SUMMARY

Eliminates sunset date on conditional exemption from disclosure of public records that set forth name, home address or professional location of person engaged in, or providing goods and services for, medical research at Oregon Health and Science University that is conducted using animals other than rodents.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to the exemption from disclosure of public records that identify
3 persons involved in research using animals at Oregon Health and Science
4 University; amending ORS 146.035 and 192.501; and repealing section 4,
5 chapter 455, Oregon Laws 2005.

6 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

7 **SECTION 1. Section 4, chapter 455, Oregon Laws 2005, as amended**
8 **by section 1, chapter 719, Oregon Laws 2009, section 8, chapter 9,**
9 **Oregon Laws 2011, section 1, chapter 160, Oregon Laws 2011, and sec-**
10 **tion 8, chapter 1, Oregon Laws 2013, is repealed.**

11 **SECTION 2. ORS 192.501, as amended by section 3, chapter 455, Oregon**
12 **Laws 2005, section 7, chapter 608, Oregon Laws 2007, section 2, chapter 687,**
13 **Oregon Laws 2007, section 2, chapter 48, Oregon Laws 2008, section 3, chap-**
14 **ter 57, Oregon Laws 2009, section 2, chapter 135, Oregon Laws 2009, section**
15 **4, chapter 222, Oregon Laws 2009, section 2, chapter 769, Oregon Laws 2009,**

2 192.501. The following public records are exempt from disclosure under
3 ORS 192.410 to 192.505 unless the public interest requires disclosure in the
4 particular instance:

5 (1) Records of a public body pertaining to litigation to which the public
6 body is a party if the complaint has been filed, or if the complaint has not
7 been filed, if the public body shows that such litigation is reasonably likely
8 to occur. This exemption does not apply to litigation which has been con-
9 cluded, and nothing in this subsection shall limit any right or opportunity
10 granted by discovery or deposition statutes to a party to litigation or po-
11 tential litigation.

12 (2) Trade secrets. "Trade secrets," as used in this section, may include,
13 but are not limited to, any formula, plan, pattern, process, tool, mechanism,
14 compound, procedure, production data, or compilation of information which
15 is not patented, which is known only to certain individuals within an or-
16 ganization and which is used in a business it conducts, having actual or
17 potential commercial value, and which gives its user an opportunity to ob-
18 tain a business advantage over competitors who do not know or use it.

19 (3) Investigatory information compiled for criminal law purposes. The re-
20 cord of an arrest or the report of a crime shall be disclosed unless and only
21 for so long as there is a clear need to delay disclosure in the course of a
22 specific investigation, including the need to protect the complaining party
23 or the victim. Nothing in this subsection shall limit any right constitu-
24 tionally guaranteed, or granted by statute, to disclosure or discovery in
25 criminal cases. For purposes of this subsection, the record of an arrest or the
26 report of a crime includes, but is not limited to:

27 (a) The arrested person's name, age, residence, employment, marital status
28 and similar biographical information;

29 (b) The offense with which the arrested person is charged;

30 (c) The conditions of release pursuant to ORS 135.230 to 135.290;

31 (d) The identity of and biographical information concerning both com-

1 plaining party and victim;

2 (e) The identity of the investigating and arresting agency and the length
3 of the investigation;

4 (f) The circumstances of arrest, including time, place, resistance, pursuit
5 and weapons used; and

6 (g) Such information as may be necessary to enlist public assistance in
7 apprehending fugitives from justice.

8 (4) Test questions, scoring keys, and other data used to administer a li-
9 censing examination, employment, academic or other examination or testing
10 procedure before the examination is given and if the examination is to be
11 used again. Records establishing procedures for and instructing persons ad-
12 ministering, grading or evaluating an examination or testing procedure are
13 included in this exemption, to the extent that disclosure would create a risk
14 that the result might be affected.

15 (5) Information consisting of production records, sale or purchase records
16 or catch records, or similar business records of a private concern or enter-
17 prise, required by law to be submitted to or inspected by a governmental
18 body to allow it to determine fees or assessments payable or to establish
19 production quotas, and the amounts of such fees or assessments payable or
20 paid, to the extent that such information is in a form which would permit
21 identification of the individual concern or enterprise. This exemption does
22 not include records submitted by long term care facilities as defined in ORS
23 442.015 to the state for purposes of reimbursement of expenses or determining
24 fees for patient care. Nothing in this subsection shall limit the use which
25 can be made of such information for regulatory purposes or its admissibility
26 in any enforcement proceeding.

27 (6) Information relating to the appraisal of real estate prior to its acqui-
28 sition.

29 (7) The names and signatures of employees who sign authorization cards
30 or petitions for the purpose of requesting representation or decertification
31 elections.

