## Senate Bill 94

Sponsored by Senator MONROE (Presession filed.)

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Authorizes law enforcement agencies to establish sobriety checkpoints.

Takes effect only if Senate Joint Resolution 2 (2013) is approved by people at next regular general election. Takes effect on effective date of constitutional amendment proposed in Senate Joint Resolution 2 (2013).

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to sobriety checkpoints; and prescribing an effective date.

**3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:** 

4 <u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) As used in this section, "sobriety checkpoint" means a roadblock estab-

5 lished for the purpose of apprehending persons who are driving while under the influence of

6 intoxicants in violation of ORS 813.010.

7 (2) A law enforcement agency may establish sobriety checkpoints in its jurisdiction if the

8 checkpoints follow guidelines issued by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration

9 in the publication titled "The Use of Sobriety Checkpoints for Impaired Driving
10 Enforcement" (DOT HS 807 656, November 1990).

11 <u>SECTION 2.</u> This 2013 Act does not become effective unless the amendment to the 12 Oregon Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution 2 (2013) is approved by the people 13 at the regular general election held in November 2014. This 2013 Act becomes effective on the 14 effective date of that amendment.

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
