

## HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 2322

### “DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE

14  
15  
16 “**SECTION 1.** Notwithstanding section 7, chapter 710, Oregon Laws 2009, the amount of  
17 \$5,478,292 is transferred from the Tax Amnesty Fund to the General Fund for general gov-  
18 ernmental purposes.

19 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 323.455 is amended to read:

20 “323.455. (1) All moneys received by the Department of Revenue from the tax imposed by ORS  
21 323.030 (1) shall be paid over to the State Treasurer to be held in a suspense account established  
22 under ORS 293.445. The department may pay expenses for administration **and enforcement** of ORS  
23 323.005 to 323.482 out of moneys received from the tax imposed under ORS 323.030 (1). Amounts  
24 necessary to pay administrative **and enforcement** expenses are continuously appropriated to the  
25 department from the suspense account. After the payment of administrative **and enforcement** ex-  
26 penses and refunds, 89.65 percent shall be credited to the General Fund, 3.45 percent is appropriated  
27 to the cities of this state, 3.45 percent is appropriated to the counties of this state and 3.45 percent  
28 is continuously appropriated to the Department of Transportation for the purpose of financing and  
29 improving transportation services for elderly individuals and individuals with disabilities as provided  
30 in ORS 391.800 to 391.830.

31 “(2) The moneys so appropriated to cities and counties shall be paid on a monthly basis within  
32 35 days after the end of the month for which a distribution is made. Each city shall receive such  
33 share of the money appropriated to all cities as its population, as determined under ORS 190.510 to  
34 190.590 last preceding such apportionment, bears to the total population of the cities of the state,  
35 and each county shall receive such share of the money as its population, determined under ORS

1 190.510 to 190.590 last preceding such apportionment, bears to the total population of the state.

2 “(3) The moneys appropriated to the Department of Transportation under subsection (1) of this  
3 section shall be distributed and transferred to the Elderly and Disabled Special Transportation Fund  
4 established by ORS 391.800 at the same time as the cigarette tax moneys are distributed to cities  
5 and counties under this section.

6 “(4) Of the moneys credited to the General Fund under this section 51.92 percent shall be dedi-  
7 cated to funding the maintenance and expansion of the number of persons eligible for the medical  
8 assistance program under ORS chapter 414, or to funding the maintenance of the benefits available  
9 under the program, or both, and 5.77 percent shall be credited to the Tobacco Use Reduction Ac-  
10 count established under ORS 431.832.

11 **“SECTION 3.** ORS 323.625 is amended to read:

12 “323.625. All moneys received by the Department of Revenue under ORS 323.500 to 323.645 shall  
13 be deposited in the State Treasury and credited to a suspense account established under ORS  
14 293.445. The department may pay expenses for administration **and enforcement** of ORS 323.500 to  
15 323.645 out of moneys received from the taxes imposed under ORS 323.505 and 323.565. Amounts  
16 necessary to pay administrative **and enforcement** expenses are continuously appropriated to the  
17 department from the suspense account. After the payment of administrative **and enforcement** ex-  
18 penses and refunds or credits arising from erroneous overpayments, the balance of the money shall  
19 be credited to the General Fund. Of the amount credited to the General Fund under this section  
20 41.54 percent shall be dedicated to funding the maintenance and expansion of the number of persons  
21 eligible for the medical assistance program under ORS chapter 414, or to funding the maintenance  
22 of the benefits available under the program, or both, and 4.62 percent shall be credited to the To-  
23 bacco Use Reduction Account established under ORS 431.832.

29 **“Sec. 8b.** The amendments to ORS 171.772 by section 8a, chapter 877, Oregon Laws 2007, be-  
30 come operative January 1, [2015] **2016.**

31 **“SECTION 5.** Section 9e, chapter 877, Oregon Laws 2007, as amended by section 25, chapter

42 **“SECTION 7.** Notwithstanding ORS 454.436, the amount of \$1,655,000 is transferred from  
43 the Assessment Deferral Loan Program Revolving Fund to the General Fund for general  
44 governmental purposes.

1 "COUNTY FAIR COMMISSION

2  
3 "SECTION 8. ORS 565.405, 565.410, 565.415, 565.420, 565.435, 565.440, 565.442, 565.443, 565.449  
4 and 565.450 are repealed.

5 "SECTION 9. ORS 565.021 is amended to read:

6 "565.021. (1) The State Parks and Recreation Director shall appoint a State Fair Advisory  
7 Committee to provide advice and assistance to the director on matters regarding the operation of  
8 the Oregon State Fair.

9 "(2) The advisory committee shall consist of seven members appointed by the director for four-  
10 year terms. The director shall appoint:

11 "(a) A resident from each congressional district of Oregon. The director shall seek to ensure  
12 that those persons reflect a broad-based representation of the industrial, educational and cultural  
13 interests active in state fair activities, such as agricultural, stock raising, horticultural, mining,  
14 mechanical, artistic and industrial pursuits.

15 "(b) Two persons to represent county fair interests. [*The director may give consideration to*  
16 *nominations suggested by the County Fair Commission established under ORS 565.410.*]

17 "(3) The members of the advisory committee serve at the pleasure of the director. The director  
18 may fill a vacancy on the advisory committee by appointing a person to fill the unexpired term.

19 "(4) Each member of the advisory committee is entitled to compensation and reimbursement of  
20 expenses, as provided in ORS 292.495, from moneys appropriated to the State Parks and Recreation  
21 Department for that purpose.

22 "(5) The advisory committee shall select one of its members as chairperson and another as vice  
23 chairperson, for such terms and with such duties and powers necessary for the performance of the  
24 functions of those offices as the advisory committee determines appropriate.

25 "(6) The advisory committee shall meet at the call of the director.

