001) which revealed that local Public Housing Authorities (PHAs) do not conduct adequate screenings for convicted sex offenders and have admitted dangerous offenders to live in public housing projects and Section 8 housing. Additionally, the OIG found that the Department failed to implement adequate controls or monitoring at the federal level to ensure that PHAs prevent this from happening. The OIG reviewed a sample of 67 households and found that 36 contained lifetime sex offenders, including:

- 18 household members who were ineligible at the time of admission due to lifetime registration status.
- 10 household members who were admitted and convicted before the current law was enacted.
- 8 household members who were eligible at the time of admission, but later became lifetime registered sex offenders.

- Based on these figures, the OIG determined that HUD subsidizes an estimated 2,094 to 3,046 households that include lifetime registered sex offenders.

Additionally, the OIG informed my staff that they are prohibited from releasing the specific names of the lifetime registered sex offenders that were identified in the audit sampling due to an agreement made with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Specifically, the FBI provided National Sex Offender Registry information to the OIG which is subject to confidentiality provisions and is therefore not available to the public. The Dru Sjodin National Sex Offender Public Website is available to the public; however it only searches state websites and is not fully reliable. As a result, the names of dangerous sex offenders presently living in public housing can neither be released, nor can the individuals be removed from the PHA.

According to the OIG, it is the responsibility of the PHAs to conduct thorough application reviews and background checks on all new applicants. In particular, PHAs are required to perform the necessary criminal history background checks in the state where the housing is located and in the other states where the household members are known to have lived. I was also made aware of the fact that PHAs are not **requiring** (emphasis added) complete background information from PHA applicants and are not specifically asking an applicant for a list of all the states in which the applicant previously lived. Further, I understand that housing projects and PHAs are not currently required to check the Dru Sjodin Nation Sex Offender Website. Consequently, the Administration has created an environment that enables lifetime sex offenders to withhold pertinent information and gain entrance to taxpayer funded housing. Lastly, it is my understanding that HUD does not penalize PHAs for failing to conduct more thorough background checks.

According to the Audit Report, the law as written has created a loophole that “only prohibit[s] admission and do[es] not prohibit offenders convicted after admission or those who were both admitted and convicted before the current law was enacted (p. 6).” I understand that legislation is being drafted to correct this situation and I would appreciate an update on the efforts being made to close this loophole.

Following the release of the Audit Report, HUD issued a Special Notice (H 2009-11 and PIH 2009-35HA)) to “reiterate current regulatory requirements and strongly encourage the establishment of standards and processes with a zero tolerance approach to prevent lifetime sex offenders from receiving federal housing assistance.” While I appreciate HUD’s effort to ensure that PHAs are strengthening their respective screening processes to ensure that sex offenders are not allowed into the programs, I am concerned that HUD merely **recommends** (emphasis added), as opposed to **requires** (emphasis added), that PHAs conduct additional screening. I also note that there does not appear to be any accountability structure set forth to enforce the Department’s recommendations with regard to sex offenders.

For these many reasons, and to ensure the safety and security of individuals and families living in federally subsidized housing, please:

- 1) Describe in detail the implementation plan being conducted by HUD to address the OIG's recommendations.
- 2) Discuss in detail the actions taken by HUD to address those PHAs that failed to establish the zero tolerance standards and procedures as outlined in the HUD Special Notice. In the event an action was taken against a PHA, please identify the PHA and the nature of its failure.
- 3) Advise of any instances known to HUD involving a lifetime sex offender residing in a PHA during the period of FY 2008 through the present.
- 4) Identify each PHA penalized for not complying fully with all pertinent laws relating to lifetime sex offenders for the period of FY 2008 through the present.
- 5) Describe in detail what the Department intends to do with those lifetime sex offenders who are presently residing in public housing. Specifically, will they be removed, and if not, why not?

On behalf of Secretary Donovan, thank you for your letter of August 10, 2010 concerning the Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) actions in response to the HUD Office of the Inspector General's (OIG) audit report (2009-KC-0001) on lifetime registered sex offenders residing in federally assisted housing. In your letter, you ask HUD to respond to several questions concerning this audit and subsequent actions by HUD to prevent lifetime registered sex offenders from residing in federally assisted housing.

At the outset, I would like to assure you that HUD takes very seriously its responsibility to see that residents in federally assisted housing are able to live in safe and secure conditions. Specifically, HUD is committed to ensuring that appropriate steps are taken to address any situations that could compromise resident safety relating to the presence of other residents who are lifetime registered sex offenders.

HUD is currently exploring options to address this issue, such as legislation that would mandate the termination of tenancy or assistance for any household member subject to a lifetime registration requirement under a State sex offender registration program, unless the crime is of a nature that would not threaten the health and safety of other residents. In addition, we are investigating how legislation along these lines could also be used to create a partnership between HUD and the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) to match data from the National Sex Offender Registry and HUD tenant information databases. Ensuring that housing managers have accurate access to sex offender information will greatly improve their ability to enforce current and future laws prohibiting lifetime registered sex offenders from residing in federally assisted housing, and we look forward to continuing to explore with Congress the best way of achieving this goal. In addition, HUD has proposed a partnership with NCIC to establish such a data exchange, regardless of whether legislation is passed, and a copy of HUD's letter to NCIC proposing this partnership is attached.

As you referenced in your letter, upon the release of the OIG audit, HUD's Office of Public and Indian Housing (PIH) and the Office of Multifamily Housing (Multifamily Housing) released a notice on September 9, 2009 (the Notice), reiterating the responsibility of managers of federally assisted housing to thoroughly screen applicants to ensure that no lifetime registered sex offenders reside in or are admitted to HUD assisted housing. The notice strongly recommends the termination of assistance for lifetime registered sex offenders who present a threat to the health and safety of residents and community members, or who provided false information on their applications regarding sex offender status of any household member.

In addition, PIH and Multifamily Housing are developing an additional notice and revising existing handbooks to have housing managers ask applicants for a list of all states in which they have resided, in order to ensure that thorough background checks are conducted for all applicants. The notice will also require public housing agencies (PHA) to document consideration of sex offender status, including the source and date of the screening. Moreover, Multifamily Housing has revised, and PIH is in the process of revising, occupancy handbooks to clarify that managers who conduct criminal background checks through sources other than a PHA must retain the records for the term of tenancy plus three years for tenants; and for applicants not admitted to the program they must retain the records with the application for three years.

PIH is working with HUD Field Offices to develop and implement controls to monitor PHA use of the required application questions and retention of screening documentation. PIH plans to provide training and technical assistance to field offices and housing authorities to ensure consistency across PHAs in the implementation of these policies.

Multifamily Housing is creating a Lease Addendum that amends the termination provisions of its model leases to strengthen the language concerning lifetime registered sex offenders who were wrongly admitted or who committed the crime after admission. In addition, PIH and Multifamily Housing are updating management review forms (Form HUD-5834, Management Review for Public Housing Projects, and Form HUD-9834, Management Review of Multifamily Housing Projects, respectively), to include additional monitoring questions relating to the policies and procedures for ensuring that individuals subject to lifetime state sex offender registration requirements are not being admitted and, when applicable, pursuing eviction of individuals erroneously admitted or who commit criminal activity or other lease violations after admission.

HUD is also considering requiring applicants and current tenants to self-certify at admission and at yearly recertification that no member of their household is subject to a lifetime sex offender registration requirement in any state. Failure to report or falsely reporting this information would qualify as fraud and be grounds for termination of tenancy or assistance.

Finally, you also requested information about the actions that HUD has taken to address situations in which managers failed to establish the standards and procedures outlined in the Notice. With regard to the potential removal of specific individuals identified by the OIG as lifetime registered sex offenders, because the OIG has informed us that he is unable to release the names identified as part of the audit, HUD has been unable to determine whether housing managers can remove or have removed these individuals from HUD programs. Furthermore, HUD cannot investigate which managers may not be fully complying with pertinent laws or regulations with regard to these specific individuals. Again, as HUD moves forward on the efforts to ensure that the NCIC database can be accessed and used more effectively, this problem can be addressed. In any case, PIH and Multifamily Housing are in the process of implementing monitoring tools to ensure that the mandatory ban on admission of lifetime registered sex offenders is fully enforced. To date, we are unaware of any PHAs or other housing managers that have failed to establish the zero tolerance standards and procedures outlined in the Notice; however, the monitoring tools will help us detect such managers in the future.

Creating safe communities for participants in HUD programs is a top priority for the Department, and we are working to ensure the safety of residents and community members, while continuing to fulfill our mission of providing needed affordable rental housing.

On August 19, 2009, the Office of the Inspector General (OIG) for the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) issued Audit 2009-KC-0001, "HUD Subsidized an Estimated 2,094 to 3,046 Households That Included Lifetime Registered Sex Offenders." One finding of this audit is that Public Housing Authorities (PHAs) do not have reliable, streamlined access to sex offender registration information. Because of this, PHAs experience some difficulty in determining if applicants and participants in the Public Housing and Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) programs are subject to a lifetime registration requirement under a State sex offender registration program.¹

PHAs currently have statutory authority to access information regarding the criminal conviction records of adult applicants to, or tenants of, federally assisted housing for purposes of applicant screening, lease enforcement, and eviction from the National Crime Information Center (42 U.S. Code 1437d (q)(1)(A)); however, this information must be transmitted through a law enforcement agency. In practice, this requires each PHA to contact their local law enforcement agency, or other entity with access to sex offender information, to confirm that the applicant or tenant is not a lifetime registered sex offender. Representatives from your agency indicated that current law would potentially allow non-law enforcement personnel to perform a preliminary match which could then be followed-up with fingerprints where a potential match is found.


I am writing to propose a partnership between the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) and HUD to exchange data between the National Sex Offender Registry (NSOR) and the Public Housing Information Center (PIC), which contains tenant information for the Public Housing and HCV programs. One potential proposal is that on a regular basis (monthly or quarterly), a HUD representative would extract tenant information, including name, date of birth, and social security number, from PIC and send this information to a representative at NCIC. This information would then be run against the NSOR and likely matches would be flagged. Matches would then be returned to HUD and a flag would be activated in the PIC system; this flag would indicate to PHAs that this tenant should be sent to a local law enforcement agency to be fingerprinted and have this information rerun against the NSOR. If there is a finger-printed

¹ The Quality Housing and Work Responsibility Act of 1998 (the Act), Section 578, established the ineligibility of households with a member who is subject to a lifetime registration requirement under a State sex offender registration program for admission to federally subsidized housing. Additionally, PHAs have the authority to evict or terminate assistance for any program participant who threatens the health and safety of other residents.

match between the resident and the NSOR, the PHA would be alerted and would either deny admission or consider whether the offender presents a threat to the health and safety of other tenants and should have their housing assistance terminated.

It is crucial that our PHAs have streamlined access to accurate data on sex offenders in order to protect other residents, as well as comply with federal statute. A partnership between the NCIC and HUD would greatly increase the administrative efficiency of gathering this data. I am interested in discussing the above proposal, as well as any other potential partnerships that would allow PHAs better access to sex offender information. I would like to arrange a conference call between our offices to further discuss details of this potential partnership. At your convenience, please contact me at (202)708-1380.

SUBCHAPTER V--SAFETY AND SECURITY IN PUBLIC AND ASSISTED HOUSING

Sec. 13661. Screening of applicants for federally assisted housing

(a) Ineligibility because of eviction for drug crimes

Any tenant evicted from federally assisted housing by reason of drug-related criminal activity (as such term is defined in section 1437a(b) of this title) shall not be eligible for federally assisted housing during the 3-year period beginning on the date of such eviction, unless the evicted tenant successfully completes a rehabilitation program approved by the public housing agency (which shall include a waiver of this subsection if the circumstances leading to eviction no longer exist).

(b) Ineligibility of illegal drug users and alcohol abusers

(1) In general

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a public housing agency or an owner of federally assisted housing, as determined by the Secretary, shall establish standards that prohibit admission to the program or admission to federally assisted housing for any household with a member--

(A) who the public housing agency or owner determines is illegally using a controlled substance; or

(B) with respect to whom the public housing agency or owner determines that it has reasonable cause to believe that such household member's illegal use (or pattern of illegal use) of a controlled substance, or abuse (or pattern of abuse) of alcohol, may interfere with the health, safety, or right to peaceful enjoyment of the premises by other residents.

