

House Bill 2374

Sponsored by Representative THATCHER (Pre-session filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Revises public records law. Revises procedures for requesting and responding to public records requests. Limits fees that may be charged for copies of public records. Modifies process for appeal following denial of public records request.

Establishes Public Records Exemptions Accountability Commission. Directs commission to review exemptions from disclosure of public records and make recommendations to Legislative Assembly on exemptions. Modifies or eliminates certain exemptions from disclosure of public records.

12 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

13 **SECTION 1.** ORS 192.410 is amended to read:

14 192.410. As used in ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

15 (1) "Custodian" means:

16 (a) The person described in ORS 7.110 for purposes of court records; or

17 (b) A public body mandated, directly or indirectly, to create, maintain, care for or control a
18 public record. "Custodian" does not include a public body that has custody of a public record as
19 an agent of another public body that is the custodian unless the public record is not otherwise
20 available.

21 (2) "Person" includes any natural person, corporation, partnership, firm, association or member
22 or committee of the Legislative Assembly.

23 (3) "Public body" [*includes every state officer, agency, department, division, bureau, board and*
24 *commission; every county and city governing body, school district, special district, municipal corpo-*
25 *ration, and any board, department, commission, council, or agency thereof; and any other public agency*
26 *of this state.*] **has the meaning given that term in ORS 174.109, except that "public body" does**
27 **not include the Legislative Assembly or its members, committees, officers or employees in-**
28 **sofar as they are exempt under Article IV, section 9, of the Oregon Constitution.**

29 (4)[(a)] "Public record" [*includes any writing that contains information relating to the conduct of*

1 *the public's business, including but not limited to court records, mortgages, and deed records, prepared,*
 2 *owned, used or retained by a public body regardless of physical form or characteristics.] includes any*
 3 **writing containing information relating to the conduct of government or the performance**
 4 **of any governmental or proprietary function prepared, owned, used or retained by a public**
 5 **body regardless of physical form or characteristics.**

6 *[(b) "Public record" does not include any writing that does not relate to the conduct of the public's*
 7 *business and that is contained on a privately owned computer.]*

8 *[(5) "State agency" means any state officer, department, board, commission or court created by the*
 9 *Constitution or statutes of this state but does not include the Legislative Assembly or its members,*
 10 *committees, officers or employees insofar as they are exempt under section 9, Article IV of the Oregon*
 11 *Constitution.]*

12 (6) "Writing" *[means handwriting, typewriting, printing, photographing and every means of re-*
 13 *coding, including letters, words, pictures, sounds, or symbols, or combination thereof, and all papers,*
 14 *maps, files, facsimiles or electronic recordings.] means every method of recording any form of*
 15 **communication or representation.**

 17 **PROCESS**
 18

19 **SECTION 2. Each public body shall adopt, publish and prominently display and make**
 20 **available for inspection and copying, for guidance of the public:**

21 (1) **Descriptions of the public body's central and field organization and the established**
 22 **places at which, the employees from whom and the methods whereby the public may obtain**
 23 **information, make submittals or requests or obtain copies of decisions by the public body;**

24 (2) **Statements of the general course and method by which the public body's operations**
 25 **are channeled and determined, including the nature and requirements of all formal and in-**
 26 **formal procedures available;**

27 (3) **Rules of procedure applicable to the public body;**

28 (4) **Substantive rules of general applicability adopted as authorized by law, and state-**
 29 **ments of general policy or interpretations of general applicability formulated and adopted by**
 30 **the public body; and**

31 (5) **Each amendment or revision to or repeal of any information required to be provided**
 32 **under this section.**

33 **SECTION 3. A public body, public official, public employee or custodian of a public record**
 34 **may not be liable, nor shall a cause of action exist, for any loss or damage based upon the**
 35 **release of a public record if the public body, public official, public employee or custodian**
 36 **acted in good faith in attempting to comply with the provisions of ORS 192.410 to 192.505.**

37 **SECTION 4. (1) Each public body shall make available for public inspection and copying**
 38 **all public records, unless the record falls within a specific exemption set forth in law that**
 39 **exempts or prohibits disclosure of specific information or records. To the extent required to**
 40 **prevent an unreasonable invasion of personal privacy interests protected under ORS 192.410**
 41 **to 192.505, a public body shall delete identifying details in a manner consistent with ORS**
 42 **192.410 to 192.505 when the public body makes available or publishes any public record. In**
 43 **each case in which a public body deletes identifying details under this section, the justifica-**
 44 **tion for the deletion shall be explained fully in writing.**

