

**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO  
SENATE BILL 49**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, delete “and 1.178” and insert “, 1.178,  
2 133.005 and 181.610 and section 3, chapter 88, Oregon Laws 2012”.

3 Delete lines 4 through 23 and insert:

4 **“SECTION 1.** ORS 1.177, as amended by section 1, chapter 88, Oregon  
5 Laws 2012, and section 104, chapter 107, Oregon Laws 2012, is amended to  
6 read:

7 “1.177. (1) The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court may adopt state stan-  
8 dards, and a state plan, for:

9 **“(a)** State court security, emergency preparedness and business continuity  
10 for facilities used by **the** judges or staff of a [*circuit court, the Supreme*  
11 *Court, Court of Appeals or Oregon Tax Court*] **court operating under the**  
12 **Judicial Department** or **the staff of** the office of the State Court  
13 Administrator[.]; **and**

14 **“(b)** **The physical security of the judges or staff of a court operating**  
15 **under the Judicial Department or the staff of the office of the State**  
16 **Court Administrator.**

17 **“(2)(a)** The Chief Justice may appoint a [*judicial security officer*] **Chief**  
18 **Judicial Marshal** and other [*judicial security personnel*] **deputy judicial**  
19 **marshals** charged with:

20 **“(A)** Implementing a state plan adopted under subsection (1) of this  
21 section[.];

22 **“(B)** **Ensuring the physical security and safety of judges of a court**

1 **operating under the Judicial Department;**

2 **“(C) Ensuring the physical security and safety of the staff of a court**  
3 **operating under the Judicial Department, the staff of the office of the**  
4 **State Court Administrator and the public in and around court facili-**  
5 **ties as defined in ORS 166.360; and**

6 **“(D) Ensuring the security of the real and personal property owned,**  
7 **controlled, occupied or used by the Judicial Department.**

8 **“(b) Persons appointed as judicial marshals under this section are**  
9 **subject to the personnel rules and policies established by the Chief**  
10 **Justice under ORS 1.002.**

11 **“(c) When appointed and duly sworn by the Chief Justice, judicial**  
12 **marshals appointed under this section who are trained pursuant to**  
13 **section 3, chapter 88, Oregon Laws 2012, have the authority given to**  
14 **peace officers of this state for the purposes of carrying out the duties**  
15 **of their employment.**

16 **“(d) The Chief Justice may define the duties of judicial marshals**  
17 **appointed under this section.**

18 **“(e) Judicial marshals granted the authority of a peace officer un-**  
19 **der this section who detain any person in accordance with the**  
20 **marshal’s duties retain the authority until the law enforcement**  
21 **agency having general jurisdiction over the area in which the person**  
22 **is detained assumes responsibility for the person.**

23 **“(f) Persons appointed as judicial marshals under this section are**  
24 **not police officers for purposes of the Public Employees Retirement**  
25 **System.**

26 **“(3) Except as provided in this subsection, a plan adopted under this**  
27 **section and all documents related to development of the plan are confidential**  
28 **and need not be disclosed under the provisions of ORS 192.410 to 192.505. The**  
29 **Chief Justice may authorize the disclosure of all or part of a plan prepared**  
30 **under this section if the Chief Justice determines that the interest of the**

1 public would be served by the disclosure and that the disclosure will not  
2 impair the integrity of the plan. Records of expenditures for a [*state court*  
3 *security*] plan **adopted under this section** and records of equipment pur-  
4 chased under the plan are not confidential under the provisions of this sub-  
5 section, and are subject to disclosure as public records under the provisions  
6 of ORS 192.410 to 192.505.”

8 “(B) Responsible for enforcing the criminal laws of this state or laws or  
9 ordinances relating to airport security;

10 “(b) An investigator of a district attorney’s office if the investigator is  
11 or has been certified as a peace officer in this or another state, an authorized  
12 tribal police officer as defined in section 1, chapter 644, Oregon Laws 2011,  
13 or a humane special agent commissioned under section 1, chapter 67, Oregon  
14 Laws 2012; or

15 “(c) [*An individual member of the judicial security personnel identified*  
16 *pursuant to*] **A judicial marshal appointed under** ORS 1.177 who is trained

30 ordinances relating to airport security;

1 “(b) An investigator of a district attorney’s office if the investigator is  
2 or has been certified as a peace officer in this or another state or a humane  
3 special agent commissioned under section 1, chapter 67, Oregon Laws 2012;  
4 or

5 “(c) [*An individual member of the judicial security personnel identified*  
6 *pursuant to]* **A judicial marshal appointed under** ORS 1.177 who is trained  
7 pursuant to section 3, chapter 88, Oregon Laws 2012.

8 “(16) ‘Public or private safety agency’ means a unit of state or local  
9 government, a special purpose district or a private firm that provides, or has  
10 authority to provide, fire fighting, police, ambulance or emergency medical  
11 services.

12 “(17) ‘Public safety personnel’ and ‘public safety officer’ include cor-  
13 rections officers, youth correction officers, emergency medical dispatchers,  
14 parole and probation officers, police officers, certified reserve officers, tele-  
15 communicators, liquor enforcement inspectors and fire service professionals.

16 “(18) ‘Reserve officer’ means an officer or member of a law enforcement  
17 unit who is:

18 “(a) A volunteer or employed less than full-time as a peace officer com-  
19 missioned by a city, port, school district, mass transit district, county,

30 primary duties are receiving, processing and transmitting public safety in-

1 formation received through a 9-1-1 emergency reporting system as defined in  
2 ORS 403.105.

3 “(20) ‘Youth correction officer’ means an employee of the Oregon Youth  
4 Authority who is charged with and primarily performs the duty of custody,  
5 control or supervision of youth offenders confined in a youth correction fa-  
6 cility.

7 **“SECTION 8.** Section 3, chapter 88, Oregon Laws 2012, is amended to  
8 read:

9 **“Sec. 3.** (1) Upon request of the Security and Emergency Preparedness  
10 Office of the Judicial Department, the Department of Public Safety Standards  
11 and Training shall certify individual [*members of the judicial security per-*  
12 *sonnel identified pursuant to*] **judicial marshals appointed under** ORS 1.177  
13 as being qualified in the same manner as police officers pursuant to ORS  
14 181.640.

15 “(2) The provisions of ORS 181.610 to 181.712 relating to the training and  
16 certification of police officers apply to individual [*members of the judicial*  
17 *security personnel*] **judicial marshals** trained pursuant to subsection (1) of  
18 this section.

19 “(3) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Security and Emer-  
20 gency Preparedness Office of the Judicial Department shall bear the expense  
21 of training pursuant to subsection (1) of this section.

22 **“SECTION 9. This 2013 Act being necessary for the immediate**  
23 **preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is**  
24 **declared to exist, and this 2013 Act takes effect on its passage.”.**

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