(2) Consideration of rehabilitation

In determining whether, pursuant to paragraph (1)(B), to deny admission to the program or federally assisted housing to any household based on a pattern of illegal use of a controlled substance or a pattern of abuse of alcohol by a household member, a public housing agency or an owner may consider whether such household member--

(A) has successfully completed a supervised drug or alcohol rehabilitation program (as applicable) and is no longer engaging in the illegal use of a controlled substance or abuse of alcohol (as applicable);

(B) has otherwise been rehabilitated successfully and is no longer engaging in the illegal use of a controlled substance or abuse of alcohol (as applicable); or

(C) is participating in a supervised drug or alcohol rehabilitation program (as applicable) and is no longer engaging in the illegal use of a controlled substance or abuse of alcohol (as applicable).

(c) Authority to deny admission to criminal offenders

Except as provided in subsections (a) and (b) of this section and in addition to any other authority to screen applicants, in selecting among applicants for admission to the program or to federally assisted housing, if the public housing agency or owner of such housing (as applicable) determines that an applicant or any member of the applicant's household is or was, during a reasonable time preceding the date when the applicant household would otherwise be selected for admission, engaged in any drug-related or violent criminal activity or other criminal activity which would adversely affect the health, safety, or right to peaceful enjoyment of the premises by other residents, the owner, or public housing agency employees, the public housing agency or owner may--

(1) deny such applicant admission to the program or to federally assisted housing; and

(2) after the expiration of the reasonable period beginning upon such activity, require the applicant, as a condition of admission to the program or to federally assisted housing, to submit to the public housing agency or owner evidence sufficient (as the Secretary shall by regulation provide) to ensure that the individual or individuals in the applicant's household who engaged in criminal activity for which denial was made under paragraph (1) have not engaged in any criminal activity during such reasonable period.

Sec. 13663. Ineligibility of dangerous sex offenders for
admission to public housing

(a) In general

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, an owner of federally assisted housing shall prohibit admission to such housing for any household that includes any individual who is subject to a lifetime registration requirement under a State sex offender registration program.

(b) Obtaining information

As provided in regulations issued by the Secretary to carry out this section--

(1) a public housing agency shall carry out criminal history background checks on applicants for federally assisted housing and make further inquiry with State and local agencies as necessary to determine whether an applicant for federally assisted housing is subject to a lifetime registration requirement under a State sex offender registration program; and

(2) State and local agencies responsible for the collection or maintenance of criminal history record information or information on persons required to register as sex offenders shall comply with requests of public housing agencies for information pursuant to this section.

(c) Requests by owners for PHAs to obtain information

A public housing agency may take any action under subsection (b) of this section regarding applicants for, or tenants of, federally assisted housing other than federally assisted housing described in subparagraph (A) or (B) of section 13664(a)(2) of this title, but only if the housing is located within the jurisdiction of the agency and the owner of such housing has requested that the agency take such action on behalf of the owner. Upon such a request by the owner, the agency shall take the action requested under subsection (b) of this section. The agency may not make any information obtained pursuant to the action under subsection (b) of this section available to the owner but shall perform determinations for the owner regarding screening, lease enforcement, and eviction based on criteria supplied by the owner.

(d) Opportunity to dispute

Before an adverse action is taken with respect to an applicant for federally assisted housing on the basis that an individual is subject to a lifetime registration requirement under a State sex offender registration program, the public housing agency obtaining the record shall provide the tenant or applicant with a copy of the registration information and an opportunity to dispute the accuracy and relevance of that information.

(e) Fee

A public housing agency may be charged a reasonable fee for taking actions under subsection (b) of this section. In the case of a public housing agency taking actions on behalf of another owner of federally assisted housing pursuant to subsection (c) of this section, the agency may pass such fee on to the owner making the request and may charge an additional reasonable fee for making the request on behalf of the owner.

(f) Records management

Each public housing agency shall establish and implement a system of records management that ensures that any criminal record or information regarding a lifetime registration requirement under a State sex offender registration program that is obtained under this section by the public housing agency is--

- (1) maintained confidentially;
- (2) not misused or improperly disseminated; and
- (3) destroyed, once the purpose for which the record was requested has been accomplished.

Dear Mr. May:

I am writing in regard to a complaint that you received from Caterina Rosefeld (Corvallis, Oregon (541) 758-9095). It appears that I am the local official of last resort to listen to Ms. Rosenfeld's complaint.

After reviewing the documents presented to me, I noticed a very disturbing pattern. I am very concerned about HUD housing and vouchers being used for the apparent care of assorted felons and child sex offenders. If a single mother, for whatever the circumstance has moved into Section 8 housing, it would appear the system is making them a victim twice. I verified this pattern in a telephone conversation with the Corvallis Police Chief, Gary Boldizar. The Chief indicated to me the frustration he and his predecessor have had with the housing of these criminals and pedophiles with children.

The unfortunate problem that I have as a Linn County Commissioner is that the Linn-Benton Housing Authority has become a creature of the State and HUD. As a local official, it is my understanding that we no longer have the standing we had, say 20 years ago in these matters. The operation of the organization has become insulated from the County and other local government bodies.

In regard to Ms. Rosenfeld's complaint, I also verified with Chief Boldizar that he had been interviewed by your investigator, Ife Asantewa. He indicated to me he had forwarded a large amount of documentation supporting Ms. Rosenfeld's assertions.

The pieces I find disturbing are three-fold: 1) Have HUD vouchers and preferences been given to dangerous felons? 2) Have other residents been "forced" out of low-income housing after voicing concerns of this activity? 3) Given the past year of

incidents of crimes against children on a national scale, where does the responsibility rest in this dispute?

It is my opinion that something is not right here. I would very much like for your office to follow-up on this issue. If your staff has recommendations for future changes, I would very much like to hear them.

Thank you for your letter of September 16, 2005, concerning the complaint that the Office of Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity (FHOO) Regional Office in Seattle, Washington received from Caterina Rosenfeld. While we can appreciate your concerns and frustrations, on the date of your letter this office had no open cases filed by Ms. Rosenfeld.

This office researched the database maintained by FHOO. The database revealed that the Regional Office for FHOO in Seattle, Washington closed the only complaint filed by Ms. Rosenfeld against the Linn-Benton Housing Authority (HA) on July 11, 2005. To adequately respond to your letter, Gregory King, the Acting Director for the Office of Enforcement, reviewed the electronic case file. Base on that review, this office concurs with the decision that resulted from the investigation of the Rosenfeld complaint.

Section 8 vouchers allow eligible persons to live in the privately owned housing of their choice. The owners and managers of privately owned housing establish their respective criteria or qualifications for the examination of applications and the acceptance of tenants. If the persons that you described in your letter do not receive Section 8 vouchers, then the owner or manager of the privately owned property made the decision to permit that person to occupy the property as a tenant.

HUD plays no role in private rental transactions unless and until persons who want or have housing believe that another person has violated their rights under the Fair Housing Act, as amended (the Act), or under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended (Title VI) file a complaint with HUD. The Act prohibits discrimination in housing because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, familial status, and disability. Title VI prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin in program and activities that receive federal financial assistance. Whenever persons believe that they have been victims of discrimination, including interference, intimidation, coercion, or harassment, they can file a complaint with HUD. The Act protects residents who believe that they have or will experience harassment, intimidation, coercion, threats, or interference with their housing rights because of their membership in one of the seven protected classes, and Title VI provides identical protection based on race, color, or national origin. Neither law protects persons from encounters with the person that you described in your letter unless the person in need of protection claims the following:

1. Membership in a protected class,
 2. Harassment, coercion, or intimidation by an occupant of the housing provider's property because of membership in a protected class;
 3. Actual or constructive knowledge of harassment, intimidation, or coercion by the housing provider; and
 4. The housing providers refusal to act to protect the person who claims harassment, etc.; *or*
1. Harassment, coercion, or intimidation that amount to interference with a right granted by the Act;
 2. Actual or constructive knowledge of harassment, intimidation, or coercion by the housing provider; and
 3. The housing providers refusal to act to protect tenant who claims harassment, etc.

The Rosenfeld complaint did not involve either of these scenarios as a substantive claim of discrimination.

As you know, each state enacts a law that permits municipalities to create and operate quasi-governmental entities known as public housing authorities, to provide housing to eligible low-income applicants. Public housing authorities also provide housing through the issuance housing assistance vouchers to eligible applicants through the housing authorities participation in the Section 8 Housing Assistance Voucher Program. If the local public housing authority has adopted and implemented a "One-strike Policy", then applicants with disqualifying criminal records would not be permitted to occupy local public housing or participate in the Section 8 voucher program. Whether the Linn-Benton Housing Authority has adopted and implemented a "One-strike policy", or adopted other measures as part of its Tenant Selection and Assignment Plan (TSAP), the HA makes a decision to accept or reject an applicant for occupancy or participation in the Section 8 voucher program, including persons such as the persons described in your letter.

HUD does not participate in any of the daily local decisions that affect selection and assignment of applicants to housing units. Those decisions rest exclusively with the executive director of each housing authority, and ultimately with the Board of Commissioners for the Housing Authority. Either state or local law controls the appointment of the individual members of the HA's Board of Commissioners. HUD does not participate in any of the local decisions concerning the identification, nomination, or selection of HA commissioners. HUD, through the implementing regulations published in Title 24, Code of Federal Regulations, does establish the parameters for the operation of housing authorities and the Section 8 Voucher program.

Notwithstanding the Tenant Selection and Assignment Plan (TSAP) of the Linn-Benton HA, who live in public housing or receive Section 8 vouchers retain the right to file complaints when they believe that another person has violated their individual rights under the Act, or under Title VI. The Act applies equally to nonexempt private housing providers and public housing authorities. Title VI applies to public housing authorities as recipients of HUD funds.

To recap this office's response to your questions: (1) The Housing Authority controls the

distribution of Housing Authority, not HUD, vouchers. HUD controls the allocation of the housing vouchers to public housing authorities; (2) Other than complaints from residents and other interested persons, this office does not have any specific knowledge about any actions to force residents out of low-income housing. Residents who believe that they have been forced out of low-income housing because they voiced their concerns with respect their housing rights (not the case with Ms. Rosenfeld) should utilize the HA's grievance procedure, or file a complaint with the Regional Office for FHEO in Seattle, Washington; and (3) The responsibility for tenant selection and assignment rest with the Linn-Benton HA.

Finally, based on the facts available to this office the Rosenfeld issue and the felon issue present clearly separate issues. The solution to "felon issue" lies in meeting with representatives of the local housing authority, the Commission, and representatives from HUD's Office of Public Housing and FHEO. If the HA has misinterpreted or misunderstood the policies of the Department to require the admission of convicted felons and child sex offenders as you assert in your letter, then this meeting will be help to clarify these issues.

The investigation of Ms. Rosenfeld's complaint and the decision resolved that issue for the Department and the Housing Authority. If Ms. Rosenfeld disagrees with the Department's decision, the Act authorizes her to pursue the matter in court. Based on the facts obtained during the investigation, this office has no reason to believe that a court will arrive at a different conclusion.

I received your letter dated 13OCT2005 in reply to my letter concerning problems with the Linn-Benton Housing Authority and concerns of Ms. Rosenfeld (Title VII-#10-050144-8 Sect. 504-#10-05-0026-4 ADA-#10-05-0017-D).

I hope your statement that you have no case file pertaining to Ms. Rosenfeld is an oversight. This issue has been stewing for some years now. In addition to a file in Seattle, Ms. Rosenfeld has apparently written directly to you in the past.

I thank you for your instructions on the issues I need to address.

The first issue is whether Ms. Rosenfeld was a victim of harassment & intimidation. It did not take more than a few minutes of reviewing police reports and records for me to form an opinion on this matter. To give you an idea of how outlandish some of these issues are I have attached a couple of police records. The first is predatory sex offender James Hickman. The home address is public housing. The second is James Reid, a live in felon of one of the residents. The third is Barry Brown "the stalker". These are not very nice folks and certainly not the type of individuals you want around your kids. Ms Rosenfelds worries have long been documented and consistently fallen on deaf ears. One of the most compelling examples of this is the attached Corvallis City Council minutes from a couple of years ago, nothing has been done. I will once again point out my conversation with the Corvallis police chief and his concerns.