26 "SECTION 10. ORS 565.445 is amended to read:

27 "565.445. (1) The County Fair Account is established separate and distinct from the General  
28 Fund. All moneys in the account are continuously appropriated to the [*County Fair Commission*]  
29 **Oregon Department of Administrative Services.**

30 "(2) The account shall consist of moneys allocated under ORS 565.447. [*Moneys credited to the*  
31 *account may be expended by the County Fair Commission for the administration of ORS 565.410 to*  
32 *565.450, not to exceed \$40,000 per biennium.*]

33 "(3) [*Subject to ORS 565.442 (2) and subsection (2) of this section,*] On the first business day of  
34 each calendar year the [*County Fair Commission*] **Oregon Department of Administrative Services**  
35 shall disburse the moneys in the County Fair Account to the county fair boards in equal shares.

39 "SECTION 11. ORS 182.454 is amended to read:

40 "182.454. The following semi-independent state agencies are subject to ORS 182.456 to 182.472:

41 "(1) The Appraiser Certification and Licensure Board.

42 "(2) The State Board of Architect Examiners.

43 "(3) The State Board of Examiners for Engineering and Land Surveying.

44 "(4) The State Board of Geologist Examiners.

45 "(5) The State Landscape Architect Board.

1 “(6) The Oregon Board of Optometry.

2 “(7) The Oregon Patient Safety Commission.

3 “(8) The Oregon Wine Board.

4 “(9) The State Board of Massage Therapists.

5 “(10) The Physical Therapist Licensing Board.

6 “(11) The State Landscape Contractors Board.

7 “(12) **The Citizens’ Initiative Review Commission.**

8 “**SECTION 12.** ORS 250.137 is amended to read:

9 “250.137. (1) The Citizens’ Initiative Review Commission is established [*within the executive*  
10 *branch of state government,*] **as a semi-independent state agency subject to ORS 182.456 to**  
11 **182.472. The commission shall consist** [*consisting*] of 11 members. The members shall be appointed  
12 in the following manner:

13 “(a) The Governor shall appoint three members who have at some time been selected by the four  
14 appointed members of an explanatory statement committee under ORS 251.205 (5) to prepare an ex-  
15 planatory statement, as follows:

16 “(A) One member recommended by the leadership of the Democratic party in the Senate and one  
17 member recommended by the leadership of the Republican party in the Senate.

18 “(B) Except as provided in subparagraph (C) of this paragraph, one member recommended by the  
19 leadership of the political party with the largest representation in the Senate that is not the same  
20 party as the Governor.

21 “(C) If more than two political parties are represented in the Senate, one member recommended  
22 by the leadership of a third political party with the largest representation in the Senate.

23 “(b) Four former moderators shall be appointed as members as described in ORS 250.143.

24 “(c) Four electors who have served on a citizen panel shall be appointed as members as de-  
25 scribed in ORS 250.143.

26 “(2) The term of office of a member of the commission is four years, with the terms of no more  
27 than six members expiring every two years. Vacancies shall be filled by the Governor for the un-  
28 expired term, consistent with subsection (1) of this section.

29 “(3) The commission shall:

30 “(a) Ensure that the citizen panels are convened to review initiated measures in a fair and im-  
31 partial manner.

32 “(b) Adopt rules necessary to carry out the commission’s duties under ORS 250.137 to 250.149.

33 “**SECTION 13. ORS 250.146 is repealed.**

34 “**SECTION 14. Any moneys remaining in the Citizens’ Initiative Review Fund on the ef-**  
35 **fective date of this 2013 Act shall be transferred to the account established by the Citizens’**  
36 **Initiative Review Commission as required by ORS 182.470.**

37 “**SECTION 15.** ORS 250.139 is amended to read:

38 “250.139. (1) The Citizens’ Initiative Review Commission shall select one or more state measures  
39 proposed by initiative petition to be voted on at a general election and convene a separate citizen  
40 panel to review each selected measure.

41 “(2) In selecting a measure to be reviewed by a citizen panel, the commission shall consider the  
42 following criteria:

43 “(a) The fiscal impact of a measure.

44 “(b) Whether the measure amends the Oregon Constitution.

45 “(c) The availability of funds to conduct reviews.

1 “(d) Any other criteria established by the commission by rule.

2 “(3) Each citizen panel shall evaluate and write statements for the measure considered by the  
3 panel.

4 “(4)(a) The commission shall select citizens for each panel from a representative sample of  
5 anonymous electors, using survey sampling methods that, to the extent practicable, give every  
6 elector a similar chance of being selected. Each citizen panel shall consist of not fewer than 18 and  
7 not more than 24 electors.

8 “(b) The commission shall ensure, to the extent practicable and legally permissible, that the  
9 demographic makeup of each panel fairly reflects the population of the electorate of this state as a  
10 whole, with respect to the following characteristics, prioritized in the following order:

11 “(A) The location of the elector’s residence.

12 “(B) The elector’s party affiliation, if any.

13 “(C) The elector’s voting history.

14 “(D) The elector’s age.

15 “(c) In addition to the criteria described in paragraph (b) of this subsection, the commission may  
16 also consider:

17 “(A) The elector’s gender.

18 “(B) The elector’s ethnicity.

19 “(C) Any other criteria.

20 “(5) The commission shall, from moneys in the [*Citizens’ Initiative Review Fund*] **account es-**  
21 **tablished under ORS 182.470:**

22 “(a) Compensate each elector for each day served on a panel in an amount calculated using the  
23 average weekly wage as defined in ORS 656.211;

24 “(b) Reimburse each elector who serves on a panel for travel expenses in accordance with re-  
25 imbursement policies determined by the commission by rule;

26 “(c) Provide for costs required to convene and conduct a citizen panel; and

27 “(d) Transfer to the Secretary of State all moneys necessary to pay the costs of printing any  
28 statements described in ORS 250.141 in the voters’ pamphlet.

29 “(6)(a) Each panel shall meet to review the measure on five consecutive days for a total of not  
30 less than 25 hours unless otherwise provided by commission rule.

31 “(b) Each panel shall conduct public hearings at which the panel shall receive testimony or  
32 other information from both proponents and opponents of the measure. Unless otherwise determined  
33 by a majority of the panelists, equal time shall be allotted to proponents and opponents of a meas-  
34 ure.

