SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Directs Early Learning Council and Department of Education to assist school districts in implementing process to assess children to determine their readiness for kindergarten.

Requires standardized screening and appropriate referral services for voluntary statewide early learning system.

Requires Department of Human Services and Child Care Division of Employment Department to convene professional development and labor management committee to establish quality improvement system for home-based child care providers.

Expands assessments and services provided by Healthy *[Start Family Support Services]* **Families Oregon** programs to include children from zero through three years of age and their families.

Directs Oregon Health Authority and Early Learning Council to work collaboratively with coordinated care organizations to meet specified goals related to prenatal care.

Directs Oregon Health Authority and Early Learning Council to establish grant program to support effective and scalable strategies that align early learning systems and health systems for purpose of improving developmental outcomes for children zero through three years of age.

[Expands requirements for tiered quality rating and improvement system for child care.]

Requires that preschool child with disability have comprehensive plan for communication that allows child, by age of three years, to engage in expressive and receptive communication.

[Directs Early Learning Council to establish demonstration projects to foster creation of locally developed models of early learning service delivery.]

Directs Early Learning Council to establish Early Learning Hub demonstration project for coordination of early learning services and to establish metrics for measuring resources and outcomes for early learning.

Establishes Early Learning Kindergarten Readiness Partnership and Innovation Program to improve readiness of children for kindergarten.

Appropriates moneys from General Fund to Early Learning Council for *[demonstration projects]* **establishment and support of Early Learning Hubs.**

Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2013.

2 Relating to early learning; creating new provisions; amending ORS 343.475, 417.705, 417.710, 417.725,
3 417.728, 417.775, 417.777, 417.790 and 417.795 and sections 14, 77, 77a, 78, 82 and 103, chapter

6 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

7 **SECTION 1.** Section 14, chapter 37, Oregon Laws 2012, is amended to read:

8 **Sec. 14.** (1) The Early Learning Council established by section 4, chapter 519, Oregon Laws
9 2011, and the Department of Education shall jointly develop a process that allows for an assessment
10 of children to determine their readiness for kindergarten. The development of the process must in-
11 clude the input of kindergarten teachers prior to implementation as described in subsection (2) of
12 this section.

13 (2) By November 1, 2012, the process described in subsection (1) of this section must be made

1 available to school districts that have been selected to be part of a pilot program for the imple-
2 mentation of the process. The council and department shall select the participating school districts
3 from school districts that volunteer to be part of the pilot program and in a manner that achieves
4 the greatest possible diversity of school districts across this state.

5 (3)(a) By November 1, 2013, the process described in subsection (1) of this section must be made
6 available to all school districts for implementation.

7 **(b) The council and department shall assist school districts in implementing the process**
8 **described in subsection (1) of this section. Assistance shall include training on:**

9 **(A) The goals of the process;**

10 **(B) The implementation of the process;**

11 **(C) Early learning services available to improve a child's readiness for kindergarten; and**

24 to read:

25 417.777. (1) Each local commission on children and families, as part of the local coordinated
26 comprehensive plan developed under ORS 417.775 for the county or region, shall lead and coordinate
27 the development of a voluntary local early childhood system plan that shall focus on the needs of
28 children who are zero through eight years of age and their families. Local Oregon prekindergarten
29 programs, early childhood special education programs and early intervention services shall collab-
30 orate and participate with the local commission in the development and implementation of the vol-
31 untary early childhood system plan.

32 (2) In the process of developing the voluntary local early childhood system plan, a local com-
33 mission shall include parents, youth, community representatives and representatives of local pro-
34 viders of early childhood services that reflect the diversity of the county or region, including but
35 not limited to representatives from:

36 (a) Hospitals and the health professions;

37 (b) Local interagency coordinating councils;

29 (17) Alcohol and drug prevention and treatment services included in the local coordinated com-
 30 prehensive plan must meet minimum standards adopted by the Oregon Health Authority under ORS
 31 430.357.

32 **SECTION 16.** Section 77, chapter 37, Oregon Laws 2012, is amended to read:

33 **Sec. 77.** *[(1) As used in this section, "community-based coordinator of early learning services"*
 34 *means counties, cities, school districts, education service districts, community colleges, public universi-*
 35 *ties, private educational institutions, faith-based organizations, nonprofit service providers, tribes and*
 36 *any other entity that meets the minimum criteria to be a community-based coordinator of early learning*
 37 *services, as determined by the Early Learning Council.]*

38 **(1) As used in this section:**

39 **(a) "Early Learning Hub" means any entity designated by regional partners to coordinate**
 40 **early learning services, as determined by rules adopted by the Early Learning Council.**

