SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Establishes Oregon [*Supplemental*] Reinsurance Program to be administered by Oregon Medical Insurance Pool Board. Terminates Oregon Medical Insurance Pool and Temporary High Risk Pool Program. Ends Oregon [*Supplemental*] Reinsurance Program on December 31, 2016, and abolishes board on July 1, 2017.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

9 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

11 **ESTABLISHMENT OF THE**
12 **OREGON REINSURANCE PROGRAM**

13
14 **SECTION 1. The Oregon Reinsurance Program is established in the Oregon Health Au-**
15 **thority. The program shall be administered by the Oregon Medical Insurance Pool Board,**
16 **created in ORS 735.610, for the purposes of stabilizing the rates and premiums for individual**
17 **health benefit plans and providing greater financial certainty to consumers of health insur-**
18 **ance in this state by providing state reinsurance payments to insurers from assessments**
19 **described in section 2 of this 2013 Act.**

20 **SECTION 2. (1) As used in this section, section 1 of this 2013 Act and ORS 735.610:**

21 **(a) "Health benefit plan" has the meaning given that term in ORS 743.730.**

22 **(b) "Insurer" means an insurer described in ORS 735.605 (4)(a), (b) and (d).**

23 **(c) "Program" means the Oregon Reinsurance Program established in section 1 of this**
24 **2013 Act.**

25 **(d) "Reinsurance eligible health benefit plan" means a health benefit plan providing indi-**
26 **vidual coverage that:**

NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter [*italic and bracketed*] is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (A) Is delivered or issued for delivery in this state;

2 (B) Is not a grandfathered health plan as defined in ORS 743.730; and

3 (C) Meets the criteria prescribed by the Oregon Medical Insurance Pool Board under
4 subsection (2) of this section.

5 (e) "Reinsurance eligible individual" means an individual who is insured on or before
6 April 1, 2014, under a reinsurance eligible health benefit plan and who, on December 31, 2013,
7 was:

8 (A) Enrolled in the Oregon Medical Insurance Pool created in ORS 735.610 or the Tem-
9 porary High Risk Pool Program established in section 1, chapter 47, Oregon Laws 2010;

10 (B) Insured under a portability health benefit plan as defined in ORS 743.760; or

11 (C) Reinsured under the reinsurance program for children's coverage described in ORS
12 735.614 (1)(b).

13 (2) The board shall prescribe by rule the criteria for a health benefit plan to qualify for
14 reinsurance payments under the program. The criteria must be consistent with requirements
15 for:

16 (a) Premium rates under 42 U.S.C. 300gg;

17 (b) Guaranteed availability under 42 U.S.C. 300gg-1;

18 (c) Guaranteed renewability under 42 U.S.C. 300gg-2;

19 (d) Coverage of essential health benefits under 42 U.S.C. 18022; and

20 (e) Using a single risk pool under 42 U.S.C. 18032(c).

21 (3) An issuer of a reinsurance eligible health benefit plan becomes eligible for a reinsur-
22 ance payment when the claims costs for a reinsurance eligible individual's covered benefits
23 in a calendar year exceed the attachment point. The amount of the payment shall be the
24 product of the coinsurance rate and the issuer's claims costs for the reinsurance eligible
25 individual's claims costs that exceed the attachment point, up to the reinsurance cap, as
26 follows:

27 (a) For 2014:

28 (A) The attachment point is \$30,000.

29 (B) The reinsurance cap is \$300,000.

30 (C) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, the coinsurance rate is:

31 (i) Ten percent for claims costs above \$60,000 and up to and including \$250,000; and

32 (ii) Ninety percent for claims costs from \$30,000 and up to and including \$60,000 and above
33 \$250,000.

34 (b) The board may lower the coinsurance rate if the reinsurance claims incurred exceed
35 the total amount of the assessments collected under subsection (4) of this section.

36 (c) The board shall adopt by rule an attachment point, reinsurance cap and coinsurance
37 rate for calendar years 2015 and 2016 that complement the federal reinsurance program re-
38 quirements, so that the reinsurance claims do not exceed the total amount of the assess-
39 ments collected under subsection (4) of this section. After the rules required under this
40 paragraph are adopted for a calendar year, the board may not:

41 (A) Change the attachment point or the reinsurance cap adopted for that calendar year;

42 or

43 (B) Increase the coinsurance rate adopted for that calendar year.

44 (4) The board shall impose an assessment on all insurers at a rate that is expected to
45 produce an amount of funds sufficient to pay administrative expenses and to make reinsur-

1 **ance payments that are due to issuers of reinsurance eligible health benefit plans in a cal-**
2 **endar year, but not greater than the rate that would be expected to produce funds totaling**
3 **the lesser of:**

4 **(a) An amount per month multiplied by the number of insureds and certificate holders**
5 **in this state who are insured or reinsured; or**

6 **(b) The total assessment set forth in subsection (5) of this section.**

7 **(5) The amount per month and total assessment on all insurers are as follows:**

8 **(a) For calendar year 2014, the amount per month is \$4 and the total assessment is \$72**
9 **million.**

10 **(b) For calendar year 2015, the amount per month is \$3.50 and the total assessment is**
11 **\$63 million.**

12 **(c) For calendar year 2016, the amount per month is \$2.20 and the total assessment is**
13 **\$40 million.**

14 **(6) In determining the number of insureds and certificate holders in this state who are**
15 **insured or reinsured, the board shall exclude individuals with the following types of coverage:**