1 (8) Investigatory information relating to any complaint filed under ORS
2 659A.820 or 659A.825, until such time as the complaint is resolved under ORS
3 659A.835, or a final order is issued under ORS 659A.850.

4 (9) Investigatory information relating to any complaint or charge filed
5 under ORS 243.676 and 663.180.

6 (10) Records, reports and other information received or compiled by the
7 Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services under ORS
8 697.732.

9 (11) Information concerning the location of archaeological sites or objects
10 as those terms are defined in ORS 358.905, except if the governing body of
11 an Indian tribe requests the information and the need for the information is
12 related to that Indian tribe's cultural or religious activities. This exemption
13 does not include information relating to a site that is all or part of an ex-
14 isting, commonly known and publicized tourist facility or attraction.

15 (12) A personnel discipline action, or materials or documents supporting
16 that action.

17 (13) Information developed pursuant to ORS 496.004, 496.172 and 498.026
18 or ORS 496.192 and 564.100, regarding the habitat, location or population of
19 any threatened species or endangered species.

20 (14) Writings prepared by or under the direction of faculty of public ed-
21 ucational institutions, in connection with research, until publicly released,
22 copyrighted or patented.

23 (15) Computer programs developed or purchased by or for any public body
24 for its own use. As used in this subsection, "computer program" means a
25 series of instructions or statements which permit the functioning of a com-
26 puter system in a manner designed to provide storage, retrieval and manip-
27 ulation of data from such computer system, and any associated
28 documentation and source material that explain how to operate the computer
29 program. "Computer program" does not include:

30 (a) The original data, including but not limited to numbers, text, voice,
31 graphics and images;

1 (b) Analyses, compilations and other manipulated forms of the original
2 data produced by use of the program; or

3 (c) The mathematical and statistical formulas which would be used if the
4 manipulated forms of the original data were to be produced manually.

5 (16) Data and information provided by participants to mediation under
6 ORS 36.256.

7 (17) Investigatory information relating to any complaint or charge filed
8 under ORS chapter 654, until a final administrative determination is made
9 or, if a citation is issued, until an employer receives notice of any citation.

10 (18) Specific operational plans in connection with an anticipated threat
11 to individual or public safety for deployment and use of personnel and
12 equipment, prepared or used by a public body, if public disclosure of the
13 plans would endanger an individual's life or physical safety or jeopardize a
14 law enforcement activity.

15 (19)(a) Audits or audit reports required of a telecommunications carrier.
16 As used in this paragraph, "audit or audit report" means any external or
17 internal audit or audit report pertaining to a telecommunications carrier, as
18 defined in ORS 133.721, or pertaining to a corporation having an affiliated
19 interest, as defined in ORS 759.390, with a telecommunications carrier that
20 is intended to make the operations of the entity more efficient, accurate or
21 compliant with applicable rules, procedures or standards, that may include
22 self-criticism and that has been filed by the telecommunications carrier or
23 affiliate under compulsion of state law. "Audit or audit report" does not
24 mean an audit of a cost study that would be discoverable in a contested case
25 proceeding and that is not subject to a protective order; and

26 (b) Financial statements. As used in this paragraph, "financial
27 statement" means a financial statement of a nonregulated corporation having
28 an affiliated interest, as defined in ORS 759.390, with a telecommunications
29 carrier, as defined in ORS 133.721.

30 (20) The residence address of an elector if authorized under ORS 247.965
31 and subject to ORS 247.967.

1 (21) The following records, communications and information submitted to
2 a housing authority as defined in ORS 456.005, or to an urban renewal
3 agency as defined in ORS 457.010, by applicants for and recipients of loans,
4 grants and tax credits:

5 (a) Personal and corporate financial statements and information, includ-
6 ing tax returns;

7 (b) Credit reports;

8 (c) Project appraisals, excluding appraisals obtained in the course of
9 transactions involving an interest in real estate that is acquired, leased,
10 rented, exchanged, transferred or otherwise disposed of as part of the project,
11 but only after the transactions have closed and are concluded;

12 (d) Market studies and analyses;

13 (e) Articles of incorporation, partnership agreements and operating
14 agreements;

15 (f) Commitment letters;

16 (g) Project pro forma statements;

17 (h) Project cost certifications and cost data;

18 (i) Audits;

19 (j) Project tenant correspondence requested to be confidential;

20 (k) Tenant files relating to certification; and

21 (L) Housing assistance payment requests.

22 (22) Records or information that, if disclosed, would allow a person to:

23 (a) Gain unauthorized access to buildings or other property;

24 (b) Identify those areas of structural or operational vulnerability that
25 would permit unlawful disruption to, or interference with, services; or

26 (c) Disrupt, interfere with or gain unauthorized access to public funds or
27 to information processing, communication or telecommunication systems, in-
28 cluding the information contained in the systems, that are used or operated
29 by a public body.

