

## HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 2492

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 7 through 30 and delete pages 2 through 28 and insert:  
2 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 238A.005, as amended by section 1, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
3 amended to read:

4 “238A.005. For the purposes of this chapter:

5 “(1) ‘Active member’ means a member of the pension program or the individual account program  
6 of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan who is actively employed in a qualifying position.

7 “(2) ‘Actuarial equivalent’ means a payment or series of payments having the same value as the  
8 payment or series of payments replaced, computed on the basis of interest rate and mortality as-  
9 sumptions adopted by the board.

10 “(3) ‘Board’ means the Public Employees Retirement Board.

11 “(4) ‘Eligible employee’ means a person who performs services for a participating public em-  
12 ployer, including elected officials other than judges. ‘Eligible employee’ does not include:

13 “(a) Persons engaged as independent contractors;

14 “(b) Aliens working under a training or educational visa;

15 “(c) Persons, other than workers in the Industries for the Blind Program under ORS 346.190,  
16 provided sheltered employment or make-work by a public employer;

17 “(d) Persons categorized by a participating public employer as student employees;

18 “(e) Any person who is an inmate of a state institution;

19 “(f) Employees of foreign trade offices of the Oregon Business Development Department who live  
20 and perform services in foreign countries under the provisions of ORS 285A.075 (1)(g);

21 “(g) An employee actively participating in an alternative retirement program established under  
22 ORS 353.250 or an optional retirement plan established under ORS 341.551;

23 “(h) Employees of the Oregon University System who are actively participating in an optional  
24 retirement plan offered under ORS 243.800;

25 “(i) Any employee who belongs to a class of employees that was not eligible on August 28, 2003,  
26 for membership in the system under the provisions of ORS chapter 238 or other law;

27 “(j) Any person who belongs to a class of employees who are not eligible to become members  
28 of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan under the provisions of ORS 238A.070 (2);

29 “(k) Any person who is retired under ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245 or ORS chapter 238 and who  
30 continues to receive retirement benefits while employed; and

31 “(L) Judges.

32 “(5) ‘Firefighter’ means:

33 “(a) A person employed by a local government, as defined in ORS 174.116, whose primary job  
34 duties include the fighting of fires;

35 “(b) The State Fire Marshal, the chief deputy state fire marshal and deputy state fire marshals;

1 and

2 “(c) An employee of the State Forestry Department who is certified by the State Forester as a  
3 professional wildland firefighter and whose primary duties include the abatement of uncontrolled  
4 fires as described in ORS 477.064.

5 “(6) ‘Fund’ means the Public Employees Retirement Fund.

6 “(7)(a) ‘Hour of service’ means:

7 “(A) An hour for which an eligible employee is directly or indirectly paid or entitled to payment  
8 by a participating public employer for performance of duties in a qualifying position; and

9 “(B) An hour of vacation, holiday, illness, incapacity, jury duty, military duty or authorized  
10 leave during which an employee does not perform duties but for which the employee is directly or  
11 indirectly paid or entitled to payment by a participating public employer for services in a qualifying  
12 position, as long as the hour is within the number of hours regularly scheduled for the performance  
13 of duties during the period of vacation, holiday, illness, incapacity, jury duty, military duty or au-  
14 thorized leave.

15 “(b) ‘Hour of service’ does not include any hour for which payment is made or due under a plan  
16 maintained solely for the purpose of complying with applicable workers’ compensation laws or un-  
17 employment compensation laws.

18 “(8) ‘Inactive member’ means a member of the pension program or the individual account pro-  
19 gram of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan whose membership has not been terminated, who  
20 is not a retired member and who is not employed in a qualifying position.

21 “(9) ‘Individual account program’ means the defined contribution individual account program of  
22 the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan established under ORS 238A.025.

23 “(10) ‘Institution of higher education’ means a public university listed in ORS 352.002, the  
24 Oregon Health and Science University or a community college, as defined in ORS 341.005.

25 “(11) ‘Member’ means an eligible employee who has established membership in the pension pro-  
26 gram or the individual account program of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan and whose  
27 membership has not been terminated under ORS 238A.110 or 238A.310.

28 “(12) ‘Participating public employer’ means a public employer as defined in ORS 238.005 that  
29 provides retirement benefits for employees of the public employer under the system.

30 “(13) ‘Pension program’ means the defined benefit pension program of the Oregon Public Service  
31 Retirement Plan established under ORS 238A.025.

32 “(14) ‘Police officer’ means a police officer as described in ORS 238.005.

33 “(15) ‘Qualifying position’ means one or more jobs with one or more participating public em-  
34 ployers in which an eligible employee performs 600 or more hours of service in a calendar year,  
35 excluding any service in a job for which benefits are not provided under the Oregon Public Service  
36 Retirement Plan pursuant to ORS 238A.070 (2).

37 “(16) ‘Retired member’ means a pension program member who is receiving a pension as provided  
38 in ORS 238A.180 to 238A.195.

39 “(17)(a) ‘Salary’ means the remuneration paid to an active member in return for services to the  
40 participating public employer, including remuneration in the form of living quarters, board or other  
41 items of value, to the extent the remuneration is includable in the employee’s taxable income under  
42 Oregon law. Salary includes the additional amounts specified in paragraph (b) of this subsection,  
43 but does not include the amounts specified in paragraph (c) of this subsection, regardless of whether  
44 those amounts are includable in taxable income.

45 “(b) ‘Salary’ includes the following amounts:

1 “(A) Payments of employee and employer money into a deferred compensation plan that are  
2 made at the election of the employee.

3 “(B) Contributions to a tax-sheltered or deferred annuity that are made at the election of the  
4 employee.

5 “(C) Any amount that is contributed to a cafeteria plan or qualified transportation fringe benefit  
6 plan by the employer at the election of the employee and that is not includable in the taxable in-  
7 come of the employee by reason of 26 U.S.C. 125 or 132(f)(4), as in effect on [December 31, 2011]  
8 **January 3, 2013.**

9 “(D) Any amount that is contributed to a cash or deferred arrangement by the employer at the  
10 election of the employee and that is not included in the taxable income of the employee by reason  
11 of 26 U.S.C. 402(e)(3), as in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013.**

12 “(E) Retroactive payments described in ORS 238.008.

13 “(F) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is paid by  
14 the employer and deducted from the compensation of the employee, as provided under ORS 238A.335  
15 (1) and (2)(a).

16 “(G) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is not paid  
17 by the employer under ORS 238A.335.

18 “(H) Wages of a deceased member paid to a surviving spouse or dependent children under ORS  
19 652.190.

20 “(c) ‘Salary’ does not include the following amounts:

21 “(A) Travel or any other expenses incidental to employer’s business which is reimbursed by the  
22 employer.

23 “(B) Payments made on account of an employee’s death.

