



Oregon Liquor Control Commission 2015-17 Governor's Budget



- Makes investments to update and modernize the agency and its infrastructure
 - o Roof repair (\$2.6 million Other Funds)
 - o Upgrade to the phone system (\$0.1 million Other Funds)
 - Provides for online and e-commerce licensing (\$0.3 million Other Funds)
 - Updates the warehouse shipping system to increase shipping capacity (\$5.0 million Other Funds)
- Provides the agency resources to meet peace officer training requirements as required by Senate Bill 1528 (2012) (\$0.2 million Other Funds)

Oregon Liquor Control Commission 2015-17 Governor's Budget

- DAS DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE
- Establishes a new Marijuana Regulation program in support of Ballot Measure 91
- Establishes bank card fees as a Nonlimited expenditure
- Assumes that the Legislature will dedicate the full amount of the 50-cent per spirits bottle surcharge to the General Fund
- Supports House Bill 2480 which establishes a new processing fee for the issuance of a new license or a license following a change in ownership
