The Testimony of Dalene McElhaney Date: February 2, 2015 Yes on Senate Bill 411

MS. MCELHANEY: On October 30, 2011, I was in an automobile accident. It was a head-on accident. I had a driver coming towards me on Highway 26 just outside of Madras, two-land highway. And I saw her coming and saw her veer off the side of the highway and she over-corrected and she came into my lane and hit me head-on. And that -- it -- it just ended up having me trapped in the car. My children were also in the vehicle. And we were knocked off the highway and I had to be cut out of the vehicle with Jaws of Life.

Well, as you can imagine, 23 nights in the hospital is quite a bit of money. The -- the titanium in -- that's in my legs and my hip amounted to about \$35,000 itself. That's without doctor expenses or anything. Then, of course, the surgery, 23 nights in the hospital. It came out to about \$285,000. I ended up using up my limit on my physical therapy, so I ended up having to spend money out of my own pocket for physical therapy. I spent about \$1,000 out of my own pocket to cover what was not covered with my insurance.

And then when I looked at -- or when I found out about the car insurance, I had paid all of my premiums and I had my uninsured, underinsured motorist coverage

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    of $300,000, which I thought would go into play when
    somebody did not have enough coverage to pay for
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    medical expenses.

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    yes. In Oregon, I'm -- I'm only required to carry, I
    believe, it's $25,000. And the gal that hit me had
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     $100,000 coverage. So when I heard that her $100,000
    was not adequate, I thought, okay, well, then, my
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    insurance will kick in and pay the rest. And I found
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    out that's not so. And so I was left, then, with
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    another $185,000 to try to figure out how to pay for
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     it. And so, you know, when I was trying to heal, and
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    when I heard this news, it was just devastating. And,
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    you know.

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    fault. I shouldn't have had to pay a dime for
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    anything. I -- I've paid enough having to go through
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    the emotional trauma. But then I also had to go
     through the concern over the financial aspect of
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    things and I just don't want to see other people go
    through it.