35 “(c) The chief petitioners of the measure shall designate two persons to provide information in  
36 favor of the measure to the citizen panel. If the chief petitioners fail to timely designate two persons  
37 to appear before the panel, the commission may designate two persons who support the measure to  
38 provide information in favor of the measure.

39 “(d) The commission shall designate two persons who oppose the measure to provide information  
40 in opposition to the measure.

41 “(e) The commission, by rule, may specify additional criteria regarding the public hearings.

42 “(7) The commission shall provide each panel with any complaints regarding the panel not later  
43 than the fourth day the panel convenes.

44 “(8) The commission shall, by rule, establish qualifications for moderators for each citizen panel.  
45 A moderator must have experience in mediation and shall complete a training course established

1 by the commission.

2 “(9) The commission shall contract with two moderators for each panel and shall compensate  
3 each moderator for service.

4 “**SECTION 16.** ORS 250.147 is amended to read:

5 “250.147. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the Citizens’ Initiative Review Com-  
6 mission may accept contributions of moneys and assistance from the United States Government or  
7 its agencies or from any other source, public or private, and agree to conditions placed on the  
8 moneys not inconsistent with the duties of the commission. All moneys received by the commission  
9 under this subsection shall be deposited into the [*Citizens’ Initiative Review Fund established under*  
10 *ORS 250.146*] **account established under ORS 182.470.**

11 “(2) The commission may not receive contributions of moneys or assistance from:

12 “(a) A political committee, as defined in ORS 260.005;

13 “(b) For-profit corporate treasuries;

14 “(c) Union treasuries; or

15 “(d) Any other source the commission determines might be used to transfer moneys from a pol-  
16 itical committee, for-profit corporate treasury or union treasury to the commission.

17 “(3) If a person contributes to the commission an aggregate total of more than \$100 in a calen-  
18 dar year, not later than 14 calendar days after the commission receives the contribution, the com-  
19 mission shall make available to the public on the Internet:

20 “(a) The name and address of the person or entity who made the contribution; and

21 “(b) The amount of the contribution.

22 “(4) The commission may enter into contracts and hire any staff the commission deems neces-  
23 sary.

24 “(5) The commission may appoint an executive director to serve at the pleasure of the commis-  
25 sion.

26 “**SECTION 17.** ORS 250.149 is amended to read:

27 “250.149. (1) Not later than the date that is four months before the date of the general election  
28 in an even-numbered year, the Citizens’ Initiative Review Commission shall determine whether  
29 moneys in sufficient amount are available in the [*Citizens’ Initiative Review Fund*] **account estab-**  
30 **lished under ORS 182.470** to carry out all the duties, functions and powers of the commission, im-  
31 plement ORS 250.139 to 250.143 and pay for any statements to be printed in the voters’ pamphlet  
32 under ORS 251.185.

33 “(2)(a) If the commission determines that the [*fund*] **account** has sufficient moneys under sub-  
34 section (1) of this section, the commission shall carry out all the duties, functions and powers of the  
35 commission, implement ORS 250.139 to 250.143 and may submit statements to be printed in the  
36 voters’ pamphlet under ORS 251.185.

37 “(b) If the commission determines that the [*fund*] **account** has insufficient moneys under sub-  
38 section (1) of this section, for the general election in that even-numbered year, the commission may  
39 not carry out all the duties, functions and powers of the commission, implement ORS 250.139 to  
40 250.143 or submit statements to be printed in the voters’ pamphlet under ORS 251.185.

41 “**SECTION 18.** Section 11, chapter 365, Oregon Laws 2011, is amended to read:

42 “**Sec. 11.** (1) Any expenses incurred in the initial appointment and organization of the Citizens’  
43 Initiative Review Commission under section 3 [*of this 2011 Act*], **chapter 365, Oregon Laws 2011,**  
44 shall be paid by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services from moneys appropriated to the  
45 department.

1 “(2) When the Citizens’ Initiative Review Commission determines that moneys in sufficient  
2 amount are available in the [*Citizens’ Initiative Review Fund*] **account established under ORS**  
3 **182.470**, the commission shall reimburse the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, without  
4 interest, in an amount equal to the amount paid by the department for expenses under subsection  
5 (1) of this section.

6 “**SECTION 19.** ORS 182.454, as amended by section 11 of this 2013 Act, is amended to read:

7 “182.454. The following semi-independent state agencies are subject to ORS 182.456 to 182.472:

8 “(1) The Appraiser Certification and Licensure Board.

10 “(3) The State Board of Examiners for Engineering and Land Surveying.

11 “(4) The State Board of Geologist Examiners.

23 to the people at the election for which the pamphlet was prepared. The pamphlet must include the  
24 procedures for filing a complaint under ORS 260.345. Each measure shall be printed in the pamphlet  
25 with:

26 “(a) The number and ballot title of the measure;

27 “(b) The financial estimates and any statement prepared for the measure under ORS 250.125;

28 “(c) The explanatory statement prepared for the measure; **and**

29 “(d) Arguments relating to the measure and filed with the Secretary of State.]; *and*]

30 “[*(e) Any statement submitted for the measure by a citizen panel under ORS 250.141.*]

31 “(2) A county measure or measure of a metropolitan service district organized under ORS  
32 chapter 268, and ballot title, explanatory statement and arguments relating to the measure, filed by  
33 the county or metropolitan service district under ORS 251.285 shall be included in the voters’ pam-  
34 phlet described in subsection (1) of this section if required under ORS 251.067.