45 (2) **Each public body shall maintain and make available for public inspection and copying**

1 a current index providing identifying information as to the following records issued, adopted
 2 or promulgated after the effective date of this 2013 Act:

3 (a) Final opinions, including concurring and dissenting opinions, as well as orders, made
 4 in the adjudication of cases;

5 (b) Those statements of policy and interpretations of policy, statute and the Oregon
 6 Constitution which have been adopted by the agency;

7 (c) Administrative staff manuals and instructions to staff that affect a member of the
 8 public;

9 (d) Planning policies and goals and interim and final planning decisions;

10 (e) Factual staff reports and studies, factual consultant's reports and studies, scientific
 11 reports and studies and any other factual information derived from tests, studies, reports
 12 or surveys, whether conducted by public employees or others; and

13 (f) Correspondence, and materials referred to therein, relating to any regulatory, super-
 14 visory or enforcement responsibilities of the agency, whereby the agency determines or
 15 opines upon, or is asked to determine or opine upon, the rights of the state, the public, a
 16 subdivision of state government or of any private party.

17 (3) A local government or local service district, as defined in ORS 174.116, need not
 18 maintain an index described in subsection (2) of this section if to do so would be unduly
 19 burdensome, but shall in that event:

20 (a) Issue and publish a formal order specifying the reasons why and the extent to which
 21 compliance would unduly burden or interfere with agency operations; and

22 (b) Make available for public inspection and copying all indexes maintained for agency
 23 use.

24 (4) Each public body shall establish, maintain and make available for public inspection
 25 and copying a statement of the actual per page cost or other costs, if any, that the public
 26 body charges for providing copies of public records and a statement of the factors and man-
 27 ner used to determine the actual per page cost or other costs, if any.

28 (5)(a) In determining the actual per page cost for providing copies of public records, a
 29 public body may include all costs directly incident to copying the public records, including
 30 the actual cost of the paper and the per page cost for use of copying equipment. In deter-
 31 mining other actual costs for providing copies of public records, a public body may include
 32 all costs directly incident to shipping the public records, including the cost of postage or
 33 delivery charges and the cost of any container or envelope used.

34 (b) In determining the actual per page cost or other costs for providing copies of public
 35 records, a public body may not include staff salaries, benefits or other general administrative
 36 or overhead charges unless those costs are directly related to the actual cost of copying the
 37 public records. Staff time to copy and mail the requested public records may be included in
 38 a public body's costs.

39 (6) A public body need not calculate the actual per page cost or other costs of providing
 40 photocopies of public records if to do so would be unduly burdensome, but in that event the
 41 public body may not charge in excess of 15 cents per page for photocopies of public records
 42 or for the use of public body equipment to photocopy public records, and the actual postage
 43 or delivery charge and the cost of any container or envelope used to mail the public records
 44 to the requester.

45 **SECTION 5.** (1) Public records must be available for inspection and copying, and public

1 bodies shall, upon request for identifiable public records, make them promptly available to
 2 any person, including, if applicable, on a partial or installment basis, as records that are part
 3 of a larger set of requested records are assembled or made ready for inspection or disclosure.
 4 A public body may not deny a request for identifiable public records solely on the basis that
 5 the request is overbroad. A public body may not distinguish among persons requesting re-
 6 cords, and any person requesting records may not be required to provide information as to
 7 the purpose for the request except to establish whether inspection and copying would violate
 8 any law that exempts or prohibits disclosure of specific information or records to certain
 9 persons. Facilities shall be made available to any person for the copying of public records
 10 except when and to the extent that this would unreasonably disrupt the operations of the
 11 public body.

12 (2) Public records must be available for inspection and copying during the customary of-
 13 fice hours of the public body for a minimum of 30 hours per week, except weeks that include
 14 state legal holidays, unless the person making the request and the public body or its repre-
 15 sentative agree on a different time. Customary business hours must be posted on the public
 16 body's website and made known by other means designed to provide the public with notice.

17 (3) A state agency may adopt rules to protect public records from damage or disorgan-
 18 ization and to prevent excessive interference with other essential functions of the agency.
 19 The rules must provide for the fullest assistance to requesters and the most timely possible
 20 action on requests for information.

