WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Defines key terms. Establishes minimum energy efficiency standards for televisions, large battery charger systems, and inductive charger systems and small battery charger systems with certain exceptions effective January 1, 2014. Prohibits person from selling, offering to sell, or installing for compensation television, large battery charger system, inductive charger system, or small battery charger systems unless energy efficiency of new product meets or exceeds standards specified effective January 1, 2014. Establishes minimum energy efficiency standards for high light output double-ended quartz halogen lamp effective January 1, 2016. Prohibits person from selling, offering to sell, or installing for compensation high light output double-ended quartz halogen lamp unless energy efficiency of new product meets or exceeds standards specified effective January 1, 2016.

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: Replaces measure.

BACKGROUND: In June 2005, the Oregon Legislative Assembly approved legislation setting minimum energy efficiency standards for 11 appliances. Testing requirements and minimum efficiency standards are outlined in the regulations. The standards do not apply to products installed in a mobile or manufactured home at the time of construction or designed expressly for installation and use in recreational vehicles. Senate Bill 692 B adds televisions, battery chargers, and some specific electric lamps to Oregon's appliance standards statute.
