

**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO  
SENATE BILL 602**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after “Lake;” delete the rest of the  
2 line and insert “creating new provisions; amending ORS 830.110, 830.185,  
3 830.990 and 835.205; and declaring an emergency.”.

4 Delete lines 4 through 29.

5 Delete pages 2 and 3 and insert:

6 **“SECTION 1. Section 2 of this 2013 Act is added to and made a part**  
7 **of ORS chapter 830.**

8 **“SECTION 2. (1) Except as provided in subsections (2) and (3) of this**  
9 **section, a person may not use an outboard or inboard motor to propel**  
10 **a boat on Waldo Lake.**

11 **“(2) Subsection (1) of this section does not apply to the Department**  
12 **of State Police and any other public body, as defined in ORS 174.109,**  
13 **that has jurisdiction over the lake.**

14 **“(3) Subsection (1) of this section does not apply to boats propelled**  
15 **by an electric motor, a four-stroke outboard motor or a four-stroke**  
16 **inboard motor Sunday through Thursday between the hours of 9 a.m.**  
17 **and 6 p.m.**

18 **“SECTION 3. ORS 830.185 is amended to read:**

19 **“830.185. (1) [No person shall] A person may not** operate a boat with an  
20 outboard or inboard motor at a speed in excess of 10 miles per hour during  
21 those hours of the day and on those days of the year that it is lawful to fish,  
22 on East Lake, Paulina Lake and Elk Lake in Deschutes County; Magone

1 Lake in Grant County; Timothy Lake in Clackamas County; and Davis Lake  
2 in Deschutes and Klamath Counties.

3 “(2) [No person shall] **A person may not** operate a boat with an outboard  
4 or inboard motor at a speed in excess of 10 miles per hour on the following  
5 named waters of this state located in the counties named:

7 Counties      Lakes and Reservoirs

9 Clackamas      On that portion of the waters of the reservoir known as North Fork Reservoir which  
10 lies upstream from a line drawn across the reservoir at right angles to the thread  
11 of the stream at a point 2.3 miles upstream from the North Fork Dam measured along  
12 the thread of the stream

13 Deschutes      Hosmer, Lava, Little Cultus, Little Lava, Sparks Lakes and Crane Prairie Reservoir

14 Jefferson      On that portion of the waters behind Pelton Dam, known as Lake Simtustus, which  
15 lies upstream from a line drawn across the lake at right angles to the thread of the  
16 stream at a point 0.85 miles upstream from the Pelton Dam measured along the  
17 thread of the stream

18 Klamath      That portion of Upper Klamath Lake that lies west of a line beginning at a point on  
19 the north shore of Pelican Bay one-quarter mile east of Crystal Creek and extending  
20 due south to the opposite shore of the lake; any stream, creek or canal that leads into  
21 the portion of Upper Klamath Lake described above including Crystal Creek, Recre-  
22 ation Creek and Four-Mile Creek, also known as Harriman Creek

23 [Lane      *Waldo Lake*]

24 Linn      Smith and Trailbridge Reservoirs

25 Wasco      Clear Lake

26 “ \_\_\_\_\_

27 “(3)(a) The State Marine Board shall establish an appropriate decibel  
28 rating and speed restriction on Diamond Lake in Douglas County to allow  
29 recreational boating that is not limited to fishing. Recreational boating does  
30 not include operating a jet ski or similar personal watercraft. The speed es-

1 established by the board:

2 “(A) May not exceed 45 miles per hour between the hours of 9 a.m. and  
3 6 p.m.;

4 “(B) May not exceed 10 miles per hour between the hours of 6 p.m. and  
5 9 a.m.; and

6 “(C) Shall be restricted to 10 miles per hour at all times in any area  
7 within 200 yards of any boat ramp, boat dock, swimming area, inlet or outlet  
8 of the lake, designated campground or summer home.

