

A REVIEW OF THE 2012 VOLCANOES PATRIOTIC TRIBUTE AT VOLCANOES **STADIUM**

The Volcanoes 5th Annual Patriotic Tribute at Volcanoes Stadium on July 4, 5, 6, 2012, was by far the best Tribute to our brave men and women of the Armed Forces – both past and present - of any of the previous four, as we Thanked, Honored and Saluted 93 outstanding men and women from World War II, Korea, Vietnam and the Middle-East on the field to thunderous, standing ovations.

An impressive cross-section was truly admired by 11,364 fans during the three days.

After nine months of preparation, the final touches finally began on July 3rd as the 911 Patriot Field of Flags personnel rimmed Volcanoes Stadium with 176 American Flags, and another 50 flags representing all of our military branches were displayed inside the stadium including flags representing Iwo Jima, the Navy Seals, Pearl Harbor, Vietnam, Korea and World War II.

Finally, July 4th arrived, and the Volcanoes were very prepared to Thank, Honor and Salute our Honored Guests. As the gates opened at 5:15, The Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution, Uncle Sam and President Lincoln were present to greet the fans. Forty-five Organizations who interact with Military personnel and their families were setup on the concourse, and ready to let all know what services they provide to our Armed Forces. The tables were brightly decorated with their colors and logos. As fans arrived, and mingled with the many Military Heroes present, many videos ran on the Giant video board in right field including the current recruiting video of each branch, videos of action from the different wars and conflicts, and even our favorite Marine – Gomer Pyle – appeared on the board to entertain fans.

Our Patriotic Tribute pre-game Military Ceremony began with "The Toast to the Fallen Warriors". On the field, at home plate, we have the "Fallen Warrior Memorial", and presenting Soldiers. We also have a small, round table and on the table, we have a vase of roses tied with a red ribbon, a plate with lemon and salt, an inverted glass, and an empty chair.

We ask all fans to rise, and raise their hand in the air as if they had a glass so we may toast all Fallen Warriors with the following toast:



We are here to Thank, Honor and Salute, not only the many military heroes who are with us tonight, but all of our brave "Fallen Warriors" who have given their life for our country.

If you would face the table, near home plate, we would like to toast all our brave "Fallen Warriors". Please raise your hand in the air as if you had a glass.

The TABLE is small - symbolizing the loneliness we feel without them.

The TABLECLOTH is white - symbolizing the purity of their intentions, and willingness to respond to their country's call-to-arms.

The FLOWERS in the vase reminds us of the families and loved ones, of our comrades-in-arms, who kept the faith awaiting their return.

The RED RIBBON, tied so prominently on the vase, is reminiscent of the red ribbon worn by many, who bear witness to their unyielding determination to account for every one of our missing.

A SLICE OF LEMON is on the plate to remind us of their bitter fate.

There is SALT upon the plate also; symbolic of the river of tears, shed by their families and loved ones.

The GLASS is inverted -- they cannot toast with us tonight.

The CHAIR is empty as they cannot be here.

Would you repeat after me, please -- "To Our Missing and Fallen Warriors".




Each year, the Army, Air Force, Navy and Marines induct new Soldiers, Airmen, Sailors and Marines into their respective branches at home plate during the Patriotic Tribute at Volcanoes Stadium.

A "raw" group, they get a quick lesson in formation and marching in the parking lot, and then marched to home plate to receive the "Oath of Enlistment" from the Commanding Officer. Afterwards, our fans give them a tremendous ovation for volunteering to help defend our nation.



















Many Honored Guests were thrilled at being selected to throw a "Ceremonial First Pitch" prior to the National Anthem. There was a lot of fun "bantering" back and forth as to who threw the best pitch. After their bio's were read, the fans gave them a Heroes ovation, and then the ball sailed to the Volcanoes catcher. A great time was had by all, including Specialist Kevin Pannell, (directly below) United States Army Wounded Warrior, Iraq, who had both legs amputated because of enemy grenade explosion in combat in central Baghdad.

























In keeping with the tradition of Honoring Children at every Volcanoes baseball game, we have the running of the Child Ceremonial Base Run prior to the National Anthem. This event at all games is extremely well-received by the fans, we play the song "Wipeout" over the public address system, fans and players alike from both teams cheer the child on. The umpire even gives them a "safe" sign when they step on home plate.

On July 4th, 2012, Honorary Major General Marcus Hurst ran the Child Ceremonial Base Run in Honor of his friend "Fallen Oregon Army National Guard Soldier, Specialist Taylor Marks. General Hurst even wore a special shirt dedicated to Specialist Marks. It was a very touching moment.





