# House Bill 2660

Sponsored by Representative FREDERICK (Presession filed.)

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Renames crime of intimidation as hate crime.

Includes commission of assault in fourth degree as hate crime in first degree when committed by one person and motivated by perception of victim's race, color, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, disability or national origin.

Requires court to impose term of incarceration of at least 60 days when person is convicted of hate crime.

Modifies authority of certain law enforcement officials to bring civil action based on commission of hate crime.

Directs law enforcement agencies to report statistics regarding hate crimes to Department of Justice.

(1) Two or more persons acting together commit [the crime of intimidation] a hate crime in the first degree, if the persons: 7 8 (a)(A) Intentionally, knowingly or recklessly cause physical injury to another person because of 9 the actors' perception of that person's race, color, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, 10 disability or national origin; or (B) With criminal negligence cause physical injury to another person by means of a deadly 11 12 weapon because of the actors' perception of that person's race, color, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, disability or national origin; 13 (b) Intentionally, because of the actors' perception of another person's race, color, religion, 14 ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, disability or national origin, place another person in fear of 1516 imminent serious physical injury; or (c) Commit [such] acts [as] that would constitute [the crime of intimidation] a hate crime in the 1718 second degree, if undertaken by one person acting alone. (2) A person commits a hate crime in the first degree if the person: 19 (a) Intentionally, knowingly or recklessly causes physical injury to another person be-20 21cause of the actor's perception of that person's race, color, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual 22 orientation, disability or national origin; or 23(b) With criminal negligence causes physical injury to another person by means of a 24 deadly weapon because of the actor's perception of that person's race, color, religion, 25ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, disability or national origin. 26 [(2)] (3) [Intimidation] A hate crime in the first degree is a Class C felony.

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(4) When a person is convicted of violating subsection (1)(a) or (2) of this section, in addition to any other sentence the court may impose, the court shall impose a term of incarceration of at least 60 days. SECTION 2. ORS 166.155 is amended to read: 166.155. (1) A person commits [the crime of intimidation] a hate crime in the second degree if the person: (a) Tampers or interferes with property, having no right to do so nor reasonable ground to believe that the person has such right, with the intent to cause substantial inconvenience to another because of the person's perception of the other's race, color, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, disability or national origin; (b) Intentionally subjects another to offensive physical contact because of the person's perception of the other's race, color, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, disability or national origin; or (c) Intentionally, because of the person's perception of race, color, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, disability or national origin of another or of a member of the other's family, subjects the other person to alarm by threatening: (A) To inflict serious physical injury upon or to commit a felony affecting the other person, or a member of the person's family; or (B) To cause substantial damage to the property of the other person or of a member of the other person's family. (2) [Intimidation] A hate crime in the second degree is a Class A misdemeanor. (3) For purposes of this section, "property" means any tangible personal property or real property. SECTION 3. (1) If [any] the Attorney General or a district attorney has reasonable cause to believe that [any] a person or group of persons is engaged in violation of ORS 166.155 or 166.165, the Attorney General or district attorney may bring a civil claim for relief in the appropriate court, setting forth facts pertaining to [such] the violation, and request [such] relief as may be necessary to restrain or prevent [such] the violation. In addition to any other available remedy, the court: (a) May order the person or group to make restitution in specific amounts to a person

who suffered an ascertainable loss of money or property as a result of the violation.

(b) May make additional orders or judgments as may be necessary to restore to a person
in interest any moneys or property, real or personal, of which the person was deprived as a
result of the violation.

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(c) May impose a penalty of not more than \$250,000.

(d) Shall award reasonable attorney fees, expert witness fees and investigative costs to
 the Attorney General or district attorney if the Attorney General or district attorney pre vails in an action under this section.

(e) May award reasonable attorney fees and expert witness fees to a defendant who prevails in an action under this section if the court determines that the Attorney General or
district attorney had no objectively reasonable basis for asserting the claim or no reasonable
basis for appealing an adverse decision of the trial court.

(2) A temporary restraining order may be granted without prior notice to the person or
group if the court finds there is a threat of immediate harm to the public health, safety or
welfare. A temporary restraining order issued under this subsection may not exceed 10 days,

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2 (a) The order may be extended by court order for good cause shown for an amount of 3 time equal to the terms of the original order; or

4 (b) The order may be for any amount of time if the restrained person or group consents 5 to the terms of the order.

6 (3) Any claim for relief under this section does not prevent [any] **a** person from seeking any 7 other remedy otherwise available under law.