9 “(b) The board shall reduce the speed restriction on Diamond Lake to 10  
10 miles per hour at all hours when the State Fish and Wildlife Director de-  
11 termines that the health of Diamond Lake is restored and the lake can be  
12 restocked for fishing.

13 **“SECTION 4.** ORS 830.990 is amended to read:

14 “830.990. (1)(a) Violation of ORS 830.565 by a person operating a manually  
15 propelled boat is a Class D violation. Notwithstanding ORS 153.019, the  
16 presumptive fine for a violation of ORS 830.565 is \$30.

17 “(b) Violation of ORS 830.565 by a person operating a motorboat is  
18 punishable as a Class D violation. Notwithstanding ORS 153.019, the  
19 presumptive fine for a violation of ORS 830.565 is \$50.

20 “(2) A person who violates ORS 830.050, 830.088, 830.090, 830.092, 830.094,  
21 830.230, 830.415, 830.710, 830.720, 830.770, 830.780, 830.810, 830.850 or 830.855,  
22 or rules adopted to carry out the purposes of those statutes, commits a Class  
23 D violation.

24 “(3) A person who violates ORS 830.220, 830.240, 830.245, 830.250, 830.375,  
25 830.475 (4), 830.480, 830.785, 830.805 or 830.825, or rules adopted to carry out  
26 the purposes of those statutes, commits a Class C violation.

27 “(4) A person who violates ORS 830.110, 830.175, 830.180, 830.185, 830.195,  
28 830.210, 830.215, 830.225, 830.235, 830.260, 830.300, 830.315 (2) and (3), 830.335,  
29 830.340, 830.345, 830.350, 830.355, 830.360, 830.362, 830.365, 830.370, 830.410,  
30 830.420, 830.495, 830.560, 830.775, 830.795 or 830.830 **or section 2 of this 2013**

1 **Act**, or rules adopted to carry out the purposes of those statutes, commits  
2 a Class B violation.

3 “(5) A person who violates ORS 830.305 or 830.390, or rules adopted to  
4 carry out the purposes of those statutes, commits a Class A violation.

5 “(6) A person who violates ORS 830.383 or 830.909 commits a Class B  
6 misdemeanor.

7 “(7) A person who violates ORS 830.035 (2), 830.053, 830.315 (1), 830.325,  
8 830.475 (1), 830.730 or 830.955 (1) commits a Class A misdemeanor.

9 “(8) A person who violates ORS 830.475 (2) commits a Class C felony.

10 **“SECTION 5.** ORS 830.110 is amended to read:

11 “830.110. In addition to the powers and duties otherwise provided in this  
12 chapter, the State Marine Board shall have the power and duty to:

13 “(1) Make all rules necessary to carry out the provisions of this chapter.  
14 The rules shall be made in accordance with ORS chapter 183.

15 “(2) Devise a system of identifying numbers for boats, floating homes and  
16 boathouses. If an agency of the federal government has an overall system of  
17 identification numbering for boats within the United States, the system de-  
18 vised by the board shall conform with the federal system.

19 “(3) Cooperate with state and federal agencies to promote uniformity of  
20 the laws relating to boating and their enforcement.

21 “(4) Make contracts necessary to carry out the provisions of ORS 830.060  
22 to 830.140, 830.700 to 830.715, 830.725, 830.730, 830.770, 830.780, 830.785, 830.795  
23 to 830.820 and 830.830 to 830.870.

24 “(5) Advise and assist county sheriffs and other peace officers in the  
25 enforcement of laws relating to boating.

26 “(6) Study, plan and recommend the development of boating facilities  
27 throughout the state which will promote the safety and pleasure of the pub-  
28 lic through boating.

29 “(7) Publicize the advantage of safe boating.

30 “(8) Accept gifts and grants of property and money to be used to further

1 the purposes of this chapter.

2 “(9) Exempt from any provisions of this chapter any class of boats if it  
3 determines that the safety of persons and property will not be materially  
4 promoted by the applicability of those provisions to the class of boats. The  
5 board may not exempt from numbering any class of boats unless:

6 “(a) The board determines that the numbering will not materially aid in  
7 their identification; and

8 “(b) The secretary of the department of the federal government under  
9 which the United States Coast Guard is operating has exempted from num-  
10 bering the same boats or classes of boats.

