SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Modifies certain provisions relating to Nursing Home Administrators Board, Respiratory Therapist and Polysomnographic Technologist Licensing Board, Board of Cosmetology, Board of Body Art Practitioners and Oregon Health Licensing Agency.

A BILL FOR AN ACT
Relating to regulated professions; creating new provisions; and amending ORS 676.992, 678.770,
688.819, 690.005, 690.350, 694.085, 694.155 and 694.185.
Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
NURSING HOME ADMINISTRATORS BOARD
SECTION 1. ORS 678.770 is amended to read:
678.770. (1) The Nursing Home Administrators Board may establish by rule standards for the
issuance of a license by endorsement[, without examination,] to an applicant who:
(a) Meets the requirements as established by the board; and
(b) On the date of making application, is a nursing home administrator licensed under the laws
of any other state or territory of the United States if the requirements for licensing of nursing home
administrators in the state or territory in which the applicant is licensed are not less than those
required by ORS 678.710 to 678.820.
(2) Each applicant under this section shall pay to the Oregon Health Licensing Agency at the
time of filing the application a fee determined by the agency under ORS 678.775.
RESPIRATORY THERAPIST AND POLYSOMNOGRAPHIC
TECHNOLOGIST LICENSING BOARD
SECTION 2. ORS 688.819, as amended by section 21, chapter 43, Oregon Laws 2012, is amended
to read:
688.819. (1) An applicant for a polysomnographic technologist license shall:
(a) Submit to the Oregon Health Licensing Agency written evidence that the applicant:
(A) Is at least 18 years of age;

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1 (B) Has completed an approved four-year high school course of study or the equivalent as de-2 termined by the appropriate educational agency; and 3 (C) Has completed a polysomnography education or training program, or a polysomnography

4 program that combines education and training, approved by the Respiratory Therapist and 5 Polysomnographic Technologist Licensing Board; and

6 (b) Pass an examination approved by the board.

7 (2) An applicant meets the requirements of subsection (1)(a)(C) of this section if the applicant 8 provides the agency with documentation of military training or experience that the board determines 9 is substantially equivalent to the education **or training** required by subsection (1)(a)(C) of this sec-10 tion.

(3) The agency may issue a polysomnographic technologist license by endorsement or reciprocityto:

(a) An applicant who is currently licensed to practice polysomnography under the laws of an other state, territory or country if the qualifications of the applicant are considered by the agency
 to be equivalent to those required in this state; or

16 (b) An applicant holding an active credential approved by the board.

(4) Except as provided in subsection (8) of this section, all licenses expire on the last day of themonth, one year from the date of issuance.

19 (5) To renew a polysomnographic technologist license, a licensee must submit to the agency a 20 completed renewal application, required renewal fee and satisfactory evidence of completion of any 21 required continuing education credits on or before the expiration date of the license as specified by 22 agency rule.

(6) The agency shall adopt by rule requirements for late renewal of a license, reactivation of
 an expired license or reinstatement of a license that has been expired for more than three consec utive years.

(7) If a polysomnographic technologist license has been denied, suspended or revoked for commission of a prohibited act under ORS 676.612, the agency may refuse to issue or renew the license for up to one year from the date of denial, suspension or revocation.

(8) The agency may vary the date of license renewal by giving the applicant written notice of
 the renewal date being assigned and by making prorated adjustments to the renewal fee.

(9) The agency may issue a temporary permit to practice polysomnography in accordance withrules adopted by the agency.

37 690.005. As used in ORS 690.005 to 690.235:

(1) "Barbering" means any of the following practices, when done upon the human body for cos metic purposes and not for medical diagnosis or treatment of disease or physical or mental ailments:

8	and teach one or more fields of practice on a temporary basis.
9	(6) "Esthetics" means any of the following skin care or facial care practices performed on the
10	human body or face for the purpose of keeping the skin of the human body or face healthy and
11	attractive and not for medical diagnosis or treatment of disease or physical or mental ailments:
12	(a) The use of the hands or mechanical or [electrical] electric apparatuses or appliances for
13	cleansing, stimulating, manipulating, exfoliating or applying lotions or creams.
14	(b) Temporary removal of hair.
15	(c) Makeup artistry.

19	(7) "Facility" means an establishment operated on a regular or irregular basis for the purpose
20	of providing services in one or more fields of practice.

26	(9) "Freelance authorization" means a written authorization that allows a practitioner to prac-

8	of Education and is operated for the purpose of teaching one or more fields of practice.
9	(17) "Temporary facility permit" means a written authorization issued under ORS 690.055 to
10	provide services on a temporary basis in one or more fields of practice.

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14	SECTION 4. ORS 690.350 is amended to read:

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694.155. The powers and duties of the Oregon Health Licensing Agency with regard to dealing 1 2 in hearing aids are as follows: (1) To authorize all disbursements necessary to carry out the provisions of ORS 694.015 to 3 694.185. 4 (2) To determine training and experience requirements prerequisite to taking the examination 5 and to supervise and administer qualifying examinations to test the knowledge and proficiency of 6 applicants for licensure. 7 (3) To provide for waivers of examinations by rule. 8 9 [(3)] (4) To license persons who apply to the agency and who have qualified to deal in hearing aids. 10 [(4)] (5) To purchase and maintain or rent audiometric equipment and facilities necessary to 11 12 carry out the examination of applicants for licensure. 13 [(5)] (6) To issue and renew licenses and temporary licenses.