24 “(C) Any lump sum payment for accumulated unused sick leave, vacation leave or other paid  
25 leave.

26 “(D) Any severance payment, accelerated payment of an employment contract for a future period  
27 or advance against future wages.

28 “(E) Any retirement incentive, retirement bonus or retirement gratuitous payment.

29 “(F) Payment for a leave of absence after the date the employer and employee have agreed that  
30 no future services in a qualifying position will be performed.

31 “(G) Payments for instructional services rendered to public universities of the Oregon Univer-  
32 sity System or the Oregon Health and Science University when those services are in excess of full-  
33 time employment subject to this chapter. A person employed under a contract for less than 12  
34 months is subject to this subparagraph only for the months covered by the contract.

35 “(H) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is paid by  
36 the employer and is not deducted from the compensation of the employee, as provided under ORS  
37 238A.335 (1) and (2)(b).

38 “(I) Any amount in excess of \$200,000 for a calendar year. If any period over which salary is  
39 determined is less than 12 months, the \$200,000 limitation for that period shall be multiplied by a  
40 fraction, the numerator of which is the number of months in the determination period and the de-  
41 nominator of which is 12. The board shall adopt rules adjusting this dollar limit to incorporate  
42 cost-of-living adjustments authorized by the Internal Revenue Service.

43 “(18) ‘System’ means the Public Employees Retirement System.

44 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 238A.125, as amended by section 2, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
45 amended to read:

1 “238A.125. (1) Upon retiring at normal retirement age, a vested pension program member shall  
2 be paid an annual pension for the life of the member as follows:

3 “(a) For service as a police officer or firefighter, 1.8 percent of final average salary multiplied  
4 by the number of years of retirement credit attributable to service as a police officer or firefighter.

5 “(b) For service as other than a police officer or firefighter, 1.5 percent of final average salary  
6 multiplied by the number of years of retirement credit attributable to service as other than a police  
7 officer or firefighter.

8 “(2) Notwithstanding any provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, the annual benefit payable to  
9 a member under the pension program and under any other tax-qualified defined benefit plan main-  
10 tained by the participating public employer may not exceed the applicable limitations set forth in  
11 26 U.S.C. 415(b), as in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013**. The Public Employees Re-  
12 tirement Board shall adopt rules for the administration of this limitation, including adjustments in  
13 the annual dollar limitation to reflect cost-of-living adjustments authorized by the Internal Revenue  
14 Service.

15 “(3) The board shall make no actuarial adjustment in a member’s pension calculated under this  
16 section by reason of the member’s retirement after normal retirement age.

17 “**SECTION 3.** ORS 238A.150, as amended by section 3, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
18 amended to read:

19 “238A.150. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, an eligible  
20 employee who leaves a qualifying position for the purpose of performing service in the uniformed  
21 services, and who subsequently returns to employment with a participating public employer with  
22 reemployment rights under federal law, is entitled to accrue retirement credit, credit toward the  
23 probationary period required by ORS 238A.100 and credit toward the vesting requirements of ORS  
24 238A.115 under rules adopted by the Public Employees Retirement Board pursuant to subsection (2)  
25 of this section.

26 “(2) The board shall adopt rules establishing benefits and service credit for any period of service  
27 in the uniformed services by an employee described in subsection (1) of this section. For the purpose  
28 of adopting rules under this subsection, the board shall consider and take into account all federal  
29 law relating to benefits and service credit for any period of service in the uniformed services, in-  
30 cluding 26 U.S.C. 414(u), as in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013**. Benefits and service  
31 credit under rules adopted by the board pursuant to this subsection may not exceed benefits and  
32 service credit required under federal law for periods of service in the uniformed services.

33 “**SECTION 4.** ORS 238A.170, as amended by section 4, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
34 amended to read:

35 “238A.170. (1) An active member of the pension program who is 70-1/2 years of age or older must  
36 retire not later than April 1 of the calendar year following the calendar year in which the member  
37 terminates employment with all participating public employers. An inactive member of the pension  
38 program must retire not later than April 1 of the calendar year following the calendar year in which  
39 the member attains 70-1/2 years of age.

40 “(2) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, the entire interest of a  
41 member of the pension program must be distributed over a time period commencing no later than  
42 the required beginning date set forth in subsection (1) of this section, and must be distributed in a  
43 manner that satisfies all other minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and regu-  
44 lations implementing that section, as in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013**. The Public  
45 Employees Retirement Board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution require-

1 ments.

2 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 238A.230, as amended by section 5, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
3 amended to read:

4 “238A.230. (1) If a member of the pension program who is vested dies before the member’s ef-  
5 fective date of retirement, the Public Employees Retirement Board shall pay the death benefit pro-  
6 vided for in this section to the spouse of the member or to any other person who is constitutionally  
7 required to be treated in the same manner as a spouse for the purpose of retirement benefits.

8 “(2)(a) The death benefit to be paid under this section shall be for the life of the spouse or other  
9 person who is constitutionally required to be treated in the same manner as a spouse, and shall be  
10 the actuarial equivalent of 50 percent of the pension that would otherwise have been paid to the  
11 deceased member.

12 “(b) For the purpose of paragraph (a) of this subsection, the amount of the pension that would  
13 otherwise have been paid to the deceased member shall be calculated:

14 “(A) As of the date of death if the member dies after the earliest retirement date for the member  
15 under ORS 238A.165; or

16 “(B) As if the member became an inactive member on the date of death and thereafter retired  
17 at the earliest retirement date if the member dies before the earliest retirement date for the member  
18 under ORS 238A.165.

19 “(3) The death benefit provided under this section is first effective on the first day of the month  
20 following the date of death of the member. The surviving spouse or other person entitled to the  
21 death benefit may elect to delay payment of the death benefit, but payment must commence no later  
22 than December 31 of the calendar year in which the member would have reached 70-1/2 years of age.

23 “(4) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, distributions of death  
24 benefits under the pension program must comply with the minimum distribution requirements of 26  
25 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and the regulations implementing that section, as in effect on [December 31, 2011]  
26 **January 3, 2013.** The board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution require-  
27 ments.

28 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 238A.370, as amended by section 6, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
29 amended to read:

30 “238A.370. Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, the annual addi-  
31 tion to the employee and employer accounts of a member of the individual account program for a  
32 calendar year, together with the annual additions to the accounts of the member under any other  
33 defined contribution plan maintained by the participating public employer for a calendar year, may  
34 not exceed the lesser of \$40,000, or 100 percent of the member’s compensation for that calendar year.  
35 For purposes of this section, ‘annual addition’ has the meaning given that term in 26 U.S.C. 415(c)(2),  
36 as in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013,** and ‘compensation’ has the meaning given the  
37 term ‘participant’s compensation’ in 26 U.S.C. 415(c)(3), as in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January**  
38 **3, 2013.** The Public Employees Retirement Board shall adopt rules for the administration of this  
39 limitation, including adjustments in the annual dollar limitation to reflect cost-of-living adjustments  
40 authorized by the Internal Revenue Service.