35 “**SECTION 21.** (1) **ORS 250.137, 250.139, 250.141, 250.143, 250.147 and 250.149 and section 3,**  
36 **chapter 365, Oregon Laws 2011, are repealed.**

37 “(2) **Section 11, chapter 365, Oregon Laws 2011, as amended by section 18 of this 2013 Act,**  
38 **is repealed.**

39 “**SECTION 22.** **The repeal of ORS 250.137, 250.139, 250.141, 250.143, 250.147 and 250.149 and**  
40 **sections 3 and 11, chapter 365, Oregon Laws 2011, by section 21 of this 2013 Act and the**  
41 **amendments to ORS 182.454 and 251.185 by sections 19 and 20 of this 2013 Act become oper-**

1       “**SECTION 23.** Section 1, chapter 604, Oregon Laws 2011, as amended by section 82, chapter  
2 107, Oregon Laws 2012, is amended to read:

3       “**Sec. 1.** For the biennium beginning July 1, [2011] **2013**, the Department of Human Services may,  
4 notwithstanding ORS 411.070, 412.006, 412.009 and 412.016:

5       “(1) Prescribe by rule an employability assessment and orientation process that the department  
6 shall use to determine the level of participation by individuals applying for or receiving aid pursuant  
7 to the temporary assistance for needy families program and required to participate in the job op-  
8 portunity and basic skills program described in ORS 412.006. This process must occur prior to any  
9 assessment described in ORS 412.006 (3) that is conducted by the department.

10       “(2) Require all families to participate in the employability assessment and orientation process  
11 as a condition for the family’s receipt of aid.

12       “[(3) *Determine the selection and placement in the job opportunity and basic skills program activ-*  
13 *ities of existing and future applicants and recipients of aid based on the results of the employability*  
14 *assessment or other criteria.*]

15       “**(3) Limit in the job opportunity and basic skills program, for existing and future appli-**  
16 **cants and recipients of aid, based on the results of the employability assessment or other**  
17 **criteria:**

18       “**(a) The number of participants;**

19       “**(b) The activities; or**

20       “**(c) The level of participation.**

21       “(4) Require an individual in a one-parent family to participate in the job opportunity and basic  
22 skills program while caring for a dependent child who is under two years of age.

23       “(5) Not approve enrollment in and attendance at an educational institution as an allowable  
24 work activity for purposes of ORS 412.001 to 412.069, except for recipients who have a case plan in  
25 effect on June 30, 2011, that approves enrollment in and attendance at an educational institution  
26 as an allowable work activity under ORS 412.016.

27       “(6) Deny or terminate aid to a family in which a caretaker relative is separated from employ-  
28 ment without good cause, subject to exceptions prescribed by the department by rule. The family  
29 shall be ineligible to receive aid for a period of 120 days beginning on the date the caretaker rela-  
30 tive is separated from employment without good cause.

31       “(7) Establish an income eligibility limit equal to 185 percent of the federal poverty guidelines  
32 for aid to a dependent child residing with a caretaker relative who is not the child’s parent.

33       “[(8) *Deny employment-related day care assistance to a parent who is self-employed.*]

34       “[(9) *Eliminate the reduced copayment required for employment-related day care assistance in the*  
35 *first month of employment.*]

36       “**SECTION 24.** Section 7, chapter 604, Oregon Laws 2011, is amended to read:

37       “**Sec. 7.** (1) The amendments to ORS 412.009, 412.014 and 412.024 by sections 2, 3 and 5 [*of this*  
38 *2011 Act*], **chapter 604, Oregon Laws 2011**, become operative on October 1, 2011.

39       “(2) The amendments to ORS 412.014 by section 4 [*of this 2011 Act*], **chapter 604, Oregon Laws**  
40 **2011**, become operative on July 1, [2013] **2015**.

41       “**SECTION 25.** Section 8, chapter 604, Oregon Laws 2011, is amended to read:

42       “**Sec. 8.** Section 1, **chapter 604, Oregon Laws 2011**, [*of this 2011 Act*] is repealed on July 1,  
43 [2013] **2015**.

44       “**SECTION 26.** Notwithstanding ORS 412.124, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, the  
45 **Department of Human Services may not provide aid described in ORS 412.124.**

11 appeal, the appellant may rely on no other points than those set forth in such statement. If the  
12 appellant has designated for inclusion in the record all the testimony and all the instructions given  
13 and requested, no statement of points is necessary. Not later than the 15th day following the filing  
14 of the **certificate of preparation for the transcript under ORS 19.370 (3)**, the appellant may serve  
15 and file an amended statement of points. Except by approval of the court, the appellant may then  
16 rely on no other points than those set forth in such amended statement.

17 “[*(f)*] (g) The signature of the appellant or attorney for the appellant.

18 “(2) Within 14 days after the filing of the notice of appeal or [*notice of*] amended designation of  
19 record, any other party may serve and file a designation of additional parts of the proceedings and  
20 exhibits to be included in the record. Such designation [*shall*] **must** be served and filed as provided  
21 for the serving and filing of a notice of appeal under ORS 19.240 and 19.260. If such party also ap-  
22 peals, the designation [*shall*] **must** be included in the notice of appeal of the party and [*shall*] **may**  
23 not be served and filed separately.

24 “[*(3) The reporter shall prepare a transcript of such parts of the proceedings as are designated*  
25 *pursuant to subsection (1)(d) of this section and subsection (2) of this section.*]

26 “**SECTION 59.** ORS 19.365 is amended to read:

27 “19.365. (1) The record of the case [*shall*] **must** be prepared and transmitted to the court to  
28 which the appeal is made in the manner provided in this chapter.

29 “(2) The record on appeal [*shall consist*] **consists** of those parts of the trial court file, exhibits  
30 and record of oral proceedings in the trial court that are designated under ORS 19.250. The record  
31 of oral proceedings [*shall be*] **is** the transcript prepared under ORS 19.370, an agreed narrative

22 *time of filing the original transcript deposit a copy thereof with the trial court administrator for use*  
23 *by all such other parties. The person preparing the transcript shall serve notice of such deposit upon*  
24 *all such parties and file proof of such service with the trial court administrator and with the State*  
25 *Court Administrator.*]

30 **Laws 2013 (Enrolled House Bill 5016), may be used for:**

31 “(a) **The provision of conciliation and mediation services in circuit courts; or**

32 “(b) **The operation of law libraries or the provision of law library services.**

33 “(2) **Subject to subsection (3) of this section, a governing body of a county may determine**  
34 **the amount to be spent on each of the two purposes specified in subsection (1) of this section**

21 ity, partnership, venture, public franchise, franchisor, franchisee or its wholly owned subsidiary that  
22 exists for profit-making purposes or otherwise to secure economic advantage.