16 **(a) The medical assistance program under ORS chapter 414;**

17 **(b) Medicare;**

18 **(c) Disability income insurance;**

19 **(d) Hospital-only insurance;**

20 **(e) Dental-only insurance;**

21 **(f) Vision-only insurance;**

22 **(g) Accident-only insurance;**

23 **(h) Automobile insurance;**

24 **(i) Specific disease insurance;**

25 **(j) Medical supplemental plans;**

26 **(k) TRICARE;**

27 **(L) Prescription drug only plans;**

28 **(m) Long term care insurance; and**

29 **(n) Federal Employees Health Benefits Program.**

30 **(7) If the board collects assessments that exceed the amount necessary to pay adminis-**
31 **trative expenses and to make all of the reinsurance payments that are due to issuers of re-**
32 **insurance eligible health benefit plans in calendar years 2014, 2015 and 2016, the board shall**
33 **refund the excess, on a pro rata basis, to insurers who are subject to the assessment im-**
34 **posed by subsection (4) of this section.**

35 **(8) The board may not impose an assessment under subsection (4) of this section for**
36 **calendar years beginning with 2017.**

37 **(9) All moneys received or collected by the board under this section shall be paid into the**
38 **Oregon Medical Insurance Pool Account established in ORS 735.612.**

39 **(10) The board, in consultation with the Department of Consumer and Business Services,**
40 **may adopt rules necessary to carry out the provisions of this section including, but not**
41 **limited to, rules prescribing:**

42 **(a) The eligibility requirements for participation in the program by an issuer of a rein-**
43 **surance eligible health benefit plan;**

44 **(b) The form and manner of issuing notices of assessment amounts;**

45 **(c) The amount, manner and frequency of the payment and collection of assessments;**

1 (d) The amount, manner and frequency of reinsurance payments; and

2 (e) Reporting requirements for insurers subject to the assessment and for issuers of re-
3 insurance eligible health benefit plans.

4 **SECTION 3.** Sections 4 and 4a of this 2013 Act are added to and made a part of the In-
5 surance Code.

6 **SECTION 4.** (1) As used in this section:

7 (a) "Health benefit plan" has the meaning given that term in ORS 743.730.

8 (b) "Oregon Medical Insurance Pool Board" means the board created in ORS 735.610.

9 (c) "Oregon Reinsurance Program" means the program created in section 1 of this 2013
10 Act.

11 (d) "Reinsurance eligible individual" has the meaning given that term in section 2 of this
12 2013 Act.

13 (2) An insurer that offers a health benefit plan must report to the Oregon Medical In-
14 surance Pool Board, in the form and manner prescribed by the board by rule, information
15 about reinsurance eligible individuals insured by the health benefit plan, as necessary for the
16 board to calculate reinsurance payments under the Oregon Reinsurance Program.

17 **SECTION 4a.** In a rate filing under ORS 743.018, an insurer must identify the impact of:

18 (1) State reinsurance payments under section 2 of this 2013 Act and federal reinsurance
19 payments on projected claims costs and in the development of rates; and

20 (2) Assessments imposed under section 2 of this 2013 Act on rates.

21 **SECTION 5.** ORS 731.509 is amended to read:

22 731.509. (1) The purpose of ORS 731.509, 731.510, 731.511, 731.512 and 731.516 is to protect the
23 interests of insureds, claimants, ceding insurers, assuming insurers and the public generally. The
24 Legislative Assembly declares that its intent is to ensure adequate regulation of insurers and re-
25 insurers and adequate protection for those to whom they owe obligations. In furtherance of that
26 state interest, the Legislative Assembly mandates that upon the insolvency of an alien insurer or
27 reinsurer that provides security to fund its United States obligations in accordance with ORS
28 731.509, 731.510, 731.511, 731.512 and 731.516, the assets representing the security shall be main-
29 tained in the United States and claims shall be filed with and valued by the state insurance com-
30 missioner with regulatory oversight, and the assets shall be distributed in accordance with the
31 insurance laws of the state in which the trust is domiciled that are applicable to the liquidation of
32 domestic United States insurers. The Legislative Assembly declares that the laws contained in ORS
33 731.509, 731.510, 731.511, 731.512 and 731.516 are fundamental to the business of insurance in ac-
34 cordance with 15 U.S.C. 1011 and 1012.

35 (2) The Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services shall not allow credit for
36 reinsurance to a domestic ceding insurer as either an asset or a reduction from liability on account
37 of reinsurance ceded unless credit is allowed as provided under ORS 731.508 and unless the re-
38 insurer meets the requirements of:

39 (a) Subsection (3) of this section;

40 (b) Subsection (4) of this section;

41 (c) Subsections (5) and (8) of this section;

42 (d) Subsections (6) and (8) of this section; [or]

43 (e) Subsection (7) of this section[.]; or

44 (f) **Subsection (9) of this section.**

45 (3) Credit shall be allowed when the reinsurance is ceded to an authorized assuming insurer that

1 accepts reinsurance of risks, and retains risk thereon within such limits, as the assuming insurer is
2 otherwise authorized to insure in this state as provided in ORS 731.508.

3 (4) Credit shall be allowed when the reinsurance is ceded to an assuming insurer that is ac-
4 credited as a reinsurer in this state as provided in ORS 731.511. The director shall not allow credit
5 to a domestic ceding insurer if the accreditation of the assuming insurer has been revoked by the
6 director after notice and opportunity for hearing.

7 (5) Credit shall be allowed when the reinsurance is ceded to a foreign assuming insurer or a
8 United States branch of an alien assuming insurer meeting all of the following requirements:

9 (a) The foreign assuming insurer must be domiciled in a state employing standards regarding
10 credit for reinsurance that equal or exceed the standards applicable under this section. The United
11 States branch of an alien assuming insurer must be entered through a state employing such stan-
12 dards.

13 (b) The foreign assuming insurer or United States branch of an alien assuming insurer must
14 maintain a combined capital and surplus in an amount not less than \$20,000,000. The requirement
15 of this paragraph does not apply to reinsurance ceded and assumed pursuant to pooling arrange-
16 ments among insurers in the same holding company system.

17 (c) The foreign assuming insurer or United States branch of an alien assuming insurer must
18 submit to the authority of the director to examine its books and records.

