Dear Chair Shields and Members of the Committee:

We write to offer our support for SB 1563A. We view this bill as important to fostering entrepreneurship and supporting the development of targeted industry clusters in rural communities, which will also benefit Oregon as a whole.

Job creation is essential to the vitality of any community, and especially to rural areas that have been hit hard by the economic downturn. The City of Portland has experienced success through collaborative efforts between business, government and academia and believes this is a model that could help bolster small businesses and create economic opportunity in communities across the state. That is why the City of Portland supports the expansion of a pilot program at Business Oregon to identify, develop and promote entrepreneurial activities in rural communities through SB 1563A.

The bill increases the cap for Oregon Entrepreneurial Development loans from \$70,000 to \$100,000 and lengthens the repayment period from five to ten years.