21 **SECTION 6.** (1) A fee may not be charged for the inspection of public records. A fee may
 22 not be charged for locating public documents and making them available for copying. A rea-
 23 sonable charge may be imposed for providing copies of public records and for the use by any
 24 person of public body equipment to copy public records.

25 (2) A charge that is allowable under this section may not exceed the amount necessary
 26 to reimburse the public body for the actual costs directly incident to the copying of public
 27 records. State agency charges for copies shall be imposed in accordance with the actual per
 28 page cost or other costs established and published by the agency. An agency may not charge
 29 a per page cost greater than the actual per page cost as established and published by the
 30 agency. To the extent the agency has not determined the actual per page cost for photoco-
 31 pies of public records, the agency may not charge in excess of 15 cents per page.

32 (3) A state agency may require a deposit in an amount not to exceed 10 percent of the
 33 estimated cost of providing copies for a request. If an agency makes a request available on
 34 a partial or installment basis, the agency may charge for each part of the request as it is
 35 provided. If an installment of a records request is not claimed or reviewed, the agency is not
 36 obligated to fulfill the balance of the request.

37 **SECTION 7.** (1) Responses to requests for public records shall be made promptly by public
 38 bodies. Within five business days of receiving a public record request, a public body must
 39 respond by:

40 (a) Providing the record;

41 (b) Providing an Internet address and link to the public body's website where the specific
 42 records requested are located, except that if the requester notifies the public body that the
 43 requester cannot access the records through the Internet, then the public body must provide
 44 copies of the record or allow the requester to view copies using a public body computer;

45 (c) Acknowledging that the public body has received the request and providing a reason-

1 able estimate of the time the public body will require to respond to the request; or

2 (d) Denying the public record request.

3 (2) Additional time required to respond to a request may be based upon the need to
 4 clarify the intent of the request, to locate and assemble the information requested, to notify
 5 third persons or agencies affected by the request or to determine whether any of the infor-
 6 mation requested is exempt and that a denial should be made as to all or part of the request.
 7 In acknowledging receipt of a public record request that is unclear, the public body may ask
 8 the requester to clarify what information the requester is seeking. If the requester fails to
 9 clarify the request, the public body need not respond to it.

10 (3) Denials of requests must be accompanied by a written statement of the specific rea-
 11 sons therefor. Public bodies shall establish mechanisms for the most prompt possible review
 12 of decisions denying inspection, and such review shall be deemed completed at the end of the
 13 second business day following the denial of inspection and shall constitute final action for the
 14 purposes of judicial review.

15 **SECTION 8.** Whenever a public body concludes that a public record is exempt from dis-
 16 closure and denies a person the opportunity to inspect or copy a public record for that rea-
 17 son, the person may request the Attorney General to review the matter. The Attorney
 18 General shall provide the person with a written opinion on whether the record is exempt.

19 **SECTION 9.** The examination of any specific public record may be enjoined if, upon mo-
 20 tion and affidavit by a public body or its representative or a person who is named in the re-
 21 cord or to whom the record specifically pertains, the circuit court for the county in which
 22 the movant resides or in which the record is maintained finds that such examination would
 23 clearly not be in the public interest and would substantially and irreparably damage any
 24 person, or would substantially and irreparably damage vital governmental functions. A public
 25 body has the option of notifying persons named in the record, or to whom a record specif-
 26 ically pertains, that release of a record has been requested. However, this option does not
 27 exist where the public body is required by law to provide such notice.

28 **SECTION 10.** (1) Upon the motion of any person having been denied an opportunity to
 29 inspect or copy a public record by a public body, the circuit court in the county in which a
 30 record is maintained may require the responsible public body to show cause as to why the
 31 public body has refused to allow inspection or copying of a specific public record or class of
 32 records. The burden of proof shall be on the public body to establish that refusal to permit
 33 public inspection and copying is in accordance with a provision of law that exempts or pro-
 34 hibits disclosure in whole or in part of specific information or records.

35 (2) Upon the motion of any person who believes that a public body has not made a rea-
 36 sonable estimate of the time that the public body requires to respond to a public record re-
 37 quest, the circuit court in the county in which a record is maintained may require the
 38 responsible public body to show that the estimate provided is reasonable. The burden of proof
 39 shall be on the public body to show that the estimate provided is reasonable.