41 “**SECTION 7.** ORS 238A.400, as amended by section 7, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
42 amended to read:

43 “238A.400. (1) Upon retirement on or after the earliest retirement date, as described in ORS  
44 238A.165, a member of the individual account program shall receive in a lump sum the amounts in  
45 the member’s employee account, rollover account and employer account to the extent the member

1 is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320.

2 “(2) In lieu of a lump sum payment under subsection (1) of this section, a member of the indi-  
3 vidual account program may elect to receive the amounts in the member’s employee account and  
4 employer account, to the extent the member is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320, in  
5 substantially equal installments paid over a period of 5, 10, 15 or 20 years, or over a period that is  
6 equal to the anticipated life span of the member as actuarially determined by the Public Employees  
7 Retirement Board. Installments may be made on a monthly, quarterly or annual basis. In no event  
8 may the period selected by the member exceed the time allowed by the minimum distribution re-  
9 quirements described in subsection (5) of this section. The board shall by rule establish the manner  
10 in which installments will be adjusted to reflect investment gains and losses on the unpaid balance  
11 during the payout period elected by the member under this subsection. The board by rule may es-  
12 tablish minimum monthly amounts payable under this subsection. The board may require that a  
13 lump sum payment, or an installment schedule different than the schedules provided for in this  
14 subsection, be used to pay the vested amounts in the member’s accounts if those amounts are not  
15 adequate to generate the minimum monthly amounts specified by the rule.

16 “(3) A member of the individual account program electing to receive installments under sub-  
17 section (2) of this section must designate a beneficiary or beneficiaries. In the event the member dies  
18 before all amounts in the employee and vested employer accounts are paid, all remaining installment  
19 payments shall be made to the beneficiary or beneficiaries designated by the member. A beneficiary  
20 may elect to receive a lump sum distribution of the remaining amounts.

21 “(4) A member who is entitled to receive retirement benefits under ORS chapter 238 may receive  
22 vested amounts in the member’s employee account, rollover account and employer account in the  
23 manner provided by this section when the member retires for service under the provisions of ORS  
24 chapter 238.

25 “(5) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, the entire interest of a  
26 member of the individual account program must be distributed over a time period commencing no  
27 later than the latest retirement date set forth in ORS 238A.170, and must be distributed in a manner  
28 that satisfies all other minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and regulations im-  
29 plementing that section, as in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013**. The board shall adopt  
30 rules implementing those minimum distribution requirements.

31 “**SECTION 8.** ORS 238A.410, as amended by section 8, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
32 amended to read:

33 “238A.410. (1) If a member of the individual account program dies before retirement, the  
34 amounts in the member’s employee account, rollover account and employer account, to the extent  
35 the member is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320, shall be paid in a lump sum to the  
36 beneficiary or beneficiaries designated by the member for the purposes of this section.

37 “(2) If a member of the individual account program is married at the time of death, or there  
38 exists at the time of death any other person who is constitutionally required to be treated in the  
39 same manner as a spouse for the purpose of retirement benefits, the spouse or other person shall  
40 be the beneficiary for purposes of the death benefit payable under this section unless the spouse or  
41 other person consents to the designation of a different beneficiary or beneficiaries before the des-  
42 ignation has been made and the consent has not been revoked by the spouse or other person as of  
43 the time of the member’s death. Consent and revocation of consent must be in writing, acknowledged  
44 by a notary public, and submitted to the Public Employees Retirement Board in accordance with  
45 rules adopted by the board. If the member’s spouse is designated as the member’s beneficiary and

1 the marriage of the member and spouse is subsequently dissolved, the former spouse shall be treated  
2 as predeceasing the member for purposes of this section, unless the member expressly designates the  
3 former spouse as beneficiary after the effective date of the dissolution or the former spouse is re-  
4 quired to be designated as a beneficiary under the provisions of ORS 238.465.

5 “(3) For purposes of this section and ORS 238A.400 (3), if a member fails to designate a benefi-  
6 ciary, or if the person or persons designated do not survive the member, the death benefit provided  
7 for in this section shall be paid to the following person or persons, in the following order of priority:

8 “(a) The member’s surviving spouse or other person who is constitutionally required to be  
9 treated in the same manner as a spouse;

10 “(b) The member’s surviving children, in equal shares; or

11 “(c) The member’s estate.

12 “(4) The entire amount of a deceased member’s vested accounts must be distributed by December  
13 31 of the fifth calendar year after the year in which the member died. Notwithstanding any other  
14 provision of this chapter, distributions of death benefits under the individual account program must  
15 comply with the minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and the regulations im-  
16 plementing that section, as in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013**. The Public Employees  
17 Retirement Board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution requirements.

18 “**SECTION 9.** ORS 238A.415, as amended by section 9, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
19 amended to read:

20 “238A.415. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, an eligible  
21 employee who leaves a qualifying position for the purpose of performing service in the uniformed  
22 services, and who subsequently returns to employment with a participating public employer with  
23 reemployment rights under federal law, is entitled to credit toward the probationary period required  
24 by ORS 238A.300, credit toward the vesting requirements of ORS 238A.320 and contributions under  
25 rules adopted by the Public Employees Retirement Board pursuant to subsection (2) of this section.

26 “(2) The board shall adopt rules establishing contributions and service credit for any period of  
27 service in the uniformed services by an employee described in subsection (1) of this section. For the  
28 purpose of adopting rules under this subsection, the board shall consider and take into account all  
29 federal law relating to benefits and service credit for any period of service in the uniformed ser-  
30 vices, including 26 U.S.C. 414(u), as in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013**. Contributions  
31 and service credit under rules adopted by the board pursuant to this subsection may not exceed  
32 contributions and service credit required under federal law for periods of service in the uniformed  
33 services.

34 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 238A.430, as amended by section 10, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
35 amended to read:

36 “238A.430. (1) To the extent required by law, and except as otherwise provided by rules adopted  
37 by the Public Employees Retirement Board under subsection (4) of this section, any portion of a  
38 distribution of benefits described in subsection (2) of this section shall, at the election of and in lieu  
39 of distribution to the distributee, be paid directly to an eligible retirement plan specified by the  
40 distributee.

41 “(2) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section apply to a distribution of any benefit under  
42 the pension program or the individual account program except:

43 “(a) A distribution that is one of a series of substantially equal periodic payments made at least  
44 annually for the life or life expectancy of the distributee, or for the joint lives or life expectancies  
45 of the distributee and a designated beneficiary;

1 “(b) A distribution that is one of a series of substantially equal periodic payments made at least  
2 annually for a specified period of 10 years or more; and

3 “(c) A distribution to the extent that the distribution is required under 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9).