11 “(10) Appoint and require the bonding of agents to issue a temporary  
12 permit to operate a boat. In addition to the prescribed fees, the agents may  
13 charge the following for their services in issuing the temporary permit:

14 “(a) \$2.50 per transaction for calendar years 2008, 2009 and 2010;

15 “(b) \$3.75 per transaction for calendar years 2011, 2012 and 2013; and

16 “(c) Beginning in 2014, and every three years thereafter, the board shall  
17 issue an order revising the fee specified in paragraph (b) of this subsection  
18 on January 1, based on changes in the Portland-Salem, OR-WA, Consumer  
19 Price Index for All Urban Consumers for All Items, as published by the Bu-  
20 reau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor. The board  
21 shall round the amount of the fee to the nearest half-dollar. The revised fee  
22 takes effect on January 1 and applies for the following three years.

23 “(11) Publish and distribute to the interested public the boating laws of  
24 this state and resumes or explanations of those laws.

25 “(12) Publish and distribute forms for any application required under this  
26 chapter and require the use of such forms.

27 “(13) Make rules for the uniform navigational marking of the waters of  
28 this state. Such rules shall not conflict with markings prescribed by the  
29 United States Coast Guard. No political subdivision or person shall mark the  
30 waters of this state in any manner in conflict with the markings prescribed

1 by the board.

2 “(14) Make rules regarding marine toilets and their use consistent with  
3 the prevention and control of pollution of the waters of this state and not  
4 in conflict with the rules of the Oregon Health Authority or the Environ-  
5 mental Quality Commission.

6 “(15) Institute proceedings to enjoin unlawful obstructions injuring free  
7 navigation on the waters of this state.

8 “(16) Make rules regulating water ski course markers, ski jumps and  
9 other special use devices placed in the waters of this state. Such rules may  
10 regulate the installation and use of the devices and may require a permit.

11 “(17) Adopt rules necessary to carry out and enforce the provisions of  
12 ORS 830.950 and 830.955. The rules shall include but need not be limited to:

13 “(a) The kinds of protective covering or physical barriers that are ac-  
14 ceptable to be used between a submersible polystyrene device and the water.

15 “(b) Guidelines for the use of submersible polystyrene devices for the re-  
16 pair or maintenance of existing docks or floats.

17 “(18) Adopt rules providing for establishment of a Safe Boating Education  
18 Course to be made available to courts and law enforcement agencies within  
19 this state for use as a sentencing option for those individuals convicted of  
20 boating offenses. The board shall specify the content of the Safe Boating  
21 Education Course and shall prescribe procedures for making the course  
22 available to local courts and law enforcement agencies, including procedures  
23 for promptly notifying such courts whether individuals required to enroll in  
24 the course have taken and successfully passed the course. Such rules may  
25 provide for administration of the course through nonprofit organizations,  
26 such as the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary, United States Power  
27 Squadrons or similar groups.

28 “(19) For purposes of ORS 830.175, 830.180, 830.185 and 830.195 **and sec-**  
29 **tion 2 of this 2013 Act**, in cooperation with the State Aviation Board, reg-  
30 ulate boats that are seaplanes as provided in ORS 830.605 and 835.200.

1       **“SECTION 6.** ORS 835.205 is amended to read:

2       “835.205. For purposes of ORS 830.175, 830.180, 830.185 and 830.195 **and**  
3 **section 2 of this 2013 Act**, the Oregon Department of Aviation, in cooper-  
4 ation with the State Marine Board, shall regulate boats that are seaplanes  
5 as provided in ORS 830.605 and 835.200.

6       **“SECTION 7. This 2013 Act being necessary for the immediate**  
7 **preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is**  
8 **declared to exist, and this 2013 Act takes effect on its passage.”.**