19 (6) Credit shall be allowed when the reinsurance is ceded to an assuming insurer that maintains
20 a trust fund meeting the requirements of this subsection and additionally complies with other re-
21 quirements of this subsection. The trust fund must be maintained in a qualified United States fi-
22 nancial institution, as defined in ORS 731.510 (1), for the payment of the valid claims of its United
23 States policyholders and ceding insurers and their assigns and successors in interest. The assuming
24 insurer must report annually to the director information substantially the same as that required to
25 be reported on the annual statement form by ORS 731.574 by authorized insurers, in order to enable
26 the director to determine the sufficiency of the trust fund. The following requirements apply to such
27 a trust fund:

28 (a) In the case of a single assuming insurer, the trust fund must consist of funds in trust in an
29 amount not less than the assuming insurer's liabilities attributable to reinsurance ceded by United
30 States ceding insurers. In addition, the assuming insurer must maintain a trustee surplus of not less
31 than \$20,000,000.

32 (b) In the case of a group including incorporated and individual unincorporated underwriters:

33 (A) For reinsurance ceded under reinsurance agreements with an inception, amendment or re-
34 newal date on or after August 1, 1995, the trust shall consist of a trustee account in an amount
35 not less than the group's several liabilities attributable to business ceded by United States domiciled
36 ceding insurers to any member of the group.

37 (B) For reinsurance ceded under reinsurance agreements with an inception date on or before
38 July 31, 1995, and not amended or renewed after that date, notwithstanding the other provisions of
39 ORS 731.509, 731.510, 731.511, 731.512 and 731.516, the trust shall consist of a trustee account in
40 an amount not less than the group's several insurance and reinsurance liabilities attributable to
41 business written in the United States.

42 (C) In addition to the trusts described in subparagraphs (A) and (B) of this paragraph, the group
43 shall maintain in trust a trustee surplus of which \$100,000,000 shall be held jointly for the benefit
44 of the United States domiciled ceding insurers of any member of the group for all years of account.

45 (D) The incorporated members of the group shall not be engaged in any business other than

1 underwriting as a member of the group and shall be subject to the same level of regulation and
2 solvency control by the group's domiciliary regulator as are the unincorporated members.

3 (E) Within 90 days after the group's financial statements are due to be filed with the group's
4 domiciliary regulator, the group shall provide to the director an annual certification by the group's
5 domiciliary regulator of the solvency of each underwriter member or, if certification is unavailable,
6 financial statements of each underwriter member of the group prepared by independent certified
7 public accountants.

8 (c) In the case of a group of incorporated insurers described in this paragraph, the trust must
9 be in an amount equal to the group's several liabilities attributable to business ceded by United
10 States ceding insurers to any member of the group pursuant to reinsurance contracts issued in the
11 name of the group. This paragraph applies to a group of incorporated insurers under common ad-
12 ministration that complies with the annual reporting requirements contained in this subsection and
13 that has continuously transacted an insurance business outside the United States for at least three
14 years immediately prior to making application for accreditation. Such a group must have an aggre-
15 gate policyholders' surplus of \$10,000,000,000 and must submit to the authority of this state to ex-
16 amine its books and records and bear the expense of the examination. The group shall also maintain
17 a joint trusteed surplus of which \$100,000,000 must be held jointly for the benefit of United States
18 ceding insurers of any member of the group as additional security for any such liabilities. Each
19 member of the group shall make available to the director an annual certification of the member's
20 solvency by the member's domiciliary regulator and its independent certified public accountant.

21 (d) The form of the trust and any amendment to the trust shall have been approved by the in-
22 surance commissioner of the state in which the trust is domiciled or by the insurance commissioner
23 of another state who, pursuant to the terms of the trust instrument, has accepted principal regula-
24 tory oversight of the trust.

25 (e) The form of the trust and any trust amendments also shall be filed with the insurance com-
26 missioner of every state in which the ceding insurer beneficiaries of the trust are domiciled. The
27 trust instrument must provide that contested claims shall be valid and enforceable upon the final
28 order of any court of competent jurisdiction in the United States. The trust must vest legal title to
29 its assets in its trustees for the benefit of the assuming insurer's United States ceding insurers and
30 their assigns and successors in interest. The trust and the assuming insurer are subject to exam-
31 ination as determined by the director. The trust must remain in effect for as long as the assuming
32 insurer has outstanding obligations due under the reinsurance agreements subject to the trust.

33 (f) Not later than March 1 of each year, the trustees of each trust shall report to the director
34 in writing the balance of the trust and listing the trust's investments at the preceding year end, and
35 shall certify the date of termination of the trust, if so planned, or certify that the trust will not
36 expire prior to the following December 31.

37 (7) Credit shall be allowed when the reinsurance is ceded to an assuming insurer not meeting
38 the requirements of subsection (3), (4), (5) or (6) of this section, but only as to the insurance of risks
39 located in jurisdictions in which the reinsurance is required by applicable law or regulation of that
40 jurisdiction.

41 (8) If the assuming insurer is not authorized to transact insurance in this state or accredited
42 as a reinsurer in this state, the director shall not allow the credit permitted by subsections (5) and
43 (6) of this section unless the assuming insurer agrees in the reinsurance agreement to the provisions
44 stated in this subsection. This subsection is not intended to conflict with or override the obligation
45 of the parties to a reinsurance agreement to arbitrate their disputes, if such an obligation is created

1 in the agreement. The assuming insurer must agree in the reinsurance agreement:

2 (a) That in the event of the failure of the assuming insurer to perform its obligations under the
3 terms of the reinsurance agreement, the assuming insurer, at the request of the ceding insurer, shall
4 submit to the jurisdiction of any court of competent jurisdiction in any state of the United States,
5 will comply with all requirements necessary to give the court jurisdiction and will abide by the final
6 decision of the court or of any appellate court in the event of an appeal; and

7 (b) To designate the director or a designated attorney as its true and lawful attorney upon whom
8 any lawful process in any action, suit or proceeding instituted by or on behalf of the ceding company
9 may be served.

