## Package 410 Wildfire Protection Act

### Request

- Funding to implement HB 2050.
- \$1,599,469 General Fund, \$5,998,949 Other Funds, 3.30 FTE.

### Need

- Additional capacity for rapid response to stop fires when small, limiting cost and damage.
- Addresses productivity and cost challenges in Eastern Oregon.
- Moves toward 50-50 sharing of large fire cost responsibilities.

- Larger fires.
- Increased public and private costs and resource damage.
- Increased threats to communities.
- Diminished viability of eastside lands as working forests.
- Forgone opportunity to reduce GF exposure to large fire costs.

### **POP** biennial overview

\$6 M of GF for the biennium matches the new \$6 M of severity funds from landowners (OFLPF).

The POP of \$1.6 M plus the current biennial \$4.4 M for severity resources produces the needed \$6 M.

# Package 411 Severity Program – Fire Protection



### Request

- Continuation of the Special Purpose Appropriation for fire severity and insurance costs.
- \$5,000,000 General Fund.

### Need

- Funds critical fire suppression resources airtankers and helicopters.
- The state's share of the premium for one year of Oregon's catastrophic wildfire insurance policy.
- Vital for implementation of HB 2050.

- Increased fire size and costs, threats to communities and damage to natural resources.
- Forgone opportunities to realize benefits of HB 2050.
- Funding would not be available for catastrophic wildfire insurance.

# Package 412 Fire Investigation

### Request

- Two Fire Investigator (Natural Resource Specialist 2) positions.
- \$348,801 Other Funds, 2.00 FTE.

### Need

- Capacity for two fire investigators.
- Facilitation of timely cost collection for eligible fires.
- Determination of fire causes key in prevention.
- Capacity to address arson cases and fires.

- Increased time to determine fire cause.
- Continued limited capacity to address arson cases.
- Decreased ability to collect suppression costs on eligible fires.

# Package 431 Acquisition of Gilchrist State Forest Lands

### Request

- Complete the Gilchrist State Forest acquisition.
- \$7,600,000 Other Funds (lottery bond proceeds).
- \$796,864 Lottery Funds (debt service for 2013-15).

### Need

 Purchase the remaining adjacent and intermingled 25,754 acres in order to conserve working forests for multiple, long-term benefits.

- ODF may lose option to complete the Gilchrist purchase.
- Forestland remains on pathway toward fragmentation and conversion out of working forest use.

# Package 486 Elliott State Forest Monitoring

### Request

- Dedicated funds to implement monitoring projects on Elliott State Forest.
- \$500,000 Other Funds.

### Need

- Governor called for monitoring as part of process to assess the Elliott Forest Management Plan and adapt it accordingly.
- Data needed to inform policy decisions.

- Limited understanding of Forest Management Plan's success in achieving environmental, social, and economic goals.
- Policy decisions made without applied science.



# Package 486 Elliott State Forest Monitoring

### **Funding Direction**

- Focus on high priority projects:
  - Expand understanding of science related to threatened and endangered species.
  - Ongoing collaborative projects to assess roads and water quality.
  - Surveys and inventory necessary to support normal operations.
- Initiate new studies to determine effectiveness of Elliott forest management strategies:
  - Forest structure, wildlife habitat and wildlife use.
  - Stream protection.
  - Slope stability.

# Package 452 Integrated Effectiveness Monitoring



### Request

- Support for watershed research through Oregon State University, and integrated effectiveness monitoring.
- One Monitoring Specialist (Natural Resource Specialist 3) position.
- \$399,598 General Fund, \$66,399 Other Funds, 1.00 FTE.

### Need

- Ensure the effectiveness of natural resource protection rules and best management practices.
- Inform the adaptive management cycle at multiple levels.
- Sound regulatory framework that helps keep working forests working.

### Without this package

 Less efficiency in designing, implementing, and regulating forest practices into the future.

# Package 452 Integrated Effectiveness Monitoring Key Outcomes





Effects of road construction, use, and maintenance on sediment movement at local and watershed scales.

Effects of harvest on temperature in small non-fish streams and downstream fish-bearing streams.



## Package 453 Forest Practices Act Administration

### Request

- Five Stewardship Forester (Natural Resource Specialist 2) positions.
- \$675,095 Federal Funds, 3.41 FTE.

### Need

- Deliver technical assistance for U.S. Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) cost-share projects.
- Deliver incentive programs, implement the Oregon Plan, and administer the Forest Practices Act.

### Without this package

 Lost opportunity for a new source of funding for improving management on family forestlands under federal Farm Bill.

# Package 453 Forest Practices Act Administration

### **Additional Information**

- Furthers a cooperative relationship with NRCS that recognizes :
  - NRCS as a source of expertise in forestry and natural resource conservation, and
  - ODF as having primary responsibility for delivering forestry programs on state and private lands.
- Increases capacity to maintain sustainability of family forestlands.

