SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Urges Congress to support passage of Postal Service Protection Act of 2013.

JOINT MEMORIAL

2 To the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress as-3 sembled:

We, your memorialists, the Seventy-seventh Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, in legislative session assembled, respectfully represent as follows:

6 Whereas the United States Postal Service was established pursuant to Article 1, section 8, 7 clause 7, of the United States Constitution; and

8 Whereas due to crippling legislation mandating unsustainable practices, the United States Postal 9 Service is facing insolvency and the necessity of eliminating many jobs and services; and

10 Whereas Congressman Peter DeFazio introduced the Postal Service Protection Act of 2013 (H.R.

630, 113th Cong., 1st Sess.) in the United States House of Representatives on February 13, 2013;
and

Whereas Senator Bernie Sanders introduced the Postal Service Protection Act of 2013 (S. 316,
113th Cong., 1st Sess.) in the United States Senate on February 13, 2013; and

15 Whereas if enacted, the Postal Service Protection Act would preserve essential functions of and 16 solve the most immediate financial difficulties facing the United States Postal Service; and

17 Whereas the Postal Service Protection Act would protect six-day delivery and prevent the pro-18 posed reduction of postal services on Saturdays, a cost-cutting measure that would adversely affect 19 many customers and cause them to seek other mail options; and

20 Whereas the Postal Service Protection Act would eliminate the existing requirement that the 21 United States Postal Service make 75 years' worth of retiree health care benefit payments over a 22 10-year period, a burden no other government agency or private company is required to bear; and

23 Whereas the Postal Service Protection Act would allow the United States Postal Service to re-24 cover overpayments to its pension plans that amount to approximately \$50 billion, according to some 25 studies; and

26 Whereas the Postal Service Protection Act would prevent the closure of rural post offices by 27 giving the Postal Regulatory Commission binding authority to prevent post offices from being closed 28 if the closure would adversely affect the community and employees of the post office; and

Whereas the Postal Service Protection Act would help to ensure that the United States Postal Service remains a viable and competitive institution that can provide services essential to the pub-

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1 lic; and

2 Whereas because the State of Oregon utilizes a vote-by-mail system, Oregonians have a unique 3 relationship with the United States Postal Service; and

Whereas closing rural post offices and otherwise reducing postal services would adversely affect the ability of many Oregonians to exercise their constitutionally protected right to vote; now, therefore,

7 Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

8 (1) The Congress of the United States is respectfully urged to support the passage of the Postal

9 Service Protection Act of 2013.

(2) A copy of this memorial shall be sent to the Senate Majority Leader, to the Speaker of the
 House of Representatives and to each member of the Oregon Congressional Delegation.

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