40 (3) Judicial review of all public body actions taken or challenged shall be de novo. Courts
 41 shall take into account the policy of ORS 192.410 to 192.505 that free and open examination
 42 of public records is in the public interest, even though such examination may cause incon-
 43 venience or embarrassment to public officials or others. Courts may examine any record in
 44 camera in any proceeding brought under this section. The court may conduct a hearing based
 45 solely on affidavits.

1 (4) Any person who prevails against a public body in any action in the courts seeking the
 2 right to inspect or copy any public record or the right to receive a response to a public re-
 3 cord request within a reasonable amount of time shall be awarded all costs, including rea-
 4 sonable attorney fees, incurred in connection with such legal action.

5 (5) Actions under this section must be filed within one year of the agency's claim of ex-
 6 emption or the last production of a record on a partial or installment basis.

7
 8 **PUBLIC RECORDS EXEMPTIONS ACCOUNTABILITY COMMISSION**
 9

10 **SECTION 11.** (1) The Public Records Exemptions Accountability Commission is created
 11 to review exemptions from disclosure of public records. The commission shall consist of the
 12 following 13 members:

13 (a) The Governor shall appoint six members, one of whom represents the Governor, one
 14 of whom represents local government and four members of the public, with consideration
 15 given to diversity of viewpoint and geography.

16 (b) The Attorney General shall appoint two members, one of whom represents the At-
 17 torney General and one of whom represents a statewide media association.

18 (c) The Secretary of State shall appoint one member.

19 (d) The President of the Senate shall appoint one member from the majority party of the
 20 Senate and one member from the minority party of the Senate.

21 (e) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint one member from the
 22 majority party of the House of Representatives and one member from the minority party of
 23 the House of Representatives.

24 (2) The Governor shall select the chair of the commission from among its membership.

25 (3) The term of each member of the commission shall be two years. If a member is un-
 26 able or unwilling to complete the term of the member, the appointing authority shall appoint
 27 a new member to complete the remainder of the term.

28 (4) The purpose of the commission is to review public disclosure exemptions and provide
 29 recommendations pursuant to subsection (8) of this section. The commission shall develop
 30 and publish criteria for review of public exemptions.

31 (5) Commission meetings are public meetings under ORS 192.610 to 192.690.

32 (6) The Department of Justice shall provide staff support to the commission.

33 (7) Legislative members of the commission shall be reimbursed for travel expenses in
 34 accordance with ORS 171.072. Nonlegislative members, except those representing an em-
 35 ployer or organization, are entitled to be reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with
 36 ORS 292.495.

37 (8)(a) The commission shall develop a schedule to accomplish a review of each public
 38 disclosure exemption. The commission shall publish the schedule and publish any revisions
 39 made to the schedule.

40 (b) The commission shall meet at least once a quarter and may hold additional meetings
 41 at the call of the chair or by a majority vote of the members of the commission.

42 (c) For each public disclosure exemption, the commission shall provide a recommendation
 43 to the judiciary committees of the Legislative Assembly as to whether the exemption should
 44 be continued without modification, modified, scheduled for sunset review at a future date or
 45 terminated. The commission shall make the recommendations on or before November 15 of

1 each year.

2
3 **EXEMPTIONS**
4

5 **SECTION 12.** The following personal information is exempt from public inspection and
6 copying under ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

7 (1) Personal information in any files maintained for students in public schools, patients
8 or clients of public institutions or public health agencies or the Department of Human Ser-
9 vices.

10 (2) Personal information in files maintained for employees, appointees or elected officials
11 of any public body, to the extent that disclosure would violate the right to privacy of the
12 employees, appointees or elected officials.

13 (3) Information required of any taxpayer in connection with the assessment or collection
14 of any tax, if the disclosure of the information to other persons would:

15 (a) Be prohibited by other law; or

16 (b) Violate the taxpayer's right to privacy or result in unfair competitive disadvantage
17 to the taxpayer.

18 (4) Credit card numbers, debit card numbers, electronic check numbers, card expiration
19 dates or bank or other financial account numbers, except when disclosure is expressly re-
20 quired or governed by other law.

21 (5) Documents and related materials and scanned images of documents and related ma-
22 terials used to prove identity, age, residential address, Social Security number or other per-
23 sonal information required to apply for a driver license or government-issued identification
24 card.

