#### SUMMARY

Establishes Oregon Investment Council as public corporation to be governed by board of directors and supervised by executive director. Changes name to Oregon Investment Corporation. Specifies duties, functions and powers of corporation. Transfers duties of council, and State Treasurer as investment officer, to corporation.

Establishes Oregon Investment Corporation Fund and continuously appropriates moneys in fund to corporation for expenses of corporation. Exempts corporation from certain laws regulating government entities.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

1 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

2 <u>SECTION 1.</u> Sections 2 to 9 of this 2013 Act are added to and made
3 a part of ORS 293.701 to 293.820.

SECTION 2. Powers and duties of the Oregon Investment Corpo-4 ration. (1) The Oregon Investment Corporation is established as a 5public corporation. The corporation shall exercise and carry out 6 statewide all the powers, rights and privileges that are expressly con-7 ferred upon the corporation, are implied by law or are incident to such 8 powers. Except as provided in ORS 293.701 to 293.820, nothing in ORS 9 293.701 to 293.820 is intended to affect the powers and duties of the 10 State Treasurer otherwise provided by law or under the Oregon Con-11 stitution. 12

(2) The mission of the corporation is to invest the investment funds
 and any other moneys it is charged by law with investing.

(3) In addition to any other powers and duties granted by law, the
 corporation may:

17 (a) Sue and be sued in its own name.

(b) Invest and reinvest moneys in the investment funds or any other moneys it is charged by law with investing, and in furtherance of such investing may acquire, retain, manage and dispose of as investments every kind of investment that persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence acquire, retain, manage and dispose of for their own accounting.

(c) Enter into contracts and acquire, hold, own, encumber, issue,
replace, deal in and with and dispose of real and personal property for
its own proprietary interest.

(d) Employ persons as it determines necessary or desirable to carry
out the mission and powers of the corporation.

(e) Enter into contracts with advisors, service providers or others
 as it determines necessary or desirable to carry out the mission and
 powers of the corporation, including but not limited to entering into

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contracts with one or more persons who may, in lieu of or in addition
 to the corporation, perform discretionary investment manager or
 other functions to the extent provided in the contract.

4 (f) Collect the principal and interest or other income of investments 5 when due and payable, and shall pay the principal and interest or 6 other income, when so collected, into the appropriate fund. Except as 7 otherwise provided by law, interest or other income of the funds in-8 vested for state agencies shall be paid into the General Fund as pro-9 vided in ORS 293.140 to be available for the payment of general 10 governmental expenses.

(g) Exercise any shareholder or other voting rights in connection
 with an investment.

(h) For and on behalf of the Public Employees Retirement System and Public Employees Retirement Board, enter into group annuity contracts with one or more insurance companies authorized to do business in this state. In lieu of any investment of moneys in the Public Employees Retirement Fund, the corporation may make payments from time to time under such annuity contracts using any moneys in that fund available for investment purposes.

(4) In the event of a default, breach or impairment of the payment
of amounts due or other obligations related to an investment, or if the
corporation determines it is otherwise appropriate in furtherance of
its powers and duties, the corporation may:

(a) Institute proceedings to collect the matured principal or interest
 or other income of an investment.

(b) Accept for exchange purposes refunding bonds or other evi dences of indebtedness at interest rates agreed upon by the corpo ration and the obligor.

(c) Make compromises, adjustments or disposition of the matured or future principal or interest or other income of an investment as the corporation considers advisable for the purpose of protecting the

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1 moneys invested.

(d) File or participate in class action lawsuits or other legal proceedings with corporate shareholders or other investors as the corporation considers advisable for the purpose of protecting the moneys
invested or otherwise benefitting invested moneys.

6 (5) Notwithstanding ORS 180.220 and 180.235, in addition to legal 7 counsel provided by the Department of Justice or special assistant at-8 torneys general, the corporation may employ and be represented by its 9 own general or special counsel in a particular matter or class of mat-10 ters and in related matters.