41 **(b) "Regional partners" includes counties, cities, school districts, education service dis-**
 42 **tricts, community colleges, public universities, private educational institutions, faith-based**
 43 **organizations, nonprofit service providers and tribes.**

44 **(2) The Early Learning Council shall implement and oversee a system that coordinates the de-**
 45 **livery of early learning services to the communities of this state through the [use of community-based**

1 *coordinators of early learning services*] **direction of Early Learning Hubs.**

2 (3) The system implemented and overseen by the council must ensure that:

3 (a) Providers of early learning services are accountable **for outcomes**;

4 (b) Services are provided in a cost-efficient manner; and

5 (c) The services provided, and the means by which those services are provided, are focused on
6 the outcomes of the services.

7 [(4) *An entity may become a community-based coordinator of early learning services by submitting*
8 *to the council an application that demonstrates the following:*]

9 **(4) The Early Learning Council shall develop and implement a process for requesting**
10 **proposals from entities to become Early Learning Hubs. Proposals submitted under this**
11 **subsection must comply with criteria and requirements adopted by the council by rule, in-**
12 **cluding:**

13 (a) The entity [*is*] **will be** able to coordinate the provision of early learning services to the
14 community that will be served by the entity. An entity may [*make the demonstration required by*
15 *this*] **meet the requirement of this** paragraph by submitting evidence that local stakeholders, in-
16 cluding but not limited to service providers, parents, community members, county governments, local
17 governments and school districts, have participated in the development of the [*application*] **proposal**

19 (b) The services coordinated by the entity will be in alignment with the services provided by the

21 (c) The entity will **be in alignment with, and** make advantageous use of, the system of public
22 health care and services available through county health departments and other publicly supported
23 programs delivered through, or in partnership with, counties **and coordinated care organizations.**

24 **(d) The entity will be able to integrate efforts among education providers, providers of**
25 **health care, providers of human services and providers of other programs and services in the**
26 **community.**

27 **(e) The entity will use coordinated and transparent budgeting.**

28 **(f) The entity will operate in a fiscally sound manner.**

29 [(d)] **(g) The entity [*has*] must have** a governing body or [*an*] **community** advisory body that:

30 (A) Has the authority to initiate audits, recommend the terms of a contract and provide reports
31 to the public and to the Early Learning Council on the outcomes of the provision of early learning
32 services to the community served by the entity.

33 (B) Has members selected through a transparent process **and includes both public and private**
34 **entities, locally based parents and service recipients, human service providers, health care**
35 **providers and representatives of local governments.**

36 [(e)] **(h) The entity will collaborate on documentation related to coordinated services with public**
37 **and private entities that are identified by the Early Learning Council as providers of services that**
38 **advance the early learning of children.**

39 [(f)] **(i) The entity will serve a community that is based on the population and service needs of**
40 **the community and will demonstrate the ability to improve results for at-risk children, in-**
41 **cluding the ability to identify, evaluate and implement coordinated strategies to ensure that**
42 **a child is ready to succeed in school.**

43 [(g)] **(j) The entity [*is*] will be** able to raise significant funds from public and private sources to
44 support early learning services coordinated by the entity **and operate in a fiscally sound**
45 **manner.**

1 *[(h)]* **(k)** The entity meets any other qualifications established by the Early Learning Council.

2 (5) The Early Learning Council may *[develop]* **adopt by rule** requirements **that are** in addition
3 to the requirements described in subsections (3) and (4) of this section that an entity must meet to
4 qualify as *[a community-based coordinator of early learning services]* **an Early Learning Hub**. When
5 developing the **additional** requirements, the council must use a statewide public process of commu-
6 nity engagement that is consistent with the requirements of the federal Head Start Act.

7 (6) When determining whether to designate an entity as *[a community-based coordinator of early*
8 *learning services]* **an Early Learning Hub**, the Early Learning Council shall balance the following
9 factors:

10 (a) The entity's ability to engage the community and be involved in the community.

11 (b) The entity's ability to produce outcomes that benefit children.

12 (c) The entity's resourcefulness.

13 (d) The entity's use, or proposed use, of evidence-based practices.

14 (7) The Early Learning Council may alter the lines of the territory served by *[a community-based*
15 *coordinator of early learning services]* **an Early Learning Hub** only to ensure that all children of
16 this state are served by *[a community-based coordinator of early learning services]* **an Early Learn-**
17 **ing Hub**.

18 (8) An entity designated as *[a community-based coordinator of early learning services]* **part of**
19 **an Early Learning Hub** may not use more than 15 percent of the moneys received by the entity
20 from the Early Learning Council to pay administrative costs of the entity.