25 **SECTION 13.** The following investigative, law enforcement and crime victim information
26 is exempt from public inspection and copying under ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

27 (1) Specific intelligence information and specific investigative records compiled by inves-
28 tigative, law enforcement or corrections agencies and state agencies vested with the re-
29 sponsibility to discipline members of any profession, the nondisclosure of which is essential
30 to effective law enforcement or for the protection of any person's right to privacy.

31 (2) Information revealing the identity of persons who are witnesses to or victims of crime
32 or who file complaints with investigative, law enforcement or corrections agencies, if dis-
33 closure would endanger any person's life, physical safety or property. If at the time a com-
34 plaint is filed the complainant, victim or witness indicates a desire for disclosure or
35 nondisclosure, such desire shall govern.

36 (3) Any records of investigative reports prepared by any state, county, municipal or other
37 law enforcement agency pertaining to sex offenses.

38 (4) Information revealing the identity of child victims of sexual assault who are under
39 18 years of age. Identifying information means the child victim's name, address, location,
40 photograph and, in cases in which the child victim is a relative or stepchild of the alleged
41 perpetrator, identification of the relationship between the child and the alleged perpetrator.

42 **SECTION 14.** The following employment and licensing information is exempt from public
43 inspection and copying under ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

44 (1) Test questions, scoring keys and other examination data used to administer a license,
45 employment or academic examination.

1 (2) All applications for public employment, including the names of applicants, resumes
2 and other related materials submitted with respect to an applicant.

3 (3) The residential addresses, residential telephone numbers, personal wireless telephone
4 numbers, personal electronic mail addresses, Social Security numbers and emergency con-
5 tact information of employees or volunteers of a public body, and the names, dates of birth,
6 residential addresses, residential telephone numbers, personal wireless telephone numbers,
7 personal electronic mail addresses, Social Security numbers and emergency contact infor-
8 mation of dependents of employees or volunteers of a public body that are held by any public
9 body in personnel records, public employment related records or volunteer rosters, or are
10 included in any mailing list of employees or volunteers of any public body.

11 (4) Information that identifies a person who, while an employee of a public body:

12 (a) Seeks advice, under an informal process established by the public body, in order to
13 ascertain the person's rights in connection with a possible unfair employment practice
14 against the person; and

15 (b) Requests that the person's identity or any identifying information not be disclosed.

16 (5) Investigative records compiled by an employing public body conducting an active and
17 ongoing investigation of a possible unlawful employment practice or of a possible violation
18 of other federal, state or local laws prohibiting discrimination in employment.

19 (6) Criminal history records checks for candidates for employment with public bodies.

20 (7) Photographs and month and year of birth in the personnel files of employees and
21 workers of law enforcement agencies. The news media shall have access to the photographs
22 and full date of birth.

23 **SECTION 15.** The contents of real estate appraisals made for or by any public body rel-
24 ative to the acquisition or sale of property, until the project or prospective sale is abandoned
25 or until such time as all of the property has been acquired or the property to which the sale
26 appraisal relates is sold, are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505. In no
27 event may disclosure be denied for more than three years after the appraisal.

28 **SECTION 16.** The following financial, commercial and proprietary information is exempt
29 from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

30 (1) Valuable formulae, designs, drawings, computer source code or object code and re-
31 search data obtained by any agency within five years of the request for disclosure when
32 disclosure would produce private gain and public loss.

33 (2) Financial information supplied by or on behalf of a person, firm or corporation for the
34 purpose of qualifying to submit a bid or proposal for highway construction or improvement.

35 (3) Financial and commercial information and records supplied by businesses or individ-
36 uals during application for loans or program services supplied by public bodies.

37 (4) Financial information, including but not limited to account numbers and values and
38 other identification numbers supplied by or on behalf of a person, firm, corporation, limited
39 liability company, partnership or other entity related to an application for a business license,
40 liquor license or lottery retail license.

41 (5) Proprietary data, trade secrets or other information that relates to:

42 (a) A vendor's unique methods of conducting business;

43 (b) Data unique to the product or services of the vendor; or

44 (c) Determining prices or rates to be charged for services, submitted by any vendor to
45 a public body.