4 “(3) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section apply to any portion of a distribution of  
5 benefits under the pension program or the individual account program even though the portion  
6 consists of after-tax employee contributions that are not includable in gross income. Any portion of  
7 a distribution that consists of after-tax employee contributions that are not includable in gross in-  
8 come may be transferred only to an individual retirement account or annuity described in 26 U.S.C.  
9 408(a) or (b), or to a qualified defined contribution or defined benefit plan described in 26 U.S.C.  
10 401(a) or 403(b) that agrees to account separately for amounts transferred, including accounting  
11 separately for the portion of the distribution that is includable in gross income and the portion of  
12 the distribution that is not includable in gross income. The amount transferred shall be treated as  
13 consisting first of the portion of the distribution that is includable in gross income, determined  
14 without regard to 26 U.S.C. 402(c)(1).

15 “(4) The board shall adopt rules implementing the direct rollover requirements of 26 U.S.C.  
16 401(a)(31) and the regulations implementing that section, and may adopt administrative exceptions  
17 to the direct rollover requirements to the extent permitted by 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(31) and the regu-  
18 lations implementing that section.

19 “(5) All references in this section to federal laws and regulations are to the laws and regulations  
20 in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013**.

21 “(6) For purposes of this section:

22 “(a) ‘Distributee’ means a member, a member’s surviving spouse or a member’s alternate payee  
23 under ORS 238.465.

24 “(b) ‘Eligible retirement plan’ means:

25 “(A) An individual retirement account described in 26 U.S.C. 408(a);

26 “(B) An individual retirement annuity described in 26 U.S.C. 408(b), other than an endowment  
27 contract;

28 “(C) A qualified trust under 26 U.S.C. 401(a), that is a defined contribution or defined benefit  
29 plan and permits the acceptance of rollover contributions;

30 “(D) An annuity plan described in 26 U.S.C. 403(a);

31 “(E) An eligible deferred compensation plan described in 26 U.S.C. 457(b) that is maintained by  
32 an eligible governmental employer described in 26 U.S.C. 457(e)(1)(A) and that agrees to account  
33 separately for amounts transferred into such plan from the distributing plan; or

34 “(F) An annuity contract described in 26 U.S.C. 403(b).

35 “**SECTION 11.** ORS 305.230, as amended by section 11, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
36 amended to read:

37 “305.230. (1) Notwithstanding ORS 9.320:

38 “(a) Any person who is qualified to practice law or public accountancy in this state, any person  
39 who has been granted active enrollment to practice before the Internal Revenue Service and who  
40 is qualified to prepare tax returns in this state or any person who is the authorized employee of a  
41 taxpayer and is regularly employed by the taxpayer in tax matters may represent the taxpayer be-  
42 fore a tax court magistrate or the Department of Revenue in any conference or proceeding with  
43 respect to the administration of any tax.

44 “(b) Any person who is licensed by the State Board of Tax Practitioners or who is exempt from  
45 such licensing requirement as provided for and limited by ORS 673.610 may represent a taxpayer



1 before a tax court magistrate or the department in any conference or proceeding with respect to the  
2 administration of any tax on or measured by net income.

3 “(c) Any shareholder of an S corporation, as defined in section 1361 of the Internal Revenue  
4 Code, as amended and in effect on [*December 31, 2011*] **January 3, 2013**, may represent the corpo-  
5 ration in any proceeding before a tax court magistrate or the department in the same manner as if  
6 the shareholder were a partner and the S corporation were a partnership. The S corporation must  
7 designate in writing a tax matters shareholder authorized to represent the S corporation.

8 “(d) An individual who is licensed as a real estate broker or principal real estate broker under  
9 ORS 696.022 or is a state certified appraiser or state licensed appraiser under ORS 674.310 or is a  
10 registered appraiser under ORS 308.010 may represent a taxpayer before a tax court magistrate or  
11 the department in any conference or proceeding with respect to the administration of any ad  
12 valorem property tax.

13 “(e) A general partner who has been designated by members of a partnership as their tax mat-  
14 ters partner under ORS 305.242 may represent those partners in any conference or proceeding with  
15 respect to the administration of any tax on or measured by net income.

16 “(f) Any person authorized under rules adopted by the department may represent a taxpayer  
17 before the department in any conference or proceeding with respect to any tax. Rules adopted under  
18 this paragraph, to the extent feasible, shall be consistent with federal law that governs represen-  
19 tation before the Internal Revenue Service, as federal law is amended and in effect on [*December*  
20 *31, 2011*] **January 3, 2013**.

21 “(g) Any person authorized under rules adopted by the tax court may represent a taxpayer in  
22 a proceeding before a tax court magistrate.

23 “(2) A person may not be recognized as representing a taxpayer pursuant to this section unless  
24 there is first filed with the magistrate or department a written authorization, or unless it appears  
25 to the satisfaction of the magistrate or department that the representative does in fact have au-  
26 thority to represent the taxpayer. A person recognized as an authorized representative under rules  
27 or procedures adopted by the tax court shall be considered an authorized representative by the de-  
28 partment.

29 “(3) A taxpayer represented by someone other than an attorney is bound by all things done by  
30 the authorized representative, and may not thereafter claim any proceeding was legally defective  
31 because the taxpayer was not represented by an attorney.

32 “(4) Prior to the holding of a conference or proceeding before the tax court magistrate or de-  
33 partment, written notice shall be given by the magistrate or department to the taxpayer of the  
34 provisions of subsection (3) of this section.

37 “305.494. Notwithstanding ORS 9.320, any shareholder of an S corporation as defined in section

43 “305.690. As used in ORS 305.690 to 305.753, unless the context otherwise requires:

44 “(1) ‘Biennial years’ means the two income tax years of individual taxpayers that begin in the  
45 two calendar years immediately following the calendar year in which a list is certified under ORS

2 “(2) ‘Commission’ means the Oregon Charitable Checkoff Commission.

3 “(3) ‘Department’ means the Department of Revenue.

17 “(a) ‘Art museum’ means a nonprofit corporation organized to display works of art to the public.

18 “(b) ‘Internal Revenue Code’ means the federal Internal Revenue Code as amended and in effect  
19 on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013.**

20 “(c) ‘Nonprofit corporation’ means a corporation that:

21 “(A) Is organized not for profit, pursuant to ORS chapter 65 or any predecessor of ORS chapter

41 of the sale of any inventory sold to the general public are used to support a welfare program. As

11 with services and activities for providing fire protection to all residents within a fire response area.

