The day that we were invited to the climbing gym with her VI instructors was a very different, very positive experience. Not only were the routes set up and reserved for our kids, instructors were on hand to assist. My daughter climbed to the top on her first try. It was an incredible success for her. She absolutely loved it and felt like she could do anything! This is a priceless gift to a child who missed out on so much of the world visually.

In addition to the recreation these funds are making reading at a higher level accessible for my daughter, and many children by providing iPads. With the support of this technology my daughter is able to access books, in the proper size font, track her reading and move along with the class. This is a remarkable resource. The vision instructors have opened up so many possibilities for children with the funds to purchase and use the iPads. In today's world they must continue to have this academic necessity.

On a final note I would like to express gratitude for these funds. Not only have they opened the doors of technology and climbing, but also to a favorite sport.
