

SENATE AMENDMENTS TO SENATE BILL 49

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, delete “and 1.178” and insert “, 1.178, 133.005 and 181.610
2 and section 3, chapter 88, Oregon Laws 2012”.

3 Delete lines 4 through 23 and insert:

4 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 1.177, as amended by section 1, chapter 88, Oregon Laws 2012, and section
5 104, chapter 107, Oregon Laws 2012, is amended to read:

6 “1.177. (1) The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court may adopt state standards, and a state plan,
7 for:

8 “(a) State court security, emergency preparedness and business continuity for facilities used by
9 **the judges or staff of a [circuit court, the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals or Oregon Tax Court]
10 court operating under the Judicial Department or the staff of the office of the State Court
11 Administrator[.]; and**

12 “(b) **The physical security of the judges or staff of a court operating under the Judicial
13 Department or the staff of the office of the State Court Administrator.**

14 “(2)(a) The Chief Justice may appoint a [judicial security officer] **Chief Judicial Marshal** and
15 other [judicial security personnel] **deputy judicial marshals** charged with:

16 “(A) Implementing a state plan adopted under subsection (1) of this section[.];

17 “(B) **Ensuring the physical security and safety of judges of a court operating under the
18 Judicial Department;**

19 “(C) **Ensuring the physical security and safety of the staff of a court operating under the
20 Judicial Department, the staff of the office of the State Court Administrator and the public
21 in and around court facilities as defined in ORS 166.360; and**

22 “(D) **Ensuring the security of the real and personal property owned, controlled, occupied
23 or used by the Judicial Department.**

24 “(b) **Persons appointed as judicial marshals under this section are subject to the per-
25 sonnel rules and policies established by the Chief Justice under ORS 1.002.**

26 “(c) **When appointed and duly sworn by the Chief Justice, judicial marshals appointed
27 under this section who are trained pursuant to section 3, chapter 88, Oregon Laws 2012, have
28 the authority given to peace officers of this state for the purposes of carrying out the duties
29 of their employment.**

30 “(d) **The Chief Justice may define the duties of judicial marshals appointed under this
31 section.**

32 “(e) **Judicial marshals granted the authority of a peace officer under this section who
33 detain any person in accordance with the marshal’s duties retain the authority until the law
34 enforcement agency having general jurisdiction over the area in which the person is detained
35 assumes responsibility for the person.**

1 **“(f) Persons appointed as judicial marshals under this section are not police officers for**
2 **purposes of the Public Employees Retirement System.**

3 “(3) Except as provided in this subsection, a plan adopted under this section and all documents
4 related to development of the plan are confidential and need not be disclosed under the provisions
5 of ORS 192.410 to 192.505. The Chief Justice may authorize the disclosure of all or part of a plan
6 prepared under this section if the Chief Justice determines that the interest of the public would be
7 served by the disclosure and that the disclosure will not impair the integrity of the plan. Records
8 of expenditures for a [*state court security*] plan **adopted under this section** and records of equip-
9 ment purchased under the plan are not confidential under the provisions of this subsection, and are
10 subject to disclosure as public records under the provisions of ORS 192.410 to 192.505.”.

32 “(g) An authorized tribal police officer as defined in section 1, chapter 644, Oregon Laws

34 **“(h) A judicial marshal appointed under ORS 1.177 who is trained pursuant to section 3,**
35 **chapter 88, Oregon Laws 2012.**

36 “(4) ‘Reserve officer’ means an officer or member of a law enforcement agency who is:

37 “(a) A volunteer or employed less than full-time as a peace officer commissioned by a city, port,
38 school district, mass transit district, county, county service district authorized to provide law
39 enforcement services under ORS 451.010, the Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice,
40 the Oregon State Lottery Commission or the Governor or a member of the Department of State
41 Police;

42 “(b) Armed with a firearm; and

43 “(c) Responsible for enforcing the criminal laws and traffic laws of this state or laws or ordi-
44 nances relating to airport security.

36 ORS 181.620.

37 “(3) ‘Certified reserve officer’ means a reserve officer who has been designated by a local law
38 enforcement unit, has received training necessary for certification and has met the minimum stan-
39 dards and training requirements established under ORS 181.640.

40 “(4) ‘Commissioned’ means being authorized to perform various acts or duties of a police officer
41 or certified reserve officer and acting under the supervision and responsibility of a county sheriff
42 or as otherwise provided by law.