# Package 481 Eastern Lane Redevelopment Project



### Request

- Replace an aging, unsafe warehouse in Lane county.
- \$2,500,000 Other Funds (Certificate of Participation proceeds).
- \$149,171 General Fund and \$225,067 Other Funds (2013-15 debt service).

### Need

- 60-year-old building used to house firefighters, their equipment, and a shop has multiple problems.
- Deteriorating foundation, leaking roof, separation of foundation walls from floor slab, and non-compliance with code.
- Repair costs exceed building's value.

### Without this package

 Unstable building compromises safety, health and readiness of fire protection staff, and compromises fire operations.

# Package 482 Information Technology Support Capacity

### Request

- Three Information Systems Specialist (ISS) 6 positions and one ISS 5.
- \$364,678 General Fund, \$796,918 Other Funds, 4.00 FTE.

### Need

- 2007 Legislature approved one-time funding to improve and develop technology platforms and business systems.
- The resulting 16 new IT systems and processes require ongoing maintenance and support.
- Recent Secretary of State audit cites inadequate resources.

- Older systems may fail as hardware and software evolve.
- Agency remains reactive instead of proactive in meeting IT needs.
- Inability to implement audit recommendations.

# Package 482 Information Technology Support Capacity

### **Position Detail**

- Two Information Systems Specialist (ISS) 6 Application Developers :
  - Enhance, maintain, support agency applications.
  - Meet ongoing business needs. Keep current with industry standards.
- One ISS 6 Business Analyst:
  - Work with customers to analyze and document business needs.
  - Convert business needs into system requirements for application developers.
- One ISS 5 Systems Administrator :
  - Convert existing limited-duration position to permanent.
  - Administer and support SharePoint intranet environment, the agency's primary resource for communication and collaboration.

# Package 485 Agency Admin Capacity and Technical Adjustments

### Request

- Technical corrections regarding funding sources for three positions.
- \$230,614 General Fund, \$73,839 Other Funds, (\$75,253) Federal Funds.

### Need

- Positions are more appropriately funded through the Administrative Prorate than through outdated, program-specific percentages.
- Continues efforts to properly align the Administrative positions with Administrative funding.

### Without this package

Service & Supplies (S&S) dollars will be used to fund these positions.
 Other S&S items would go unfunded.

# Package 487 Federal Forest Policy Coordination



### Request

- Funding for continuation of federal forest policy contract work.
- \$400,000 General Fund.

### Need

 Provides capacity and leadership within the Governor's Office for focused work with the Oregon Delegation, county commissioners, federal agencies and stakeholders to address the O & C Lands

### Without this package

• Diminished capacity to effectively advocate for and coordinate State of Oregon efforts for federal forest policy change.



# General Fund Budget Reduction Options Summary

- 10% General Fund reduction: \$5.4 million.
- ODF's reduction plan:
  - First 7.5% from Private Forests Division: \$4.1 million General Fund.
     This will also result in a \$1.9 million Other Funds (Harvest Tax) reduction.
  - Next 2.5% from Fire Protection and Private Forests Divisions' share of Agency Administration costs: \$1.3 million General Fund.

### **Private Forests Division Reductions**

- Would reduce Private Forests' General Fund by 29%, and would roll back restorations from the 2011 legislative session. Would eliminate:
  - 21 of 51 stewardship foresters, training and compliance audit coordinator, and 2 field coordinators.
  - 6 technical specialists and 3 effectiveness monitoring specialists.
  - Annual compliance audit contract and Forests Electronic Notification System.
- Would reduce:
  - Forest Health Management Program.

### **Private Forests Division Reductions**

### Outcome/Impact:

- Substantially reduced ability to protect natural resources through the Forest Practices Act (FPA).
- Significantly reduced support to ODF fire militia.
- Less reliance on the FPA as "one-stop-shopping," potentially increasing landowner costs in the future.
- Decreased effectiveness monitoring of FPA rules and best management practices.
- Decreases in forest health monitoring, and early detection and rapid response for invasive species.
- Increased risk of conversion of working forests.

### **Agency Administration**

### • Eliminate:

- 3.00 FTE by converting several positions to part-time.
- Inflationary increase from generic Services and Supplies expenditures.

### Outcome/Impact:

- o Less fiscal oversight.
- Impacts ability to meet deadlines for payroll and firefighting billings, and to provide accurate fiscal information required for FEMA reimbursements.
- Increased security risks due to outdated IT applications.
- Mailroom and distribution functions assumed by other staff, reducing productivity.
- Deferred or compromised facilities maintenance, resulting in greater future costs.