23 “[2] ‘Doing business’ means maintaining equipment, facilities, personnel or any other apparatus  
24 of business or commerce in Sudan, including the ownership or possession of real or personal property  
25 located in Sudan.]

26 “[3] ‘Investment’ or ‘Invest’ means the commitment of funds or other assets to a company, includ-  
27 ing a loan or other extension of credit made to that company, or the ownership or control of a share  
28 or interest in that company or of a bond or other debt instrument issued by that company.]

29 “[4] ‘Subject investment funds’ means:]

30 “[a] The Public Employees Retirement Fund referred to in ORS 238.660;]

31 “[b] The Industrial Accident Fund referred to in ORS 656.632;]

32 “[c] The Common School Fund referred to in ORS 327.405;]

33 “[d] The Oregon War Veterans’ Fund referred to in ORS 407.495; and]

34 “[e] Investment funds of the State Board of Higher Education available for investment or rein-  
35 vestment by the Oregon Investment Council.]

36 “(2) ‘Fund of funds’ means investment funds that function by secondary investment in a  
37 portfolio of other investments, including investment funds.

38 “(3) ‘Index funds’ means pooled investments that are passively managed with an intent  
39 to match or track the performance of a market index.

40 “(4) ‘Invest’ means to commit funds or other assets to a company. ‘Invest’ includes  
41 making a loan or other extension of credit to a company, or owning or controlling a share  
42 or interest in a company or a bond or other debt instrument issued by a company.

43 “(5) ‘Investment’ means the commitment of funds or other assets to a company for an  
44 interest in the company. ‘Investment’ includes the ownership or control of a share or inter-  
45 est in a company or of a bond or other debt instrument issued by a company.

1       “(6) ‘Scrutinized company’ means any company that currently has an investment, in the  
2 Sudan, from which federal law specifically allows public pension plans to divest.

3       “[(5)] (7) ‘Sudan’ means the Republic of the Sudan and any territory under the administration,  
4 legal or illegal, of Sudan, including but not limited to the Darfur region.

5       “**SECTION 68.** Sections 69 to 73 of this 2013 Act are added to and made a part of ORS  
6 293.811 to 293.817.

7       “**SECTION 69.** (1) The Oregon Investment Council and the State Treasurer, in the State  
8 Treasurer’s role as investment officer for the council, shall act reasonably and in a manner  
9 consistent with fiduciary standards, including the provisions of ORS 293.721 and 293.726, to  
10 try to ensure that managers who are engaged by the council or the State Treasurer for the  
11 active management of investment funds consisting of the Public Employees Retirement Fund  
12 referred to in ORS 238.660, through the purchase and sale of publicly traded equities, are not  
13 investing in publicly traded equities of any scrutinized company.

14       “(2) Subsection (1) of this section does not apply to investment indirectly made through

18 process of engagement with managers who:

20 management of investment funds consisting of the Public Employees Retirement Fund re-  
21 ferred to in ORS 238.660 through the purchase and sale of publicly traded equities; and

22       “(b) Have invested such funds in scrutinized companies.

23       “(2) The policy required under subsection (1) of this section must require the State  
24 Treasurer, to the extent practicable, to identify and send a written notice to the managers  
25 described in subsection (1) of this section. The notice shall encourage the managers, con-

27       “(a) Notify scrutinized companies with which the managers have made investments of the

30 companies and avoid future investments in the scrutinized companies, as long as the man-  
31 agers may do so without monetary loss through reasonable, prudent and productive invest-

33 scrutinized companies.

34       “(3) A notice provided by a manager to a scrutinized company under subsection (2) of this  
35 section shall advise the scrutinized company that the company may comment in writing to  
36 the State Treasurer to dispute the identification of the company as a scrutinized company.

37       “(4) If the State Treasurer determines under subsection (3) of this section that a com-  
38 pany is not a scrutinized company, the State Treasurer shall notify the relevant manager  
39 of the State Treasurer’s determination.

40       “(5) The State Treasurer shall advise the Oregon Investment Council of a notice the  
41 State Treasurer provides under subsection (2) of this section if the manager to whom the  
42 notice was given has not informed the State Treasurer within 180 days after the date the  
43 notice was given that the manager has ended the manager’s investment in scrutinized com-  
44 panies or plans to divest from its investment in scrutinized companies.

45       “**SECTION 71.** On or before March 15 of each year, the State Treasurer shall make

1 available on the State Treasurer’s website a summary of actions taken during the previous  
2 year in accordance with ORS 293.811 to 293.817. The summary shall include a list of identified

35 **may include requiring a pledge of school district revenues or the grant of a security in other**  
36 **assets of the school district, to assure the State Treasurer that the school district will be**  
37 **able to fully reimburse the state for amounts transferred by the State Treasurer and any**  
38 **interest or penalties applicable to the transferred amounts.**

39 “[*f*] **(g)** The manner of designating the particular school bonds to which the State Treasurer’s  
40 certificate of qualification and the state guaranty applies.

41 “[*g*] **(h)** Subject to Article XI-K of the Oregon Constitution, reasonable limitations on:

42 “(A) The total aggregate outstanding amount of all school bonds the state may guarantee; and

43 “(B) The outstanding amount of the school bonds of any single school district the state may  
44 guarantee.

45 “[*h*] **(i)** The method of providing notice of denial of a certificate of qualification.

1       “(i) (j) The method of providing notice of disqualification to school districts that fail to qualify  
2 or for which changes in financial affairs or condition or failure to provide the State Treasurer cur-  
3 rent or updated information warrant disqualification of the school district.

4       “(j) (k) Requirements for promptly reporting to the State Treasurer any changes in condition  
5 or occurrences that may affect a school district’s eligibility to qualify or maintain its qualification  
6 to participate in the state guaranty program.