(6) The corporation shall follow generally accepted accounting 11 12practices, record the individual amounts and the totals of all investments and provide to the officer or body controlling and administering 13 the invested moneys any information necessary for financial reporting 14 required by law. The corporation shall separately identify investments 15held in the Oregon Growth Account established in ORS 348.702 and the 16 **Oregon Resource and Technology Development Subaccount established** 17 in ORS 348.706 as part of the information provided on the Education 18 **Stability Fund.** 19

SECTION 3. Board of directors. (1) The Governor shall appoint four 2021voting members, subject to Senate confirmation in the manner provided in ORS 171.562 and 171.565, to a board of directors for the Oregon 22Investment Corporation. The directors appointed by the Governor 23must be qualified by training and experience in the field of investment 24or finance. The term of office of each appointed member of the board 25is four years, but each appointed director serves at the pleasure of the 26Governor and may be removed from office with or without cause. 27

(2) The Governor may appoint a director under subsection (1) of this
section who is also a member of the Public Employees Retirement
Board appointed under ORS 238.640 (4). Except as provided in this
subsection, members appointed by the Governor may not hold any

1 other public office or public employment.

2 (3) The State Treasurer shall be the fifth voting member of the
3 board of directors.

4 (4) The Director of the Public Employees Retirement System shall
5 be an ex officio member of the board with no voting power.

6 (5) Each director appointed by the Governor shall hold office until 7 a successor is appointed or until an earlier resignation or removal. 8 Before the expiration of the term of an appointed member, the Gov-9 ernor shall appoint a successor. A member is eligible for reappoint-10 ment.

(6) Any director appointed by the Governor may resign at any time upon written notice to the Governor. A resignation takes effect at the time specified in the notice. If a time is not specified in the notice, the resignation is effective at the time the notice is received by the Governor. Acceptance by the Governor of a resignation is not necessary to make the resignation effective.

(7) Any vacancy in the office of an appointed director shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. An appointee under this subsection may serve as a temporary director until confirmed by the Senate in the manner provided in ORS 171.562 and 171.565. If a temporary appointee is not confirmed by the Senate, the appointee may continue to serve until another person is appointed by the Governor and approved by the Senate.

SECTION 4. Powers of the board of directors. (1) The board of di-24rectors of the Oregon Investment Corporation shall formulate policies 25for the investment and reinvestment of moneys invested by the cor-26poration and for the acquisition, retention, management and disposi-27tion of such investments with the objective of making the moneys as 28productive as possible, subject to applicable fiduciary standards, in-29cluding but not limited to ORS 238.660, 238A.025 and 293.726. The board, 30 from time to time, shall review the policies and make changes as it 31

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1 considers necessary or desirable.

(2) The board shall adopt personnel policies, subject to ORS 236.605
to 236.640, for employees of the corporation who are transferred from
the office of the State Treasurer or from any other state agency.

5 (3) The board may elect to provide for participation in a health 6 benefit plan available to state employees pursuant to ORS 243.105 to 7 243.285 and may elect to participate in the state deferred compensation 8 plan established under ORS 243.401 to 243.507. If the board so elects, 9 employees of the corporation shall be considered eligible employees for 10 purposes of ORS 243.105 to 243.285 and eligible state employees for 11 purposes of ORS 243.401 to 243.507.

(4) The board shall adopt a code of ethics applicable to the corporation that is based on the best practices in the investment industry and reflects the unique position of trust and loyalty in which the corporation's employees are placed in the investment of public and private moneys. At a minimum, the code shall require the corporation's employees, in the conduct of the duties of their employment, to:

19 (a) Act in a professional and ethical manner;

(b) Act for the benefit of the State of Oregon and the public and
private beneficiaries of the funds entrusted to the corporation for investment;

23 (c) Act with independence and objectivity;

24 (d) Act with skill, competence and diligence; and

(e) Communicate with state agencies, public bodies and others for
 whom moneys are invested in a timely and accurate manner, including
 any disclosures required by law or best industry practices.

(5)(a) The board shall adopt a budget on a biennial basis using
classifications of expenditures and revenues required by generally accepted accounting principles applicable to governmental entities. The
budget is not subject to review and approval by the Legislative As-

sembly or to modification by the Emergency Board, by the Legislative
 Assembly or through the allotment process. The board is not required
 to seek expenditure limitation approval from the Legislative Assembly
 to spend any available moneys.

5 (b) The budget shall be adopted at a regularly scheduled public 6 meeting of the board. The board may modify a budget only after a 7 public meeting. The board must give notice of the meeting to any in-8 terested parties in accordance with the provisions of ORS 192.610 to 9 192.690.

(c) The board shall follow generally accepted accounting principles
 and keep financial and statistical information as necessary to com pletely and accurately disclose the financial condition and financial
 operations of the board.

(d) The board shall prepare an annual financial statement of board
revenues and expenses and shall make the statement available for
public review. The board shall provide a copy of the statement to the
Governor and the Legislative Assembly not later than the 90th day
after the end of the state fiscal year.

