21 **“SECTION 2.** Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the following amounts
22 are established for a six-year period beginning July 1, 2013, as the maximum limits for the
23 expenditure of federal funds collected or received by the state agencies listed, for the acqui-
24 sition of land and the acquisition, planning, constructing, altering, repairing, furnishing and
25 equipping of buildings and facilities:

32 **“SECTION 3.** Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on
33 expenditures established by section 1 (6), chapter 904, Oregon Laws 2009, for a six-year period
34 beginning July 1, 2009, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or
35 other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal
36 funds, collected or received by the State Forestry Department for land acquisition is in-
37 creased by \$5,200,000.

38 **“SECTION 4.** The project approvals and expenditure limitations in sections 1, 2 and 6 of
39 this 2013 Act expire on June 30, 2019, unless otherwise noted.

40 **“SECTION 5.** The expiration dates of the project approvals and expenditure limitations

42 **“SECTION 6. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the following amounts**
 43 **are established for a six-year period beginning July 1, 2013, as the maximum limit for pay-**
 44 **ment of expenses under this section from bond proceeds and other revenues, including fed-**
 45 **eral funds, collected or received by the Department of Community Colleges and Workforce**

1 Development, for the acquisition of and improvements to land and the acquisition, planning,
2 constructing, altering, repairing, furnishing and equipping of buildings and facilities at com-

45 "SECTION 7. The project approvals and expenditure limitations established by section 7

1 (3) and (9), chapter 904, Oregon Laws 2009, for capital construction or acquisition projects
2 at Clackamas Community College and Umpqua Community College expire on June 30, 2017.

3 **“SECTION 8.** Pursuant to Article XI-G of the Oregon Constitution and ORS 341.721 and
4 ORS chapter 286A, the State Treasurer may sell, at the request of the State Board of Edu-
5 cation, general obligation bonds of the State of Oregon of the kind and character and within
6 the limits prescribed by Article XI-G of the Oregon Constitution, as the treasurer deter-
7 mines, but in no event may the treasurer sell more than the aggregate principal sum of
8 \$125,081,600 par value for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013. The moneys realized from the
9 sale of the bonds shall be appropriated and may be expended for the purposes set forth in
10 section 6 of this 2013 Act and section 7 (3) and (9), chapter 904, Oregon Laws 2009, and for
11 payment for capitalized interest and costs incidental to issuance of the bonds.

12 **“SECTION 9.** The Legislative Assembly approves the proposal of the Oregon Military
13 Department, submitted in accordance with ORS 396.515 (4), for the sale of the Baker City
14 Armory.

15 **“SECTION 10.** (1) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on
16 expenditures established by section 1 (7)(a), chapter 615, Oregon Laws 2011, for a six-year
17 period beginning July 1, 2011, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees,
18 moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and
19 federal funds, collected or received by Department of Veterans’ Affairs for the acquisition
20 of land and the acquisition, planning, constructing, altering, repairing, furnishing and equip-
21 ping of buildings or facilities, is increased by \$4,000,000 for the Lebanon Veterans’ Home.

22 **“(2)** Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures
23 established by section 5, chapter 79, Oregon Laws 2012, for the six-year period beginning July
24 1, 2011, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or re-
25 ceived by Department of Veterans’ Affairs for the acquisition of land and the acquisition,
26 planning, constructing, altering, repairing, furnishing and equipping of buildings and facili-
27 ties, is increased by \$6,840,377 for the Lebanon Veterans’ Home.

28 **“SECTION 11.** This 2013 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public
29 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2013 Act takes effect
30 on its passage.”.

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