When mailing my last letter I forwarded a copy to US Rep. Peter Defazio. He in turn mailed a copy to the director of the Linn Benton Housing Director. The director then replied to me stating that these practices do not take place. This statement does not match the record. I trust court records and police reports far more than personal perspectives.


After reviewing excerpts of Ms. Rosenfelds hearing on her housing voucher, it appears to me that some serious questions need to be raised. The most compelling in my mind is that it would appear

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that Ms. Rosenfeld may be a victim of retaliation. I believe this needs to be reviewed. There is a big misconception that Linn and Benton Counties have some authority over this issue, we do not (see attached letter of Benton County Chair). As with many government programs that start out to do something good, they then become self evolving entities. I would like to point out that we can advocate for our citizens but in cases such as this the evolving system has locked us out from oversight.

Regarding any violations under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (harassment or intimidation), we are not a federal enforcement agency here in Linn County. I believe our role is to instruct that something appears out of the ordinary in our opinion. It would be the role of a Federal Agency to enforce their rules. I would like to take this moment again to ask for a full review of this case.

TITLE 42--THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND WELFARE

CHAPTER 8--LOW-INCOME HOUSING

Sec. 1436a. Restriction on use of assisted housing by non-resident aliens

(a) Conditions for assistance

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the applicable Secretary may not make financial assistance available for the benefit of any alien unless that alien is a resident of the United States and is--

(1) an alien lawfully admitted for permanent residence as an immigrant as defined by section 1101(a)(15) and (20) of title 8, excluding, among others, alien visitors, tourists, diplomats, and students who enter the United States temporarily with no intention of abandoning their residence in a foreign country;

(2) an alien who entered the United States prior to June 30, 1948, or such subsequent date as is enacted by law, has continuously maintained his or her residence in the United States since then, and is not ineligible for citizenship, but who is deemed to be lawfully admitted for permanent residence as a result of an exercise of discretion by the Attorney General pursuant to section 1259 of title 8;

(3) an alien who is lawfully present in the United States pursuant to an admission under section 1157 of title 8 or pursuant to the granting of asylum (which has not been terminated) under section 1158 of title 8;

(4) an alien who is lawfully present in the United States as a result of an exercise of discretion by the Attorney General for emergent reasons or reasons deemed strictly in the public interest pursuant to section 1182(d)(5) of title 8;

(5) an alien who is lawfully present in the United States as a result of the Attorney General's withholding deportation pursuant to section 1231(b)(3) of title 8;

(6) an alien lawfully admitted for temporary or permanent residence under section 1255a of title 8; or

(7) an alien who is lawfully resident in the United States and its territories and possessions under section 141 of the Compacts of Free Association between the Government of the United States and the Governments of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia (48 U.S.C. 1901 note) and Palau (48 U.S.C. 1931 note) while the applicable section is in effect: Provided, That, within Guam any such alien shall not be entitled to a preference in receiving assistance under this Act over any United States citizen or national resident therein who is otherwise eligible for such assistance.

(b) ``Financial assistance'' defined

(1) For purposes of this section the term ``financial assistance'' means financial assistance made available pursuant to the United States

Dear Senator Grassley:

This letter is a follow up to the one I sent you dated May 18, 2011 (registered). My previous contact was my perspective on your discovery of the extensive amount of corruption at the Department of Housing and Urban Renewal. This was confirmed in the Office of Inspector Generals report discussed in that letter.

My letter went further to give you a view of the issue of predatory criminal offenders in public housing and the abuse the Medicare/SSDI system here in the State of Oregon. In that letter I warned that the State of Oregon was preparing to empty out the State Mental institutions and prisons by abusing the federal system to pay for this. My overall concern was the systematic danger to citizens this would create. It is my understanding that you were upset that your home state of Iowa was engaging in this practice.

Since my last correspondence, the Oregon legislature has passed two new laws (SB420 & HB 3100) to further abuse the system. These bills cut law enforcement and psychiatric professionals out of the system and to hide it behind supposed interpretations of HIPPA laws. This allows "buearcrats, not the judicial system dispatch justice. I have fought this tooth and nail repeatedly stating that it all is against federal law. I was invited not to testify before the legislature.

42 U.S.C. chapt 135 sub V sec. 13663 prohibits the placement of predatory sex offenders in publicly funded housing. The Social Security Act sec.202 [42 U.S.C. 402] (x)(1)(A) forbids the use of SSDI to place adjudicated offenders in "group homes" under this law.

One of the cases I referred to in my previous letter communicated the abuse of one whistle-blower named Caterina Rosenfeld. Now the reason I am bringing up that name is because after my last letter an attorney for HUD named Dennis Raschka authored a letter to Ms Rosenfeld regarding my correspondence to you (attachment #1).

In this letter, the attorney Dennis Raschka states "Mr. Lindsey's... outlines his belief that current laws *are permitting* convicted felons to live near families with children" [*emphasis added*] Right there is an example of what is wrong with the Department of Housing and Urban Development. I very specifically laid out the case of how all of these activities are not consistent with federal law. I would also point out that they are not consistent with state law as I previously stated. At issue is the lack of enforcement of law.

It is overwhelmingly apparent that HUD has no intention of enforcing their own laws. This was made quite clear in the letter by Dennis Raschka. As with ALL government policy there is always a motive to not carry out policy. I would speculate three scenarios:

- 1) Mr. Raschka and his supervisors are incompetent or are enablers for these criminals.
- 2) Mr. Raschka has no respect for his superiors or has no respect for the law or members of congress.
- 3) Mr. Raschka has some sort of financial gain and interest in these housing projects frauding HUD, Social Security and Medicare.

Since my last correspondence I would like to point out a quick thumbnail sketch of two unrelated incidences that show the example of how dangerous federal programs are becoming. Here in my neighborhood, lifetime nationally register sex offender, rapists, kidnapper and violent felon Louis Alfred Nemnich is a prime example. Three years ago in one of his favorite activities, Mr. Nemnich attacked and raped a woman in broad daylight. To cover up his crime this time he wrapped her neck with a rope to squeeze the last bit of life out of his victim. He was stopped before he was done. The Clackamas County DA just assumed he would spend the rest of his life in prison. This would be a more appropriate setting, given Mr. Nemnich's skill-set.

Under new health parity laws, Mr. Nemnich (attachment #2) was sent for a psychiatric review and disappeared into the system. He has now turned up in a "group home" under supposed guard. He is on SSDI and subsidized by public housing. His victim has never had her day in court.

I have attached (#3) a story from DC's neck of the woods. This story is of a violent offender named Antoinette Starks. I called around to confirm the facts of this piece. The issues are no different than the issues I have brought up. In this case the victims of her slashing rampages will never have justice served and she will always have the federal government defending her.

Senator Grassley, as you can tell I take this issue of lack of federal enforcement seriously. As each child is victimized by enablers at HUD I get angrier. As I see the unloading of violent felons, molesters and foreign gangs into poor neighborhoods, my level of disgust increases. As I see financially disadvantaged people and families placed in dangerous positions by government institutions, my faith in justice erodes. I laid out some solutions in my last letter. To get a hold of the system, it will take discipline. Corruption of a government institution usually exists where the money is plentiful.

Mr. Stephens spoke to me about your conversation with him, and his comment about you needing a voucher. This is to clarify that he did not mean that he would or could obtain a voucher for you. He was trying to be sympathetic and repeating what he believed you were asking for. We understand your plight and are sorry for your circumstances, however, only HUD or the courts have the authority to reinstate your voucher. We have reviewed the materials which you have submitted many times and unless there is new evidence, our office will be taking no further action in this matter.

In regard to your latest complaint, we have also researched the name of the individual and company involved in the group home and there is no HUD funding going to them. Mr. Lindsey's letter to Senator Grassley, which you attached, outlines his belief that current laws are permitting convicted felons to live near families with children. Senator Grassley and other members of Congress are the correct forum to address new laws.

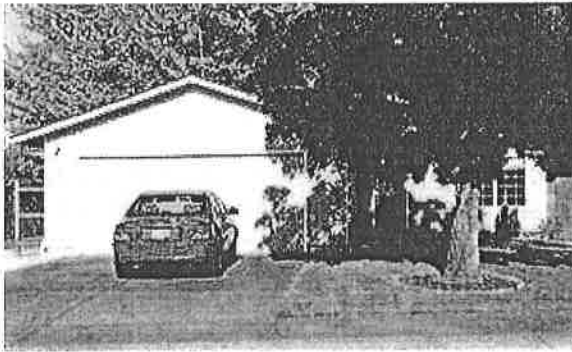

Neighbors sign off on group home

A neighborhood agreement has been signed and Linn County plans to move forward on a contract with Shangri-La Corp., the company behind a planned home for residents with mental illness on Del Rio Place S.E. in Albany, officials announced today.

The county board of commissioners had been holding off on agreeing to draw up a contract with the corporation until immediate neighbors signed a "neighborhood agreement."

The agreement spells out how to handle any conflicts among the group home, the neighbors, Shangri-La and Linn County.

"We still wish this wasn't happening," said Carol Mahr, one of the neighbors who signed the agreement. "We put a lot of time and effort into working for a different outcome.

"But now we need to move on with our lives. I hope it works out wonderfully. Check back with me in six months."

She said she gives Shangri-La CEO Jan Kral credit for taking the time to listen and take the neighbors' opinions and concerns into consideration.

Salem-based Shangri-La — a not-for-profit company that partners with the state to provide mental health services — has the option of contracting directly with the state and bypassing Linn County and its mental health department.

However, since November the company CEO and others have been working with neighbors and county officials to come up with a plan all parties can live with.

Mahr said though the outcome is less than desirable, she is glad Linn County will contract with Shangri-La and serve as the "gatekeeper," determining which individuals will be a good fit for the home.

"While the board disagrees with the state's approach to this issue, everyone involved at the local level is going to do the best they can to make it work," said Roger Nyquist, the county board chairman.

"I have a lot of respect for Carol and the rest of the neighbors for being proactive and caring about the quality of life in their neighborhood."

Shangri-La had originally planned to house forensic patients — people judged guilty of a crime "except for insanity" — at the Del Rio Place location.

The neighbors protested and Nyquist came out against the plan. The plan was revised, and state officials, partnering with Shangri-La, announced in a public meeting the project would move forward but would house only civilly committed, non-felon individuals with mental illness.

Linn County Mental Health Director Frank Moore estimates residents could move in by early November, but the selection process will likely take longer.

Neighbors say no to forensic patients

Some living nearby object to facility's plan to create six transitional homes

Two Salem artists who live near Oregon State Hospital are objecting to state plans to move dozens of criminally committed psychiatric patients, possibly including sex offenders, into six transitional homes on the state hospital grounds.

Andries Fourie, a sculptor who teaches art at Willamette University, has sent protest letters to Gov. Ted Kulongoski, Senate President Peter Courtney, House Speaker Jeff Merkley and Salem Mayor Janet Taylor.

Fourie, who can see the cottages from his home along 24th Street NE, fears that the transitional homes will jeopardize neighborhood safety.

"These plans appear to have been made with little more than a deliberate and callous disregard for the safety of neighboring residents," he wrote in an Aug. 22 letter to Kulongoski. "Why would anyone in their right mind place sex offenders right next to a neighborhood that is filled with children and many elderly people who live alone."

Fourie also wrote that "there is no such thing as a 0 percent recidivism rate, and that it is only a matter of time before one of the patients in the planned transitional units uses their newly gained freedom and ready access to the adjacent community to perform the kind of act that they were institutionalized for in the first place, and the victim will be a child, a woman or an elderly person from the neighborhood. When that kind of tragedy occurs, the state will have to bear the blame."

Jonathan Bucci, also a resident on 24th Street and a sculptor and painter who is the collection curator at Willamette's Hallie Ford Museum of Art, has similar concerns about the cottages. He characterized the state's plan to create clustered transitional homes adjacent to the central Salem neighborhood as "a Petri dish experiment."

Top hospital officials confirmed that six cottages will open as transitional units early next year. In all, 36 patients will be housed in the cottages. All or most of the occupants will be forensic patients — people who committed crimes and were judged "guilty except for insanity."

Officials said the transitional program is designed for low-risk, high-functioning patients who have progressed in treatment and are nearing their hospital discharges. Most of them take stabilizing medication to manage their mental illness.

