SUMMARY

Creates crime of causing child to witness sexually explicit conduct in first degree. Punishes by maximum of five years' imprisonment, \$125,000 fine, or both. Designates crime as sex crime.

Creates crime of causing child to witness sexually explicit conduct in second degree. Punishes by maximum of one year's imprisonment, \$6,250 fine, or both. Designates crime as sex crime.

Removes certain provisions relating to crime of endangering welfare of minor that cover similar conduct.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

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A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to crime; creating new provisions; amending ORS 137.225, 163.345,

3 163.575, 163.580, 181.594 and 475.245; and declaring an emergency.

4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

5 <u>SECTION 1.</u> Sections 2 and 3 of this 2013 Act are added to and made

6 a part of ORS 163.305 to 163.467.

7 <u>SECTION 2.</u> (1) A person commits the crime of causing a child to 8 witness sexually explicit conduct in the first degree if the person 9 knowingly engages in an act of sexually explicit conduct as defined in 10 ORS 163.665 while knowing that the act will be witnessed by a child 11 under 14 years of age.

(2) Causing a child to witness sexually explicit conduct in the first
 degree is a Class C felony.

(3) The Oregon Criminal Justice Commission shall classify causing
 a child to witness sexually explicit conduct in the first degree as a
 person felony and crime category 6 on the crime seriousness scale of

1 the sentencing guidelines.

2 <u>SECTION 3.</u> (1) A person commits the crime of causing a child to 3 witness sexually explicit conduct in the second degree if the person 4 engages in an act of sexually explicit conduct as defined in ORS 163.665 5 while knowing that the act will be witnessed by a child under 18 years 6 of age.

7 (2) Causing a child to witness sexually explicit conduct in the sec8 ond degree is a Class A misdemeanor.

9 **SECTION 4.** ORS 163.345 is amended to read:

10 163.345. (1) In any prosecution under ORS 163.355, 163.365, 163.385, 163.395, 11 163.415, 163.425, 163.427 or 163.435 or section 2 or 3 of this 2013 Act in 12 which the victim's lack of consent was due solely to incapacity to consent 13 by reason of being less than a specified age, it is a defense that the actor 14 was less than three years older than the victim at the time of the alleged 15 offense.

(2) In any prosecution under ORS 163.408, when the object used to commit the unlawful sexual penetration was the hand or any part thereof of the actor and in which the victim's lack of consent was due solely to incapacity to consent by reason of being less than a specified age, it is a defense that the actor was less than three years older than the victim at the time of the alleged offense.

(3) In any prosecution under ORS 163.445 in which the victim's lack of
consent was due solely to incapacity to consent by reason of being less than
a specified age, it is a defense that the actor was less than three years older
than the victim at the time of the alleged offense if the victim was at least
15 years of age at the time of the alleged offense.

27 **SECTION 5.** ORS 163.575 is amended to read:

163.575. (1) A person commits the crime of endangering the welfare of a
minor if the person knowingly:

30 [(a) Induces, causes or permits an unmarried person under 18 years of age 31 to witness an act of sexual conduct or sadomasochistic abuse as defined by

[(b)] (a) Permits a person under 18 years of age to enter or remain in a
place where unlawful activity involving controlled substances is maintained
or conducted; [or]

7 [(d)] (c) Distributes, sells, or causes to be sold, tobacco in any form to a
8 person under 18 years of age; or

(1)(c) of this section or by violation of subsection [(1)(e)] (1)(d) of this section, involving a device for smoking tobacco, is a Class A violation.

SECTION 7. ORS 137.225, as amended by section 4, chapter 70, Oregon
Laws 2012, is amended to read:

137.225. (1)(a) At any time after the lapse of three years from the date of 9 pronouncement of judgment, any defendant who has fully complied with and 10 performed the sentence of the court and whose conviction is described in 11 12subsection (5) of this section by motion may apply to the court where the conviction was entered for entry of an order setting aside the conviction; or 13 (b) At any time after the lapse of one year from the date of any arrest, 14 if no accusatory instrument was filed, or at any time after an acquittal or 15a dismissal of the charge, the arrested person may apply to the court that 16 would have jurisdiction over the crime for which the person was arrested, 17for entry of an order setting aside the record of the arrest. For the purpose 18 of computing the one-year period, time during which the arrested person has 19 secreted himself or herself within or without this state is not included. 20

(2)(a) A copy of the motion and a full set of the defendant's fingerprints 21shall be served upon the office of the prosecuting attorney who prosecuted 22the crime or violation, or who had authority to prosecute the charge if there 23was no accusatory instrument filed, and opportunity shall be given to contest 24the motion. The fingerprint card with the notation "motion for setting aside 25conviction," or "motion for setting aside arrest record" as the case may be, 26shall be forwarded to the Department of State Police. Information resulting 27from the fingerprint search along with the fingerprint card shall be returned 28to the prosecuting attorney. 29

30 (b) When a prosecuting attorney is served with a copy of a motion to set 31 aside a conviction under this section, the prosecuting attorney shall provide

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a copy of the motion and notice of the hearing date to the victim, if any, of
the crime by mailing a copy of the motion and notice to the victim's lastknown address.