1 (6)(a) When supplied to and in the records of the Oregon Business Development Depart-
 2 ment in connection with the siting, recruitment, expansion, retention or relocation of that
 3 person's business and until a siting decision is made, identifying information of any person
 4 supplying information under this subsection and the locations being considered for siting,
 5 relocation or expansion of a business.

6 (b) For the purposes of this subsection, "siting decision" means the decision to acquire
 7 or not to acquire a site.

8 (7) Any production records, mineral assessments and trade secrets submitted by a permit
 9 holder, mine operator or landowner to a public body.

10 (8) Financial, commercial, operations and technical and research information and data
 11 submitted to or obtained by the Department of Human Services, the Department of Con-
 12 sumer and Business Services or the Oregon Health Authority, to the extent that such in-
 13 formation, if revealed, would reasonably be expected to result in private loss to providers of
 14 this information.

15 (9) Financial and commercial information submitted to or obtained by the Oregon Uni-
 16 versity System when the information relates to investments in private funds, to the extent
 17 that such information, if revealed, would reasonably be expected to result in loss to an
 18 endowment fund of the Oregon University System.

19 SECTION 17. Preliminary drafts, notes, recommendations and intra-agency memoran-
 20 dum in which opinions are expressed or policies formulated or recommended are exempt
 21 under ORS 192.410 to 192.505, except that a specific record is not exempt when publicly cited
 22 by an agency in connection with any agency action.

23 SECTION 18. Records that are relevant to a controversy to which a public body is a
 24 party, but that would not be available to another party under the rules of pretrial discovery
 25 for civil actions in this state, are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505.

26 SECTION 19. Records, maps or other information identifying the location of
 27 archaeological sites in order to avoid the looting or depredation of such sites are exempt
 28 from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505.

29 SECTION 20. Any library record, the primary purpose of which is to maintain control of
 30 library materials, or to gain access to information, that discloses or could be used to disclose
 31 the identity of a library user is exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505.

32 SECTION 21. The following educational information is exempt from disclosure under ORS

16 (7) Rules adopted under ORS 279A.065 must provide for and regulate the correction and with-
 17 drawal of bids before and after bid opening and the cancellation of awards or contracts based on
 18 bid mistakes. After bid opening, changes in bids prejudicial to the interests of the public or fair
 19 competition are not permitted. A contracting agency that permits a bidder to correct or withdraw
 20 a bid or that cancels an award or a contract based on bid mistakes, shall support the decision with
 21 a written determination that states the reasons for the action taken.

22 (8) The cancellation of invitations to bid and the rejection of bids must be in accordance with
 23 ORS 279B.100.

 18 otherwise, the scope of work shall require the contractor to meet the highest standards prevalent

20 (d) Specify a time, date and place for prequalification applications, if any, to be filed and the
 21 classes of work, if any, for which proposers must be prequalified in accordance with ORS 279B.120.

22 (e) State that the contracting agency may cancel the procurement or reject any or all proposals
 23 in accordance with ORS 279B.100.

24 (f) State that "Contractors shall use recyclable products to the maximum extent economically
 25 feasible in the performance of the contract work set forth in this document." if a state contracting
 26 agency issues the request for proposals.

27 (g) Require the contractor or subcontractor to possess an asbestos abatement license, if required
 28 under ORS 468A.710.

29 (h) Include all contractual terms and conditions applicable to the procurement. The contract
 30 terms and conditions shall specify clear consequences for a contractor's failure to perform the scope
 31 of work identified in the request for proposals or the contractor's failure to meet established per-
 32 formance standards. The consequences may include, but are not limited to:

33 (A) Reducing or withholding payment;

34 (B) Requiring the contractor to perform, at the contractor's expense, additional work necessary
 35 to perform the identified scope of work or meet the established performance standards; or

 2 include, but is not limited to, negotiating with the highest ranked proposer, competitive negotiations,

 5 or a combination of methods, as authorized or prescribed by rules adopted under ORS 279A.065; and

 40 under ORS 419C.005.

41 (b) A youth admits to being within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court as provided in ORS
 42 419C.005 on a petition described in subsection (7) of this section or is adjudicated by a juvenile court
 43 to be within its jurisdiction on a petition described in subsection (7) of this section.

44 (c) A youth is found responsible except for insanity under ORS 419C.411.

45 (d) Notice had been given as provided by paragraph (a) or (b) of this subsection and the juvenile