10 **(9) Credit shall be allowed when the reinsurance is ceded to the Oregon Reinsurance**
11 **Program established in section 1 of this 2013 Act.**

12 [(9)] (10) If the assuming insurer does not meet the requirements of subsection (3), (4) or (5) of
13 this section, the credit permitted by subsection (6) of this section shall not be allowed unless the
14 assuming insurer agrees in the trust agreements to the following conditions:

15 (a) Notwithstanding any other provisions in the trust instrument, if the trust fund is inadequate
16 because it contains an amount less than the applicable amount required by subsection (6)(a), (b) or
17 (c) of this section, or if the grantor of the trust has been declared insolvent or placed into
18 receivership, rehabilitation, liquidation or similar proceedings under the laws of the grantor's state
19 or country of domicile, the trustee shall comply with an order of the insurance commissioner with
20 regulatory oversight over the trust or with an order of a court of competent jurisdiction directing
21 the trustee to transfer to the insurance commissioner with regulatory oversight all the assets of the
22 trust fund.

23 (b) The assets shall be distributed by and claims shall be filed with and valued by the insurance
24 commissioner with regulatory oversight in accordance with the laws of the state in which the trust
25 is domiciled that are applicable to the liquidation of domestic insurance companies.

26 (c) If the insurance commissioner with regulatory oversight determines that the assets of the
27 trust fund or any part thereof are not necessary to satisfy the claims of the United States ceding
28 insurers of the grantor of the trust, the assets or part thereof shall be returned by the insurance
29 commissioner according to the laws of that state and according to the terms of the trust agreement
30 not inconsistent with the laws of that state.

31 (d) The grantor shall waive any right otherwise available to it under United States law that is
32 inconsistent with this subsection.

33 **SECTION 6.** ORS 735.610 is amended to read:

34 735.610. (1) There is created in the Oregon Health Authority the Oregon Medical Insurance Pool
35 Board. The board shall establish the Oregon Medical Insurance Pool and otherwise carry out the
36 responsibilities of the board under ORS 735.600 to 735.650 **and sections 1, 2 and 4 of this 2013**
37 **Act.**

38 (2)(a) The board shall consist of [10] **12** individuals, [eight] **10** of whom shall be appointed by the
39 Director of the Oregon Health Authority. The Director of the Department of Consumer and Business
40 Services or the director's designee and the Director of the Oregon Health Authority or the director's
41 designee shall be members of the board. The chair of the board shall be elected from among the
42 members of the board. The board shall at all times, to the extent possible, include at least:

43 **(A)** One representative of a domestic insurance company licensed to transact health
44 insurance[.];

45 **(B)** One representative of a domestic not-for-profit health care service contractor[.];

1 (C) One representative of a health maintenance organization[.];

2 (D) One representative of reinsurers; and

3 (E) *[two]* **Four** members of the general public:

4 (i) Who are not associated with the medical profession, a hospital or an insurer[.]; **and**

5 (ii) **Two of whom represent businesses that purchase health insurance coverage that is**
6 **subject to the assessments under section 2 of this 2013 Act.**

7 (b) A majority of the voting members of the board constitutes a quorum for the transaction of
8 business. An act by a majority of a quorum is an official act of the board.

9 (3) The Director of the Oregon Health Authority may fill any vacancy on the board by ap-
10 pointment.

11 (4) The board shall have the *[general powers and authority under the laws of this state granted*
12 *to insurance companies with a certificate of authority to transact health insurance and the]* specific
13 authority to:

14 (a) Enter into such contracts as are necessary or proper to carry out the provisions and pur-
15 poses of ORS 735.600 to 735.650 including the authority to enter into contracts with similar pools
16 of other states for the joint performance of common administrative functions, or with persons or
17 other organizations for the performance of administrative functions;

18 (b) Recover any assessments for, on behalf of, or against insurers;

19 (c) Take such legal action as is necessary to avoid the payment of improper claims against the
20 pool or the coverage provided by or through the pool;

21 *[(d) Establish appropriate rates, rate schedules, rate adjustments, expense allowances, insurance*
22 *producers' referral fees, claim reserves or formulas and perform any other actuarial function appro-*
23 *priate to the operation of the pool. Rates may not be unreasonable in relation to the coverage provided,*
24 *the risk experience and expenses of providing the coverage. Rates and rate schedules may be adjusted*
25 *for appropriate risk factors such as age and area variation in claim costs and shall take into consid-*
26 *eration appropriate risk factors in accordance with established actuarial and underwriting practices;]*

27 *[(e) Issue policies of insurance in accordance with the requirements of ORS 735.600 to 735.650;]*

28 *[(f)]* (d) Appoint from among insurers appropriate actuarial and other committees as necessary
29 to provide technical assistance in the operation of the pool¹, *[policy and other contract design]* **and**
30 **the Oregon Reinsurance Program**, and for any other function within the authority of the board;

31 *[(g)]* (e) Seek advances to effect the purposes of the pool **and the program**; and

32 *[(h)]* (f) Establish rules, conditions and procedures for reinsuring risks under ORS 735.600 to
33 735.650 **and the operation of and participation of issuers of reinsurance eligible health benefit**
34 **plans in the program.**

35 (5) Each member of the board is entitled to compensation and expenses as provided in ORS
36 292.495.

