WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Modifies certain required documentation to be submitted to school administrator for purpose of opting out of immunizations. Specifies parent sign affidavit declaring that obtaining immunizations conflicts with religious beliefs of parent or have signature from health care practitioner verifying that parent has reviewed risks and benefits of immunization information or parent has completed vaccine education module approved by Oregon Health Authority. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Oregon's immunization rates
- Protection of children and school populations
- Options for parents and informed decisions
- Religious freedom/exemption
- Oregon's non-medical exemption to school immunization rates

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE MINORITY AMENDMENT: Changes "statement" to "document". Specifies that parent sign affidavit declaring that obtaining immunizations conflicts with religious beliefs of parent or have signature from health care practitioner verifying that parent has reviewed risks and benefits of immunization information or parent has completed vaccine education module approved by Oregon Health Authority.

BACKGROUND: According to the Oregon Public Health Division, for the last decade, Oregon's non-medical exemption to the school immunization rate for kindergartners has increased from less than 2 percent in 2001 to 5.8 percent in 2012. In some counties, the rate of non-medical exemption is as high as 12 percent. Oregon has the highest non-medical exemption rate for one or more immunizations in the United States, and some Oregon schools have an exemption rate as high as 70 percent.

Senate Bill 132-A (Minority) requires parents to sign affidavit declaring that obtaining immunizations conflicts with religious beliefs of parent and have signature from a health practitioner verifying that the parent has reviewed risks and benefits of immunization or the parent has completed a vaccine education module approved by Oregon Health Authority.