(6) In carrying out the duties, functions and powers of the corporation, the board may contract with any state agency the board considers appropriate, including but not limited to the office of the State Treasurer. A state agency may charge the corporation reasonable fees and expenses in connection with providing personnel, equipment, facilities, space and other support to the corporation.

(7) In addition to the services provided under ORS 293.820 and
26 294.805 to 294.895, the corporation may provide services to other gov27 ernmental entities for a reasonable fee intended to cover the
28 corporation's expenses in connection with the services.

29 <u>SECTION 5.</u> Criminal records check; fingerprints required; persons 30 <u>subject to requirement.</u> For the purpose of requesting a state or na-31 tionwide criminal records check under ORS 181.534, the Oregon In-

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1 vestment Corporation may require the fingerprints of a person who:

2 (1) Is employed by or applying for employment with the corporation;
 3 or

4 (2) Is, or will be, providing services to the corporation in a position:
5 (a) In which the person is providing information technology ser6 vices and has control over, or access to, information technology sys7 tems that would allow the person to harm the information technology
8 systems or the information contained in the systems;

9 (b) In which the person has access to information that is confiden10 tial or for which state or federal laws, rules or regulations prohibit
11 disclosure;

(c) That has payroll or investment functions or in which the person
has responsibility for receiving, receipting or depositing money, negotiable instruments or securities, or other financial transactions or for
purchasing or selling property or otherwise has access to invested
moneys;

17 (d) That has mailroom duties as a primary duty or job function;

(e) In which the person has responsibility for auditing the corpo ration;

(f) That has personnel or human resources functions as a primary
 responsibility;

(g) In which the person has access to bank routing numbers, Social
Security numbers or electronic funds transfer instructions or numbers; or

(h) In which the person has access to tax or financial information
 about individuals or business entities.

27 <u>SECTION 6.</u> Executive director; appointment; functions. (1) The 28 Oregon Investment Corporation shall be under the supervision of an 29 executive director appointed by the board of directors of the corpo-30 ration. The executive director serves at the pleasure of the board and 31 shall be paid a salary as prescribed by the board.

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1 (2) Before assuming the duties of the office, the executive director 2 shall:

(a) Give to the state a fidelity bond, with one or more corporate
sureties authorized to do business in this state, in a penal sum prescribed by the Director of the Oregon Department of Administrative
Services, but not less than \$50,000. The premium for the bond shall be
paid by the corporation.

(b) Subscribe to an oath that the executive director faithfully and
impartially will discharge the duties of the office and that the executive director will support the Constitution of the United States and the
Constitution of the State of Oregon. The executive director shall file
a copy of the signed oath with the Secretary of State.

(3) The executive director has the powers necessary to carry out the duties of the corporation, subject to policy direction of the board, including but not limited to the power to employ, supervise and terminate the employment of staff as the executive director considers necessary. The executive director shall prescribe the duties and fix the compensation of the corporation's employees, in accordance with the personnel policies adopted by the board.

20 <u>SECTION 7.</u> Employees of the corporation. (1) Employees of the 21 Oregon Investment Corporation shall be considered employees for 22 purposes of participation in the Public Employees Retirement System 23 under ORS chapter 238 and eligible employees for purposes of partic-24 ipation in the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan under ORS 25 chapter 238A.

(2) Employees of the corporation may participate in collective bar gaining in accordance with ORS 243.650 to 243.782.

(3) Except as otherwise provided by law, employees of the corporation are eligible to receive the same benefits as state employees and
are entitled to retain their State of Oregon hire dates, transfer rights
and job bidding rights, all without loss of seniority, and to the direct

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1 transfer of all accumulated state agency leaves.

2 <u>SECTION 8.</u> Oregon Investment Corporation exempt from certain 3 <u>laws.</u> (1) Except as otherwise provided by law, the provisions of ORS 4 279.835 to 279.855 and ORS chapters 182, 240, 270, 273, 276, 279A, 279B, 5 279C, 282, 283, 291, 292 and 293 do not apply to the Oregon Investment 6 Corporation.

7 (2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, ORS 182.100,
8 182.109, 240.167, 279A.100, 292.043, 292.044, 293.115, 293.117, 293.130, 293.169,
9 293.171, 293.205 to 293.225, 293.250, 293.265 to 293.280, 293.285, 293.295,
10 293.321, 293.353, 293.375, 293.406, 293.465 to 293.485, 293.490, 293.495,
11 293.525, 293.701 to 293.820, 293.875, 293.880 and 293.990 apply to the corporation.

