## **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Requires law enforcement agency to alter police vehicle so that it no longer resembles police vehicle before selling or transferring title.]

Creates offense of operating impostor police vehicle. Provides exceptions. Punishes by maximum fine of \$2,000.

26 27 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. Before selling or transferring title to a police vehicle, a law enforcement agency, as defined in ORS 136.595, shall take all steps necessary to alter the vehicle so that the vehicle no longer resembles a police vehicle, including removing any insignia or other marking of the vehicle identifying it as a police vehicle and removing the spotlights, push bumper and light bar.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> Section 3 of this 2013 Act is added to and made a part of the Oregon Vehicle Code.

SECTION 3. (1) A person commits the offense of operating an impostor police vehicle if the person operates a motor vehicle on a highway or premises open to the public and the vehicle is painted in a manner that resembles a vehicle used by a police officer.

- (2) This section does not apply to:
- (a) Persons using vehicles described in subsection (1) of this section exclusively for movie or television production;
- (b) Employees of law enforcement agencies, as defined in ORS 136.595, acting within the scope of their employment;
- (c) Persons test-driving vehicles to facilitate repair or maintenance of the vehicles or installation or removal of police vehicle equipment on or from the vehicles;
- 21 (d) Vehicle dealers in possession of new police vehicles for purposes of sale or display; 22 or
  - (e) Companies that sell or offer for sale police vehicles or police vehicle equipment, for the purpose of test-driving the vehicles or demonstrating the equipment.
  - (3) The offense described in this section, operating an impostor police vehicle, is a Class A traffic violation.
