5 **“SECTION 1. ORS 346.190 and 346.230 are repealed.**

6 **“SECTION 2.** ORS 238.005 is amended to read:

7 “238.005. For purposes of this chapter:

8 “(1) ‘Active member’ means a member who is presently employed by a participating public em-  
9 ployer in a qualifying position and who has completed the six-month period of service required by  
10 ORS 238.015.

11 “(2) ‘Annuity’ means payments for life derived from contributions made by a member as provided  
12 in this chapter.

13 “(3) ‘Board’ means the Public Employees Retirement Board.

14 “(4) ‘Calendar year’ means 12 calendar months commencing on January 1 and ending on De-  
15 cember 31 following.

16 “(5) ‘Continuous service’ means service not interrupted for more than five years, except that  
17 such continuous service shall be computed without regard to interruptions in the case of:

18 “(a) An employee who had returned to the service of the employer as of January 1, 1945, and  
19 who remained in that employment until having established membership in the Public Employees  
20 Retirement System.

21 “(b) An employee who was in the armed services on January 1, 1945, and returned to the service  
22 of the employer within one year of the date of being otherwise than dishonorably discharged and  
23 remained in that employment until having established membership in the Public Employees Retire-  
24 ment System.

25 “(6) ‘Creditable service’ means any period of time during which an active member is being paid  
26 a salary by a participating public employer and for which benefits under this chapter are funded by  
27 employer contributions and earnings on the fund. For purposes of computing years of ‘creditable  
28 service,’ full months and major fractions of a month shall be considered to be one-twelfth of a year  
29 and shall be added to all full years. ‘Creditable service’ includes all retirement credit received by  
30 a member.

31 “(7) ‘Earliest service retirement age’ means the age attained by a member when the member  
32 could first make application for retirement under the provisions of ORS 238.280.

33 “(8) ‘Employee’ includes, in addition to employees, public officers, but does not include:

34 “(a) Persons engaged as independent contractors.

35 “(b) Seasonal, emergency or casual workers whose periods of employment with any public em-

1 ployer or public employers do not total 600 hours in any calendar year.

2 “(c) Persons[, *other than workers in the Oregon Industries for the Blind under ORS 346.190,*]  
3 provided sheltered employment or made-work by a public employer in an employment or industries  
4 program maintained for the benefit of such persons.

5 “(d) Persons employed and paid from federal funds received under a federal program intended  
6 primarily to alleviate unemployment. However, any such person shall be considered an ‘employee’  
7 if not otherwise excluded by paragraphs (a) to (c) of this subsection and the public employer elects  
8 to have the person so considered by an irrevocable written notice to the board.

9 “(e) Persons who are employees of a railroad, as defined in ORS 824.020, and who, as such em-  
10 ployees, are included in a retirement plan under federal railroad retirement statutes. This paragraph  
11 shall be deemed to have been in effect since the inception of the system.

12 “(9) ‘Final average salary’ means whichever of the following is greater:

13 “(a) The average salary per calendar year paid by one or more participating public employers  
14 to an employee who is an active member of the system in three of the calendar years of membership  
15 before the effective date of retirement of the employee, in which three years the employee was paid  
16 the highest salary. The three calendar years in which the employee was paid the largest total salary  
17 may include calendar years in which the employee was employed for less than a full calendar year.  
18 If the number of calendar years of active membership before the effective date of retirement of the  
19 employee is three or fewer, the final average salary for the employee is the average salary per cal-  
20 endar year paid by one or more participating public employers to the employee in all of those years,  
21 without regard to whether the employee was employed for the full calendar year.

22 “(b) One-third of the total salary paid by a participating public employer to an employee who  
23 is an active member of the system in the last 36 calendar months of active membership before the  
24 effective date of retirement of the employee.

25 “(10) ‘Firefighter’ does not include a volunteer firefighter, but does include:

26 “(a) The State Fire Marshal, the chief deputy fire marshal and deputy state fire marshals; and

27 “(b) An employee of the State Forestry Department who is certified by the State Forester as a  
28 professional wildland firefighter and whose primary duties include the abatement of uncontrolled  
29 fires as described in ORS 477.064.

30 “(11) ‘Fiscal year’ means 12 calendar months commencing on July 1 and ending on June 30 fol-  
31 lowing.

32 “(12) ‘Fund’ means the Public Employees Retirement Fund.

33 “(13) ‘Inactive member’ means a member who is not employed in a qualifying position, whose  
34 membership has not been terminated in the manner described by ORS 238.095 and who is not retired  
35 for service or disability.

36 “(14) ‘Institution of higher education’ means a public university listed in ORS 352.002, the  
37 Oregon Health and Science University and a community college, as defined in ORS 341.005.

38 “(15) ‘Member’ means a person who has established membership in the system and whose mem-  
39 bership has not been terminated as described in ORS 238.095. ‘Member’ includes active, inactive and  
40 retired members.

41 “(16) ‘Member account’ means the regular account and the variable account.

42 “(17) ‘Normal retirement age’ means:

43 “(a) For a person who establishes membership in the system before January 1, 1996, as described  
44 in ORS 238.430, 55 years of age if the employee retires at that age as a police officer or firefighter  
45 or 58 years of age if the employee retires at that age as other than a police officer or firefighter.

1           “(b) For a person who establishes membership in the system on or after January 1, 1996, as de-  
2 scribed in ORS 238.430, 55 years of age if the employee retires at that age as a police officer or  
3 firefighter or 60 years of age if the employee retires at that age as other than a police officer or  
4 firefighter.

5           “(18) ‘Pension’ means annual payments for life derived from contributions by one or more public  
6 employers.

7           “(19) ‘Police officer’ includes:

8           “(a) Employees of institutions defined in ORS 421.005 as Department of Corrections institutions  
9 whose duties, as assigned by the Director of the Department of Corrections, include the custody of  
10 persons committed to the custody of or transferred to the Department of Corrections and employees  
11 of the Department of Corrections who were classified as police officers on or before July 27, 1989,  
12 whether or not such classification was authorized by law.

13           “(b) Employees of the Department of State Police who are classified as police officers by the  
14 Superintendent of State Police.

15           “(c) Employees of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission who are classified as liquor enforce-  
16 ment inspectors by the administrator of the commission.

17           “(d) Sheriffs and those deputy sheriffs or other employees of a sheriff whose duties, as classified  
18 by the sheriff, are the regular duties of police officers or corrections officers.

19           “(e) Police chiefs and police personnel of a city who are classified as police officers by the  
20 council or other governing body of the city.

21           “(f) Police officers who are commissioned by a university under ORS 352.383 or 353.125 and who  
22 are classified as police officers by the university.

23           “(g) Parole and probation officers employed by the Department of Corrections, parole and pro-  
24 bation officers who are transferred to county employment under ORS 423.549 and adult parole and  
25 probation officers, as defined in ORS 181.610, who are classified as police officers for the purposes  
26 of this chapter by the county governing body. If a county classifies adult parole and probation offi-  
27 cers as police officers for the purposes of this chapter, and the employees so classified are repres-  
28 ented by a labor organization, any proposal by the county to change that classification or to cease  
29 to classify adult parole and probation officers as police officers for the purposes of this chapter is  
30 a mandatory subject of bargaining.

31           “(h) Police officers appointed under ORS 276.021 or 276.023.

32           “(i) Employees of the Port of Portland who are classified as airport police by the Board of  
33 Commissioners of the Port of Portland.

34           “(j) Employees of the State Department of Agriculture who are classified as livestock police of-  
35 ficers by the Director of Agriculture.

36           “(k) Employees of the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training who are classified  
37 by the department as other than secretarial or clerical personnel.

38           “(L) Investigators of the Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice.

39           “(m) Corrections officers as defined in ORS 181.610.

40           “(n) Employees of the Oregon State Lottery Commission who are classified by the Director of  
41 the Oregon State Lottery as enforcement agents pursuant to ORS 461.110.

42           “(o) The Director of the Department of Corrections.

43           “(p) An employee who for seven consecutive years has been classified as a police officer as de-  
44 fined by this section, and who is employed or transferred by the Department of Corrections to fill  
45 a position designated by the Director of the Department of Corrections as being eligible for police

1 officer status.

2 “(q) An employee of the Department of Corrections classified as a police officer on or prior to  
3 July 27, 1989, whether or not that classification was authorized by law, as long as the employee  
4 remains in the position held on July 27, 1989. The initial classification of an employee under a sys-  
5 tem implemented pursuant to ORS 240.190 does not affect police officer status.

6 “(r) Employees of a school district who are appointed and duly sworn members of a law  
7 enforcement agency of the district as provided in ORS 332.531 or otherwise employed full-time as  
8 police officers commissioned by the district.

9 “(s) Employees at youth correction facilities and juvenile detention facilities under ORS  
10 419A.050, 419A.052 and 420.005 to 420.915 who are required to hold valid Oregon teaching licenses  
11 and who have supervisory, control or teaching responsibilities over juveniles committed to the cus-  
12 tody of the Department of Corrections or the Oregon Youth Authority.

13 “(t) Employees at youth correction facilities as defined in ORS 420.005 whose primary job de-  
14 scription involves the custody, control, treatment, investigation or supervision of juveniles placed  
15 in such facilities.

16 “(u) Employees of the Oregon Youth Authority who are classified as juvenile parole and pro-  
17 bation officers.

18 “(20) ‘Prior service credit’ means credit provided under ORS 238.442 or under ORS 238.225 (2)  
19 to (6) (1999 Edition).

20 “(21) ‘Public employer’ means the state, one of its agencies, any city, county, or municipal or  
21 public corporation, any political subdivision of the state or any instrumentality thereof, or an agency  
22 created by one or more such governmental organizations to provide governmental services. For  
23 purposes of this chapter, such agency created by one or more governmental organizations is a gov-  
24 ernmental instrumentality and a legal entity with power to enter into contracts, hold property and  
25 sue and be sued.

26 “(22) ‘Qualifying position’ means one or more jobs with one or more participating public em-  
27 ployers in which an employee performs 600 or more hours of service in a calendar year, excluding  
28 any service in a job for which a participating public employer does not provide benefits under this  
29 chapter pursuant to an application made under ORS 238.035.

30 “(23) ‘Regular account’ means the account established for each active and inactive member un-  
31 der ORS 238.250.

32 “(24) ‘Retired member’ means a member who is retired for service or disability.

33 “(25) ‘Retirement credit’ means a period of time that is treated as creditable service for the  
34 purposes of this chapter.

35 “(26)(a) ‘Salary’ means the remuneration paid an employee in cash out of the funds of a public  
36 employer in return for services to the employer, plus the monetary value, as determined by the  
37 Public Employees Retirement Board, of whatever living quarters, board, lodging, fuel, laundry and  
38 other advantages the employer furnishes the employee in return for services.

39 “(b) ‘Salary’ includes but is not limited to:

40 “(A) Payments of employee and employer money into a deferred compensation plan, which are  
41 deemed salary paid in each month of deferral;

42 “(B) The amount of participation in a tax-sheltered or deferred annuity, which is deemed salary  
43 paid in each month of participation;

44 “(C) Retroactive payments described in ORS 238.008; and

45 “(D) Wages of a deceased member paid to a surviving spouse or dependent children under ORS

1 652.190.

2 “(c) ‘Salary’ or ‘other advantages’ does not include:

3 “(A) Travel or any other expenses incidental to employer’s business which is reimbursed by the  
4 employer;

5 “(B) Payments for insurance coverage by an employer on behalf of employee or employee and  
6 dependents, for which the employee has no cash option;

7 “(C) Payments made on account of an employee’s death;

8 “(D) Any lump sum payment for accumulated unused sick leave;

9 “(E) Any accelerated payment of an employment contract for a future period or an advance  
10 against future wages;

11 “(F) Any retirement incentive, retirement severance pay, retirement bonus or retirement  
12 gratuitous payment;

13 “(G) Payments for periods of leave of absence after the date the employer and employee have  
14 agreed that no future services qualifying pursuant to ORS 238.015 (3) will be performed, except for  
15 sick leave and vacation;

16 “(H) Payments for instructional services rendered to public universities listed in ORS 352.002  
17 or the Oregon Health and Science University when such services are in excess of full-time employ-  
18 ment subject to this chapter. A person employed under a contract for less than 12 months is subject  
19 to this subparagraph only for the months to which the contract pertains; or

20 “(I) Payments made by an employer for insurance coverage provided to a domestic partner of  
21 an employee.

22 “(27) ‘School year’ means the period beginning July 1 and ending June 30 next following.

23 “(28) ‘System’ means the Public Employees Retirement System.

24 “(29) ‘Variable account’ means the account established for a member who participates in the  
25 Variable Annuity Account under ORS 238.260.

26 “(30) ‘Vested’ means being an active member of the system in each of five calendar years.

27 “(31) ‘Volunteer firefighter’ means a firefighter whose position normally requires less than 600  
28 hours of service per year.

29 “**SECTION 3.** ORS 238.005, as operative until July 1, 2014, is amended to read:

4 Services shall submit the proposed changes, **including step pay increases**, to the legislative review

22 persons or of a majority of the members of the task force.

23 “(8) The task force may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the task force.

39 “SECTION 12. The task force established by section 10 of this 2014 Act is a continuation  
40 of the Task Force on the State Budget Process established by section 1, chapter 601, Oregon  
41 Laws 2013, and not a new task force. The members appointed under section 1, chapter 601,  
42 Oregon Laws 2013, and serving on the date of the convening of the 2014 regular session of  
43 the Legislative Assembly shall continue to serve for purposes of the task force established  
44 under section 10 of this 2014 Act.





1 make a loan to the school district. A loan made as provided by this paragraph:

2 “(A) May not exceed \$400,000;

3 “(B) Shall be interest free;

4 “(C) Must be repaid within four years after entering into the agreement or by December  
5 31, 2018, whichever is earlier; and

6 “(D) Must be repaid from amounts that otherwise would have been distributed to the  
7 school district from the State School Fund.

8 “(5) The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall transfer to the State School Fund any  
9 amounts repaid by a financially troubled school district for a loan made under this section.

10 “(6) A school district that receives financial assistance under this section shall submit  
11 quarterly financial reports to the department for review until the loan is repaid in full.

12 “(7) The Superintendent of Public Instruction, on recommendation of the department,  
13 may order changes in the financial policies of the school district until the loan is repaid in  
14 full.

15 “SECTION 19. Section 18 of this 2014 Act is repealed on December 31, 2018.

16 “SECTION 20. Notwithstanding ORS 327.008 and 327.013, for the biennium beginning July  
17 1, 2013, the Department of Education may expend up to \$400,000 from the State School Fund  
18 for the purposes of section 18 of this 2014 Act.

22 “SECTION 21. The unit captions used in this 2014 Act are provided only for the conven-  
23 ience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or express any  
24 legislative intent in the enactment of this 2014 Act.

26 “EMERGENCY CLAUSE

27  
28 “SECTION 22. This 2014 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public  
29 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2014 Act takes effect  
30 on its passage.”.