Staff members will be on duty around the clock in the cottages, officials said. The units will be locked at night and equipped with alarm systems to alert employees to any unauthorized patient departures.

Faced with neighbor opposition to the transitional units, hospital Superintendent Roy Orr said Friday that he intends to set up additional meetings with residents to further explain the program and "to also humanize the work we do here and demystify it to some extent. That's a big piece of this."

Asked whether the hospital might pull the plug on the planned program, Orr said that's not an option.

Fourie said he might ask neighbors to join his protest.

"We need to see if the hospital will be amenable to taking our concerns seriously," he said. "If they don't, then I suppose we will have to sort of try to organize the neighborhood. Hopefully, we won't need to. I mean, I have a full-time job, I teach at the university. I have no real interest in being a community activist. I've never done anything like this before."

Controversy continues

Hospital officials tried to ease concerns about the transitional units during an Aug. 19 meeting attended by Fourie, Bucci and other neighbors. But their safety assurances failed to defuse the controversy.

"For the most part, I was more disturbed by what I heard than heartened by it," Fourie said, "because they confirmed that there will be forensic patients in there, including sex offenders."

The hospital's forensic program has about 450 patients who committed crimes and were found guilty except for insanity, resulting in stints of psychiatric care rather than incarceration in state prisons or county jails. Their crimes range from theft to sex offenses and murder.

Hospital officials confirmed that the transitional cottages could house an unspecified number of sex offenders.

"Potentially, there could be sex offenders, but 'sex offender' is a pretty broad term, and it's really a red flag to everyone in the public," said Maynard Hammer, the hospital's deputy superintendent. "Some of our sex offenders committed one act back in their teens and they're now in their 30s or 40s."

"That's certainly not the focus of putting folks in there. It's based on treatment level, risk analysis of how well they function and how successful they're likely to be."

Opposition to the transitional housing program comes as the state is moving forward with long-awaited plans to build a new \$250 million psychiatric facility to replace the existing 125-year-old institution.

The transitional program is expected to take some of the patients now occupying minimum-security wards in the hospital's decaying J Building. State plans call for preserving the oldest part of the J Building and incorporating it into the new complex. Other parts of the J Building will be razed to clear the way for the planned state-of-the-art facility.

Fourie said his opposition to the planned transitional units doesn't mean that he objects to the state hospital replacement project.

"It's not as if we're saying, 'we don't want the hospital there,' " he said. "The hospital was there long before us. I've only lived here less than a year. But at the same time, they really need to respect our need for peace of mind and safety. I don't think there's a community anywhere that would volunteer for the privilege of living right across the street from that kind of transitional housing."

Troubled history

More than two dozen cottages are scattered across the south and southwest section of the hospital's sprawling 144-acre campus. In a bygone era, hospital administrators and other high-ranking employees resided in some of the stately homes.

Today, some cottages have occupants, others stand vacant. Varied uses for the cottages include office space for hospital financial operations, offices for nonprofit agencies and at least two group homes for former hospital patients and other community-based mental-health clients.

The group homes are run by Marion County and the Shangri-La Corp., a Salem-based nonprofit agency.

Remodeling work now is being done on the six cottages that will become transitional units for forensic patients.

Hammer noted that the planned transitional program isn't a new concept. In the 1990s, the hospital ran a three-cottage program that housed 26 forensic patients. It was scrapped during state budget cuts in 2001-03.

"We've had these kinds of programs operating there since probably the mid-1990s, and to my knowledge there's never been a problem," Hammer said.

More than 20 years ago, however, one of Salem's most notorious killers murdered two people and buried their bodies — one in a garden behind a state hospital cottage — all while on approved passes issued by hospital therapists.

In 1986, Robert Langley was enrolled in a hospital program for mentally disturbed prison inmates. He convinced his therapists that he was a model patient and worthy of frequent, unsupervised passes. His activities while freed on passes included selling drugs and committing two murders.

In December 1987, Langley bound and strangled Anne Gray of Salem. He buried her body in a muddy hole behind a North Salem house where his aunt once lived.

Four months later, Langley used a baseball bat to bludgeon to death Larry Rockenbrant in a garage on state hospital grounds. A prosecutor later told a jury that Langley and Rockenbrant knew each other and that Langley had told him about Gray's murder. Langley then killed Rockenbrant to keep him silent.

On April 13, 1988, Langley buried Rockenbrant's body in a cactus garden behind a cottage on the hospital grounds. The makeshift grave was marked with a sign reading: "Cottage 18 garden. Please don't touch."

Langley now is on Death Row at the Oregon State Penitentiary. The hospital treatment program that granted him liberal pass privileges no longer exists. It was canceled years ago.

Community opposition

The brewing controversy about the transitional units on the state hospital campus follows uproars that occurred during the past year in Oregon cities where citizen protests derailed or delayed plans to open community-based residential facilities for forensic patients coming out of the state hospital.

Community dissent to planned or existing facilities for former forensic patients erupted in Albany, Cornelius, Milwaukie and Hillsboro.

Meanwhile, the state faces pressure to create additional community facilities for patients to go once hospital therapists have determined that they no longer need to be institutionalized.

In January, a scathing report by the U.S. Department of Justice asserted that patients deemed ready to leave the hospital often languish in crowded wards, breeding anger and despair among patients

eager to re-enter society.

"The detrimental effect on individual patients of this prolonged waiting and frequent rejection is documented repeatedly in their clinical records," stated the report. "Patients' despair, anger and agitation about having been turned down by community providers become a part of their illness."

A governor-appointed task force has been examining the legalities and controversies surrounding the siting of community facilities for former forensic patients. The panel is charged with making recommendations to the governor and the 2009 Legislature.

Although anti-group-home sentiment has flared in some cities, state statistics show that few forensic patients commit new crimes after being conditionally released from the state hospital.

Statewide, about 380 former forensic patients are living in Oregon communities while on conditional release. They are subject to strict monitoring by the state Psychiatric Security Review Board and live in varied types of housing, ranging from apartments to adult foster homes and secure residential treatment facilities.

From 1997 to 2007, 2.2 percent of conditionally released patients have been arrested for new felony crimes. In comparison, nearly 30 percent of released Oregon prison inmates commit new crimes that land them back behind bars within three years.

Call for education

In Salem, public concerns about hospital security and safety were heightened this summer when a forensic patient made a headline-grabbing escape.

On July 11, Salem police arrested escapee Michael Sands, 27, after he overpowered a staff member and bolted from a locked psychiatric ward. He allegedly carjacked a vehicle in West Salem, rammed a police car, assaulted an officer and had to be subdued with Taser shocks.

Even before Sands escaped, Salem Mayor Janet Taylor had raised concerns about having a large mental institution in the city's core.

Taylor previously tried but failed to persuade state leaders to move the hospital replacement project to the city's fringe. She relented when state officials refused to budge on their decision to build the new 620-bed complex on the existing campus.

Taylor, in responding to Fourie's recent letter of complaint about the planned transitional cottages, said she sympathized with his distress but felt powerless to alter state plans.

"I have been speaking out publicly on this issue since January of this year," she wrote back to Fourie. "I really felt that the new hospital should be built in a different location that was not in the middle of a residential area. I have been continually dismissed by the State of Oregon leadership.

"Needless to say, I understand and sympathize with your situation."

In a subsequent e-mail to the Statesman Journal, Taylor said that she had asked Salem City Councilor Bruce Rogers "to head up this effort on group homes around the State Hospital as I am very deep in economic development efforts and don't want to lose focus on this important area."

Rogers, who served on a panel that reviewed hospital security in the wake of Sands' escape, said he understands the hospital's rationale for creating the transitional units. At the same time, he said, hospital officials and mental-health administrators need to do a much better job of informing the public

about plans to expand the statewide network of community-based facilities for patients coming out of the state hospital.

"I support the state hospital," Rogers said. "Do I support community-based mental health? I don't have a good answer for that. I don't understand that whole program. Some days, I think it's like new math. I don't know if it's working or not.

"The state of Oregon has to do a better job of educating communities, all communities, not just Salem, about what community-based mental health is. They just have to do it."

Antoinette Starks Arrested, Charged With Attempted Murder For Stabbing Outside Target In Prince George's County

MITCHELLVILLE, Md. (WUSA) -- A woman accused of stabbing another woman outside of a Prince George's County Target store will be held without bond, a county judge decided Wednesday afternoon.

Antoinette Starks faces up to 30 years for the stabbing, that happened at around 9:46 a.m., Tuesday, at the 10600 block of Martin Luther King Avenue in Mitchellville, police said.

Starks walked out of a Shoppers supermarket with a pack of knives and, according to police, randomly stabbed another woman just next door outside the Target.

Surveillance camera video from inside Shoppers shows Starks in a black hoodie, trying to check out and pay for a pack of knives. Police say her credit card didn't clear but she made off with the knives anyway.

Shortly afterward, she would stab her victim several times outside the Target store. Police say Antoinette Starks approached another woman at the entrance of the Target store and stabbed her.

The 39-year-old woman who was stabbed multiple times in the torso was said to be in critical condition when police and emergency personnel arrived at the scene, police said. She was later listed in stable condition.

Prince George's County Police said they had to use a taser on Antoinette Starks to arrest her.

Starks is charged with:

- first and second degree attempted murder
- first and second degree assault
- assault with a deadly weapon

Records in 9 News Now's archives show this isn't the first time Starks was charged with a stabbing attack at a shopping center. In 2005, Starks went on a stabbing rampage at the Nordstrom in the Westfield Montgomery Mall.

In that attack, at least one woman was stabbed and dozens were terrorized after Starks chased down strangers, trying to stab them with four knives she managed to tie together.

According to court documents, Starks was found not criminally responsible and ordered into a mental institution. We have confirmed Starks was released from incarceration at a mental hospital on August 11.

The state officials involved are calling the violent incident an aberration, but prosecutors are calling for reform. Fifty-six-year old Antoinette Starks is an incurable paranoid schizophrenic, according to the medical files revealed in court records, But that didn't keep a state psychiatrist from letting her out of Maryland's prison hospital for the criminally insane just a month ago. A state psychiatrist said Starks' paranoid schizophrenia was under control.

Well known Washington area criminal profiler Pat Brown said Antoinette Starks should have never been released from the custody of the mental hospital.

Brown said, "these people are the type of people you don't want back in society, because they are to the point of being psychopathic." She added, "at a psychiatric institute they will learn the tricks of what to say to be called okay and then be released."

Prince George's County Police spokesman Cpl. Henry Tippet said the stabbing was random and unprovoked."

Prince George's County Police say someone she was living with at a halfway house in Bowie drove her to the shopping center Tuesday.

We don't know yet if her lawyers will again seek a "not criminally responsible" insanity defense that could send her back into the same system she just got out of in August.

Her preliminary hearing is set for November 8th.

Attached is a request for a couple of statutory changes I would ask you to please submit to legislative council. As you know, in your district and around the state there has been a lot of confusion of PSRB patients being placed in "group homes". This policy has resulted in the death of some of these patients and close calls in other situations.

The first issue is "*group home*" vs. "*secure facility*". Group homes are usually for mentally disabled, special needs, addicted or other treatment facility associated with individuals. Long term care of these individuals is usually associated with SSI. A "secure facility" is where an individual is not free to "*come and go*". It is against the federal law and IRS code for these individuals to be supported by SSI (Oregon violates this law, that's another issue, another day). "*...an individual is confined... in connection with a verdict of not guilty by reason of insanity or guilty but insane, or a finding of incompetent to stand trial*" U.S.C. Public Law 106-170. Co-mingling of funds is not in line with federal rules.

The requirements of "secure facilities" are defined in ORS 443.465. This definition had failed to be noted in ORS 443.405. To clarify the difference of "secured facilities" I propose the minor changes needed here. This will help protect these individuals under treatment and law enforcement.

Secondly, I have also proposed change to ORS 443.465 to help inform local law enforcement of dangerous individuals under PSRB supervision. This will hopefully reduce the number of shootings involving this class of criminal.