6 “**SECTION 17.** ORS 310.140, as amended by section 17, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is

21 “(1) ‘Actual cost’ means all direct or indirect costs incurred by a government unit in order to  
22 deliver goods or services or to undertake a capital construction project. The ‘actual cost’ of pro-  
23 viding goods or services to a property or property owner includes the average cost or an allocated  
24 portion of the total amount of the actual cost of making a good or service available to the property  
25 or property owner, whether stated as a minimum, fixed or variable amount. ‘Actual cost’ includes,  
26 but is not limited to, the costs of labor, materials, supplies, equipment rental, property acquisition,  
27 permits, engineering, financing, reasonable program delinquencies, return on investment, required  
28 fees, insurance, administration, accounting, depreciation, amortization, operation, maintenance, re-  
29 pair or replacement and debt service, including debt service payments or payments into reserve ac-  
30 counts for debt service and payment of amounts necessary to meet debt service coverage  
31 requirements.

32 “(2) ‘Assessment for local improvement’ means any tax, fee, charge or assessment that does not  
33 exceed the actual cost incurred by a unit of government for design, construction and financing of  
34 a local improvement.

35 “(3) ‘Bonded indebtedness’ means any formally executed written agreement representing a  
36 promise by a unit of government to pay to another a specified sum of money, at a specified date or  
37 dates at least one year in the future.

38 “(4) ‘Capital construction’:

39 “(a) For bonded indebtedness issued prior to December 5, 1996, and for the proceeds of any  
40 bonded indebtedness approved by electors prior to December 5, 1996, that were spent or  
41 contractually obligated to be spent prior to June 20, 1997, means the construction, modification,  
42 replacement, repair, remodeling or renovation of a structure, or addition to a structure, that is ex-  
43 pected to have a useful life of more than one year, and includes, but is not limited to:

44 “(A) Acquisition of land, or a legal interest in land, in conjunction with the capital construction  
45 of a structure.

1 “(B) Acquisition, installation of machinery or equipment, furnishings or materials that will be-  
2 come an integral part of a structure.

3 “(C) Activities related to the capital construction, including planning, design, authorizing, issu-  
4 ing, carrying or repaying interim or permanent financing, research, land use and environmental im-  
5 pact studies, acquisition of permits or licenses or other services connected with the construction.

6 “(D) Acquisition of existing structures, or legal interests in structures, in conjunction with the  
7 capital construction.

8 “(b) For bonded indebtedness issued on or after December 5, 1996, except for the proceeds of  
9 any bonded indebtedness approved by electors prior to December 5, 1996, that were spent or  
10 contractually obligated to be spent before June 20, 1997, has the meaning given that term in para-  
11 graph (a) of this subsection, except that ‘capital construction’:

12 “(A) Includes public safety and law enforcement vehicles with a projected useful life of five  
13 years or more; and

14 “(B) Does not include:

15 “(i) Maintenance and repairs, the need for which could be reasonably anticipated;

16 “(ii) Supplies and equipment that are not intrinsic to the structure; or

17 “(iii) Furnishings, unless the furnishings are acquired in connection with the acquisition, con-  
18 struction, remodeling or renovation of a structure, or the repair of a structure that is required be-  
19 cause of damage or destruction of the structure.

20 “(5) ‘Capital improvements’:

21 “(a) For bonded indebtedness issued prior to December 5, 1996, and for the proceeds of any  
22 bonded indebtedness approved by electors before December 5, 1996, that were spent or contractually  
23 obligated to be spent before June 20, 1997, means land, structures, facilities, personal property that  
24 is functionally related and subordinate to real property, machinery, equipment or furnishings having  
25 a useful life longer than one year.

26 “(b) For bonded indebtedness issued on or after December 5, 1996, except for the proceeds of  
27 any bonded indebtedness approved by electors prior to December 5, 1996, that were spent or  
28 contractually obligated to be spent before June 20, 1997, has the meaning given that term in para-  
29 graph (a) of this subsection, except that ‘capital improvements’:

30 “(A) Includes public safety and law enforcement vehicles with a projected useful life of five  
31 years or more; and

32 “(B) Does not include:

33 “(i) Maintenance and repairs, the need for which could be reasonably anticipated;

34 “(ii) Supplies and equipment that are not intrinsic to the structure; or

35 “(iii) Furnishings, unless the furnishings are acquired in connection with the acquisition, con-  
36 struction, remodeling or renovation of a structure, or the repair of a structure that is required be-  
37 cause of damage or destruction of the structure.

38 “(6) ‘Direct consequence of ownership’ means that the obligation of the owner of property to pay  
39 a tax arises solely because that person is the owner of the property, and the obligation to pay the  
40 tax arises as an immediate and necessary result of that ownership without respect to any other in-  
41 tervening transaction, condition or event.

42 “(7)(a) ‘Exempt bonded indebtedness’ means:

43 “(A) Bonded indebtedness authorized by a specific provision of the Oregon Constitution;

44 “(B) Bonded indebtedness incurred or to be incurred for capital construction or capital im-  
45 provements that was issued as a general obligation of the issuing governmental unit on or before

1 November 6, 1990;

2 “(C) Bonded indebtedness incurred or to be incurred for capital construction or capital im-  
3 provements that was issued as a general obligation of the issuing governmental unit after November  
4 6, 1990, with the approval of the electors of the issuing governmental unit; or

5 “(D) Bonded indebtedness incurred or to be incurred for capital construction or capital im-  
6 provements, if the issuance of the bonds is approved by voters on or after December 5, 1996, in an  
7 election that is in compliance with the voter participation requirements of [section 11 (8),] Article  
8 XI, **section 11 (8)**, of the Oregon Constitution.

9 “(b) ‘Exempt bonded indebtedness’ includes bonded indebtedness issued to refund or refinance  
10 any bonded indebtedness described in paragraph (a) of this subsection.

11 “(8)(a) ‘Incurred charge’ means a charge imposed by a unit of government on property or upon  
12 a property owner that does not exceed the actual cost of providing goods or services and that can  
13 be controlled or avoided by the property owner because:

14 “(A) The charge is based on the quantity of the goods or services used, and the owner has direct  
15 control over the quantity;

16 “(B) The goods or services are provided only on the specific request of the property owner; or

17 “(C) The goods or services are provided by the government unit only after the individual prop-  
18 erty owner has failed to meet routine obligations of ownership of the affected property, and such  
19 action is deemed necessary by an appropriate government unit to enforce regulations pertaining to  
20 health or safety.

21 “(b) For purposes of this subsection, an owner of property may control or avoid an incurred  
22 charge if the owner is capable of taking action to affect the amount of a charge that is or will be  
23 imposed or to avoid imposition of a charge even if the owner must incur expense in so doing.

24 “(c) For purposes of paragraph (a)(A) of this subsection, an owner of property has direct control  
25 over the quantity of goods or services if the owner of property has the ability, whether or not that  
26 ability is exercised, to determine the quantity of goods or services provided or to be provided.

