Members of the Oregon Senate:

Today you are being asked to consider House Bill 4078, "the Land Use Grand Bargain," which legislatively approves specific components of Metro's Urban Growth Boundary and its Urban and Rural Reserves.



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Earlier this month, the Oregon Court of Appeals rejected large portions of Metro's decisions, citing mistakes both by Metro and by the Land Conservation and Development Commission in approving Metro's applications.

The reality is that decisions of the Court of Appeals like this one cost cities, state agencies, the courts, and citizens and stakeholders many years of time and thousands, if not millions, of dollars. Such decisions have become increasingly common. This is the fourth decision in the past five years in which the court has reversed and/or remanded a decision of LCDC for not adhering to the state's land use laws regarding planning for future growth in urban growth boundaries.