443.465 Secure residential treatment homes and facilities; rules. (1) The Department of Human Services shall adopt rules applicable to secure residential treatment homes and facilities as defined in ORS 443.400 that house persons who, as a condition of release under ORS 161.315 to 161.351, are required to live in a secure home or facility. The rules must:

(a) Provide minimum security, health and safety standards;

(b) Require the home or facility to have an emergency preparedness plan;

(c) Set minimum training standards for the staff of the home or facility; and

(d) Ensure compliance with any orders of the court or the board.

(e) Provide local law enforcement with location of home and notification of residents under PSRB care.

(f) Provide the local mental health authority of suggested state hospital placements in local facilities, under contrary with the PSRB board.

(2) As used in this section, a residential treatment home or facility is "secure" if a resident exit from the home, facility or grounds of the home or facility is restricted through the use of locking devices on resident exit doors, gates or other closures. [2009 c.475 §1].

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Lawsuit claims Linn-Benton Housing Authority subsidized felons

CORVALLIS, Ore. – Some families living in public housing in the Willamette Valley claim they were terrorized by criminals living next to them – and the man in charge of the housing agency would do nothing to help.

One mother, Caterina Rosenfeld, filed a lawsuit against the Linn-Benton Housing Authority, saying its managers denied her right to fair and safe housing.

She is representing herself in federal court, claiming she and her daughter lived in fear in public housing and that the housing authority was subsidizing felons.

"We were terrified all the time," she said. "We were absolutely terrified."

Rosenfeld said the problems started in 1999, and she went to the head of the housing authority, James Hackett, with her concerns.

"I phoned Mr. Hackett first maybe weekly and then at times daily," she said. "The other mothers wrote letters to him telling him that we couldn't live like this, that we were frightened for our children."

They were frightened of their new neighbors.

That included 56-year-old Barry Allen Brown, who has a criminal history dating back 21 years, including convictions for stalking and assault.

Rosenfeld said as soon as Brown moved in he began terrorizing children, especially her 9-year-old daughter Angelina – whose bedroom was right below Brown's home.

"He was tapping at her window at two in the morning," Rosenfeld said. "He was jumping up and down over her bedroom at night."

But she said the housing authority not only ignored her complaints but brought in more criminals.

"They knew the criminal histories of these fellows, they put them in," Rosenfeld said. "Mr. Hackett said he was going to place them anyway for money reasons."

After Brown was transferred to another home, 45-year-old James Reid moved in upstairs. He had a criminal record stretching 14 years that included convictions for robbery, forgery, identity theft, burglary and dealing drugs.

"He had come out of the penitentiary the day that he moved in," Rosenfeld said.

Then there was 45-year-old James Hickman, a registered sex offender. A predatory sex offender notification obtained by KATU listed Hickman's home address at 2631 Southwest Leonard in Corvallis, a home managed by the housing authority and right next door to the Rosenfelds. The notification even lists his target victims as minor females.

Hackett, the head of the housing authority, said due to confidentiality rules he couldn't talk about current or past clients of housing assistance.

But Rosenfeld and three former housing authority employees allege that the housing authority had to fill its vacancies to justify building Camas Commons, a family-oriented neighborhood of 56 homes. Hackett created the project.

A former employee who spoke to KATU on condition of anonymity said the plan was well known around the housing authority offices.

"There was a need for money, and the only way you could get more money was to keep the units occupied, so you fill them with whoever comes along, no regards to any of the other people," the former employee told KATU.

The agency collects and distributes more than \$12 million in taxpayer funded housing vouchers.

The former employee said he warned Hackett about Brown because of Brown's past.

"I was quite frankly afraid that something violent was going to happen," the former employee said.

But he said Hackett ignored him and other employees – another claim that Hackett denied.

Hackett, pictured below, told KATU he did not knowingly put felons in federally subsidized housing.

"Our policy is that people who have recent violent criminal or drug-related criminal activity are ineligible," Hackett said.

In 2005, Congressman Peter DeFazio wrote the Linn County and Benton County commissioners, warning them that: "sex offenders are ineligible for admission to public

housing."

The commissioners ultimately oversee the agency.

Rosenfeld was not the only one making complaints. KATU obtained a stack of letters to the housing authority and police reports indicating several neighbors also complained.

The paperwork also shows there were at least seven criminals living in that public housing during the time Rosenfeld lived there, but none in the past two years.

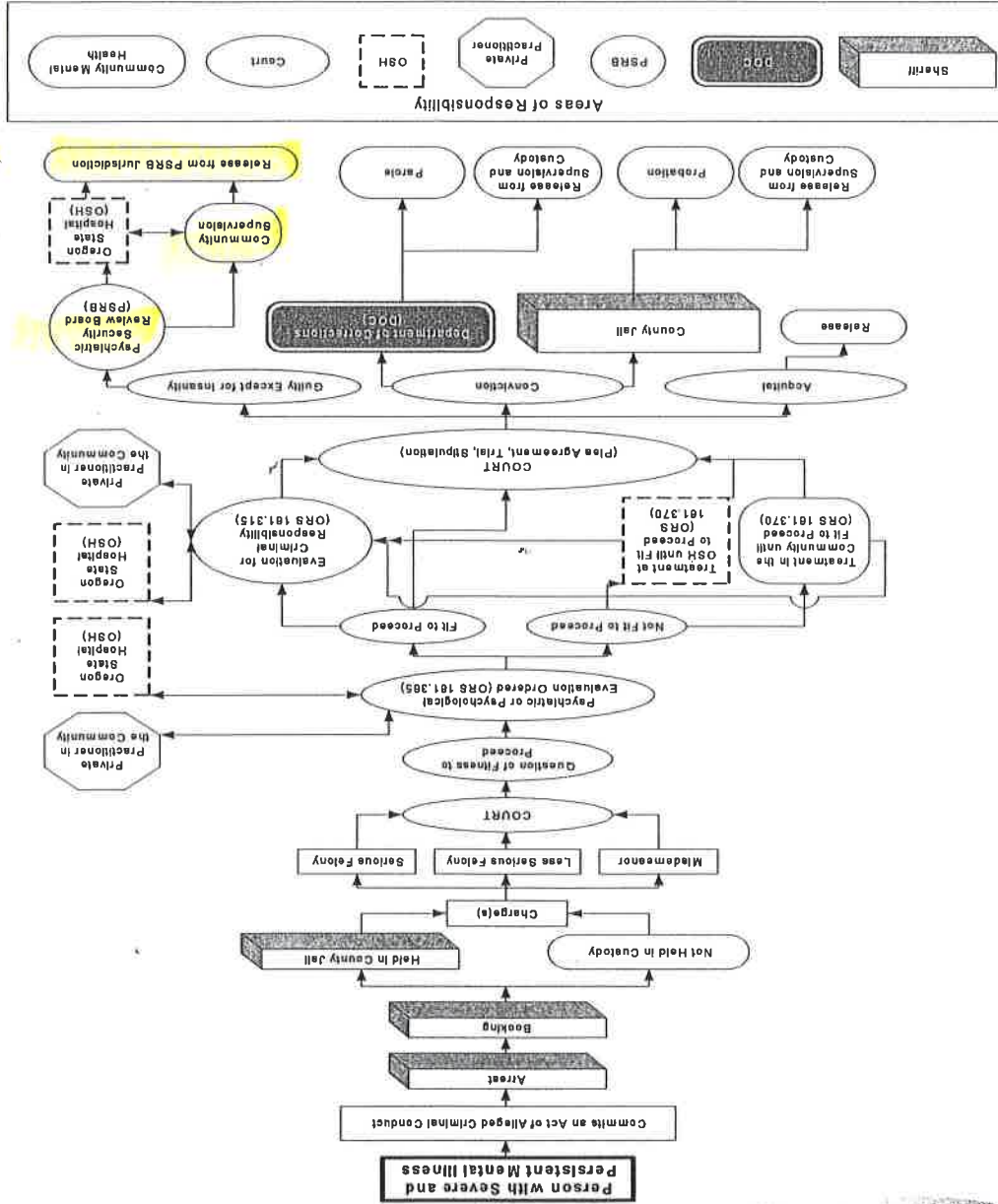

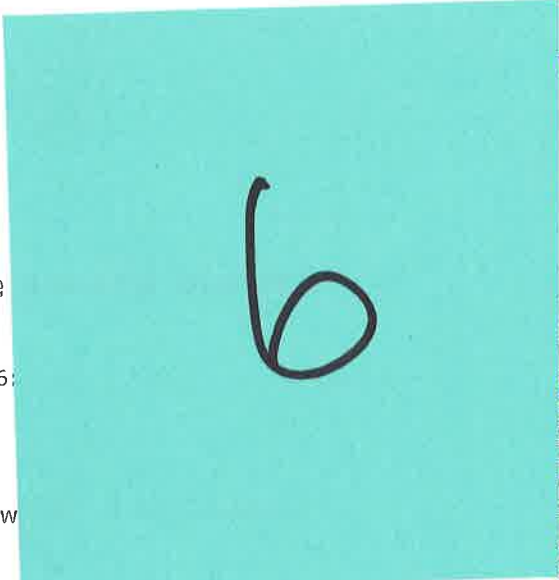

taken such a relaxed view of low-risk offenders if they knew the term could refer to a man serving a 30-year sentence for beating his domestic partner to death? How about a guy who fatally stabbed his girlfriend or another, released from prison only months earlier, who killed his octogenarian neighbor with a shovel?

Yet these criminals are among a group Pew researchers dubbed low risk during a June meeting, according to information



What, exactly, is a "low

Ask the average person, and he'll probably tell you that a low-risk offender is someone who isn't likely to hurt anybody if released (duh) and probably didn't do anything bad enough to deserve a stiff prison sentence.

That's surely how Oregonians who participated in a crime-and-punishment survey early this year understood the term. More than 80 percent agreed that the state should send "fewer low-risk offenders to prison and reinvest some of the savings" on parole and probation.

The survey was commissioned by the Pew Center on the States, which is lending technical help to the Oregon Commission on Public Safety, a panel Gov. John Kitzhaber created to "identify fiscally responsible and sustainable, evidence-based policies and practices that will control corrections growth, hold offenders accountable, and protect public safety." The commission will issue a report this year, some elements of which lawmakers will consider in 2013.

The commission's work is certainly worthwhile, and its recommendations may be as well. But at least one of its members has blown the whistle on its sloppy use of the term "low risk," and he has a point.

Would the vast majority of those who participated in the Pew survey, which appears on the commission's website, have

obtained by commission member and **Clackamas County District Attorney John Foote**.

At that meeting, the **Pew folks presented a number of slides showing various factors responsible for the growth of Oregon's prison population**. According to one slide, 26 percent of those admitted to state prisons in 2011 were low-risk offenders, a 37 percent jump over the 2000 rate. This rise, according to a later slide, is one of "numerous measures" by which "the offenders admitted to prison in 2011 were less serious than those admitted in 2000."

Foote recalls seeing the first slide and thinking, "Hey, that doesn't sound right to me." He asked for the names of those deemed low risk, then distributed the list of 850 offenders to the state's district attorneys, who provided information about most of them. Foote followed up by telling his fellow commissioners in an **Aug. 22 letter** that "Oregon's prosecutors are very concerned about the accuracy of the information that is being provided."

The low-risk criminals included dozens convicted of homicide, some of whom are on death row. It even includes Bruce Turnidge, who was convicted in 2010 of planting a bomb at a Woodburn bank that killed two police officers.

Craig Prins, executive director of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission, chalks up the controversy to context. Low risk, as applied by Pew during the June meeting, refers only to a criminal's likelihood to reoffend, according to an actuarial tool known as the **Public Safety Checklist**. But "it in no way means that an individual offender should not go to prison." In fact, he says of PEW's presentation, "I don't think that's what it's implying."

We'll take his word for it. However, the commission's statistics, and its terminology, will become part of the public debate as soon as the Legislature takes up its work, if not before. Oregonians, thus, are likely to hear that 26 percent of those admitted to prison in 2011 are low-risk criminals who shouldn't be behind bars, just as they're likely to hear that most Oregonians would prefer to send fewer low-risk offenders to jail and spend the savings on probation.

What a pity. To use these statistics to argue against locking up such "low-risk" criminals would, says **Clatsop County District Attorney Josh Marquis**, be "akin to avoiding surgery based on fundamentally flawed diagnostic techniques."