<u>SECTION 9.</u> The Oregon Investment Corporation Fund is established in the State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. Moneys deducted under ORS 293.718 and 294.865 shall be paid to the Oregon Investment Corporation Fund. Interest earned by the fund shall be credited to the fund. Moneys in the fund are continuously appropriated to the Oregon Investment Corporation for the payment of expenses of the corporation.

(2) The standard stated in subsection (1) of this section requires the exercise of reasonable care, skill and caution, and is to be applied to investments not in isolation but in the context of [*each investment fund's*] **the** investment portfolio **of each investment fund or other moneys** and as a part of an overall investment strategy, which should incorporate risk and return objectives reasonably suitable to the particular investment fund **or other moneys**.

(3) In making and implementing investment decisions, the [Oregon Investment Council and the investment officer have] corporation has a duty to
diversify the investments of the investment funds or other moneys unless,
under the circumstances, it is not prudent to do so.

(4) In addition to the duties stated in subsection (3) of this section, the
[council and the investment officer] employees and the board of directors
of the corporation must:

1 (a) Conform to the fundamental fiduciary duties of loyalty and impar-2 tiality;

3 (b) Act with prudence in deciding whether and how to delegate authority4 and in the selection and supervision of agents; and

5 (c) Incur only costs that are reasonable in amount and appropriate to the 6 investment responsibilities imposed by law.

7 (5) The duties [of the council and the investment officer under] described in this section are subject to contrary provisions of privately created public 8 trusts the assets of which by law are made investment funds or are other-9 wise invested by the corporation. Within the limitations of the standard 10 stated in subsection (1) of this section and subject to subsection (6) of this 11 12section, there may be acquired, retained, managed and disposed of as investments of the investment funds or other moneys every kind of invest-13 ment [which] that persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence acquire, 14 retain, manage and dispose of for their own account. 15

(6) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, not more than 50 percent of the moneys contributed to the Public Employees Retirement Fund or the Industrial Accident Fund may be invested in common stock, and not more than 65 percent of the moneys contributed to the other trust and endowment funds managed by the Oregon Investment [*Council or the State Treasurer*] **Corporation** may be invested in common stock.

(7) Subject to the standards set forth in this section, moneys held in the Deferred Compensation Fund may be invested in the stock of any company, association or corporation, including but not limited to shares of a mutual fund. Investment of moneys in the Deferred Compensation Fund is not subject to the limitation imposed by subsection (6) of this section.

(5) The requirements in subsections (3) and (4) of this section apply only 6 for biennia in which the Legislative Assembly does not require a greater 7 percentage of the Natural Resources Subaccount moneys to be deposited into 8 the Watershed Conservation Grant Fund. The Legislative Assembly may not 9 authorize the percentage of Natural Resources Subaccount moneys deposited 10 into the Watershed Conservation Grant Fund in a biennium to be less than 11 12the percentage required to be deposited under subsections (3) and (4) of this section. 13

(A) With an agency of the United States identified in the final agreement;

(3) The four voting members of the Oregon Investment Council appointed by the Governor under ORS 293.706 shall continue as voting members of the board of directors of the Oregon Investment Corporation until the expiration of their terms. A member is eligible for reappointment.

30 (6) Nothing in sections 1 to 9 of this 2013 Act, the amendments to 31 statutes and session laws by sections 10 to 110 of this 2013 Act or the

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repeal of statutes by section 113 of this 2013 Act relieves a person of a liability, duty or obligation accruing under or with respect to the duties, functions and powers transferred to the Oregon Investment Corporation by this 2013 Act. The corporation may undertake the collection or enforcement of any such liability, duty or obligation.

(7) Notwithstanding the transfer of duties, functions and powers to 6 the Oregon Investment Corporation by this 2013 Act, the rules of the 7 Oregon Investment Council, or the State Treasurer as investment of-8 ficer for the council, in effect on the operative date specified in section 9 114 of this 2013 Act continue in effect until superseded or repealed by 10 rules of the corporation. References, in rules of the council or the 11 12State Treasurer, to the Oregon Investment Council, an officer or employee of the council or the State Treasurer as investment officer for 13 the council are considered to be references to the corporation or an 14 officer or employee of the corporation. 15

(8) The rights and obligations of the Oregon Investment Council legally incurred under contracts, leases and business transactions executed, entered into or begun before the operative date specified in section 114 of this 2013 Act are transferred to the Oregon Investment Corporation. For the purpose of succession to these rights and obligations, the corporation is a continuation of the council and not a new authority.