30 (23) Records or information that would reveal or otherwise identify secu-
31 rity measures, or weaknesses or potential weaknesses in security measures,

1 taken or recommended to be taken to protect:

2 (a) An individual;

3 (b) Buildings or other property;

4 (c) Information processing, communication or telecommunication systems,
5 including the information contained in the systems; or

6 (d) Those operations of the Oregon State Lottery the security of which
7 are subject to study and evaluation under ORS 461.180 (6).

8 (24) Personal information held by or under the direction of officials of the
9 Oregon Health and Science University, a public university listed in ORS
10 352.002 or the Oregon University System about a person who has or who is
11 interested in donating money or property to the Oregon Health and Science
12 University, the system or a public university, if the information is related
13 to the family of the person, personal assets of the person or is incidental
14 information not related to the donation.

15 (25) The home address, professional address and telephone number of a
16 person who has or who is interested in donating money or property to the
17 Oregon University System or a public university listed in ORS 352.002.

18 (26) Records of the name and address of a person who files a report with
19 or pays an assessment to a commodity commission established under ORS
20 576.051 to 576.455, the Oregon Beef Council created under ORS 577.210 or the
21 Oregon Wheat Commission created under ORS 578.030.

22 (27) Information provided to, obtained by or used by a public body to au-
23 thorize, originate, receive or authenticate a transfer of funds, including but
24 not limited to a credit card number, payment card expiration date, password,
25 financial institution account number and financial institution routing num-
26 ber.

27 (28) Social Security numbers as provided in ORS 107.840.

28 (29) The electronic mail address of a student who attends a public uni-
29 versity listed in ORS 352.002 or Oregon Health and Science University.

30 **(30) The name, home address, professional address or location of a**
31 **person that is engaged in, or that provides goods or services for,**

1 **medical research at Oregon Health and Science University that is**
2 **conducted using animals other than rodents. This subsection does not**
3 **apply to Oregon Health and Science University press releases, websites**
4 **or other publications circulated to the general public.**

5 [(30)] (31) If requested by a public safety officer, as defined in ORS
6 181.610:

7 (a) The home address and home telephone number of the public safety
8 officer contained in the voter registration records for the public safety offi-
9 cer.

10 (b) The home address and home telephone number of the public safety
11 officer contained in records of the Department of Public Safety Standards
12 and Training.

13 (c) The name of the public safety officer contained in county real property
14 assessment or taxation records. This exemption:

15 (A) Applies only to the name of the public safety officer and any other
16 owner of the property in connection with a specific property identified by the
17 officer in a request for exemption from disclosure;

18 (B) Applies only to records that may be made immediately available to
19 the public upon request in person, by telephone or using the Internet;

20 (C) Applies until the public safety officer requests termination of the ex-
21 emption;

22 (D) Does not apply to disclosure of records among public bodies as defined
23 in ORS 174.109 for governmental purposes; and

24 (E) May not result in liability for the county if the name of the public
25 safety officer is disclosed after a request for exemption from disclosure is
26 made under this subsection.

27 [(31)] (32) Unless the public records request is made by a financial insti-
28 tution, as defined in ORS 706.008, consumer finance company licensed under
29 ORS chapter 725, mortgage banker or mortgage broker licensed under ORS
30 86A.095 to 86A.198, or title company for business purposes, records described
31 in paragraph (a) of this subsection, if the exemption from disclosure of the

1 records is sought by an individual described in paragraph (b) of this sub-
2 section using the procedure described in paragraph (c) of this subsection:

3 (a) The home address, home or cellular telephone number or personal
4 electronic mail address contained in the records of any public body that has
5 received the request that is set forth in:

6 (A) A warranty deed, deed of trust, mortgage, lien, deed of reconveyance,
7 release, satisfaction, substitution of trustee, easement, dog license, marriage
8 license or military discharge record that is in the possession of the county
9 clerk; or

10 (B) Any public record of a public body other than the county clerk.

11 (b) The individual claiming the exemption from disclosure must be a dis-
12 trict attorney, a deputy district attorney, the Attorney General or an assist-
13 ant attorney general, the United States Attorney for the District of Oregon
14 or an assistant United States attorney for the District of Oregon, a city at-
15 torney who engages in the prosecution of criminal matters or a deputy city
16 attorney who engages in the prosecution of criminal matters.

17 (c) The individual claiming the exemption from disclosure must do so by
18 filing the claim in writing with the public body for which the exemption from
19 disclosure is being claimed on a form prescribed by the public body. Unless
20 the claim is filed with the county clerk, the claim form shall list the public
21 records in the possession of the public body to which the exemption applies.
22 The exemption applies until the individual claiming the exemption requests
23 termination of the exemption or ceases to qualify for the exemption.