Re: PEW's Continued use of "low risk" in its Presentations

Please find enclosed a copy of the PowerPoint slides we received at our last meeting. I am enclosing them because I want to raise what I feel is an important issue regarding their content.

As you know well, there has been considerable controversy surrounding the use of the Oregon Public Safety Checklist to define inmates in Oregon as "low risk" for the purposes of sentencing policy. Yet despite that well-earned criticism and without any public discussion or explanation, the PEW is continuing to use the Checklist to promote the idea that many

Oregon inmates are "low risk." Most surprising and disturbing is PEW's continued use of the slide that purports to show that last year 26% of Oregon's admittees to prison were "low risk" (see Page 5 of their presentation on September 24, 2012).

Apparently, PEW does not feel compelled to explain their failure to warn the Commission of the contents of their PowerPoint slide. However, without a full explanation, it appears that PEW intended to paint a false and misleading portrait of Oregon's admissions to prison. It seems more than evident that the use of this "low risk" data was designed to demonstrate that up to one fourth of Oregon prison inmates could be safely released into the community, where they could be successfully monitored by probation or parole officers. A simple glance at the list of "low risk" inmates will dispel that notion.

Looking back to the time when this original slide was presented to us on June 29, 2012, it is hard to understand how this information could have been prepared for the Commission without any review of its contents. Unfortunately, we are left to only speculate. Either PEW failed to check this information themselves or they knew about it and failed to report that information to us. Neither choice is reassuring. Failing to know what inmates were on that list or, alternately, failing to inform the Commission about who was on the list calls either the credibility or the competence of PEW into question.

I would ask that before our Commission accepts any further information from PEW about "low risk" inmates, that PEW explain their actions. Otherwise, any information about "low risk" inmates in this process is simply not trustworthy.

That still leaves the question of whether or not the Oregon Public Safety Checklist is a reliable tool for sentencing policy. The list of inmates that has been produced raises real questions about its usefulness in this regard. First, even its proponents admit that as an actuarial tool it carries an error rate of between 20% and 30%. This is simply too large for our comfort and its imprecision is so clearly illustrated by the list of low risk defendants. Second, as we have already noted, there is much criminal history information that is automatically excluded from consideration. The Checklist is designed to be immediately accessible and easy to assemble, but that is not necessarily helpful in a sentencing context.

Perhaps the most troubling aspect of the Oregon Public Safety Checklist is the fact that all its design flaws work only in one direction – to erroneously reduce the apparent risk profile of offenders. Unlike the inevitable statistical errors inherent in any predictive model, which tend to be randomly distributed, errors produced by the exclusion of relevant criminal history in the Public Safety Checklist can only make offenders appear less of a risk to public safety than they actually are. The list prepared by the Oregon District Attorneys amply demonstrates this point. Using a predictive sentencing tool with a significant error rate to begin with is a questionable practice. Using a tool with a significant error rate whose errors only make dangerous criminals appear to be low risk offenders probably constitutes malpractice.

Finally, when one reads the list of "low risk" defendants, it is unsettling to consider how anyone with 20 or 30 prior criminal convictions could be described as "low risk", much less anyone who has committed a serious violent felony. The risk scores of many of the defendants on the list seem completely out of place. That should be a clear warning sign of how misleading this risk tool can be in the sentencing context.

Traditionally, we have based our sentencing system on the principles of proportional sentences based upon the facts of each case (both mitigating and aggravating facts) and each individual's criminal history. I would advocate this is still the most accurate and fair method of sentencing. It has stood the test of time. Oregon's sentencing system is the envy of the rest of the country.

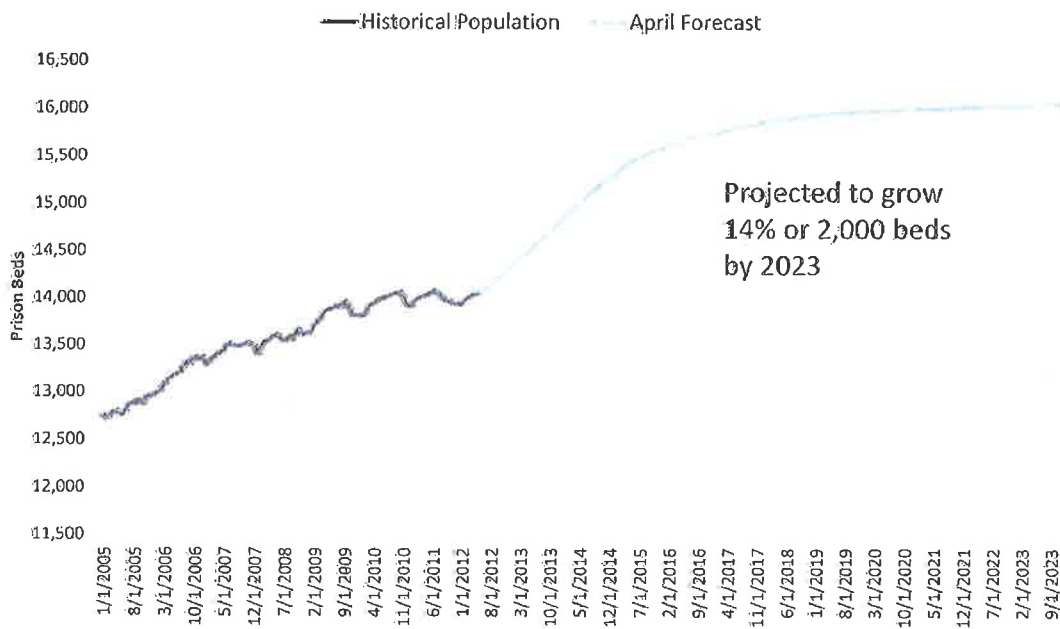

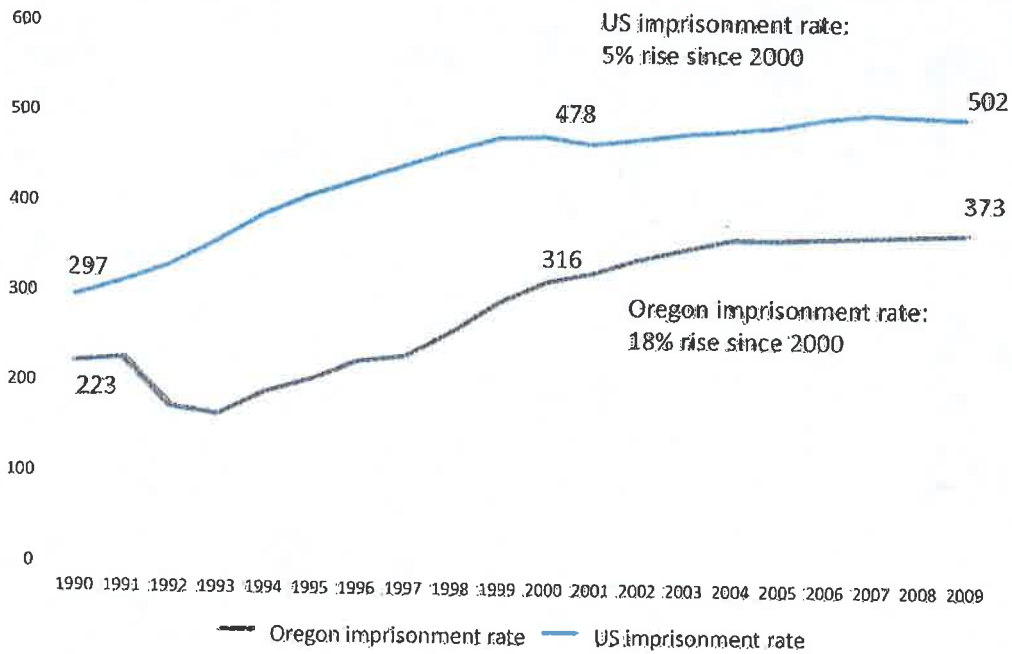

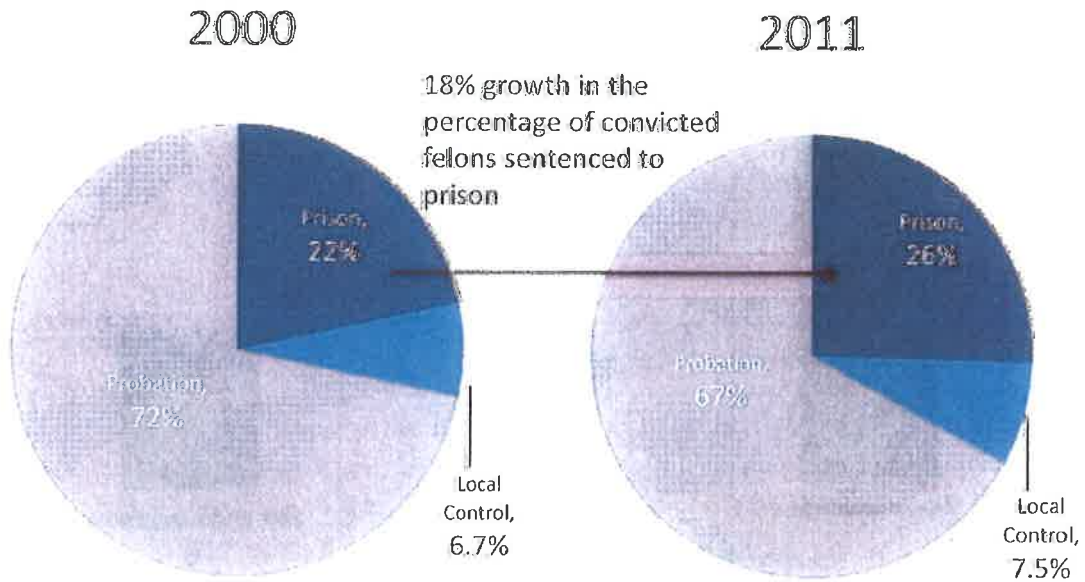
Oregon Prison Growth Drivers

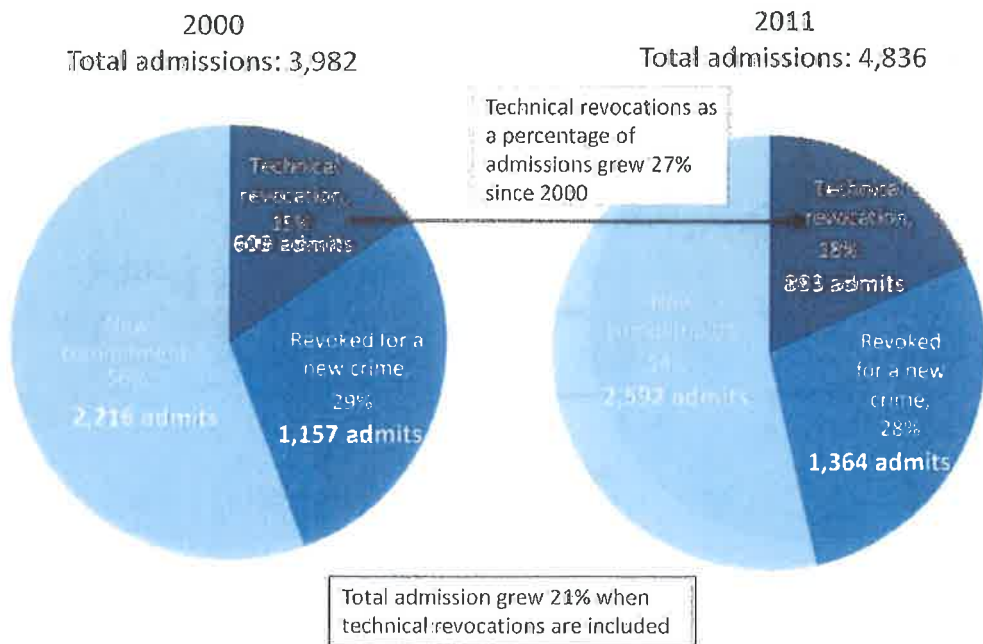
An Increasing Percentage of Convicted Felons Are Being Sentenced to Prison

Admissions: Nearly Half the Prison Intakes in 2011 Failed on Supervision, Including 18% Admitted for Technical Violations



