What is Outdoor School?

Launched in southern Oregon's Curry County in 1957

By 1970 more than 80 percent of Oregon middle school students attended outdoor school.

As of 2012, only half of Oregon students participated in Outdoor School





- "Getting Oregon schoolchildren into programs that get them outdoors to learn about science and the environment:"
 - 93 percent of Oregonians think it is important.
 - 67 percent of Oregonians think it is "extremely important" or "very important."



Would you support \$20 million a year to ensure all Oregon students get a chance to attend Outdoor School?

- 64 percent "yes" (only 22 percent "no")



- Support highest outside Portland Metro region
 - 60 percent Portland
 - 64 percent Willamette Valley
 - -70 percent rest of state



Most important skills "for the students of today to be the citizens Oregon needs for a strong future:"

- Building self-sufficiency and leadership skills
- Being good stewards of Oregon's natural resources
- Teaching children how to collaborate and work together
- Getting children active and healthier in outdoor settings





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Allocate \$22 million annually to an Outdoor Education Account to provide Oregon students with outdoor school programs during their 5th or 6th grade year



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- (a) Is a **six-day**, residential, **hands-on educational experience** featuring field study opportunities for students learning about:
 - (A) Soil, water, plants and animals;
 - (B) The role of timber, agriculture and other natural resources in the economy of this state;
 - (C) The interrelationship of nature, natural resources, economic development and career opportunities in this state; and
 - (D) The importance of preserving this state's environment and natural resources.



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- (b) Is **integrated with local school curricula** in a manner that assists students in **meeting state standards** related to science, technology, engineering and mathematics, and international standards related to science.
- (c) Provides students with opportunities to develop leadership, critical thinking and decision-making skills.
- (d) Addresses inequity of outdoor educational opportunities for underserved children in Oregon