27 “(9)(a) ‘Local improvement’ means a capital construction project, or part thereof, undertaken by  
28 a local government, pursuant to ORS 223.387 to 223.399, or pursuant to a local ordinance or resol-  
29 ution prescribing the procedure to be followed in making local assessments for benefits from a local  
30 improvement upon the lots that have been benefited by all or a part of the improvement:

31 “(A) That provides a special benefit only to specific properties or rectifies a problem caused by  
32 specific properties;

33 “(B) The costs of which are assessed against those properties in a single assessment upon the  
34 completion of the project; and

35 “(C) For which the property owner may elect to make payment of the assessment plus appro-  
36 priate interest over a period of at least 10 years.

37 “(b) For purposes of paragraph (a) of this subsection, the status of a capital construction project  
38 as a local improvement is not affected by the accrual of a general benefit to property other than the  
39 property receiving the special benefit.

40 “(10) ‘Maintenance and repairs, the need for which could be reasonably anticipated’:

41 “(a) Means activities, the type of which may be deducted as an expense under the provisions  
42 of the federal Internal Revenue Code, as amended and in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3,**  
43 **2013**, that keep the property in ordinarily efficient operating condition and that do not add mate-  
44 rially to the value of the property nor appreciably prolong the life of the property;

45 “(b) Does not include maintenance and repair of property that is required by damage, de-

1 construction or defect in design, or that was otherwise not reasonably expected at the time the property  
2 was constructed or acquired, or the addition of material that is in the nature of the replacement of  
3 property and that arrests the deterioration or appreciably prolongs the useful life of the property;  
4 and

5 “(c) Does not include street and highway construction, overlay and reconstruction.

6 “(11) ‘Projected useful life’ means the useful life, as reasonably estimated by the unit of gov-  
7 ernment undertaking the capital construction or capital improvement project, beginning with the  
8 date the property was acquired, constructed or reconstructed and based on the property’s condition  
9 at the time the property was acquired, constructed or reconstructed.

10 “(12) ‘Routine obligations of ownership’ means a standard of operation, maintenance, use or care  
11 of property established by law, or if established by custom or common law, a standard that is rea-  
12 sonable for the type of property affected.

13 “(13) ‘Single assessment’ means the complete assessment process, including preassessment, as-  
14 sessment or reassessment, for any local improvement authorized by ORS 223.387 to 223.399, or a  
15 local ordinance or resolution that provides the procedure to be followed in making local assessments  
16 for benefits from a local improvement upon lots that have been benefited by all or part of the im-  
17 provement.

18 “(14) ‘Special benefit only to specific properties’ shall have the same meaning as ‘special and  
19 peculiar benefit’ as that term is used in ORS 223.389.

20 “(15) ‘Specific request’ means:

21 “(a) An affirmative act by a property owner to seek or obtain delivery of goods or services;

22 “(b) An affirmative act by a property owner, the legal consequence of which is to cause the  
23 delivery of goods or services to the property owner; or

24 “(c) Failure of an owner of property to change a request for goods or services made by a prior  
25 owner of the property.

26 “(16) ‘Structure’ means any temporary or permanent building or improvement to real property  
27 of any kind that is constructed on or attached to real property, whether above, on or beneath the  
28 surface.

29 “(17) ‘Supplies and equipment intrinsic to a structure’ means the supplies and equipment that  
30 are necessary to permit a structure to perform the functions for which the structure was con-  
31 structed, or that will, upon installation, constitute fixtures considered to be part of the real property  
32 that is comprised, in whole or part, of the structure and land supporting the structure.

33 “(18) ‘Tax on property’ means any tax, fee, charge or assessment imposed by any government  
34 unit upon property or upon a property owner as a direct consequence of ownership of that property,  
35 but does not include incurred charges or assessments for local improvements. As used in this sub-  
36 section, ‘property’ means real or tangible personal property, and intangible property that is part of  
37 a unit of real or tangible personal property to the extent that such intangible property is subject  
38 to a tax on property.

39 “**SECTION 18.** ORS 310.630, as amended by section 18, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
40 amended to read:

41 “310.630. As used in ORS 310.630 to 310.706:

42 “(1) ‘Contract rent’ means rental paid to the landlord for the right to occupy a homestead, in-  
43 cluding the right to use the personal property located therein. ‘Contract rent’ does not include  
44 rental paid for the right to occupy a homestead that is exempt from taxation, unless payments in lieu  
45 of taxes of 10 percent or more of the rental exclusive of fuel and utilities are made on behalf of the

1 homestead. 'Contract rent' does not include advanced rental payments for another period and rental  
2 deposits, whether or not expressly set out in the rental agreement, or payments made to a nonprofit  
3 home for the elderly described in ORS 307.375. If a landlord and tenant have not dealt with each  
4 other at arm's length, and the Department of Revenue is satisfied that the contract rent charged  
5 was excessive, it may adjust the contract rent to a reasonable amount for purposes of ORS 310.630  
6 to 310.706.

7 "(2) 'Department' means the Department of Revenue.

8 "(3) 'Fuel and utility payments' includes payments for heat, lights, water, sewer and garbage  
9 made solely to secure those commodities or services for the homestead of the taxpayer. 'Fuel and  
10 utility payments' does not include telephone service.

11 "(4) 'Gross rent' means contract rent paid plus the fuel and utility payments made for the  
12 homestead in addition to the contract rent, during the calendar year for which the claim is filed.

13 "(5) 'Homestead' means the taxable principal dwelling located in Oregon, either real or personal  
14 property, rented by the taxpayer, and the taxable land area of the tax lot upon which it is built.

15 "(6) 'Household' means the taxpayer, the spouse of the taxpayer and all other persons residing  
16 in the homestead during any part of the calendar year for which a claim is filed.

17 "(7) 'Household income' means the aggregate income of the taxpayer and the spouse of the tax-  
18 payer who reside in the household, that was received during the calendar year for which the claim  
19 is filed. 'Household income' includes payments received by the taxpayer or the spouse of the tax-  
20 payer under the federal Social Security Act for the benefit of a minor child or minor children who  
21 are members of the household.

22 "(8) 'Income' means 'adjusted gross income' as defined in the federal Internal Revenue Code, as  
23 amended and in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013**, even when the amendments take ef-  
24 fect or become operative after that date, relating to the measurement of taxable income of individ-  
25 uals, estates and trusts, with the following modifications:

26 "(a) There shall be added to adjusted gross income the following items of otherwise exempt in-  
27 come:

28 "(A) The gross amount of any otherwise exempt pension less return of investment, if any.

29 "(B) Child support received by the taxpayer.

30 "(C) Inheritances.

17 taxation under section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code.

18 “(10) For a qualified loan defined in subsection (1)(i)(B) of this section financed through the  
19 purchase of bonds, the interest of which is exempt from federal taxation under section 103 of the  
20 Internal Revenue Code, the amount of finance charge that would have been charged under sub-  
21 section (2)(b) of this section is determined by reference to the finance charge that would have been  
22 charged if the federally tax exempt bonds had been issued and the tax credit under this section did  
23 not apply.

