Please accept this letter as testimony for your upcoming committee hearing on SB 633, which would strip counties in Oregon of their ability to craft appropriate seed policies.

Citizens in Jackson County have succeeded in getting a genetically modified crop ban on the 2014 ballot. Four other Oregon counties are also hard at work on similar bans. It does not surprise me given the monied, cynical politics of the day, in concert with biotech industry money, that this bill is being floated. I have never given much time to writing state legislators, but the recent disgusting giveaway to Phil Knight by Kitzhaber and the state has mobilized me out of my apathy.

I am a fifth generation Oregonian on mom's side, going back to donation land claim folks in Wasco County: gramma great ran the chevron station in Dufur for over 50 years. I am very much pro-business, have no party affiliation, and just want to see a better Oregon for our kids and grand kids. The way money runs the show these days is shameful and embarrassing, and we'll eventually all be sorry for letting big business money run the show.

This Senate Bill will effectively knee cap the future of Oregon's world class seed production industry, and take away local control of food systems, which is exactly the opposite direction we need to go as a state.
