# **A-Engrossed** House Bill 2091

#### **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Requires Oregon Health Authority to report to Legislative Assembly on needed changes to private health option component of Health Care for All Oregon Children program.] Repeals private health option component of Health Care for All Oregon Children program and requires orderly transfer of children enrolled in private health option to medical assist-ance program. Requires Oregon Health Authority to seek federal approval to provide medical assistance to children with family incomes above 200 percent of federal poverty guidelines and a to pholomy 200 percent of federal poverty guidelines and at or below 300 percent of federal poverty guidelines.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

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8	ABOLISHMENT OF PRIVATE HEALTH OPTION IN
9	HEALTH CARE FOR ALL OREGON CHILDREN PROGRAM
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11	SECTION 1. ORS 414.231 is amended to read:
12	414.231. (1) As used in this section, "child" means a person under 19 years of age.
13	(2) The Health Care for All Oregon Children program is established to make affordable, acces-
14	sible health care available to all of Oregon's children. The program [is composed of:]
15	[(a)] provides medical assistance to children, funded in whole or in part by Title XIX of the
16	Social Security Act, by the State Children's Health Insurance Program under Title XXI of the Social
17	Security Act and by moneys appropriated or allocated for that purpose by the Legislative
18	Assembly[; and]
19	[(b) A private health option administered by the Office of Private Health Partnerships under ORS
20	414.826].
21	(3) A child is eligible for the program if the child is lawfully present in this state and the income
22	of the child's family is:
23	(a) At or below [300] 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines[.]; or
24	(b) Above 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines and at or below 300 percent of the

federal poverty guidelines, as long as federal financial participation is available for the costs 1 2 of the coverage. (4) There is no asset limit to qualify for the program. 3 [(4)(a)] (5)(a) A child receiving medical assistance under the program is continuously eligible for 4 a minimum period of 12 months. 5 (b) The Department of Human Services or the Oregon Health Authority shall reenroll a child 6 for successive 12-month periods of enrollment as long as the child is eligible for medical assistance 7 on the date of reenrollment and there is federal financial participation in the costs of the 8 9 child's coverage. 10 (c) The department and the authority may not require a new application as a condition of reenrollment under paragraph (b) of this subsection and must determine the child's eligibility for 11 12 medical assistance using information and sources available to the department or documentation 13 readily available. [(5) Except for medical assistance funded by Title XIX of the Social Security Act, the department 14 15or the Oregon Health Authority may prescribe by rule a period of uninsurance prior to enrollment in 16the program.] SECTION 2. Subject to funds available, the Oregon Health Authority may provide medical assistance 19 in the form of premium assistance for the purchase of health insurance coverage provided by public programs or private insurance, including but not limited to: 20(1) The Family Health Insurance Assistance Program; and 2122(2) Medical assistance described in ORS 414.115[; and]. [(3) The Health Care for All Oregon Children program established in ORS 414.231.] 23SECTION 3. (1) The Oregon Health Authority shall request from the United States Sec-24 retary of Health and Human Services any approval necessary to obtain federal financial 25participation in paying the costs of providing medical assistance through the Health Care for 2627All Oregon Children program to children whose family incomes are above 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines and at or below 300 percent of the federal poverty guidelines and 28of transitioning children from the private health options to another medical assistance pro-2930 gram. The authority shall notify Legislative Counsel immediately upon receipt of approval 31 or disapproval. (2) The authority may take any action necessary to implement the amendments to ORS 32414.231 by section 1 of this 2013 Act immediately upon receipt of federal approval, including 33 34 but not limited to: 35 (a) Applying for federal grants or other federal moneys; and 36 (b) Adopting rules. 37 SECTION 4. (1) The Oregon Health Authority shall provide written advance notice to the adults who are responsible for all children enrolled in the private health option of the Health 38 Care for All Oregon Children program, stating that the private health option of the program 39 will be ending and that the children will be automatically enrolled in another medical as-40 sistance program. 41

(2) The authority shall ensure an orderly transfer of children enrolled in the private
health option to another medical assistance program, in consultation with each carrier providing coverage under the private health option, so that no children are enrolled in the private health option on or after June 30, 2015.

5 (c) The filing by a coordinated care organization of a statement of whether the organization or 6 another entity, such as a state or local government agency or a reinsurer, will guarantee the 7 organization's ultimate financial risk;

8 (d) The disclosure of a coordinated care organization's holdings of real property and its 20
9 largest investment holdings, if any;

(e) The disclosure by category of administrative expenses related to the provision of health
 services under the coordinated care organization's contract with the authority;

(f) The disclosure of the three highest executive salary and benefit packages of each coordinatedcare organization;

(g) The process by which a coordinated care organization will be evaluated or audited for financial soundness and stability and the organization's ability to accept financial risk under its
contracts, which process may include the use of employed or retained actuaries;

(h) A description of how the required statements and the final results of evaluations and audits
will be made available to the public over the Internet at no cost to the public;

(i) A range of sanctions that may be imposed on a coordinated care organization deemed to befinancially unsound and the process for determining sanctions; and

(j) Whether a new category of license should be created for coordinated care organizations re cognizing their unique role but avoiding duplicative requirements for organizations that contract
 with the authority but are also licensed by the Department of Consumer and Business Services.

(4) The authority shall regularly report on the development of the plans, criteria and processes
described in subsections (2) and (3) of this section to the Joint Interim Committee on Health Care
Transformation or, if such committee has not been appointed, to another appropriate interim committee of the Legislative Assembly.

(5) The authority shall present the proposals developed under this section to the LegislativeAssembly for approval no later than February 1, 2012.

(6) Until the coordinated care organization qualification criteria and the global budgeting pro cess are approved by the Legislative Assembly, the authority shall renew the contracts of prepaid
 managed care health services organizations, as defined in ORS 414.736, to provide health services.

(7) The authority shall prepare financial models and analyses to demonstrate the feasibility of a coordinated care organization being able to realize health care cost savings. The authority shall present the models and analyses to the Legislative Assembly along with the proposals developed by the authority under this section.

SECTION 9. ORS 414.825, 414.826, 414.828 and 414.831 are repealed June 30, 2015.