24 “(11) A lending institution may sell a qualified loan for which a certification has been executed  
25 to a qualified assignee whether or not the lending institution retains servicing of the qualified loan  
26 so long as a designated lending institution maintains records, annually verified by a loan servicer,  
27 that establish the amount of tax credit earned by the taxpayer throughout each year of eligibility.

28 “(12) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a lending institution that is a community de-  
29 velopment corporation organized under the Oregon Nonprofit Corporation Law may transfer all or  
30 part of a tax credit allowed under this section to one or more other lending institutions that are  
31 stockholders or members of the community development corporation or that otherwise participate  
32 through the community development corporation in the making of one or more qualified loans for  
33 which the tax credit under this section is allowed.

34 “(13) The lending institution shall file an annual statement with the Housing and Community  
35 Services Department, specifying that it has conformed with all requirements imposed by law to  
36 qualify for a tax credit under this section.

37 “(14) Notwithstanding subsection (1)(h) and (j) of this section, a qualified borrower on a loan to  
38 finance the construction, development, acquisition or rehabilitation of a manufactured dwelling park  
39 under subsection (5)(c) of this section must be a nonprofit corporation, manufactured dwelling park  
40 nonprofit cooperative, state governmental entity, local unit of government as defined in ORS 466.706  
41 or housing authority.

42 “(15) The Housing and Community Services Department and the Department of Revenue may  
43 adopt rules to carry out the provisions of this section.

44 “**SECTION 25.** ORS 348.841, as amended by section 25, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
45 amended to read:



1 “348.841. As used in ORS 348.841 to 348.873:

2 “(1) ‘Account’ means an individual account established in accordance with ORS 348.841 to  
3 348.873.

4 “(2) ‘Account owner’ means the person who has the right to withdraw funds from the account.  
5 The account owner may also be the designated beneficiary of the account.

6 “(3) ‘Board’ means the Oregon 529 College Savings Board established under ORS 348.849.

7 “(4) ‘Designated beneficiary’ means, except as provided in ORS 348.867, the individual designated  
8 at the time the account is opened as having the right to receive a qualified withdrawal for the  
9 payment of qualified higher education expenses, or if the designated beneficiary is replaced in ac-  
10 cordance with ORS 348.867, the replacement.

11 “(5) ‘Financial institution’ means a bank, a commercial bank, a national bank, a savings bank,  
12 a savings and loan, a thrift institution, a credit union, an insurance company, a trust company, a  
13 mutual fund, an investment firm or other similar entity authorized to do business in this state.

14 “(6) ‘Higher education institution’ means an eligible education institution as defined in section  
15 529(e)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code.

16 “(7) ‘Internal Revenue Code’ means the federal Internal Revenue Code as amended and in effect  
17 on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013**.

18 “(8) ‘Member of the family’ shall have the same meaning as contained in section 529(e) of the  
19 Internal Revenue Code.

20 “(9) ‘Network’ means the Oregon 529 College Savings Network established under ORS 348.841  
21 to 348.873.

22 “(10) ‘Nonqualified withdrawal’ means a withdrawal from an account that is not a qualified  
23 withdrawal.

24 “(11) ‘Qualified higher education expenses’ means tuition and other permitted expenses as set  
25 forth in section 529(e) of the Internal Revenue Code for the enrollment or attendance of a designated  
26 beneficiary at a higher education institution.

27 “(12) ‘Qualified withdrawal’ means a withdrawal made as prescribed under ORS 348.870 and  
28 made:

29 “(a) From an account to pay the qualified higher education expenses of the designated benefi-  
30 ciary;

31 “(b) As the result of the death or disability of the designated beneficiary;

32 “(c) As the result of a scholarship, allowance or payment described in section 135(d)(1)(A), (B)  
33 or (C) of the Internal Revenue Code that is received by the designated beneficiary, but only to the  
34 extent of the amount of the scholarship, allowance or payment; or

35 “(d) As a rollover or change in the designated beneficiary described in ORS 348.867.

36 “**SECTION 26.** ORS 458.670, as amended by section 26, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
37 amended to read:

38 “458.670. As used in this section and ORS 458.675 to 458.700, unless the context requires other-  
39 wise:

40 “(1) ‘Account holder’ means a resident of this state who:

41 “(a) Is 12 years of age or older;

42 “(b) Is a member of a lower income household; and

43 “(c) Has established an individual development account with a fiduciary organization.

44 “(2) ‘Fiduciary organization’ means an organization selected under ORS 458.695 to administer  
45 state moneys directed to individual development accounts and that is:

1 “(a) A nonprofit, fund raising organization that is exempt from taxation under section 501(c)(3)  
2 of the Internal Revenue Code as amended and in effect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013**; or

3 “(b) A federally recognized Oregon Indian tribe that is located, to a significant degree, within  
4 the boundaries of this state.

5 “(3) ‘Financial institution’ means:

6 “(a) An organization regulated under ORS chapters 706 to 716 or 723; or

7 “(b) In the case of individual development accounts established for the purpose described in ORS  
8 458.685 (1)(c), a financial institution as defined in ORS 348.841.

9 “(4) ‘Individual development account’ means a contract between an account holder and a  
10 fiduciary organization, for the deposit of funds into a financial institution by the account holder, and  
11 the deposit of matching funds into the financial institution by the fiduciary organization, to allow  
12 the account holder to accumulate assets for use toward achieving a specific purpose approved by  
13 the fiduciary organization.

14 “(5) ‘Lower income household’ means a household having an income equal to or less than the  
15 greater of the following:

16 “(a) 80 percent of the median household income for the area as determined by the Housing and  
17 Community Services Department. In making the determination, the department shall give consider-  
18 ation to any data on area household income published by the United States Department of Housing  
19 and Urban Development.

20 “(b) 200 percent of the poverty guidelines as determined by the Housing and Community Ser-  
21 vices Department. In making the determination, the department shall give consideration to poverty  
22 guidelines published by the United States Department of Health and Human Services and may con-  
23 sider other income data periodically published by other federal or Oregon agencies.

24 “(6) ‘Resident of this state’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 316.027.

25 “**SECTION 27.** ORS 657.010, as amended by section 27, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2012, is  
26 amended to read:

27 “657.010. As used in this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise:

28 “(1) ‘Base year’ means the first four of the last five completed calendar quarters preceding the  
29 benefit year.

30 “(2) ‘Benefits’ means the money allowances payable to unemployed persons under this chapter.

31 “(3) ‘Benefit year’ means a period of 52 consecutive weeks commencing with the first week with  
32 respect to which an individual files an initial valid claim for benefits, and thereafter the 52 consec-  
33 utive weeks period beginning with the first week with respect to which the individual next files an  
34 initial valid claim after the termination of the individual’s last preceding benefit year except that  
35 the benefit year shall be 53 weeks if the filing of an initial valid claim would result in overlapping  
36 any quarter of the base year of a previously filed initial valid claim.

