The Oregon eCourt Program successfully completed implementation of the Odyssey system in five courts – Yamhill, Linn, Crook, Jefferson and Jackson County Circuit Courts. Subject to continued funding, Clatsop, Columbia, and Tillamook are scheduled for August 2013, Benton and Polk in January 2014, Multnomah in May 2014, and eight more courts later in the biennium.

- 1. Have met court implementation schedules.
- 2. Continue to run slightly under budget.
- 3. Implementation processes continuously improved through lessons learned and after-action review processes.
- 4. Continue to improve data migration and issue management processes.
- 5. Completed build-out of redundant systems to protect court data and operations.
- 6. Continue to roll out eServices to attorneys and the public.
- 7. Completed 36 of 37 Legislative deliverables (37th in final stages).

Some Numbers:

- 1. Successfully migrated 1,866,876 cases from OJIN to Odyssey.
- 2. Successfully migrated 638,274 legacy documents composed of 7,517,212 images.
- 3. Continuing to reduce go-live issues.

- 4. To date, 98% of all go-live issues have been addressed.
- 5. To date, 90% of 2,900 help tickets have been resolved.
- 6. To date, 539 OJD staff and judges have been trained on the Odyssey system.

The Oregon eCourt Program is now providing significant eServices.

- 1. ePayment of citation and post-adjudication debt is available statewide. To date, the system has processed 120,681 transactions for \$12.13 million.
- 2. eCitations is available statewide. To date, 68,626 eCitations have been received by the courts, with a 98.7% acceptance rate.
- 3. eFiling will be in all five Odyssey courts by June 1, 2013. eFiling will be part of the standard roll-out process in future implementations.
- 4. The court case register is scheduled to be available to the public for free in late 2013.
- 5. Document access for designated government users is scheduled for late 2013, followed by access for attorneys later in 2013, and for the public by mid-2014.

Initial automated integrations with justice partners are complete:

- 1. Oregon State Bar daily inbound file containing attorney validation.
- 2. LEDS driver history driving records for violation defendants.
- 3. Collections DOR Restricted (tax intercept), DOR Unrestricted (collections), and outside collection agencies.
- 4. Department of Motor Vehicles license suspension/reinstatement.
- 5. Department of Corrections Uniform Criminal Judgment.
- 6. RSTARS monthly report of all revenue collected by OJD.
- 7. Oregon State Police disposition reporting.
- 8. Treasury check reconciliation information regarding redeemed checks.
- 9. DA Notification if requested, messages sent to the county DA every time a hearing or trial is scheduled or updated.

Data is being provided to business partners in a timely manner for their core business functions. OJD has made significant changes to accommodate business partner requests:

- 1. Increased the number of search returns from 200 to 400. Will add 'page' function to further increase search capacity.
- 2. Allowed multiple concurrent connections to improve performance.
- 3. Changed search parameters to meet business requests (separate cases by criminal or civil, by defendant, by SID/case number, etc.)
- 4. Requested vendor to develop additional search capability.
- 5. Provide daily overnight updates to bulk data purchasers.
- 6. Examining "mirror" system to make available for large-volume data users.
- 7. Modified judgment index report based on title company requests.
- 8. Modified register of actions based on title company, data purchasers, government partners, and State Bar requests.

Critical Policy Option Packages

Package 202 – Oregon eCourt Program (\$24.3M OF, 37.96 FTE): Funds continuation of the program through 2013-15 biennium

Package 201 – Debt Service (\$5.2M GF \$0.5M OF, 0.0 FTE): This could possibly be delayed depending on timing of bond sale

Package 206 – Statewide Improvement, Education and Standardization (\$0.6M GF, 2.64 FTE): Provides post-implementation training for courts

Package 207 – Technical Operations and Training (\$1.1M GF, 5.28 FTE): Provides ongoing technical infrastructure and technical training support


Package 208 – Centralization (partial package) (\$0.5M GF, 3.57 FTE): Provides resources for centralized accounting

Expected Outcomes of Packages: Will support existing systems, upgrades, and court business practices. Will augment development and rollout capabilities to 14 circuit courts during 2013-15 (including Multnomah). New functionality, services and access for Oregonians

2013 House Bill 2561

- Received unanimous do-pass recommendation from House Judiciary Committee.
- Provides explicit authority for Chief Justice to establish reasonable fees for all electronic court systems.
- Current statute authorizes any fees for OJIN, which is not defined.
- OJD charges fees to private users to defray maintenance, access, and use costs.



 - Connect to a Virtual Private Network (VPN) in real time to do high-volume searches
 - Subscribe to bulk data exports

Oregon eCourt (OECI) Product/Fee Model – The OJIN Online Equivalent

Current OJIN Online subscribers receive access to OECI for a \$10 user profile fee.

OJD recommends developing a new tiered billing model based on:

- Free web-based access for basic searches and the Register of Actions (ROA)
- 2) Monthly subscription or on-demand purchase of documents online
- 3) Web services for large-volume customers

OECI Projected Adoption Rates

- The general public will be able to obtain free online access to court register and other public court information without a courthouse visit
- ➢ Based on feedback from the Bar, title companies and other interested parties − OJD estimates document access subscribers would range from 2,250 to 5,000
- Individual document sales could be as high as 10,000/biennium upon full statewide implementation
- ➤ High-Volume Customers OJD expects these customers to stay the same, between 11-13 customers