On all three days of the Patriotic Tribute, for the last few years, we have Thanked, Honored and Saluted the Ultimate Sacrifice of a local Warrior with his family present at home plate. After the family is escorted to home plate by a ranking officer in attendance, and the video "Angel Flight" is played, the "Fallen Warriors" bio is read, and an example is:

Fans, we direct your attention to the area in front of the Volcanoes dugout. Please welcome Major Jason Fayler as he escorts the family of "Fallen Soldier" Specialist Taylor Marks to the home plate area. Please welcome the parents of Specialist Marks, Don and Michelle Mack and Morey Marks and Karla Spence, and family members Courtney Marks and Alex Mack.

Also accompanying the Marks family is members of the Patriot Guard Riders, and we thank them. What a tremendous organization they are in a Military families' time of need.

In September, 2009, that Angel Flight landed in Salem, because on August 28, 2009, we unfortunately lost a brave and courageous soldier in battle, and the Angel Flight brought him home.

Specialist Taylor Marks, just 19 years old, and a member of the 41st Infantry Brigade Combat Team of the Oregon Army National Guard, was killed in action at Rashid, Iraq, when insurgents attacked his vehicle with an explosively formed penetrator.

Taylor was a 2008 graduate of Central High School in Monmouth where he received a Dean's Scholarship to the University of Oregon.

He is remembered as a young man whose intelligence and sensitivity were offset by a sense of adventure. He was always ready to laugh, and always reached out for something bigger, more fun and more entertaining, says his mother. He loved high-tech things; fascinated by science, fiction, Star Wars, things complicated and confusing, his father recalls.

All Gave Some; Some Gave All. We therefore take this very special moment to Thank, Honor and Salute Oregon Army National Guard Specialist, Taylor Marks, for his service, and ultimate sacrifice, for the United States of America.

May GOD bless and keep Specialist Taylor Marks for eternity.

And now, fans, Jerry Howard, of the Volcanoes, and a United States Air Force Veteran, will present a "Fallen Soldier" memorial to Taylor's family from the Volcanoes.

Also, the Reverend Matthew Price, of the Oregon Gospel Ministries, an Army Veteran who was a Peace Keeper in Korea, will present Taylor's family with a "Fallen Soldier" plaque.

Fans, may we observe a Moment of Silence in Honor of Specialist Taylor Marks, and all "Fallen and Missing Warriors", followed by a 21-volley salute, and TAPS by Captain Dave Parker, United States Marines Retired.

<u>Kilong Ung</u> is the author of "Golden Leaf, A Khmer Rouge Genocide Survivor", and founder of the Golden Leaf Education Foundation – a nonprofit that builds schools for children. His life is an inspirational story about the experiences of a Cambodia genocide survivor, a boy, who spent nearly four years as a slave laborer under the tyrannical Khmer Rouge regime of Pol Pot, who killed nearly two million Cambodian civilians between 1975 and 1979. Over fifty of his relatives including his parents, grand-parents and sisters were killed; some were brutally murdered, and some starved to death. For four years, he worked at slave camps 13-hours a day, every day, digging, plowing, clearing woods, and farming rice. Many died each and every day. Against all odds, he survived by living on a diet of two tablespoons of rice with water twice a day, supplemented by eating snakes, rats, mice, caterpillars, roots and leaves.

In 1979, he escaped into Thailand. He was sent to San Diego, and then moved to Portland, graduated from Cleveland High School, Reed College and obtained his Masters Degree in Applied Statistics from Bowling Green State University. He currently works as an online banking software engineer. He was also a computer language Adjunct Instructor at Portland Community College.

In 2006, he became a proud member of the Rotary Club of Portland. In 2007, he was Knighted into the fellowship of the Royal Rosarians – the official Goodwill Ambassadors for the City of Portland, and given the Honorable title "Sir Knight". He has served on the Board of the Rotary Club of Portland, Royal Rosarians Council, Oregon Council on Civil Rights, Executive Board of the Council of the Boy Scouts of America, and the Board of the Cambodian-American Community of Oregon, plus others.

In 2010, he was selected as a Wordstock author. In 2011, he appeared on Spike TV's Deadliest Warrior Season 3 as an expert in the Saddam Hussein vs. Pol Pot episode. On March 4, 2012, he was honored as a recipient of the Commerce/Cleveland High School Distinguished Alumni Award.

