# House Bill 2060

Introduced and printed pursuant to House Rule 12.00. Presession filed (at the request of House Interim Committee on General Government and Consumer Protection for Attorney General Ellen Rosenblum)

#### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Allows Attorney General to issue order disqualifying charitable organization from receiving contributions that are deductible for purpose of Oregon income tax and corporate excise tax if Attorney General finds that charitable organization has failed to expend at least 30 percent of total annual functional expenses on program services when those expenses are averaged over most recent three fiscal years. Provides that Attorney General may decline to issue disqualification order if certain mitigating circumstances exist. Specifies exempt organizations.

Imposes mandatory disclosure requirements for charitable organizations subject to disqualifica-tion order. Requires Attorney General to publish on Internet and otherwise make available list of charitable organizations that are subject to disqualification orders. Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to regulation of charitable organizations; and prescribing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon: 3

SECTION 1. Sections 2 to 5 of this 2013 Act are added to and made a part of ORS 128.610 4

5 to 128.750.

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SECTION 2. (1) The Attorney General may issue an order disqualifying a charitable or-6 ganization from receiving contributions that are deductible as charitable donations for the 7 purpose of Oregon income tax and corporate excise tax if the Attorney General finds that 8 9 the organization has failed to expend at least 30 percent of the organization's total annual 10 functional expenses on program services when those expenses are averaged over the most recent three fiscal years for which the Attorney General has reports containing expense in-11 12 formation. The calculation of program services expenses and total functional expenses shall 13 be based on the amounts of program services expenses and total functional expenses identified by the organization in the organization's Internal Revenue Service Form 990 return or 14 other Internal Revenue Service return required to be filed as part of the organization's re-15 16 port to the Attorney General.

(2) A charitable organization may request a contested case hearing within 60 days after 17notification from the Attorney General that the Attorney General proposes to issue a dis-18 qualification order under this section. Notwithstanding a finding that the charitable 19 organization's program services expenses fall below the minimum percentage specified in 20 21subsection (1) of this section, the Attorney General may decline to issue a disqualification 22 order if the organization establishes:

(a) That the organization made payments to affiliates that should be considered in cal-2324 culating the organization's program services expenses;

25(b) That the organization is accumulating revenue for a specific program purpose con-

26 sistent with representations in solicitations; or

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(c) Such other mitigating circumstances as may be identified by the Attorney General 1 by rule. 2 (3) A disgualification order under this section remains in effect until such time as the 3 charitable organization submits sufficient information to the Attorney General to demon-4 strate that the organization's program services expenses meet the minimum percentage 5 specified in subsection (1) of this section. A charitable organization may submit information 6 under this subsection no earlier than one year after the disqualification order becomes final, 7 and may not submit information under this subsection more than once each year after the 8 9 initial submission is made. The information submitted under this subsection must include all Internal Revenue Service Form 990 returns, or equivalent Internal Revenue Service re-10 turns, filed by the organization after the disqualification order became final. 11 12(4) A disqualification order under this section may not be issued to: (a) A private foundation as defined in section 509 of the Internal Revenue Code, as in 13 effect on the effective date of this 2013 Act; 14 15(b) A community trust or foundation operating as described in 26 C.F.R. 1.170A-9(f)(10) and (11), as in effect on the effective date of this 2013 Act; 16 (c) A qualified charitable remainder trust described in section 664 of the Internal Re-17venue Code, as in effect on the effective date of this 2013 Act; 18 (d) An organization that does not qualify to receive tax deductible contributions; 19 (e) An organization that is not required to file annual reports with the Attorney General; 20(f) An organization that is not required to file an Internal Revenue Service Form 990 2122return or an equivalent Internal Revenue Service return; 23(g) An organization that receives less than 50 percent of the organization's total annual revenues from contributions or grants identified in accordance with Internal Revenue Ser-24vice Form 990 or an equivalent form; and 25(h) An organization that has been in existence for less than four years. 2627SECTION 3. (1) When a disqualification order issued under sections 2 to 5 of this 2013 Act becomes effective, the charitable organization named in the order shall provide a dis-28closure as described in this section in all solicitations made by the organization to persons 2930 in Oregon. The disclosure must clearly and conspicuously state that contributions to the 31 organization are not deductible as charitable donations for Oregon income tax purposes. The disclosure also must appear in any written document provided to a donor acknowledging the 32donation or referring to the amount of the donation. The Attorney General may specify ad-33 34 ditional disclosure requirements by rule. 35 (2) Failure to provide the disclosures required by this section is a false or misleading representation for the purposes of ORS 128.886. 36 37 SECTION 4. (1) When a disqualification order issued under sections 2 to 5 of this 2013 38 Act becomes effective, the Attorney General shall publish on the Internet and otherwise make publicly available information identifying the charitable organization named in the or-39