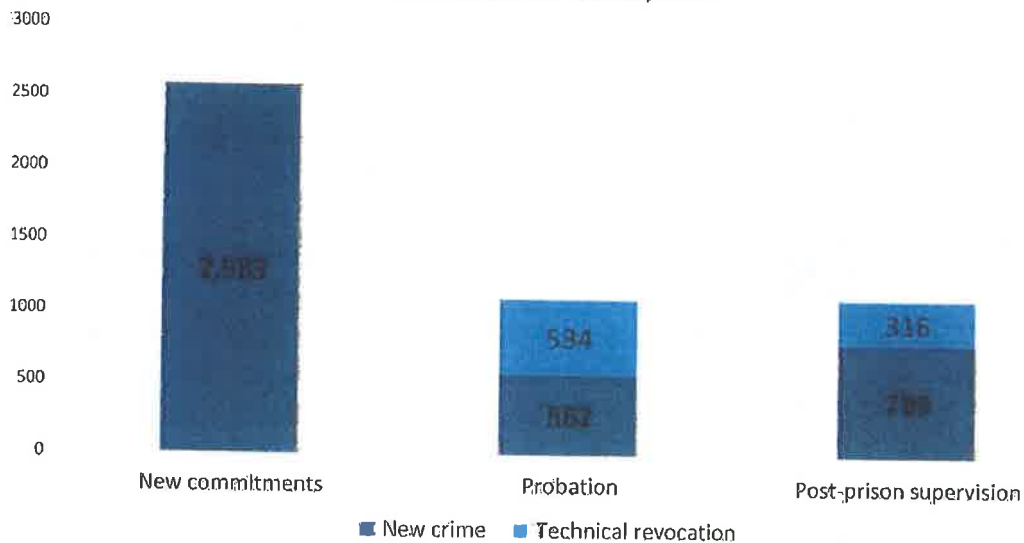

Admissions: Nearly Half the 2011 Probation Revocations Admissions Were Technical Violations



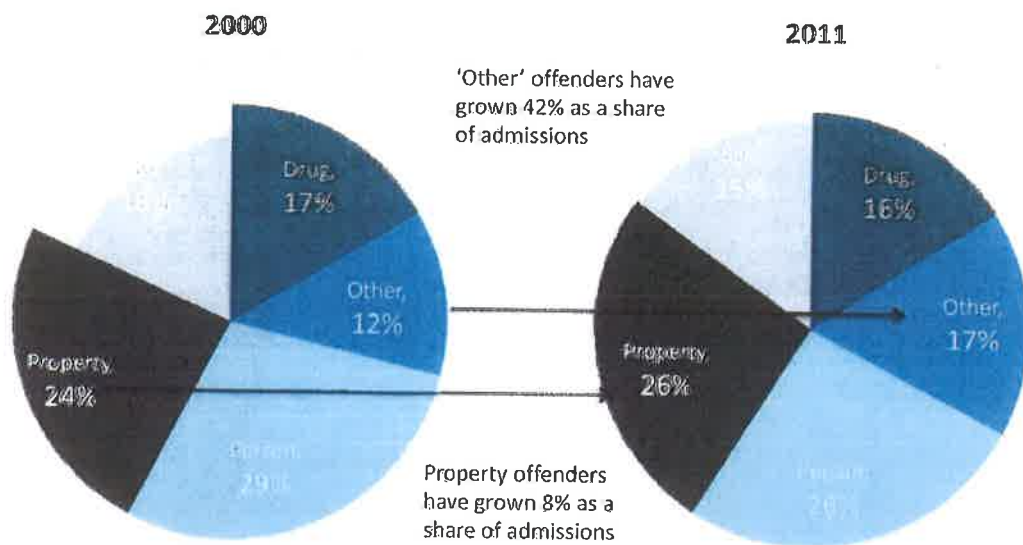
Admissions to Prison, 2011

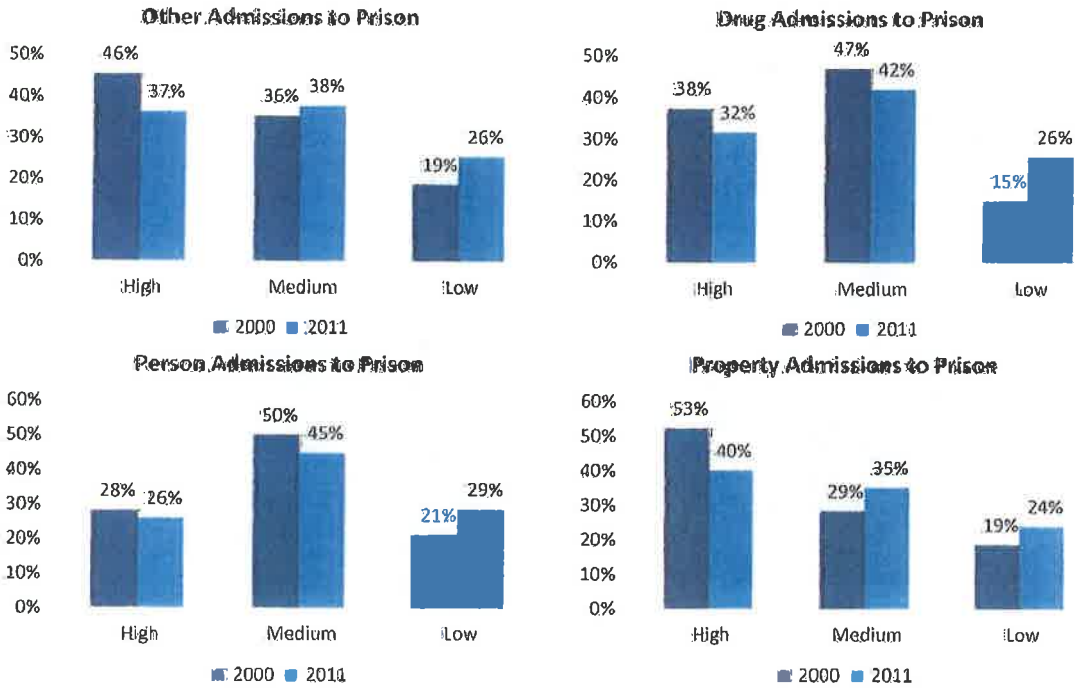
Admissions: Property and "Other" Crimes have Grown as Share of Prison Admissions

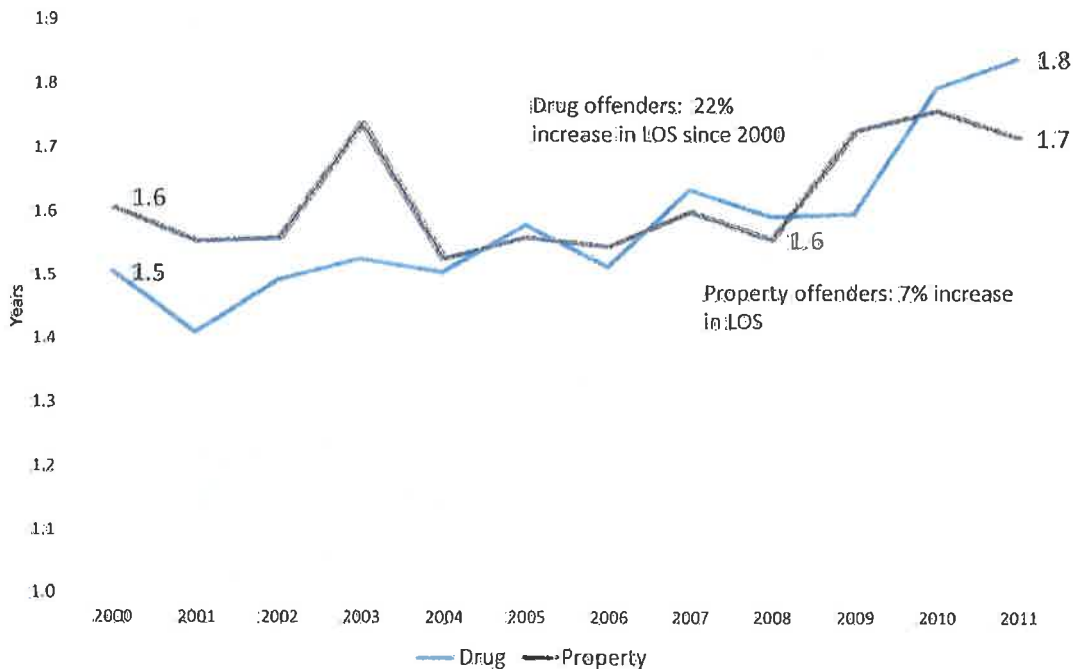
Prison Admissions: Increase in Low Risk Offenders Across All Crime Types

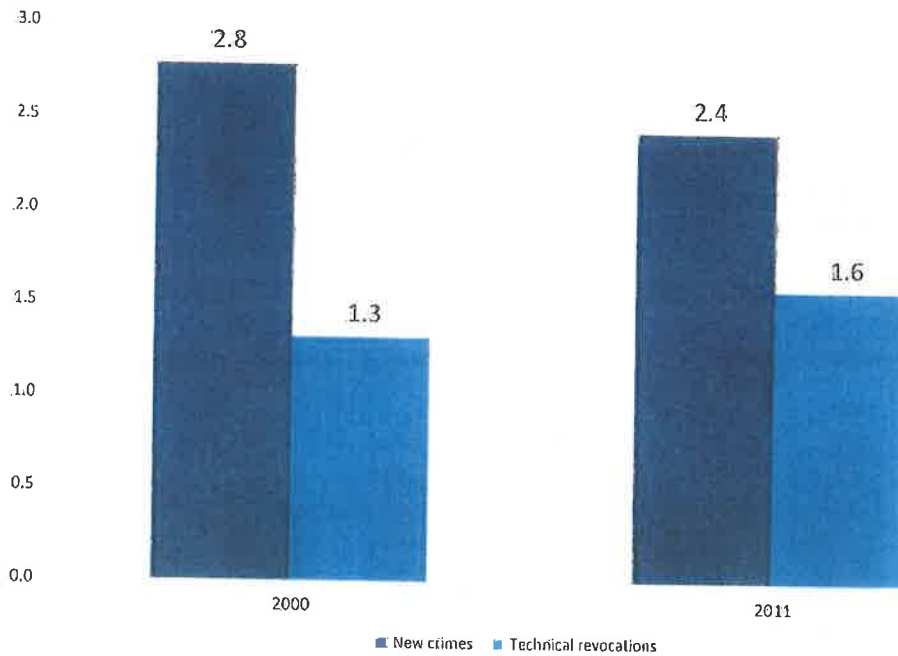
Length of Stay: Property, Drug Crimes Increased Since 2000

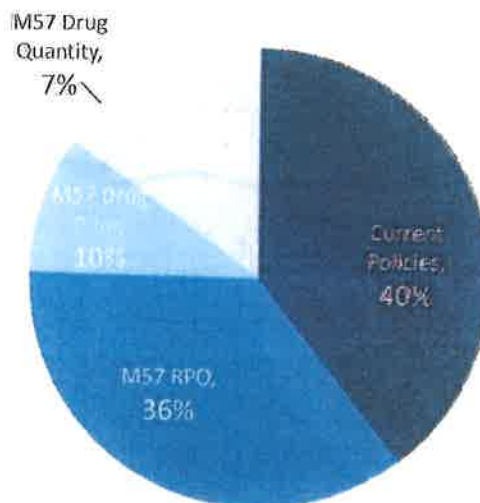

- Daniel S. Nagin et al, "Imprisonment and Reoffending," in *Crime and Justice: A Review of Research* (2008): Systematic review of the effect of reoffending for both custodial vs non-custodial sanctions, and length of custodial sanctions
 - Custodial vs. non-custodial sanctions: Five RCTs point towards a criminogenic effect of custodial sentences, 11 "matching" studies also point towards criminogenic effect
 - Length of custodial sanction: Three matching studies showed no effect of longer sentences on recidivism

RE: PEW REPORT ON "LOW RISK" NEW PRISON ADMITTEES IN 2011

We have been told that Oregon is incarcerating an increasing percentage of "low risk" criminals. At our June 29th meeting it was reported that over the past three years (2009-11) the percentage of "low risk" criminals going to prison had risen to almost 26% of new admittees in 2011. (Please find attached a copy of the specific PEW Power Point slide.)

