House Bill 2137

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Requires Oregon Health Authority to establish system for repurposing durable medical equipment that is no longer medically appropriate for medical assistance recipients for use by other medical assistance recipients.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

- 2 Relating to durable medical equipment.
 - Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
 - <u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) As used in this section, "provider" means a long term care facility, as defined in ORS 442.015, a residential facility, as defined in ORS 443.400, a foster home or a provider of in-home services.
 - (2) If the Oregon Health Authority determines that an item of durable medical equipment, including a prosthetic, orthotic or medical supply, requested by a recipient of medical assistance is likely to be useful for a longer period of time than the period of time during which the item is expected to be medically appropriate for the intended recipient of the item, the authority shall:
 - (a) Rent the item; or
 - (b) Purchase the item for use by the recipient.
 - (3) If an item is purchased under subsection (2)(b) of this section, the authority shall require the provider of care to the recipient to return the item to the authority when the item is no longer medically appropriate for the recipient. The provider shall be required to ensure that the item is clean, safe and ready for use.
 - (4) An item returned under subsection (3) of this section must be made available by the authority to another medical assistance recipient for whom the item is medically appropriate.
 - (5) The authority shall prescribe by rule a list of the types of items of durable medical equipment, prosthetics, orthotics and medical supplies to which this section applies based on the criteria described in subsection (2) of this section and considering health and safety issues, the cost of the item and the expense of reconditioning the item for a subsequent user.
 - (6) The authority shall establish a statewide, centralized inventory system for items described in subsection (5) of this section that is accessible online to all providers who are paid with state funds.

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