37 (6) The Director of the Oregon Health Authority shall adopt rules, as provided under ORS
38 chapter 183, implementing policies recommended by the board for the purpose of carrying out ORS
39 735.600 to 735.650 **and sections 1, 2 and 4 of this 2013 Act.**

40 (7) In consultation with the board, the Director of the Oregon Health Authority shall employ
41 such staff and consultants as may be necessary for the purpose of carrying out responsibilities under
42 ORS 735.600 to 735.650 **and sections 1, 2 and 4 of this 2013 Act.**

43 **SECTION 7.** ORS 735.630 is amended to read:

44 735.630. Neither participation in the **Oregon Medical Insurance Pool or the Oregon Rein-**
45 **surance Program** as members, the establishment of rates, forms or procedures, nor any other

1 action taken in the performance of the powers and duties under ORS 735.600 to 735.650 **and**
2 **sections 1, 2 and 4 of this 2013 Act**, shall be the basis of any legal action, criminal or civil liability
3 or penalty against the Oregon Medical Insurance Pool Board, any members, the Director of the
4 Oregon Health Authority, **the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services**

1 (2) A fraternal benefit society that has maintained lodges in this state and other states for 50
2 years prior to January 1, 1961, and for which a certificate of authority was not required on that

4 (3) A religious organization providing insurance benefits only to its employees, if the organiza-
5 tion is in existence and exempt from taxation under section 501(c)(3) of the federal Internal Revenue
6 Code on September 13, 1975.

7 (4) Public bodies, as defined in ORS 30.260, that either individually or jointly establish a self-
8 insurance program for tort liability in accordance with ORS 30.282.

9 (5) Public bodies, as defined in ORS 30.260, that either individually or jointly establish a self-
10 insurance program for property damage in accordance with ORS 30.282.

11 (6) Cities, counties, school districts, community college districts, community college service dis-
12 tricts or districts, as defined in ORS 198.010 and 198.180, that either individually or jointly insure
13 for health insurance coverage, excluding disability insurance, their employees or retired employees,
14 or their dependents, or students engaged in school activities, or combination of employees and de-
15 pendants, with or without employee or student contributions, if all of the following conditions are
16 met:

17 (a) The individual or jointly self-insured program meets the following minimum requirements:

18 (A) In the case of a school district, community college district or community college service
19 district, the number of covered employees and dependents and retired employees and dependents
20 aggregates at least 500 individuals;

21 (B) In the case of an individual public body program other than a school district, community
22 college district or community college service district, the number of covered employees and depen-
23 dents and retired employees and dependents aggregates at least 500 individuals; and

24 (C) In the case of a joint program of two or more public bodies, the number of covered em-
25 ployees and dependents and retired employees and dependents aggregates at least 1,000 individuals;

26 (b) The individual or jointly self-insured health insurance program includes all coverages and
27 benefits required of group health insurance policies under ORS chapters 743 and 743A;

28 (c) The individual or jointly self-insured program must have program documents that define
29 program benefits and administration;

30 (d) Enrollees must be provided copies of summary plan descriptions including:

31 (A) Written general information about services provided, access to services, charges and sched-
32 uling applicable to each enrollee's coverage;

33 (B) The program's grievance and appeal process; and

34 (C) Other group health plan enrollee rights, disclosure or written procedure requirements es-
35 tablished under ORS chapters 743 and 743A;

36 (e) The financial administration of an individual or jointly self-insured program must include the
37 following requirements:

38 (A) Program contributions and reserves must be held in separate accounts and used for the ex-
39 clusive benefit of the program;

40 (B) The program must maintain adequate reserves. Reserves may be invested in accordance with
41 the provisions of ORS chapter 293. Reserve adequacy must be calculated annually with proper
42 actuarial calculations including the following:

43 (i) Known claims, paid and outstanding;

44 (ii) A history of incurred but not reported claims;

45 (iii) Claims handling expenses;

1 (iv) Unearned contributions; and

2 (v) A claims trend factor; and

3 (C) The program must maintain adequate reinsurance against the risk of economic loss in ac-
4 cordance with the provisions of ORS 742.065 unless the program has received written approval for
5 an alternative arrangement for protection against economic loss from the Director of the Depart-
6 ment of Consumer and Business Services;

7 (f) The individual or jointly self-insured program must have sufficient personnel to service the
8 employee benefit program or must contract with a third party administrator licensed under ORS
9 chapter 744 as a third party administrator to provide such services;

11 with *[ORS 735.614 and former enrollees shall be eligible for portability coverage in accordance with*

17 annually, a financial report showing the total incurred cost of the program for the preceding year.

21 others for benefits under the program in the event, and to the extent, that no further funds, in-

38 or other occurrence, as specified in the agreement. The exemption established in this subsection
39 applies to the following persons:

40 (A) The seller of the motor vehicle, if the sale is made pursuant to a motor vehicle retail in-

42 (B) The lessor of the motor vehicle.

31 **SECTION 13.** ORS 734.790 is amended to read:

32 734.790. (1) ORS 734.750 to 734.890 provide coverage for policies and contracts specified in sub-
33 section (2) of this section to the following persons who are not provided coverage under the laws
34 of another state:

35 (a) To a person who is a resident, if the person is an owner of or a certificate holder under the
36 policy or contract other than a structured settlement annuity or, in the case of an unallocated an-
37 nuity contract, an employee participating in a governmental retirement plan established under sec-
38 tion 401, 403(b) or 457 of the United States Internal Revenue Code or the beneficiaries of each such
39 individual if deceased.

40 (b) To a person who is not a resident, if the person is an owner of or a certificate holder under
41 the policy or contract other than a structured settlement annuity or, in the case of an unallocated
42 annuity contract, an employee participating in a governmental retirement plan established under
43 section 401, 403(b) or 457 of the United States Internal Revenue Code or the beneficiaries of each
44 such individual if deceased. This paragraph applies to a person who is not a resident only if all of
45 the following conditions are met:

1 (A) The insurer that issued the policy or contract must be a member insurer.

2 (B) The state in which the person resides must have an association similar to the Oregon Life
3 and Health Insurance Guaranty Association.

4 (C) The person must not be eligible for coverage by an association in the state in which the
5 person resides, as described in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph, due to the fact that the insurer
6 was not authorized to transact insurance or licensed in that state at the time specified in the state's
7 guaranty association law.

