Measure Description:

Directs state education programs to submit specified information about number of students and number of licensed or registered teachers regularly assigned to students.

Local Government Mandate:

This bill does not affect local governments' service levels or shared revenues sufficient to trigger Section 15, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Analysis: This bill requires the Department of Education (ODE) to report on the number of students and number of licensed or registered teachers regularly assigned to students and makes the information available to the public and to the Legislative Assembly. The bill instructs ODE to report on core curriculum (defined by the State Board of Education) for 2014-15 school year. In the 2015-16 school year ODE would report on all classes.

ODE is currently working on a data system funded with ARRA funds that will be able to meet the reporting requirements of this bill, but is not robust enough to collect and report the volume of data required by this bill. ODE will need to make technical improvements to the system and create a reporting process. It is expected that this will require \$267,446 General Fund to meet these requirements. These are one-time costs that would be incurred in the 2013-15 biennium.

Oregon Youth Authority contracts with school districts for teachers and would not be affected by this bill. School districts would be affected by this bill due to the additional reporting requirements and it is reasonable to assume that this fiscal impact could be substantial. Actual estimates of this cost are not available at this time.

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