37 “(4) ‘Calendar quarter’ means the period of three consecutive calendar months ending on March  
38 31, June 30, September 30 or December 31, or the approximate equivalent thereof, as the Director  
39 of the Employment Department may, by regulation, prescribe.

40 “(5) ‘Contribution’ or ‘contributions’ means the taxes, as defined in subsection (13) of this sec-  
41 tion, that are the money payments required by this chapter, or voluntary payments permitted, to be  
42 made to the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund.

43 “(6) ‘Educational institution,’ including an institution of higher education as defined in sub-  
44 section (9) of this section, means an institution:

45 “(a) In which participants, trainees or students are offered an organized course of study or

1 training designed to transfer to them knowledge, skills, information, doctrines, attitudes or abilities  
2 from, by or under the guidance of an instructor or teacher;

3 “(b) That is accredited, registered, approved, licensed or issued a permit to operate as a school  
4 by the Department of Education or other government agency, or that offers courses for credit that  
5 are transferable to an approved, registered or accredited school;

6 “(c) In which the course or courses of study or training that it offers may be academic, techni-  
7 cal, trade or preparation for gainful employment in a recognized occupation; and

8 “(d) In which the course or courses of study or training are offered on a regular and continuing  
9 basis.

10 “(7) ‘Employment office’ means a free public employment office or branch thereof, operated by  
11 this state or maintained as a part of a state-controlled system of public employment offices.

12 “(8) ‘Hospital’ means an organization that has been licensed, certified or approved by the Oregon  
13 Health Authority as a hospital.

14 “(9) ‘Institution of higher education’ means an educational institution that:

15 “(a) Admits as regular students only individuals having a certificate of graduation from a high  
16 school, or the recognized equivalent of such a certificate;

17 “(b) Is legally authorized in this state to provide a program of education beyond high school;

18 “(c) Provides an educational program for which it awards a bachelor’s or higher degree, or  
19 provides a program that is acceptable for full credit toward such a degree, a program of post-  
20 graduate or post-doctoral studies, or a program of training to prepare students for gainful employ-  
21 ment in a recognized occupation; and

22 “(d) Is a public or other nonprofit institution.

23 “(10) ‘Internal Revenue Code’ means the federal Internal Revenue Code, as amended and in ef-  
24 fect on [December 31, 2011] **January 3, 2013.**

25 “(11) ‘Nonprofit employing unit’ means an organization, or group of organizations, described in  
26 section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code that is exempt from income tax under section 501(a)  
27 of the Internal Revenue Code.

28 “(12) ‘State’ includes, in addition to the states of the United States of America, the District of  
29 Columbia and Puerto Rico. However, for all purposes of this chapter the Virgin Islands shall be  
30 considered a state on and after the day on which the United States Secretary of Labor first approves  
31 the Virgin Islands’ law under section 3304(a) of the Federal Unemployment Tax Act as amended by  
32 Public Law 94-566.

33 “(13) ‘Taxes’ means the money payments to the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund re-  
34 quired, or voluntary payments permitted, by this chapter.

35 “(14) ‘Valid claim’ means any claim for benefits made in accordance with ORS 657.260 if the  
36 individual meets the wages-paid-for-employment requirements of ORS 657.150.

37 “(15) ‘Week’ means any period of seven consecutive calendar days ending at midnight, as the  
38 director may, by regulation, prescribe. The director may by regulation prescribe that a ‘week’ shall  
39 be ‘in,’ ‘within,’ or ‘during’ the calendar quarter that includes the greater part of such week.

40 “**SECTION 28. Notwithstanding ORS 315.004, as used in ORS 315.266, ‘Internal Revenue**  
41 **Code’ means the federal Internal Revenue Code as amended and in effect on December 31,**  
42 **2011.**

43 “**SECTION 29. (1) Except as provided in subsections (2) and (3) of this section, section 28**  
44 **of this 2013 Act and the amendments to statutes by sections 1 to 27 of this 2013 Act apply**  
45 **to transactions or activities occurring on or after January 1, 2013, in tax years beginning on**

1 or after January 1, 2013.

2 “(2) The effective and applicable dates, and the exceptions, special rules and coordination  
3 with the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, relative to those dates, contained in the Middle  
4 Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act of 2012 (P.L. 112-96), the American Taxpayer Relief  
5 Act of 2012 (P.L. 112-240) and other federal law amending the Internal Revenue Code and  
6 enacted before January 3, 2013, apply for Oregon personal income and corporate excise and  
7 income tax purposes, to the extent they can be made applicable, in the same manner as they  
8 are applied under the Internal Revenue Code and related federal law.

9 “(3)(a) If a deficiency is assessed against any taxpayer for a tax year beginning before  
10 January 1, 2013, and the deficiency or any portion thereof is attributable to any retroactive  
11 treatment under the amendments to ORS 305.230, 305.494, 305.690, 307.130, 307.147, 308A.450,  
12 310.140, 310.630, 310.800, 314.011, 315.004, 316.012, 317.010, 317.097 and 348.841 by sections 11 to  
13 25 of this 2013 Act, then any interest or penalty assessed under ORS chapter 305, 314, 315,  
14 316, 317 or 318 with respect to the deficiency or portion thereof shall be canceled.

15 “(b) If a refund is due any taxpayer for a tax year beginning before January 1, 2013, and  
16 the refund or any portion thereof is due the taxpayer on account of any retroactive treat-  
17 ment under the amendments to ORS 305.230, 305.494, 305.690, 307.130, 307.147, 308A.450,  
18 310.140, 310.630, 310.800, 314.011, 315.004, 316.012, 317.010, 317.097 and 348.841 by sections 11 to  
19 25 of this 2013 Act, then notwithstanding ORS 305.270 or 314.415 or other law, the refund or  
20 portion thereof shall be paid without interest.

21 “(c) Any changes required because of the amendments to ORS 305.230, 305.494, 305.690,  
22 307.130, 307.147, 308A.450, 310.140, 310.630, 310.800, 314.011, 315.004, 316.012, 317.010, 317.097 and  
23 348.841 by sections 11 to 25 of this 2013 Act for a tax year beginning before January 1, 2013,  
24 shall be made by filing an amended return within the time prescribed by law.

25 “(d) If a taxpayer fails to file an amended return under paragraph (c) of this subsection,  
26 the Department of Revenue shall make any changes under paragraph (c) of this subsection  
27 on the return to which the changes relate within the period specified for issuing a notice of  
28 deficiency or claiming a refund as otherwise provided by law with respect to that return, or  
29 within one year after a return for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2013, and be-  
30 fore January 1, 2014, is filed, whichever period expires later.

31 “SECTION 30. This 2013 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the date on which the 2013  
32 regular session of the Seventy-seventh Legislative Assembly adjourns sine die.”.

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