After reviewing this information from PEW, Oregon's prosecutors began to ask questions about the accuracy of this report. We asked for the underlying case data supporting this Power Point slide and, after working our way through three different organizations (PEW, DOC and CJC) were finally provided the list of 850 "low risk" criminal defendants admitted to prison in 2011 in Oregon. This list was subsequently distributed to the 36 elected Oregon District Attorneys and they have now provided specific factual information about almost all of these defendants and their cases. A copy of their information filled report is also attached. As you might imagine, this has involved a great deal of work, but Oregon's prosecutors are very concerned about the accuracy of the information that is being provided.

We have been informed that this list was compiled using what is called the Oregon Public Safety Checklist, which is a new risk assessment tool devised by professionals here in Oregon. Please find enclosed an instructive email from Craig Prins, the Executive Director of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission, which was provided when the list of defendants was delivered and which explains in some detail how this risk assessment tool was used to create the list of "low risk" offenders. As you will note, there are some significant deficiencies with the use of this risk assessment tool in sentencing.

The Oregon Public Safety Checklist does not include any out-of-state convictions or juvenile convictions (however, those are noted in red in our report when we could independently identify them). That with invariably lead to a lower risk score with certain defendants. Secondly, we have been informed that sex offenders are not included because they will consistently score "low risk". There are virtually no sex offenders on this list.

The list of defendants includes their crimes of convictions, their criminal histories (as far as we can determine) and brief factual descriptions to help you understand the circumstances of each case and defendant. As you will see, there are many serious violent criminals, including felony crimes of domestic violence and homicide, serious career property criminals, significant drug dealers, burglars, embezzlers and thieves, felony drunk drivers and assorted other serious felony criminals. Most alarmingly, there are even two defendants on death row in Oregon on the list, including Bruce Turnidge, one of the defendants convicted last year for killing two police officers with a bomb at a bank in Woodburn, Oregon.

As our friends at PEW are fond of saying, there are a couple of "take aways" that we would like to suggest from this information.

First, is the question of whether or not a risk assessment tool is useful or helpful at sentencing. Risk assessment tools have a long and important history with our corrections system. They have been used effectively for many years to manage populations of inmates and probationers/parolees because they can be a very rational way of sorting criminals. However, even within this field, risk assessment tools have limitations. Often in the field the risk score of an inmate or probationer is overruled in favor of a higher risk assessment. And some categories of criminals (sex offenders) cannot be accurately assessed with such a risk tool. These weaknesses are even more apparent when used to determine criminal sentences, which the attached list of defendants clearly demonstrates. To many, including perhaps some members of our commission, these defendants do not appear to be "low risk" despite their apparent scores.

The most important purpose of criminal sentencing is to achieve "justice" through a proportional punishment that reflects the seriousness of the crime(s), the facts of the case and the defendant's criminal history (if any). Judges strive to carefully consider all these factors in designing sentences. "Risk" of committing a new crime can be a factor in any sentence, but in the most serious crimes (including most felonies and some misdemeanors) "risk" takes a back seat to the first priority of "justice." Therefore, as with this list of cases, a risk score can seem very out of place in a criminal sentencing.² Second, the reason this group of defendants does not appear to be "low risk" is that our criminal justice system in Oregon is already doing a very good job of sorting out the vast majority of convicted felons from our prison system. As you know from our previous discussions, Oregon has a very low incarceration rate when compared to other states (33rd out of 50). More than 75% of all convicted felons in Oregon are never sent to prison. So, it is not surprising that the "lowest risk" inmates who went to prison in Oregon in 2011 do not appear to be "low risk" at all.

² Any sentencing structure that identifies a group of defendants based upon age and gender for harsher sentences will inevitably be subject to attack in our court system. Age and gender can be considered by individual judges in individual cases, but no group of defendants can be targeted for harsher sentences based upon those factors, whether they are male or female, old or young.

We believe that this kind of specific, factual information is far more useful as a basis for good public safety policy in Oregon. We hope it can more accurately guide our public policy discussions.

We look forward to discussing this information with you as we move ahead.

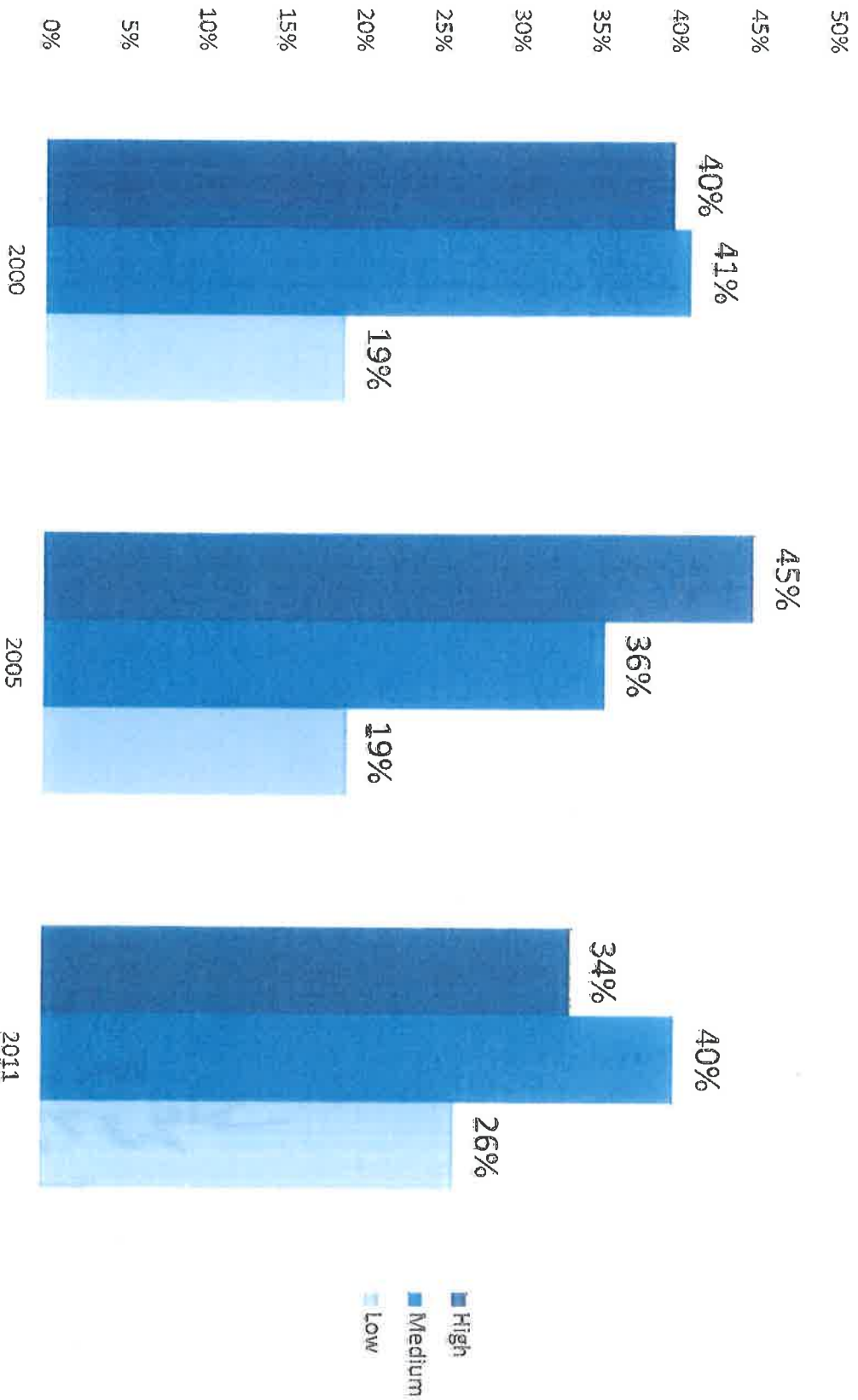

My Staff has prepared the enclosed data as follow up to the questions you directed to Director Colette Peters over the last couple weeks. This related to the PEW power point presentation, specifically SLIDE 23 of the June 29 presentation to the Governor's Public Safety Commission entitled "prison drivers."

You commented in the hearing, and dialogued with Director Peters, about wanting to understand the 2011 admits to prison that are categorized as low risk by the Public Safety Checklist.

Enclosed are records for the 850 offenders who make up the 26% of prison intakes that were categorized as low risk in that slide. The State identification number of the individual, Crime Category of Conviction (Drug, Property, Person, Other), and Public Safety Checklist Score for the offender are included for each individual.

For these offenders, based upon the information we have available, the expected recidivism rate for the 850 would be approximately 6%. The cutoff score for this population would be an 18% chance of recidivating, so offenders with a chance of recidivating from 1-18% are included. Stated another way, Approximately 6% of these offenders are predicted to be reconvicted of a felony within 3 years of being released from prison. Put differently, 51 of the 850 would be predicted to recidivate based upon this score.

A couple of notes about these offenders, and the Public Safety Checklist score:

- 1) No offenders who were committed to state prison for a Sex Offense as defined in Chapter 181 are included in the 850 records. Felicity Rose made that statement in the hearing on 6/29/12. That is because the Public Safety Checklist is a general recidivism score, it is not the best tool to measure likelihood for an adult male offender to recidivate by committing a sex crime. We believe the STATIC 99 is the best tool for that population, and that risk score would provide a necessary and complementary assessment of risk. I'm sure Clackamas County Sheriff's or Community Corrections can walk you through what is used in Clackamas for assessing & managing sex offenders.

- 2) The public safety checklist is based upon Oregon data, and does not include out of state convictions. We believe the District Attorney & the Court, and the supervising authority should always review the complete criminal history of the offender to get a complete assessment of the offender's criminal history and also likelihood to commit a future crime. A significant out of state criminal history or extremely recent in state criminal behavior that is not yet captured in the electronic data is important information that the stakeholders can use to augment this assessment and get the very best idea of the risk posed by an individual of recidivating.

- 3) The public safety checklist should always be augmented by offender information known to officials in the public safety system that would not be included in the data that can be extracted from electronic records and then aggregated into a risk score. Such information would be things like the offender just missed a court date, just submitted a dirty urine test, or other issues that would be indicative of a higher risk to recidivate. Generally,

Director Peters is out of town at a national conference. We worked hard with her to get this information to you. This level of data, at an individual level, is not generally what DOC & CJC would provide to PEW or Commissioners. However, we wanted to take the effort to provide you this data in this instance and Director Peters & I directed staff to do so. We will probably not be able to provide this granular data in the future, due to staff time constraints.

5) The Public Safety Checklist is an actuarial assessment, just like what an insurance underwriter would use to assess likelihood of a car accident or an epidemiologist would use in categorizing risk factors and the likelihood of heart disease. It is based upon observing the recidivism rates of over 250,000 Oregon offenders. It has been validated by applying it to over 55,000 offenders. Numerous studies, in several fields of study, have shown that an actuarial assessment like this will improve the predictive accuracy of a system over the clinical judgment of an individual who is not using an actuarial tool. That being said, at the end of the day whether a single individual is or is not going to have a car wreck, heart attack, or recidivate depends on that individual's behavior.

4) No risk score can tell our Oregon officials what the appropriate sentence is in an individual case. The DA & Judge must consider all relevant factors as to the offense, the offender, and the victim in recommending and determining an appropriate sentence under Article 15 of the Oregon Constitution. The risk score is a piece of information that can help ascertain the likelihood of future criminal behavior, but at the end of the day is just a piece of information that helps inform a very important and complicated decision. For example, we know some offenders may be very low likelihood to recidivate, but the crime they have been convicted of is so serious that a lengthy prison sentence is the only available means to bring accountability to the offender and closure to the victim. The CJC has always been clear that this risk score is a piece of information that may or may not be relevant when making an individual decision about an individual offense.

- a. Anti-social personality
- b. Anti-social attitudes and values
- c. Anti-social associates
- d. Family dysfunction
- e. Poor self-control, poor problem-solving skills
- f. Substance abuse
- g. Lack of employment/employment skills

these could be classified as "dynamic" or changing factors in the offender's life separate from the gender, age, and criminal history of the offender. Also, individual assessment of what is driving the offender's criminal behavior (the LSCMI is a common tool for this) would provide the Judge, DA, and supervising authority an assessment of what is driving the criminal behavior of the individual so the supervising authority can build a plan for how to increase public safety by reducing the risk the offender will commit future crime by addressing the following types of issues:
