House Bill 4076

Sponsored by Representative JOHNSON; Representatives HUFFMAN, WHISNANT, Senators GIROD, HASS (Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.**

Directs Eastern Oregon University, Oregon Institute of Technology, Southern Oregon University and Western Oregon University to develop pilot programs for fixed cost bachelor's degrees.

Establishes criteria for pilot programs.

Requires Higher Education Coordinating Commission to issue reports to Legislative Assembly detailing status of, and commission's recommendations for, pilot programs.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to degree programs at public universities; and declaring an emergency.

Whereas student loans were the second highest contributor to consumer debt in 2012; and

Whereas many national efforts have focused on implementing fixed cost pathways to achieve a bachelor's degree in a variety of fields; and

Whereas utilization of competency-based credits, online and distance learning tools and dual accreditation can reduce the amount of tuition students pay by reducing the timeline for completing a degree program; and

Whereas Oregon has taken steps toward developing a collaborative preschool through postsecondary education continuum; and

Whereas Oregon has adopted education initiatives in order to improve student outcomes and to achieve the 40-40-20 mission of educational attainment set forth in ORS 351.009; and

Whereas the achievement of 40-40-20 requires the employment of innovative methodologies and creative strategies to develop multiple pathways for higher education attainment; and

Whereas Oregon has adopted initiatives designed to develop a workforce prepared not only to meet current economic challenges but also to thrive in the workplace; and

Whereas tuition costs require significant state investment, federal investment and student investment; and

Whereas the Higher Education Coordinating Commission can lead the collaboration between regional and technical universities, community colleges and high schools to develop a pathway for achieving fixed cost bachelor's degrees; and

Whereas there are examples of high schools, community colleges and universities operating in professional learning communities to provide new pathways to successful outcomes for students; now, therefore,

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) Eastern Oregon University, Oregon Institute of Technology, Southern Oregon University and Western Oregon University shall each develop a pilot program for fixed cost bachelor's degrees. The pilot programs must be designed to create a long-term and

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sustainable benefit to the local economy and to enable students enrolled in a pilot program to graduate with less student debt than would otherwise be required to obtain a bachelor's degree from that university.

(2) Each pilot program developed under this section must:

- (a) Offer at least two bachelor's degrees that meet the following criteria:
- (A) At least one of the bachelor's degrees must be directly tied to the mission statement of the university and the local workforce needs of the region in which the university is located.
- (B) All bachelor's degrees offered under the pilot program must be offered to students at a fixed cost that includes all tuition costs required to obtain the degree. This fixed cost must be significantly less than the standard tuition cost required to obtain a bachelor's degree at that university.
- (C) All bachelor's degrees offered under the pilot program must meet the same educational and accreditation standards as other bachelor's degrees offered by the university and be capable of being approved by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission under ORS 351.047.
- (b) Include a method for tracking the success of the pilot program over a five-year period. This tracking must accurately catalog the number of students participating in the pilot program, the percentage of participating students who complete the pilot program and the employment rate for students who complete the pilot program.
- (3) In establishing a pilot program, each university listed in subsection (1) of this section may decide whether to limit the pilot program to courses taught at the university or to collaborate with other institutions in order to include courses taught on the Internet, at local high schools or at community colleges. If courses offered on the Internet, at local high schools or at community colleges are incorporated into a pilot program, the fixed cost of the pilot program must include all tuition costs students will incur in taking these courses.
 - (4) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall:
 - (a) Work with each university listed in subsection (1) of this section to:
 - (A) Develop long-term and financially sustainable pilot programs; and
 - (B) Track the success of the pilot programs;
- (b) Submit a report before December 10, 2014, to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to higher education that details the progress each university listed in subsection (1) of this section has made toward establishing a pilot program; and
- (c) Present a final version of each of the proposed pilot programs to the committees related to higher education during the 2015 regular session of the Seventy-eighth Legislative Assembly.
- (5) All of the pilot programs shall start operating at the beginning of the 2015-2016 academic year.
- (6) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall analyze the five-year tracking results of each pilot program and submit a report to the committees related to higher education during the 2021 regular session of the Eighty-first Legislative Assembly. This report must:
- (a) Include the commission's detailed recommendations for improving the pilot programs, or for continuing the pilot programs as permanent programs;
 - (b) Contain an analysis of how higher education funding models relate to the pilot pro-

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(c) Provide recommendations for state incentives or appropriations that may be necessary to ensure the long-term success of the pilot programs.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> This 2014 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2014 Act takes effect on its passage.

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
