Senate Bill 576

Sponsored by COMMITTEE ON VETERANS AND EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.**

Creates crime of making an unauthorized arrest. Punishes by maximum of one year's imprisonment, \$6,250 fine, or both.

Creates civil cause of action for unauthorized arrest. Provides prevailing plaintiff with attorney fees and greater of \$10,000 or actual damages.

Limits arrests by private person or magistrate to felonies only. Requires specified investigators to have Department of Public Safety Standards and Training certification to be considered peace officers.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

- 4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
 - SECTION 1. (1) A person commits the crime of making an unauthorized arrest if:
- 6 (a) The person arrests another person for a crime under state or federal law; and
- (b) The arrest is not authorized by the provisions of ORS 133.220 to 133.360.
- 8 (2) Making an unlawful arrest is a Class A misdemeanor.
- 9 (3) A plaintiff has a civil cause of action for a violation of this section. A prevailing plaintiff in the civil action is entitled to receive:
 - (a) The greater of \$10,000 or actual damages; and

- SECTION 2. ORS 133.225 is amended to read:
- 133.225. (1) A private person may arrest another person for [any crime] **a felony** committed in the presence of the private person if the private person has probable cause to believe the arrested person committed the [crime] **felony**. A private person making such an arrest shall, without unnec-
- essary delay, take the arrested person before a magistrate or deliver the arrested person to a peace officer.
- 19 (2) In order to make the arrest a private person may use physical force as is justifiable under 20 ORS 161.255.
 - **SECTION 3.** ORS 133.340 is amended to read:
- 133.340. When a [crime] **felony** is committed in the presence of a magistrate, the magistrate may, by a verbal or written order, command any person to arrest the offender and may thereupon proceed

(c) Responsible for enforcing the criminal laws and traffic laws of this state or laws or ordinances relating to airport security.

<u>SECTION 6.</u> This 2013 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2013 Act takes effect on its passage.