Kilong Ung is the author of "Golden Leaf, A Khmer Rouge Genocide Survivor", and founder of the Golden Leaf Education Foundation – a non-profit that builds schools for children. His life is an inspirational story about the experiences of a Cambodia genocide survivor, a boy, who spent nearly four years as a slave laborer under the tyrannical Khmer Rouge regime of Pol Pot, who killed nearly two million Cambodian civilians between 1975 and 1979. Over fifty of his relatives including his parents, grand-parents and sisters were killed; some were brutally murdered, and some starved to death. For four years, he worked at slave camps 13-hours a day, every day, digging, plowing, clearing woods, and farming rice. Many died each and every day. Against all odds, he survived by living on a diet of two tablespoons of rice with water twice a day, supplemented by eating snakes, rats, mice, caterpillars, roots and leaves.

In 1979, he escaped into Thailand. He was sent to San Diego, and then moved to Portland, graduated from Cleveland High School, Reed College and obtained his Masters Degree in Applied Statistics from Bowling Green State University. He currently works as an online banking software engineer. He was also a computer language Adjunct Instructor at Portland Community College.

In 2006, he became a proud member of the Rotary Club of Portland. In 2007, he was Knighted into the fellowship of the Royal Rosarians – the official Goodwill Ambassadors for the City of Portland, and given the Honorable title "Sir Knight". He has served on the Board of the Rotary Club of Portland, Royal Rosarians Council, Oregon Council on Civil Rights, Executive Board of the Council of the Boy Scouts of America, and the Board of the Cambodian-American Community of Oregon, plus others.

In 2010, he was selected as a Wordstock author. In 2011, he appeared on Spike TV's Deadliest Warrior Season 3 as an expert in the Saddam Hussein vs. Pol Pot episode.

On March 4, 2012, he was honored as a recipient of the Commerce/Cleveland High School Distinguished Alumni Award.

We took them on the field between innings, read their bio's and names, and the 5,000 fans gave them a three-minute, thunderous, standing ovation. I knew then we had something special, and the following September, I began planning for 2009. As a Veteran (USAF 1961-1966), I was very determined to make our "Patriotic Tribute at Volcanoes Stadium" the very best event it could be.

In 2009, in addition to Thanking, Honoring and Saluting <u>25</u> men and women from World War II, Korea, Vietnam and the Middle-East, we flew in five National Football League Cheerleaders who also belong to a group – "Sweethearts for Soldiers". They go to the mid-East and put on USO type shows for the troops; singing, dancing, etc. In addition, we were able to introduce Oregon's only living "Medal of Honor" recipient – Tech Sergeant Robert Maxwell of WWII (see his bio in attachment). We also added ten Military organizations who work with Military families, on various issues, and gave them a table on the main concourse so they could interact with our Military families in attendance. After the game, we had an extensive Fireworks Show with a blast from an Oregon National Guard Howitzer. It rattled the stadium.

In 2010, we were able to secure our first General officers – Major General Curt Loop (US Army Ret.), Brigadier General Bruce Prunk, Oregon Air National Guard, and Brigadier General Charles Yriartte, Oregon Army National Guard. In addition, we Thanked, Honored and Saluted <u>50</u> other outstanding men and women from the rank of Colonel to Private. The one thing we are extremely proud of is our cross-section of Honorees – Men/Women The Old/The Young Officers/Enlisted High-Ranking Commanders/E-1 New Inductees World War II, Korea, Vietnam & The Middle-East Deployed/Non-Deployed Combat Tested/Non-Combat Tested Warriors of Color/Many Nationalities Wounded Warriors/Families of "Fallen Warriors" All Branches of the Armed Forces. During the 2010 event, we got our first F-15 flyover from the Oregon Air National Guard 142nd Fighter Wing in Portland. Our Military organizations with tables on the concourse grew to twenty. Specialist Kevin Pannell, United States Army Wounded Warrior who had both legs amputated, joined us, as did Tech Sergeant Don Malarkey of World War II "Band of Brothers" fame. (See their bio's in attachment). 2011, brought us a challenge. For the first time ever, when the Northwest League Schedule was released, the Volcanoes were not home on July 4th, which happened to be a Monday; however, we were home on Friday-Sunday, July 1, 2 and 3. Disappointed, yes, but our very good friend, Major General Loop, said you have a great opportunity –"When One Door Closes – Another Opens". Now is the time to take Patriotic Tribute at Volcanoes Stadium to a three-day event, thus the birth of Patriotic Weekend at Volcanoes Stadium. We ended up Thanking, Honoring and Saluting <u>65</u> outstanding men and women on the field. A group in Salem who puts up American Flags on September 11th, downtown Salem, volunteered to ring our entire stadium with 176 American Flags – it was a beautiful site to see. The Oregon National Guard Army Band was here, as was the Oregon State Defense Force Bagpipe Band, the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution in their traditional dress, President Abraham Lincoln was here to greet our fans at the main gate, several Confederate War Re-enactment groups also showed. A great three days with 11,640 total fans.