23 partment of Justice, the Department of Corrections, the Oregon State Lottery Commission, the Se-
24 curity and Emergency Preparedness Office of the Judicial Department or common carrier railroad
25 the primary duty of which, as prescribed by law, ordinance or directive, is one or more of the fol-
26 lowing:

27 “(A) Detecting crime and enforcing the criminal laws of this state or laws or ordinances relating
28 to airport security;

29 “(B) The custody, control or supervision of individuals convicted of or arrested for a criminal
30 offense and confined to a place of incarceration or detention other than a place used exclusively for
31 incarceration or detention of juveniles; or

43 and who is charged with and performs the duty of:

44 “(A) Community protection by controlling, investigating, supervising and providing or making
45 referrals to reformative services for adult parolees or probationers or offenders on post-prison

1 supervision; or

2 “(B) Investigating adult offenders on parole or probation or being considered for parole or pro-
3 bation; or

4 “(b) An officer who:

5 “(A) Is certified and has been employed as a full-time parole and probation officer for more than
6 one year;

7 “(B) Is employed part-time by the Department of Corrections, a county or a court; and

8 “(C) Is charged with and performs the duty of:

9 “(i) Community protection by controlling, investigating, supervising and providing or making
10 referrals to reformatory services for adult parolees or probationers or offenders on post-prison
11 supervision; or

12 “(ii) Investigating adult offenders on parole or probation or being considered for parole or pro-
13 bation.

14 “(15) ‘Police officer’ means:

15 “(a) An officer, member or employee of a law enforcement unit employed full-time as a peace
16 officer who is:

22 “(B) Responsible for enforcing the criminal laws of this state or laws or ordinances relating to
23 airport security;

26 chapter 644, Oregon Laws 2011, or a humane special agent commissioned under section 1, chapter
27 67, Oregon Laws 2012; or

28 “(c) [*An individual member of the judicial security personnel identified pursuant to*] **A judicial**
29 **marshal appointed under** ORS 1.177 who is trained pursuant to section 3, chapter 88, Oregon Laws
30 2012.

31 “(16) ‘Public or private safety agency’ means a unit of state or local government, a special pur-
32 pose district or a private firm that provides, or has authority to provide, fire fighting, police, am-
33 bulance or emergency medical services.

34 “(17) ‘Public safety personnel’ and ‘public safety officer’ include corrections officers, youth cor-
35 rection officers, emergency medical dispatchers, parole and probation officers, police officers, certi-
36 fied reserve officers, telecommunicators, liquor enforcement inspectors and fire service professionals.

37 “(18) ‘Reserve officer’ means an officer or member of a law enforcement unit who is:

38 “(a) A volunteer or employed less than full-time as a peace officer commissioned by a city, port,
39 school district, mass transit district, county, county service district authorized to provide law
40 enforcement services under ORS 451.010, tribal government as defined in section 1, chapter 644,
41 Oregon Laws 2011, the Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice, the Oregon State
42 Lottery Commission, a university that has established a police department under ORS 352.383, the
43 Governor or the Department of State Police;

44 “(b) Armed with a firearm; and

45 “(c) Responsible for enforcing the criminal laws and traffic laws of this state or laws or ordi-

1 nances relating to airport security.

2 “(19) ‘Telecommunicator’ means a person employed as an emergency telephone worker as de-
3 fined in ORS 243.736 or a public safety dispatcher whose primary duties are receiving, processing
4 and transmitting public safety information received through a 9-1-1 emergency reporting system as
5 defined in ORS 403.105.

6 “(20) ‘Youth correction officer’ means an employee of the Oregon Youth Authority who is
7 charged with and primarily performs the duty of custody, control or supervision of youth offenders
8 confined in a youth correction facility.

9 “**SECTION 7.** ORS 181.610, as amended by section 50, chapter 644, Oregon Laws 2011, section
10 23, chapter 54, Oregon Laws 2012, section 14, chapter 67, Oregon Laws 2012, and section 5, chapter

12 “181.610. In ORS 181.610 to 181.712, unless the context requires otherwise:

13 “(1) ‘Abuse’ has the meaning given the term in ORS 107.705.

14 “(2) ‘Board’ means the Board on Public Safety Standards and Training appointed pursuant to
15 ORS 181.620.

16 “(3) ‘Certified reserve officer’ means a reserve officer who has been designated by a local law
17 enforcement unit, has received training necessary for certification and has met the minimum stan-

4 “(A) Detecting crime and enforcing the criminal laws of this state or laws or ordinances relating
5 to airport security;

6 “(B) The custody, control or supervision of individuals convicted of or arrested for a criminal
7 offense and confined to a place of incarceration or detention other than a place used exclusively for
8 incarceration or detention of juveniles; or

9 “(C) The control, supervision and reformation of adult offenders placed on parole or sentenced
10 to probation and investigation of adult offenders on parole or probation or being considered for
11 parole or probation;

12 “(b) A police force or organization of a private entity with a population of more than 1,000
13 residents in an unincorporated area the employees of which are commissioned by a county sheriff;

14 “(c) A district attorney’s office;

15 “(d) The Oregon Liquor Control Commission with regard to liquor enforcement inspectors; or

16 “(e) A humane investigation agency as defined in section 1, chapter 67, Oregon Laws 2012.

