WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Directs Oregon Health Authority (OHA) report to 2015 Legislative Assembly on the burden of diabetes in Oregon. Specifies data and information to be collected and reported. Sunsets responsibility to report upon convening of 2016 Legislative Assembly.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Effectiveness of state plans
- Cost and impact of diabetes if untreated
- Impacts of education and outreach
- Oregon Educators Benefit Board current initiatives and data relating to diabetes
- Diabetes reduction as result of Health Engagement Model (HEM)

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: Replaces original measure.

BACKGROUND: In 2010, more than 291,200 Oregonians lived with diabetes, compared to 204,600 in 2000. The long-term projections are that 546,000 Oregonians will be living with diabetes, representing an increase of 87.5 percent from the 2010 figures. The total financial burden of diabetes in American reached \$218 billion in 2007, and diabetes and its complications today consume one in every 10 of America's health care dollar.

Senate Bill 169-A directs Oregon Health Authority to report to the 2015 Legislative Assembly on the state of diabetes in Oregon and to provide a status of the strategic plan on initiatives and efforts being implemented to reduce the rates.
