## House Bill 3300

Sponsored by Representative BARNHART

## **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.** 

Requires State Geologist within State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries to appoint Mineral Resources Ombudsman. Specifies duties of Mineral Resources Ombudsman. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

- 2 Relating to the Mineral Resources Ombudsman; and declaring an emergency.
  - Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
  - SECTION 1. (1) The State Geologist within the State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries, appointed pursuant to ORS 516.120, after consultation with the Governor, shall appoint a Mineral Resources Ombudsman for matters related to mineral resources, including mining and mining claims. The ombudsman is under the supervision and control of the State Geologist and, after consultation with the Governor, the State Geologist may terminate the ombudsman.
    - (2) The Mineral Resources Ombudsman shall:
  - (a) Provide information and assistance to persons with regard to matters related to the mineral resources of the state.
  - (b) Act as a liaison with agencies, as that term is defined in ORS 183.310, on matters related to mining and mining claims, including those related to fill and removal, water pollution control and air contaminant discharges, in order to promote cooperation on matters of joint concern related to mineral resources.
  - (c) Report to the Governor in writing at least once each quarter as provided in ORS 182.500 (1).
  - (3) Public bodies, and persons that contract with public bodies, shall cooperate with the Mineral Resources Ombudsman as provided in ORS 182.500 (2).
  - <u>SECTION 2.</u> This 2013 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2013 Act takes effect on its passage.