Last July, 2012, we continued with the three-day event as we will each year going forward, and we grew it even bigger and better. We Thanked, Honored and Saluted 93 men and women on the field. The stadium was again ringed with American Flags, another F-15 flyover, a huge Fireworks Show, and for the first time, we had ten Military families come all the way from Klamath Falls – Kingsley Air Force Field – and seven families from McChord Base in Tacoma joined us to be Thanked, Honored and Saluted. Our event was becoming known outside of the Willamette Valley. We added two new features last summer – our "Stars and Stripes" Patriotic Baseball Cards where we featured a Volcanoes player and a Military Hero on the card, with their bio's and sponsor on the back of the card. We had 36 sets because we had 36 Volcanoes players and coaches. I chose a "cross-section" of our 93 Military Heroes to be on the card. We printed 1,000 cards of each set, and gave them away. It was a big hit, the Military Heroes felt like Mickey Mantle or Willie Mays with their own "baseball card", and many kids asked for their autograph. In addition, we set aside, for the first time, the second evening to Thank, Honor and Salute our tremendous Native American Veterans who have bravely and Honorably served our country since President George Washington days. I worked with the Tribal Council of the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde. I found a beautiful Caisson with a Flag-Draped Casket from Chaffin Farms in Sweet Home. (See picture in attached brochure) It was parked at the main gate. The Tribal Drum Group performed with three numbers they perform funerals. The Grand Ronde Honor Guard then removed the Flag-Draped Casket from the caisson as the Oregon State Defense Force Bagpipe Band played "Amazing Grace". The Honor Guard took the casket inside the stadium concourse, and placed it in a teepee. It was a very Honorable, emotional moment, and a favorite with our fans. During the game, we Thanked, Honored and Saluted many Native American Veterans from our area, and on our jumbotron, we featured the lives of Army Specialist Lori Piestewa, a Pima Indian, who was the first female to be killed in Iraq, and the first woman to die in combat in the history of the US Armed Services. We also Honored Corporal Ira Hayes of Iwo Jima fame, and a true American. Our attendance once again easily surpassed 11,000.

We are in our sixth month of preparation for our 2013 three-day event on July 1-3. Once again, the Volcanoes are out of town on July 4th, but we take the Monday-Wednesday, July 1-3, and will make the very best of it. We are very, very thankful we can once again Thank, Honor and Salute our brave men and women of the Armed Forces – both past and present – for their outstanding service to our country. We have had many exciting acceptances so far including Dr. Bridget Cantrell of Bellingham, WA, a world-wide noted authority on PTSD, and has been contracted by the US Army many times to go to Iraq, Afghanistan, Turkey, Ft. Hood, etc. You can google her. Also, Dr. Michael George of West Virginia is coming. He does the history of the National Anthem, and reenactments of Patrick Henry and Nathan Hale, among others. Brigadier General Stan Flemming, Combat Officer, longtime medical doctor, former Washington State House Representative and first Native American to be elected to that chamber , father of the modern US Army MEDCAPS program – Medical Civic Action Program-Medical Readiness Training Exercises, taught medicine at the University of Washington and University of Southern California Medical Schools, and Founding Father and 1st Mayor of a new city in Washington, University Place.

A couple of reference contacts for you would be – Major General Curt Loop (US Army Ret – see his bio on attachment). He has been extremely instrumental and cooperative in assisting our preparation each year and we are very grateful, and on the other end, Senior Airman Amanda Blodgett of Kingsley Field in Klamath Falls. When she was first invited, she declined thinking she was not worthy of the others being invited due to her rank, time in service, no deployment, etc. I explained to her she WAS the one we wanted based upon the cross-section I explained earlier. I finally convinced her, then found out her husband is a Senior Airman at Kingsley, along with her brother-in-law, and her father was in Vietnam. Ended up we had all of them here, and all threw a Ceremonial First Pitch, and were Thanked, Honored and Saluted on the field, and had a great time. Amanda and I have stayed in touch ever since.