7       “(3)(a) After reviewing the request, if the State Treasurer determines that the school district is  
8 eligible, the State Treasurer shall promptly issue the certificate of qualification and provide it to the  
9 requesting school district.

10       “(b)(A) Unless the certificate of qualification is revoked by the State Treasurer, and subject to  
11 the fulfillment of any conditions or requirements imposed by the State Treasurer, the school district  
12 receiving the certificate and all other persons may rely on the certificate as evidencing eligibility  
13 for the state guaranty for one year from and after the date of the certificate.

14       “(B) [No] A revocation of a certificate of qualification [shall] **does not** affect the state guaranty  
15 of any outstanding school bonds previously issued under a valid certificate.

16       “(4) Any qualified school district that chooses to forgo the benefits of the state guaranty for a  
17 particular issue of school bonds may do so by not referring to ORS 328.321 to 328.356 on the face  
18 of its school bonds.

19       “(5) [No] A school district that has school bonds, the principal of or interest on which has been  
20 paid in whole or in part by the state under ORS 328.341, [may be] **is not** eligible to issue any addi-  
21 tional school bonds with the state guaranty until:

22       “(a) All payment obligations of the school district to the state under ORS 328.346 are satisfied;  
23 and

24       “(b) The State Treasurer certifies in a writing, to be kept on file by the State Treasurer, that  
25 the school district is fiscally solvent.

26       “**SECTION 77.** ORS 328.346 is amended to read:

27       “328.346. (1)(a) If one or more payments on school bonds are made by the State Treasurer as  
28 provided in ORS 328.341, the State Treasurer shall pursue recovery from the school district of all  
29 moneys necessary to reimburse the state for all amounts paid by the treasurer to the paying agent,  
30 as well as interest, penalties and any additional costs incurred by the treasurer as described in this  
31 section. In seeking recovery, the State Treasurer may:

32       “(A) Intercept any payments from the General Fund, the State School Fund, the income of the  
33 Common School Fund and any other source of operating moneys provided by or through the state  
34 to the school district that issued the school bonds that would otherwise be paid to the school district  
35 by the state; [and]

36       “**(B) Exercise the rights of a secured creditor in any moneys or assets pledged by the**  
37 **school district to secure the district’s reimbursement obligation to the state; and**

38       “[(B)] (C) Apply any intercepted payments **and pledged moneys or assets** to reimburse the  
39 state for payments made pursuant to the state guaranty until all obligations of the school district  
40 to the state arising from those payments, including interest and penalties, and any additional costs  
41 incurred by the treasurer as described in this section are paid in full.

42       “(b) The state has no obligation to the school district or to any person or entity to replace any  
43 moneys **or assets** intercepted **or pledged** under authority of this section.

44       “(c) The authority of the State Treasurer to intercept payments **and the lien in any pledged**  
45 **moneys** under this subsection [has] **have** priority over all claims against money provided by the

1 state to a school district, including a claim that is based on a funds diversion agreement under ORS  
2 238.698. A funds diversion agreement under ORS 238.698 has priority over all other claims against  
3 money provided by the state to a school district.

4 “(2) The school district that issued school bonds for which the state has made all or part of a  
5 debt service payment shall:

6 “(a) Reimburse all moneys drawn or paid by the State Treasurer on its behalf;

7 “(b) Pay interest to the state on all moneys paid by the state from the date the moneys were  
8 drawn to the date they are repaid at a rate to be determined by the State Treasurer, in the State  
9 Treasurer’s discretion, to be sufficient to cover the costs of funds to the state plus the costs of ad-  
10 ministration of the state guaranty obligation and of collection of reimbursement; and

11 “(c) Pay any applicable penalties as described in subsection (3) of this section.

12 “(3)(a) The State Treasurer shall establish the reimbursement interest rate after considering the  
13 circumstances of any prior draws by the school district on the state, market interest and penalty  
14 rates and the cost of funds, if any, that were required to be used or borrowed by the state to make  
15 payment on the school bonds. The State Treasurer shall have authority to establish, by negotiations  
16 with the school district or otherwise, any plan of reimbursement by the school district that will re-  
17 sult in full and complete reimbursement to the state. Subject to the requirement for full and com-  
18 plete reimbursement, the State Treasurer may consider incorporating into the reimbursement plan  
19 the means and methods to allow the school district to continue its operations during the time the  
20 reimbursement plan is in effect.

21 “(b) The State Treasurer may, after considering the circumstances giving rise to the failure of  
22 the school district to make payment on its school bonds in a timely manner, impose on the school  
23 district a penalty of not more than five percent of the amount paid by the state pursuant to the state  
24 guaranty for each instance in which a payment by the state is made.

25 “(4)(a) If the State Treasurer determines that amounts obtained under this section will not re-  
26 imburse the state in full within the time determined by the State Treasurer or incorporated in the  
27 reimbursement plan from the state’s payment of a school district’s debt service payment, the State  
28 Treasurer shall pursue any legal action, including but not limited to mandamus, against the school  
29 district or school district board to compel the school district to:

30 “(A) Levy and provide property tax revenues to pay debt service on its school bonds and other  
31 obligations when due; and

32 “(B) Meet its repayment obligations to the state.

33 “(b) With respect to any school bonds for which the State Treasurer has made payment under  
34 the state guaranty, and in addition to any other rights or remedies available at law or in equity, the  
35 state shall have the same substantive and procedural rights as would a holder of the school bonds  
36 of a school district.

37 “(c) The Attorney General shall assist the State Treasurer in the discharge of the duties under  
38 this section.

39 “(d) The school district shall pay the attorney fees, expenses and costs of the State Treasurer  
40 and the Attorney General.

41 “(5)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (c) of this subsection, any school district whose funds  
42 were intercepted **or otherwise paid to the State Treasurer** under this section may replace those  
43 funds from other school district moneys or from ad valorem property taxes, subject to the limitations  
44 provided in this subsection.

