Work Session

SB 3

Creates crime of endangering person protected by Family Abuse Prevention Act restraining order.

SB 132 A

Expands crime of assault in third degree to include physical injury to health care provider in hospital.

SB 190

Prohibits person from shipping or transporting or causing to be shipped or transported cigarettes, electronic cigarettes or smokeless tobacco products unless person is licensed distributor or retailer.

SB 274

Provides that attorney authorized to practice law in this state is not required to register as collection agency in order to serve, file or convey certain legal documents or to communicate with debtor, as directed by client or court or in deposition or settlement conference, regarding pending or possible legal action to collect debt.

SB 316

Prohibits service provider from disclosing contents of communication and certain other information except in certain circumstances.

SB 369

Enacts Uniform Fiduciary Access to Digital Assets Act.

SB 397 **

**Subsequent Referral(s) to Finance and Revenue

Increases fees for driving while under influence of intoxicants screening interview and diagnostic assessment.

SB 409

Repeals \$500,000 limit on noneconomic damages recoverable in wrongful death actions and other statutorily created causes of action.

SB 525

Prohibits possession of firearm or ammunition by person who is subject to restraining order issued by court under Family Abuse Prevention Act or who has been convicted of certain misdemeanor crimes involving domestic violence.

SB 526

Modifies definition of "physical injury" for purposes of criminal code.

- SB 557
Modifies scope of justifiable use of physical force for purposes of criminal prosecution.
- SB 601
Expands definition of "personal information" for purposes of Oregon Consumer Identity Theft Protection Act.
- SB 639
Restricts use of motor vehicle registration plate surveillance cameras.
- SB 670
Directs Department of Justice to develop training curriculum and provide training to public employees, community providers and others on confidentiality requirements, privacy laws and sharing of information in order to consistently facilitate sharing of information between programs and entities wherever feasible.
- SB 694
Allows operators of motorcycles and mopeds to pass vehicles in same lane during traffic jams or slowdowns.
- SB 822
Directs presiding judge of each judicial district to ensure all grand jury proceedings except for deliberations and voting are recorded verbatim.
- SB 871
Directs law enforcement agency to notify Attorney General when police officer's use of deadly physical force causes death of person.
- SB 908
Removes prohibition of filing motion to set aside conviction for person committing certain offenses within previous 10 years.

Public Hearing and Work Session

- SB 341
Provides that agri-tourism provider is not liable for injury to or death of participant arising out of inherent risks of agri-tourism if agri-tourism provider posts certain notices.

Public Hearing and Possible Work Session

- SB 118
Requires law enforcement agency to establish policies and procedures for retaining recordings from cameras worn upon police officer's person to record officer's interactions with members of public.
- SB 344
Decreases penalty for crime of cheating to maximum of one year's imprisonment, \$6,250 fine, or both.
For the purpose of consideration of amendments.
- SB 349
Repeals obsolete provision relating to jury trials in county courts.
For the purpose of consideration of amendments.
- SB 352
Increases time for conducting preliminary hearing on minor's application for emancipation to 15 days after date of filing.
For the purpose of consideration of amendments.
- SB 353
Increases statute of limitations from 10 to 12 years for causes of action with no specified statute of limitations.
For the purpose of consideration of amendments.
- SB 392
Directs Department of Justice to conduct study on domestic violence criminal statutes and present report on findings to interim committees of Legislative Assembly related to judiciary on or before September 15, 2016.
For the purpose of consideration of amendments.
- SB 914
Eliminates automatic reporting of person found to have committed act that would constitute felony sex crime if committed by adult.

SB 915

Authorizes persons adjudicated for sex crime as juvenile in Oregon to file petition for relief from reporting requirements when person does not reside, attend school or work in Oregon.