24 [(32)] **(33)** The following voluntary conservation agreements and reports:

25 (a) Land management plans required for voluntary stewardship agree-
26 ments entered into under ORS 541.423; and

27 (b) Written agreements relating to the conservation of greater sage grouse
28 entered into voluntarily by owners or occupiers of land with a soil and water
29 conservation district under ORS 568.550.

30 [(33)] **(34)** Sensitive business records or financial or commercial informa-
31 tion of the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation that is not custom-

1 arily provided to business competitors. This exemption does not:

2 (a) Apply to the formulas for determining dividends to be paid to em-
3 ployers insured by the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation;

4 (b) Apply to contracts for advertising, public relations or lobbying ser-
5 vices or to documents related to the formation of such contracts;

6 (c) Apply to group insurance contracts or to documents relating to the
7 formation of such contracts, except that employer account records shall re-
8 main exempt from disclosure as provided in ORS 192.502 (35); or

9 (d) Provide the basis for opposing the discovery of documents in litigation
10 pursuant to the applicable rules of civil procedure.

11 [(34)] **(35)** Records of the Department of Public Safety Standards and
12 Training relating to investigations conducted under ORS 181.662 or 181.878
13 (6), until the department issues the report described in ORS 181.662 or
14 181.878.

15 [(35)] **(36)** A medical examiner's report, autopsy report or laboratory test
16 report ordered by a medical examiner under ORS 146.117.

17 [(36)] **(37)** Any document or other information related to an audit of a
18 public body, as defined in ORS 174.109, that is in the custody of an auditor
19 or audit organization operating under nationally recognized government au-
20 diting standards, until the auditor or audit organization issues a final audit
21 report in accordance with those standards or the audit is abandoned. This
22 exemption does not prohibit disclosure of a draft audit report that is pro-
23 vided to the audited entity for the entity's response to the audit findings.

24 [(37)(a)] **(38)(a)** Personally identifiable information collected as part of
25 an electronic fare collection system of a mass transit system.

26 (b) The exemption from disclosure in paragraph (a) of this subsection does
27 not apply to public records that have attributes of anonymity that are suffi-
28 cient, or that are aggregated into groupings that are broad enough, to ensure
29 that persons cannot be identified by disclosure of the public records.

30 (c) As used in this subsection:

31 (A) "Electronic fare collection system" means the software and hardware

1 used for, associated with or relating to the collection of transit fares for a
2 mass transit system, including but not limited to computers, radio commu-
3 nication systems, personal mobile devices, wearable technology, fare instru-
4 ments, information technology, data storage or collection equipment, or other
5 equipment or improvements.

6 (B) “Mass transit system” has the meaning given that term in ORS
7 267.010.

8 (C) “Personally identifiable information” means all information relating
9 to a person that acquires or uses a transit pass or other fare payment me-
10 dium in connection with an electronic fare collection system, including but
11 not limited to:

12 (i) Customer account information, date of birth, telephone number, phys-
13 ical address, electronic mail address, credit or debit card information, bank
14 account information, Social Security or taxpayer identification number or
15 other identification number, transit pass or fare payment medium balances
16 or history, or similar personal information; or

17 (ii) Travel dates, travel times, frequency of use, travel locations, service
18 types or vehicle use, or similar travel information.

19 **SECTION 3.** ORS 146.035, as amended by section 7, chapter 1, Oregon
20 Laws 2013, is amended to read:

21 146.035. (1) There is established within the Department of State Police the
22 State Medical Examiner’s office for the purpose of directing and supporting
23 the state death investigation program.

24 (2) The State Medical Examiner shall manage all aspects of the State
25 Medical Examiner’s program.

26 (3) Subject to the State Personnel Relations Law, the State Medical Ex-
27 aminer may employ or discharge other personnel of the State Medical
28 Examiner’s office.

29 (4) The State Medical Examiner’s office shall:

30 (a) File and maintain appropriate reports on all deaths requiring investi-
31 gation.

1 (b) Maintain an accurate list of all active district medical examiners, as-
2 sistant district medical examiners and designated pathologists.

3 (c) Transmit monthly to the Department of Transportation a report for
4 the preceding calendar month of all information obtained under ORS 146.113.

5 (5) Notwithstanding ORS 192.501 [(35)] **(36)**:

6 (a) Any parent, spouse, sibling, child or personal representative of the
7 deceased, or any person who may be criminally or civilly liable for the death,
8 or their authorized representatives respectively, may examine and obtain
9 copies of any medical examiner's report, autopsy report or laboratory test
10 report ordered by a medical examiner under ORS 146.117.

11 (b) The system described in ORS 192.517 (1) shall have access to reports
12 described in this subsection as provided in ORS 192.517.

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