(c) When a person makes a motion under subsection (1)(a) of this section,
the person must pay a fee of \$80 to the Department of State Police. The
person shall attach a certified check payable to the Department of State
Police in the amount of \$80 to the fingerprint card that is served upon the
prosecuting attorney. The office of the prosecuting attorney shall forward
the check with the fingerprint card to the Department of State Police.

10 (d) In addition to the fee established under paragraph (c) of this sub-11 section, when a person makes a motion under subsection (1)(a) of this section 12 the person must pay the filing fee established under ORS 21.135.

(3) Upon hearing the motion, the court may require the filing of such af-13 fidavits and may require the taking of such proofs as the court deems proper. 14 The court shall allow the victim to make a statement at the hearing. Except 15 as otherwise provided in subsection (14) of this section, if the court deter-16 mines that the circumstances and behavior of the applicant from the date 17of conviction, or from the date of arrest as the case may be, to the date of 18 the hearing on the motion warrant setting aside the conviction, or the arrest 19 record as the case may be, the court shall enter an appropriate order that 2021shall state the original arrest charge and the conviction charge, if any and if different from the original, date of charge, submitting agency and disposi-22tion. The order shall further state that positive identification has been es-23tablished by the Department of State Police and further identified as to 24Department of State Police number or submitting agency number. Upon the 25entry of the order, the applicant for purposes of the law shall be deemed not 26to have been previously convicted, or arrested as the case may be, and the 27court shall issue an order sealing the record of conviction and other official 28records in the case, including the records of arrest whether or not the arrest 29resulted in a further criminal proceeding. 30

31 (4) The clerk of the court shall forward a certified copy of the order to

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such agencies as directed by the court. A certified copy must be sent to the Department of Corrections when the person has been in the custody of the Department of Corrections. Upon entry of the order, the conviction, arrest or other proceeding shall be deemed not to have occurred, and the applicant may answer accordingly any questions relating to its occurrence.

6 (5) The provisions of subsection (1)(a) of this section apply to a conviction 7 of:

8 (a) A Class B felony, except for a violation of ORS 166.429 or any crime 9 classified as a person felony as that term is defined in the rules of the 10 Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.

(b) A Class C felony, except for criminal mistreatment in the first degree
under ORS 163.205 when it would constitute child abuse as defined in ORS
419B.005 or any sex crime.

14 (c) The crime of possession of the narcotic drug marijuana when that 15 crime was punishable as a felony only.

(d) A crime punishable as either a felony or a misdemeanor, in the dis-cretion of the court, except for:

18 (A) Any sex crime; or

19 [(B) The following crimes when they would constitute child abuse as de-20 fined in ORS 419B.005:]

[(*i*)] (**B**) Criminal mistreatment in the first degree under ORS 163.205 when it would constitute child abuse as defined in ORS 419B.005.[; and]

24 [(ii) Endangering the welfare of a minor under ORS 163.575 (1)(a).]

(e) A misdemeanor, including a violation of a municipal ordinance, for which a jail sentence may be imposed, except for [endangering the welfare of a minor under ORS 163.575 (1)(a) when it would constitute child abuse as defined in ORS 419B.005 or] any sex crime.

29 (f) A violation, whether under state law or local ordinance.

30 (g) An offense committed before January 1, 1972, that if committed after 31 that date would be:

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1 (A) A Class C felony, except for any sex crime or for [the following crimes 2 when they would constitute child abuse as defined in ORS 419B.005:]

3 [(i)] criminal mistreatment in the first degree under ORS 163.205[; and]

4 when it would constitute child abuse as defined in ORS 419B.005.

5 [(ii) Endangering the welfare of a minor under ORS 163.575 (1)(a).]

6 (B) A crime punishable as either a felony or a misdemeanor, in the dis-7 cretion of the court, except for any sex crime or for [the following crimes 8 when they would constitute child abuse as defined in ORS 419B.005:]

(6) Notwithstanding subsection (5) of this section, the provisions of sub section (1) of this section do not apply to:

18 (a) A conviction for a state or municipal traffic offense.