8 (c) To a person who, regardless of where the person resides, is a beneficiary, assignee or payee
9 of the persons covered under paragraph (a) or (b) of this subsection. This paragraph does not include
10 a nonresident certificate holder under a group policy or contract.

11 (d) To a person who is a payee under a structured settlement annuity, or to the beneficiary of
12 a payee if the payee is deceased, if the payee:

13 (A) Is a resident, regardless of where the contract owner resides; or

14 (B) Is not a resident, but only under both of the following conditions:

15 (i) The contract owner of the structured settlement annuity is a resident and is not afforded any
16 coverage by an association in another state that is similar to the association created under ORS

35 (e) Any portion of a policy or contract to the extent that the interest rate on which the policy
36 or contract is based, or to the extent that the interest rate, crediting rate or similar factor deter-
37 mined by use of an index or other external reference stated in the policy or contract for the purpose
38 of calculating returns or changes in value:

39 (A) Exceeds, when averaged over the period of four years prior to the date on which the member
40 insurer becomes either an impaired or insolvent insurer under ORS 734.750 to 734.890, whichever
41 occurs first, a rate of interest determined by subtracting four percentage points from Moody's Cor-
42 porate Bond Yield Average averaged for that same four-year period or for a lesser period if the
43 policy or contract was issued less than four years before the member insurer becomes either an
44 impaired or insolvent insurer under ORS 734.750 to 734.890, whichever occurred first; and

45 (B) Exceeds, on and after the date on which the member insurer becomes either an impaired or

1 insolvent insurer under ORS 734.750 to 734.890, whichever occurs first, the rate of interest deter-

4 (f) Any portion of a policy or contract issued to a plan or program of an employer, association

8 (A) A multiple employer welfare arrangement as defined in section 3(40) (29 U.S.C. 1002(40)) of

26 *[(L)]* (k) Any portion of a policy or contract to the extent that the assessments required by ORS
27 734.815 with respect to the policy or contract are preempted by federal or state law.

28 *[(m)]* (L) An obligation that does not arise under the express written terms of the policy or
29 contract issued by the insurer to the policyholder or contract owner, including but not limited to:

30 (A) Claims based on marketing materials;

31 (B) Claims based on side letters, riders or other documents that were issued by the insurer
32 without meeting applicable policy or contract form filing or approval requirements;

33 (C) Misrepresentations of, or regarding, policy or contract benefits;

34 (D) Extracontractual claims, including but not limited to claims related to bad faith in the pay-
35 ment of claims, punitive or exemplary damages or attorney fees or costs; or

5 (B) A multiple employer welfare arrangement subject to ORS 750.301 to 750.341; or

19 [(27) "*Oregon Medical Insurance Pool*" means the pool created under ORS 735.610.]

20 [(28)] (27) "Preexisting condition exclusion" means a health benefit plan provision applicable to
21 an enrollee or late enrollee that excludes coverage for services, charges or expenses incurred during
22 a specified period immediately following enrollment for a condition for which medical advice, diag-
23 nosis, care or treatment was recommended or received during a specified period immediately pre-
24 ceding enrollment. For purposes of ORS 743.730 to 743.773:

25 (a) Pregnancy does not constitute a preexisting condition except as provided in ORS 743.766;

26 (b) Genetic information does not constitute a preexisting condition in the absence of a diagnosis
27 of the condition related to such information; and

28 (c) Except for coverage under an individual grandfathered health plan, a preexisting condition
29 exclusion may not exclude coverage for services, charges or expenses incurred by an individual who

31 [(29)] (28) "Premium" includes insurance premiums or other fees charged for a health benefit

The crediting of prior coverage in accordance with this subsection shall be applied without regard to the specific benefits covered during the prior period.

23 **SECTION 35.** ORS 731.509, as amended by section 5 of this 2013 Act, is amended to read:

24 731.509. (1) The purpose of ORS 731.509, 731.510, 731.511, 731.512 and 731.516 is to protect the
25 interests of insureds, claimants, ceding insurers, assuming insurers and the public generally. The
26 Legislative Assembly declares that its intent is to ensure adequate regulation of insurers and re-
27 insurers and adequate protection for those to whom they owe obligations. In furtherance of that
28 state interest, the Legislative Assembly mandates that upon the insolvency of an alien insurer or
29 reinsurer that provides security to fund its United States obligations in accordance with ORS
30 731.509, 731.510, 731.511, 731.512 and 731.516, the assets representing the security shall be main-
31 tained in the United States and claims shall be filed with and valued by the state insurance com-
32 missioner with regulatory oversight, and the assets shall be distributed in accordance with the
33 insurance laws of the state in which the trust is domiciled that are applicable to the liquidation of
34 domestic United States insurers. The Legislative Assembly declares that the laws contained in ORS
35 731.509, 731.510, 731.511, 731.512 and 731.516 are fundamental to the business of insurance in ac-
36 cordance with 15 U.S.C. 1011 and 1012.

37 (2) The Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services shall not allow credit for
38 reinsurance to a domestic ceding insurer as either an asset or a reduction from liability on account
39 of reinsurance ceded unless credit is allowed as provided under ORS 731.508 and unless the re-
40 insurer meets the requirements of:

41 (a) Subsection (3) of this section;

42 (b) Subsection (4) of this section;

43 (c) Subsections (5) and (8) of this section;

44 (d) Subsections (6) and (8) of this section; **or**

45 (e) Subsection (7) of this section; *or*].

1 *[(f) Subsection (9) of this section.]*

2 (3) Credit shall be allowed when the reinsurance is ceded to an authorized assuming insurer that
3 accepts reinsurance of risks, and retains risk thereon within such limits, as the assuming insurer is
4 otherwise authorized to insure in this state as provided in ORS 731.508.