17 “(13) ‘Liquor enforcement inspector’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 471.001.

18 “(14) ‘Parole and probation officer’ means:

19 “(a) An officer who is employed full-time by the Department of Corrections, a county or a court
20 and who is charged with and performs the duty of:

21 “(A) Community protection by controlling, investigating, supervising and providing or making
22 referrals to reformative services for adult parolees or probationers or offenders on post-prison
23 supervision; or

24 “(B) Investigating adult offenders on parole or probation or being considered for parole or pro-
25 bation; or

26 “(b) An officer who:

27 “(A) Is certified and has been employed as a full-time parole and probation officer for more than
28 one year;

29 “(B) Is employed part-time by the Department of Corrections, a county or a court; and

30 “(C) Is charged with and performs the duty of:

31 “(i) Community protection by controlling, investigating, supervising and providing or making
32 referrals to reformative services for adult parolees or probationers or offenders on post-prison
33 supervision; or

34 “(ii) Investigating adult offenders on parole or probation or being considered for parole or pro-
35 bation.

36 “(15) ‘Police officer’ means:

37 “(a) An officer, member or employee of a law enforcement unit employed full-time as a peace
38 officer who is:

39 “(A) Commissioned by a city, port, school district, mass transit district, county, county service
40 district authorized to provide law enforcement services under ORS 451.010, tribal government, the
41 Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice, the Oregon State Lottery Commission, a
42 university that has established a police department under ORS 352.383, the Governor or the De-
43 partment of State Police; and

44 “(B) Responsible for enforcing the criminal laws of this state or laws or ordinances relating to
45 airport security;

1 “(b) An investigator of a district attorney’s office if the investigator is or has been certified as
2 a peace officer in this or another state or a humane special agent commissioned under section 1,
3 chapter 67, Oregon Laws 2012; or

4 “(c) [*An individual member of the judicial security personnel identified pursuant to*] **A judicial**
5 **marshal appointed under** ORS 1.177 who is trained pursuant to section 3, chapter 88, Oregon Laws
6 2012.

7 “(16) ‘Public or private safety agency’ means a unit of state or local government, a special pur-
8 pose district or a private firm that provides, or has authority to provide, fire fighting, police, am-
9 bulance or emergency medical services.

10 “(17) ‘Public safety personnel’ and ‘public safety officer’ include corrections officers, youth cor-
11 rection officers, emergency medical dispatchers, parole and probation officers, police officers, certi-
12 fied reserve officers, telecommunicators, liquor enforcement inspectors and fire service professionals.

13 “(18) ‘Reserve officer’ means an officer or member of a law enforcement unit who is:

14 “(a) A volunteer or employed less than full-time as a peace officer commissioned by a city, port,
15 school district, mass transit district, county, county service district authorized to provide law
16 enforcement services under ORS 451.010, tribal government, the Criminal Justice Division of the
17 Department of Justice, the Oregon State Lottery Commission, a university that has established a
18 police department under ORS 352.383, the Governor or the Department of State Police;

19 “(b) Armed with a firearm; and

20 “(c) Responsible for enforcing the criminal laws and traffic laws of this state or laws or ordi-
21 nances relating to airport security.

22 “(19) ‘Telecommunicator’ means a person employed as an emergency telephone worker as de-
23 fined in ORS 243.736 or a public safety dispatcher whose primary duties are receiving, processing
24 and transmitting public safety information received through a 9-1-1 emergency reporting system as
25 defined in ORS 403.105.

26 “(20) ‘Youth correction officer’ means an employee of the Oregon Youth Authority who is
27 charged with and primarily performs the duty of custody, control or supervision of youth offenders
28 confined in a youth correction facility.

29 “**SECTION 8.** Section 3, chapter 88, Oregon Laws 2012, is amended to read:

30 “**Sec. 3.** (1) Upon request of the Security and Emergency Preparedness Office of the Judicial
31 Department, the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training shall certify individual [*mem-*
32 *bers of the judicial security personnel identified pursuant to*] **judicial marshals appointed under** ORS
33 1.177 as being qualified in the same manner as police officers pursuant to ORS 181.640.

34 “(2) The provisions of ORS 181.610 to 181.712 relating to the training and certification of police
35 officers apply to individual [*members of the judicial security personnel*] **judicial marshals** trained
36 pursuant to subsection (1) of this section.

37 “(3) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Security and Emergency Preparedness Of-
38 fice of the Judicial Department shall bear the expense of training pursuant to subsection (1) of this
39 section.

40 “**SECTION 9.** **This 2013 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
41 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2013 Act takes effect**
42 **on its passage.”**
