> **Increasing tobacco taxes are important for public health.** Increasing the price of tobacco is a proven way to deter more children and teens from starting to smoke and it reduces smoking rates for everyone. Studies have shown that a 10 percent increase in the price of cigarettes reduces consumption by about 7 percent for youth and 3-5 percent for adults. Oregon's adult smoking rate is currently