5 (4) Credit shall be allowed when the reinsurance is ceded to an assuming insurer that is ac-
6 credited as a reinsurer in this state as provided in ORS 731.511. The director shall not allow credit
7 to a domestic ceding insurer if the accreditation of the assuming insurer has been revoked by the
8 director after notice and opportunity for hearing.

9 (5) Credit shall be allowed when the reinsurance is ceded to a foreign assuming insurer or a
10 United States branch of an alien assuming insurer meeting all of the following requirements:

11 (a) The foreign assuming insurer must be domiciled in a state employing standards regarding
12 credit for reinsurance that equal or exceed the standards applicable under this section. The United
13 States branch of an alien assuming insurer must be entered through a state employing such stan-
14 dards.

15 (b) The foreign assuming insurer or United States branch of an alien assuming insurer must
16 maintain a combined capital and surplus in an amount not less than \$20,000,000. The requirement
17 of this paragraph does not apply to reinsurance ceded and assumed pursuant to pooling arrange-
18 ments among insurers in the same holding company system.

19 (c) The foreign assuming insurer or United States branch of an alien assuming insurer must
20 submit to the authority of the director to examine its books and records.

21 (6) Credit shall be allowed when the reinsurance is ceded to an assuming insurer that maintains
22 a trust fund meeting the requirements of this subsection and additionally complies with other re-
23 quirements of this subsection. The trust fund must be maintained in a qualified United States fi-
24 nancial institution, as defined in ORS 731.510 (1), for the payment of the valid claims of its United
25 States policyholders and ceding insurers and their assigns and successors in interest. The assuming
26 insurer must report annually to the director information substantially the same as that required to
27 be reported on the annual statement form by ORS 731.574 by authorized insurers, in order to enable
28 the director to determine the sufficiency of the trust fund. The following requirements apply to such
29 a trust fund:

30 (a) In the case of a single assuming insurer, the trust fund must consist of funds in trust in an
31 amount not less than the assuming insurer's liabilities attributable to reinsurance ceded by United
32 States ceding insurers. In addition, the assuming insurer must maintain a trustee surplus of not less
33 than \$20,000,000.

34 (b) In the case of a group including incorporated and individual unincorporated underwriters:

35 (A) For reinsurance ceded under reinsurance agreements with an inception, amendment or re-
36 newal date on or after August 1, 1995, the trust shall consist of a trustee account in an amount
37 not less than the group's several liabilities attributable to business ceded by United States domiciled
38 ceding insurers to any member of the group.

39 (B) For reinsurance ceded under reinsurance agreements with an inception date on or before
40 July 31, 1995, and not amended or renewed after that date, notwithstanding the other provisions of
41 ORS 731.509, 731.510, 731.511, 731.512 and 731.516, the trust shall consist of a trustee account in
42 an amount not less than the group's several insurance and reinsurance liabilities attributable to
43 business written in the United States.

44 (C) In addition to the trusts described in subparagraphs (A) and (B) of this paragraph, the group
45 shall maintain in trust a trustee surplus of which \$100,000,000 shall be held jointly for the benefit

1 of the United States domiciled ceding insurers of any member of the group for all years of account.

2 (D) The incorporated members of the group shall not be engaged in any business other than
3 underwriting as a member of the group and shall be subject to the same level of regulation and
4 solvency control by the group's domiciliary regulator as are the unincorporated members.

5 (E) Within 90 days after the group's financial statements are due to be filed with the group's
6 domiciliary regulator, the group shall provide to the director an annual certification by the group's
7 domiciliary regulator of the solvency of each underwriter member or, if certification is unavailable,
8 financial statements of each underwriter member of the group prepared by independent certified
9 public accountants.

10 (c) In the case of a group of incorporated insurers described in this paragraph, the trust must
11 be in an amount equal to the group's several liabilities attributable to business ceded by United
12 States ceding insurers to any member of the group pursuant to reinsurance contracts issued in the
13 name of the group. This paragraph applies to a group of incorporated insurers under common ad-
14 ministration that complies with the annual reporting requirements contained in this subsection and
15 that has continuously transacted an insurance business outside the United States for at least three
16 years immediately prior to making application for accreditation. Such a group must have an aggre-
17 gate policyholders' surplus of \$10,000,000,000 and must submit to the authority of this state to ex-
18 amine its books and records and bear the expense of the examination. The group shall also maintain
19 a joint trustee surplus of which \$100,000,000 must be held jointly for the benefit of United States
20 ceding insurers of any member of the group as additional security for any such liabilities. Each
21 member of the group shall make available to the director an annual certification of the member's
22 solvency by the member's domiciliary regulator and its independent certified public accountant.

23 (d) The form of the trust and any amendment to the trust shall have been approved by the in-
24 surance commissioner of the state in which the trust is domiciled or by the insurance commissioner
25 of another state who, pursuant to the terms of the trust instrument, has accepted principal regula-
26 tory oversight of the trust.

27 (e) The form of the trust and any trust amendments also shall be filed with the insurance com-
28 missioner of every state in which the ceding insurer beneficiaries of the trust are domiciled. The
29 trust instrument must provide that contested claims shall be valid and enforceable upon the final
30 order of any court of competent jurisdiction in the United States. The trust must vest legal title to
31 its assets in its trustees for the benefit of the assuming insurer's United States ceding insurers and
32 their assigns and successors in interest. The trust and the assuming insurer are subject to exam-
33 ination as determined by the director. The trust must remain in effect for as long as the assuming
34 insurer has outstanding obligations due under the reinsurance agreements subject to the trust.

37 shall certify the date of termination of the trust, if so planned, or certify that the trust will not

17 *2013 Act.]*

18 *[(C)] (B)* Copayments and premiums paid to the Oregon medical assistance program.

19 *[(D)] (C)* Assessments paid to the Department of Consumer and Business Services under ORS
20 743.951 and 743.961.