(b) A person convicted, within the 10-year period immediately preceding 19 the filing of the motion pursuant to subsection (1) of this section, of any 2021other offense, excluding motor vehicle violations, whether or not the other conviction is for conduct associated with the same criminal episode that 22caused the arrest or conviction that is sought to be set aside. Notwith-23standing subsection (1) of this section, a conviction that has been set aside 24under this section shall be considered for the purpose of determining whether 25this paragraph is applicable. 26

(c) A person who at the time the motion authorized by subsection (1) of
this section is pending before the court is under charge of commission of any
crime.

30 (7) Notwithstanding subsection (5) of this section, the provisions of sub-31 section (1)(a) of this section do not apply to:

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1 (a) Criminal mistreatment in the second degree under ORS 163.200 if the 2 victim at the time of the crime was 65 years of age or older; and

3 (b) Criminal mistreatment in the first degree under ORS 163.205 if the
4 victim at the time of the crime was 65 years of age or older.

5 (8) Notwithstanding subsection (5) of this section, the provisions of sub-6 section (1)(a) of this section do not apply to criminally negligent homicide 7 under ORS 163.145, when that offense was punishable as a Class C felony.

8 (9) Notwithstanding subsection (5) of this section, the provisions of sub-9 section (1)(a) of this section apply to a conviction for a Class B felony de-10 scribed in subsection (5)(a) of this section only if:

(a) Twenty years or more have elapsed from the date of the conviction
sought to be set aside or of the release of the person from imprisonment for
the conviction sought to be set aside, whichever is later; and

(b) The person has not been convicted of or arrested for any other offense, excluding motor vehicle violations, after the date the person was convicted of the offense sought to be set aside. Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, a conviction or arrest that has been set aside under this section shall be considered for the purpose of determining whether this paragraph is applicable.

20 (10) The provisions of subsection (1)(b) of this section do not apply to:

(a) A person arrested within the three-year period immediately preceding the filing of the motion for any offense, excluding motor vehicle violations, and excluding arrests for conduct associated with the same criminal episode that caused the arrest that is sought to be set aside. An arrest that has been set aside under this section may not be considered for the purpose of determining whether this paragraph is applicable.

(b) An arrest for driving while under the influence of intoxicants if the charge is dismissed as a result of the person's successful completion of a diversion agreement described in ORS 813.200.

30 (11) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section apply to convictions 31 and arrests that occurred before, as well as those that occurred after, Sep-

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1 tember 9, 1971. There is no time limit for making an application.

(12) For purposes of any civil action in which truth is an element of a claim for relief or affirmative defense, the provisions of subsection (3) of this section providing that the conviction, arrest or other proceeding be deemed not to have occurred do not apply and a party may apply to the court for an order requiring disclosure of the official records in the case as may be necessary in the interest of justice.

8 (13) Upon motion of any prosecutor or defendant in a case involving re-9 cords sealed under this section, supported by affidavit showing good cause, 10 the court with jurisdiction may order the reopening and disclosure of any 11 records sealed under this section for the limited purpose of assisting the in-12 vestigation of the movant. 1 (15) As used in this section, "sex crime" has the meaning given that term 2 in ORS 181.594.

3 **SECTION 8.** ORS 163.580 is amended to read:

163.580. (1) Any person who sells any of the smoking devices listed in ORS
163.575 [(1)(e)] (1)(d) shall display a sign clearly stating that the sale of such
devices to persons under 18 years of age is prohibited by law.

7 (2) Any person who violates this section commits a Class B violation.

8 **SECTION 9.** ORS 475.245 is amended to read:

475.245. Whenever any person pleads guilty to or is found guilty of pos-9 session of a controlled substance under ORS 475.752 (3), 475.814, 475.824, 10 475.834, 475.854, 475.864, 475.874, 475.884 or 475.894, of endangering the wel-11 12fare of a minor under ORS 163.575 [(1)(b)] (1)(a), of frequenting a place where controlled substances are used under ORS 167.222 or of a property offense 13 that is motivated by a dependence on a controlled substance, the court, 14 without entering a judgment of guilt and with the consent of the district 15 attorney and the accused, may defer further proceedings and place the person 16 on probation. Upon violation of a term or condition of probation, the court 17may enter an adjudication of guilt and proceed as otherwise provided. Upon 18 fulfillment of the terms and conditions, the court shall discharge the person 19 and dismiss the proceedings against the person. Discharge and dismissal 20under this section shall be without adjudication of guilt and is not a con-21viction for purposes of this section or for purposes of disqualifications or 22disabilities imposed by law upon conviction of a crime. There may be only 23one discharge and dismissal under this section with respect to any person. 24

25 <u>SECTION 10.</u> This 2013 Act being necessary for the immediate 26 preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is 27 declared to exist, and this 2013 Act takes effect on its passage.

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