45 “(b) A school district may use ad valorem property taxes or other moneys to replace intercepted

1 funds **or other funds paid to the State Treasurer** only if the ad valorem property taxes or other  
2 moneys were derived from:

3 “(A) Taxes originally levied to make the payment, but which were not timely received by the  
4 school district;

5 “(B) Taxes from a special levy imposed to make up the missed payment or to replace the inter-  
6 cepted [moneys] **funds or funds otherwise paid to the State Treasurer;**

7 “(C) Moneys transferred from any lawfully available funds of the school district or the undis-  
8 tributed reserves, if any, of the school district; or

9 “(D) Any other source of moneys on hand and legally available.

10 “(c) Notwithstanding paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subsection, a school district may not replace  
11 operating funds intercepted by the state **or otherwise paid to the State Treasurer** with moneys  
12 collected and held to make payments on school bonds if that replacement would divert moneys from  
13 the payment of future debt service on the school bonds and increase the risk that the state guaranty  
14 would be called upon a second time.

15 “**SECTION 78. Section 79 of this 2013 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 328.321 to**  
16 **328.356.**

17 “**SECTION 79. (1) Except for moneys subject to the intercept provided in ORS 328.346**  
18 **(1)(a), a school district may pledge as security for its obligation to reimburse the state under**  
19 **ORS 328.346 (2) any:**

20 “(a) Revenues received or held by the school district; or

21 “(b) Real or personal property held by the school district.

22 “(2) **The lien of any pledge, mortgage or security interest granted by a school district**  
23 **under this section is valid and binding from the time the pledge is granted. The revenue or**  
24 **property is immediately subject to the lien without physical delivery, filing or other act, and**  
25 **the lien is superior to all other claims and liens of any kind whatsoever.**

26 “(3) **The lien may be foreclosed by a proceeding brought in the circuit courts of the state**  
27 **and any tangible real or personal property subject to the lien may be sold upon an order of**  
28 **the court. The proceeds of the sale must be applied first to the payment of the costs of**  
29 **foreclosure and then to the amounts owing under ORS 328.346 (2), with any remaining bal-**  
30 **ance paid to the school district.**

31  
32 **“OREGON UNIVERSITY SYSTEM**

33  
34 “**SECTION 80.** If Senate Bill 270 becomes law, section 16, chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2013 (En-  
35 rolled Senate Bill 270), is amended to read:

36 “**Sec. 16.** (1) The following entities are not subject to any provision of law enacted after January  
37 1, 2013, that is unique to governmental entities unless the following entities are expressly named:

38 “(a) A university with a governing board; and

39 “(b) Any not-for-profit organization or other entity if the equity of the entity is owned or con-  
40 trolled exclusively by a university with a governing board and if the organization or entity is cre-  
41 ated by the university to advance any of the university’s statutory missions.

42 “(2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, the provisions of ORS 30.260 to 30.460,  
43 33.710, 33.720, 200.005 to 200.025, 200.045 to 200.090, 236.605 to 236.640, 276.080, **276.090**, 279.835,  
44 279.840, 279.850 and 297.040 and ORS chapters 35, 190, 192 and 244 apply to a university with a  
45 governing board under the same terms as they apply to public bodies other than the state.

1 “(3) Except as otherwise provided by law, the provisions of ORS 35.550 to 35.575, 180.060,  
2 180.210 to 180.235, 184.305 to 184.345, 190.480, 190.490, 200.035, 243.696, 357.805 to 357.895 and  
3 656.017 (2) and ORS chapters 182, 183, 240, 270, 273, 276, 278, 279A, 279B, 279C, 282, 283, 291, 292,  
4 293, 294, 295 and 297 do not apply to a university with a governing board.

5 “(4) Notwithstanding subsections (1) and (3) of this section, ORS 240.167, 279C.600 to 279C.625,  
6 279C.800, 279C.810, 279C.825, 279C.830, 279C.835, 279C.840, 279C.845, 279C.850, 279C.855, 279C.860,  
7 279C.865, 279C.870 and 292.043 apply to a university with a governing board under the same terms  
8 as they apply to public bodies other than the state.

9 “(5) Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, ORS 190.430 and 192.105 do not apply to a  
10 university with a governing board or any organization or other entity described in subsection (1)  
11 of this section.

12 “(6) Except as set forth in subsection (3) of this section, ORS 243.650 to 243.782 apply to a uni-  
13 versity with a governing board under the same terms as they apply to the state.

14 “(7) ORS 351.065, 351.067, 351.642, 351.643, 351.644, 351.646, 351.656, 351.658, 352.012 and 352.375  
15 apply to a university with a governing board, except that the board or university shall exercise the  
16 responsibilities and authorities of the State Board of Higher Education or the Oregon University  
17 System.

18 “(8) A university with a governing board and its agents and employees remain subject to all  
19 statutes and administrative rules of this state that create rights, benefits or protections in favor of  
20 military veterans, service members and families of service members to the same extent as an agency  
21 of this state would be subject to such statutes and administrative rules.

22 “(9) ORS 351.692, 351.695 and 351.697 apply to a governing board, except that the board has the  
23 responsibilities and authorities with respect to the university it governs that the State Board of  
24 Higher Education and the Oregon University System have with respect to the public universities  
25 identified in ORS 351.011. A university with a governing board may not issue a tax credit certificate  
26 under ORS 351.692, 351.695 and 351.697 that will cause the public universities listed in ORS 352.002  
27 to owe the General Fund more than \$6 million at any one time under ORS 351.692, 351.695 and  
28 351.697.

29 “(10) If state bonds are issued for the benefit of a university with a governing board, the uni-  
30 versity shall have the powers and duties of a related agency as defined in ORS 286A.001 to the ex-  
31 tent necessary for the issuance of such state bonds and the administration of the proceeds of the  
32 state bonds.

33 “(11) Nothing in this section may be construed so that statutory provisions that are not set forth  
34 in this section apply to a university with a governing board.