21 (d) Fees created or authorized by statute that have no established rate or amount but are cal-
22 culated for each separate instance for each fee payer and are based on actual cost of services pro-
23 vided.

24 (e) State agency charges on employees for benefits and services.

25 (f) Any intergovernmental charges.

26 (g) Forest protection district assessment rates established by ORS 477.210 to 477.265 and the
27 Oregon Forest Land Protection Fund fees established by ORS 477.760.

28 (h) State Department of Energy assessments required by ORS 469.421 (8) and 469.681.

29 (i) Any charges established by the State Parks and Recreation Director in accordance with ORS

39 (m) New or increased fees that are anticipated in the legislative budgeting process for an
40 agency, revenues from which are included, explicitly or implicitly, in the legislatively adopted
41 budget or the legislatively approved budget for the agency.

42 (n) Tolls approved by the Oregon Transportation Commission pursuant to ORS 383.004.

43 (o) Convenience fees as defined in ORS 182.126 and established by the Oregon Department of

1 (3)(a) Fees temporarily decreased for competitive or promotional reasons or because of unex-

19 purchased or rented, with or without government assistance, on a basis that is affordable to indi-

21 (b) "Affordable housing entity" means any of the following:

22 (A) A housing authority created under the laws of this state or another jurisdiction and any
23 agency or instrumentality of a housing authority, including but not limited to a legal entity created

25 (B) A nonprofit corporation that is engaged in providing affordable housing.

26 (C) A partnership or limited liability company that is engaged in providing affordable housing

28 a nonprofit corporation described in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph if the housing authority or
29 nonprofit corporation:

30 (i) Has, or has the right to acquire, a financial or ownership interest in the partnership or lim-
31 ited liability company;

32 (ii) Has the power to direct the management or policies of the partnership or limited liability

34 (iii) Has entered into a contract to lease, manage or operate the affordable housing owned by
35 the partnership or limited liability company; or

36 (iv) Has any other material relationship with the partnership or limited liability company.

37 (11) A community-based health care initiative approved by the Administrator of the Office for
38 Oregon Health Policy and Research under ORS 735.723 operating a community-based health care
39 improvement program approved by the administrator.

40 (12) Except as provided in ORS 735.500 and 735.510, a person certified by the Department of
41 Consumer and Business Services to operate a retainer medical practice.

42 **SECTION 38.** ORS 743.748, as amended by section 18, chapter 500, Oregon Laws 2011, and
43 section 21 of this 2013 Act, is amended to read:

44 743.748. (1) Each carrier offering a health benefit plan shall submit to the Director of the De-
45 partment of Consumer and Business Services on or before April 1 of each year a report that con-

1 tains:

2 (a) The following information for the preceding year that is derived from the exhibit of premi-
3 ums, enrollment and utilization included in the carrier's annual report:

4 (A) The total number of members;

5 (B) The total amount of premiums;

6 (C) The total amount of costs for claims;

7 (D) The medical loss ratio;

8 (E) The average amount of premiums per member per month; and

9 (F) The percentage change in the average premium per member per month, measured from the
10 previous year.

11 (b) The following aggregate financial information for the preceding year that is derived from the
12 carrier's annual report:

13 (A) The total amount of general administrative expenses, including identification of the five
14 largest nonmedical administrative expenses [*and the assessment against the carrier for the Oregon*
15 *Reinsurance Program*];

16 (B) The total amount of the surplus maintained;

17 (C) The total amount of the reserves maintained for unpaid claims;

18 (D) The total net underwriting gain or loss; and

19 (E) The carrier's net income after taxes.

20 (2) A carrier shall electronically submit the information described in subsection (1) of this sec-
21 tion in a format and according to instructions prescribed by the Department of Consumer and
22 Business Services by rule.

23 (3) The department shall evaluate the reporting requirements under subsection (1)(a) of this
24 section by the following market segments:

25 (a) Individual health benefit plans;

26 (b) Health benefit plans for small employers;

27 (c) Health benefit plans for employers described in ORS 743.733; and

28 (d) Health benefit plans for employers with more than 50 employees.

29 (4) The department shall make the information reported under this section available to the
30 public through a searchable public website on the Internet.

32 **CONFORMING AMENDMENTS**

34 **SECTION 39.** ORS 743.769 is amended to read:

35 743.769. (1) Each carrier shall actively market all individual health benefit plans sold by the
36 carrier.

37 (2) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, no carrier or insurance producer shall,
38 directly or indirectly, discourage an individual from filing an application for coverage because of the
39 health status, claims experience, occupation or geographic location of the individual.

40 (3) Subsection (2) of this section does not apply with respect to information provided by a carrier
41 to an individual regarding the established geographic service area or a restricted network provision
42 of a carrier.

43 (4) Rejection by a carrier of an application for coverage shall be in writing and shall state the
44 reason or reasons for the rejection.

45 (5) The Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services may establish by rule

1 additional standards to provide for the fair marketing and broad availability of individual health
2 benefit plans.

3 (6) A carrier that elects to discontinue offering all of its individual health benefit plans under
4 ORS 743.766 [(5)(c)] (4)(c) or to discontinue offering and renewing all such plans is prohibited from
5 offering and renewing health benefit plans in the individual market in this state for a period of five
6 years from the date of notice to the director pursuant to ORS 743.766 [(5)(c)] (4)(c) or, if such notice
7 is not provided, from the date on which the director provides notice to the carrier that the director
8 has determined that the carrier has effectively discontinued offering individual health benefit plans
9 in this state. This subsection does not apply with respect to a health benefit plan discontinued in
10 a specified service area by a carrier that covers services provided only by a particular organization
11 of health care providers or only by health care providers who are under contract with the carrier.

16 **ience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or express any**
17 **legislative intent in the enactment of this 2013 Act.**

34 **EMERGENCY CLAUSE**

36 **SECTION 43. This 2013 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
37 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2013 Act takes effect**
38 **on its passage.**