For purposes 16 of this paragraph, an act is outrageous in the extreme if the act is not described in paragraphs (a) to (e) of this subsection, but is similar in degree and is one that a reasonable person in that com-17 18 munity would consider to be so offensive as to warrant termination of the tenancy within 24 hours, 19 considering the seriousness of the act or the risk to others. An act that is outrageous in the extreme 20is more extreme or serious than an act that warrants a 30-day termination under ORS 90.392. Acts that are "outrageous in the extreme" include, but are not limited to, the following acts by a person: 2122(A) Prostitution, patronizing a prostitute or promoting prostitution, as described in ORS 167.007,

(B) Manufacture, delivery or possession of a controlled substance, as described in ORS 475.005,
 but not including:

(i) The medical use of marijuana in compliance with ORS 475.300 to 475.346;

(ii) Possession of, or delivery for no consideration of, less than one avoirdupois ounce of
 marijuana as described in ORS 475.860 (3) or 475.864 (3); or

29 (iii) Possession of prescription drugs;

30 (C) [Intimidation] A hate crime, as described in ORS 166.155 and 166.165; or

32(2) If the cause for a termination notice given pursuant to subsection (1) of this section is based upon the acts of the tenant's pet, the tenant may cure the cause and avoid termination of the 33 34 tenancy by removing the pet from the premises prior to the end of the notice period. The notice 35 must describe the right of the tenant to cure the cause. If the tenant returns the pet to the premises at any time after having cured the violation, the landlord, after at least 24 hours' written notice 36 37 specifying the subsequent presence of the offending pet, may terminate the rental agreement and 38 take possession as provided in ORS 105.105 to 105.168. The tenant does not have a right to cure this subsequent violation. 39

(3) For purposes of subsection (1) of this section, someone is in the tenant's control if that person enters or remains on the premises with the tenant's permission or consent after the tenant
reasonably knows or should know of that person's act or likelihood to commit any act of the type
described in subsection (1) of this section.

(4) An act can be proven to be outrageous in the extreme even if the act is one that does not
violate a criminal statute. Notwithstanding the references to criminal statutes in subsection (1)(f)

1 of this section, the landlord's burden of proof in an action for possession under subsection (1) of this 2 section is the civil standard of proof by a preponderance of the evidence.

3 (5) If a good faith effort by a landlord to terminate the tenancy under subsection (1)(f) of this 4 section and to recover possession of the rental unit under ORS 105.105 to 105.168 fails by decision 5 of the court, the landlord may not be found in violation of any state statute or local ordinance re-6 quiring the landlord to remove that tenant upon threat of fine, abatement or forfeiture as long as 7 the landlord continues to make a good faith effort to terminate the tenancy.

The fingerprint card with the notation "motion for setting aside conviction," or "motion for setting aside arrest record" as the case may be, shall be forwarded to the Department of State Police. Information resulting from the fingerprint search along with the fingerprint card shall be returned to the prosecuting attorney.

(b) When a prosecuting attorney is served with a copy of a motion to set aside a conviction under this section, the prosecuting attorney shall provide a copy of the motion and notice of the hearing date to the victim, if any, of the crime by mailing a copy of the motion and notice to the victim's last-known address.

(c) When a person makes a motion under subsection (1)(a) of this section, the person must pay a fee of \$80 to the Department of State Police. The person shall attach a certified check payable to the Department of State Police in the amount of \$80 to the fingerprint card that is served upon the prosecuting attorney. The office of the prosecuting attorney shall forward the check with the fingerprint card to the Department of State Police.

(d) In addition to the fee established under paragraph (c) of this subsection, when a person
makes a motion under subsection (1)(a) of this section the person must pay the filing fee established
under ORS 21.135.

(3) Upon hearing the motion, the court may require the filing of such affidavits and may require the taking of such proofs as the court deems proper. The court shall allow the victim to make a statement at the hearing. Except as otherwise provided in subsection (14) of this section, if the court determines that the circumstances and behavior of the applicant from the date of conviction, or from the date of arrest as the case may be, to the date of the hearing on the motion warrant setting aside the conviction, or the arrest record as the case may be, the court shall enter an appropriate order that shall state the original arrest charge and the conviction charge, if any and if different from the

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original, date of charge, submitting agency and disposition. The order shall further state that positive identification has been established by the Department of State Police and further identified as to Department of State Police number or submitting agency number. Upon the entry of the order, the applicant for purposes of the law shall be deemed not to have been previously convicted, or arrested as the case may be, and the court shall issue an order sealing the record of conviction and other official records in the case, including the records of arrest whether or not the arrest resulted in a further criminal proceeding.

8 (4) The clerk of the court shall forward a certified copy of the order to such agencies as directed 9 by the court. SECTION 13. This 2013 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 14 15peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2013 Act takes effect 16on its passage.

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