35  
36 **“DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION**

37  
38 **“SECTION 81. If House Bill 2747 becomes law:**

39 **“(1) Notwithstanding ORS 327.008 and 327.013, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, the**  
40 **Department of Education may expend up to \$500,000 from the State School Fund for the**  
41 **purposes of this section.**

42 **“(2) The department shall distribute moneys authorized to be expended under this section**  
43 **to a school district to which section 8, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2013 (Enrolled House Bill**  
44 **2747), applies for approved costs incurred by the school district during the 2013-2014 school**  
45 **year for providing educational services, including special education and related costs, to**

1 students who, notwithstanding section 8, chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2013 (Enrolled House Bill  
2 2747), are not considered residents of the school district under ORS 339.133 and 339.134 and  
3 who are admitted to a long term care facility or a skilled nursing facility.

4 “(3) The amount of moneys received by a school district under this section may not ex-  
5 ceed the approved costs incurred by the school district as described in ORS 327.348 and de-  
6 termined by the department, less two times the amount of the district’s General Purpose  
7 Grant per ADMw as calculated under ORS 327.013, and any amount received by the school  
8 district for the student from:

9 “(a) The High Cost Disabilities Account; and

10 “(b) Federal funds.

11 “(4) Amounts received by a school district under this section are considered approved  
12 costs for the purpose of determining whether a school district qualified to receive a high cost  
13 disabilities grant from the High Cost Disabilities Account established by ORS 327.348.

14 “SECTION 82. (1) The Department of Education shall make grants to improve student  
15 achievement in schools that:

16 “(a) Serve students in any grade from kindergarten through grade eight; and

17 “(b) Are in the bottom five percent of schools that are considered high poverty under  
18 Title I of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as determined based  
19 on a rating system used by the department.

20 “(2) Moneys received under this section by a school described in subsection (1) of this  
21 section must be used to hire at least one licensed teacher for a full-time equivalent position  
22 at the school.

23 “(3) Grants made under this section may be made only to a school for a school year in  
24 which the school did not receive any School Improvement Grant moneys under the federal  
25 Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

26 “(4) The department shall award grants under this section to at least two schools from  
27 each congressional district. Criteria used in the awarding of the grants may include meas-  
28 ures of income of the percentage of students who attend the school who are from families  
29 in poverty, instructional support needs and levels of academic performance.

30 “(5) Any recipient of moneys distributed as a grant under this section must provide sep-  
31 arate accounting for the moneys and may use the moneys only for the purpose for which the  
32 moneys are provided.

33 “SECTION 83. Section 82 of this 2013 Act is repealed on June 30, 2015.

34  
35 “DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION  
36

37 “SECTION 84. (1) Notwithstanding section 7, chapter 55, Oregon Laws 2012, and section  
38 2 (6), chapter 542, Oregon Laws 2011, in addition to and not in lieu of any other allocation,  
39 moneys described in section 7 (2), chapter 55, Oregon Laws 2012, that remain unspent or have  
40 not been allocated on July 1, 2013, shall be retained by the Department of Transportation and  
41 shall be allocated, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, as described in subsections (2) to  
42 (4) of this section.

43 “(2) There is allocated to Multnomah County the amount of \$650,000, which may be ex-  
44 pended for project development of the Cornelius Pass Road project.

45 “(3) There is allocated to the City of Portland the amount of \$3,600,000, which may be

1 expended for project development and construction of sidewalks and other pedestrian facili-  
2 ties on Southeast 136th Avenue from Southeast Division Street to Southeast Foster Road.

3 “(4) There is allocated to the Department of Transportation the amount of \$4,900,000,  
4 which may be expended for project development of the Outer Powell Boulevard project in  
5 Multnomah County.

6 “(5) Notwithstanding subsections (1) to (4) of this section, the Legislative Assembly in-  
7 tends to provide to Multnomah County additional allocation of moneys in the amount of  
8 \$8,500,000, as originally contemplated in section 7, chapter 55, Oregon Laws 2012, for ex-  
9 penditure for additional project development and construction of Cornelius Pass Road.

10 “SECTION 85. In addition to and not in lieu of any other allocation, there is allocated to  
11 Washington County, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, out of moneys described in  
12 section 3 (11), chapter 556, Oregon Laws 2013 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5544), the amount of  
13 \$1,500,000, which may be expended for the Westside Transportation Solutions Study.

14  
15 “REVERSION OF LOTTERY ALLOCATIONS

16  
17 “SECTION 86. (1) On December 31 in each odd-numbered year, all amounts remaining  
18 unspent by a state agency from statutory allocations made from the Administrative Services  
19 Economic Development Fund to that agency for the prior biennium shall revert to the Ad-  
20 ministrative Services Economic Development Fund.

21 “(2) Subsection (1) of this section does not apply to allocations for capital construction,  
22 continuing contracts, contested claims or special allocations designated by legislative action.

23 “SECTION 87. Section 86 of this 2013 Act applies to statutory allocations remaining un-  
24 spent on or after December 31, 2015.

25  
26 “AUDIT REPORTS

27  
28 “SECTION 88. ORS 297.075 is repealed.

29  
30 “STATE LAND BOARD

31  
32 “SECTION 89. If House Bill 2506 and House Bill 3233 become law, and notwithstanding  
33 ORS 327.008 and 327.013, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, if the State Land Board  
34 increases distributions for the 2013-2015 biennium from the Common School Fund by an  
35 amount exceeding the standard distribution of Common School Fund earnings per board  
36 policy adopted April 14, 2009, and the Superintendent of Public Instruction receives a transfer  
37 in this amount pursuant to ORS 327.410, then the Department of Education may transfer up  
38 to \$12 million from the State School Fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, to the  
39 Network of Quality Teaching and Learning Fund established by section 11, chapter 577,  
40 Oregon Laws 2013 (Enrolled House Bill 2506).

41 “SECTION 90. Section 89 of this 2013 Act is repealed on June 30, 2015.

42  
43 “MISCELLANEOUS

44  
45 “SECTION 91. The unit captions used in this 2013 Act are provided only for the conven-

1 ience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or express any  
2 legislative intent in the enactment of this 2013 Act.

6 **“SECTION 92. This 2013 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**  
7 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2013 Act takes effect**  
8 **on its passage.”**
