

- 2006 Online Oregon Documents Repository created




State

ORS 357.005 State Library duties and powers

- Promote adequate library services for all of the people of this state.
- Provide advice and assistance to libraries, to library boards, to units of local government empowered to establish libraries.
- Maintain and develop appropriate collections of library materials to supplement the collections and services of other libraries in the state and to meet the reference and research needs of the Legislative Assembly and of the state government by providing library services thereto.
- Provide library services to people who are blind or print-disabled in cooperation with the United States Library of Congress.
- Prescribe the conditions for the use of state documents in depository libraries and provide for permanent public access to state government publications.



Ready to Read Grant Outcomes

- Young children develop the six early learning skills by the time they start kindergarten.
- Adults enjoy reading, singing, talking, writing, and playing with their young children regularly to help them develop early literacy skills.
- Youth maintain or improve their literacy skills over the summer.
- Youth demonstrate their love of reading and learning by choosing to engage in these activities during their free time.
- Adults enjoy spending time engaging in literacy activities with youth regularly to help them develop literacy skills.
- Public libraries make an extra effort to engage underserved youth in grant-funded activities.



Policy Package #102

Ready to Read program becomes the Reading for Success program.

Key components:

- increase eligible ages from 0-14 to 0-17,
- increase minimum grant from \$1,000 to \$1,200,
- allow public libraries to use funds for expanded learning opportunities for school age youth (out of school time)
- greater emphasis on outcomes,
- specifically target underserved children and families.

\$139,759 General Fund increase

State

Federal Grant Administration

- \$2.1 Million Library Services and Technology Act grants to states program
 - Funds statewide projects and competitive grants to local communities via their libraries
- Requires Match and Maintenance of Effort

Maintenance of Effort (MOE)

- Requires the State Library to:
 - Not replace existing state funds with federal grant dollars
 - Spend the state dollars for the same purposes as allowed by the federal grant dollars
- We use state money that supports Talking Book and Braille and Ready to Read programs to meet our MOE requirement

Talking Book and Braille Library

Services for eligible Oregonians who cannot read conventional text or hold conventional books.

Age	Talking Book and Braille Library Users
0-18	168 (3%)
19-40	334 (7%)
41-60	769 (15%)
61-80	1,760 (34%)
Over 80	2,098 (41%)



Circulation

- Players and digital books are sent to eligible Oregonians and returned to TBABS via U.S. Mail under the provisions of *Free Matter for the Blind* (Domestic Mail Manual E040)
- Eligible Oregonians who have access to high speed internet can download materials directly from *Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD),* iOS app available





Collections

- From the National Library Service for the Blind:
 - Audio books and magazines
 - Braille books and magazines
 - Downloadable audio books
- National and Oregon newspapers
- Descriptive videos

Outreach & Customer Care

- Outreach to:
 - Assisted living and nursing facilities staff and residents
 - Service organization members
 - Public library staff and patrons
 - State agency staff
- Staff follow up with newly registered patrons to assure ability to use the service
- Staff provide assistance selecting materials



Policy Package #100

Sustain current service levels within Talking Book and Braille Library

Shifts State Library Specialist 1 from Other Funds to General Fund because donation accounts are no longer sufficient to fund this position.

\$49,078 General Fund increase*

* Position control system issue



Library Services

- Borrow items from other libraries in Oregon and the U.S. for use in state agency work.
- Training in using resources and materials

- Outreach to state agency staff and Legislature

Agency Reports

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Agency Budget Drivers/Environmental Factors

- Rapid pace of change in library technology requires rapid response by State Library staff.
- Reduction in local library budgets and increasing use of local libraries requires increased State Library support with grants and consulting.
- Changes in the use of library materials and library spaces requires re-evaluation of spaces and materials.
- Sophisticated information needs of state agency staff requires sophisticated materials and services collected and maintained by the State Library.
- Aging population requires providing legacy services as well as current services.



Agency Budget Drivers/Environmental Factors

- Donation fund and interest on endowment fund are running low.
- Increasing expectations of rapid change to accommodate new technologies.
- Sophisticated information needs of state agency staff.
- Aging population requires additional services.



Policy Package #080

- Adjusts budgeted expenditures to reflect a two year budget.
- Since the State Library was funded for only one year in the 2013 Legislative session and the second year was approved in the May 2014 Emergency Board session, this package increases our 2015-2017 budget and staffing to reflect the actual costs of a two year budget.
