

SB 79: It's time for Oregon to be CPR Smart.

Requiring CPR training for Oregon students will prepare more than 45,000 new lifesavers each year to administer CPR in an emergency.

SUDDEN CARDIAC ARREST: LESS THAN 11% SURVIVE

If you suffer sudden cardiac arrest, your best chance at survival is receiving bystander CPR until EMTs arrive. But most do not. That's a reality that has to change, starting today.

- Each year, nearly 424,000 people have sudden cardiac arrest outside of a hospital, and only 10.4% of these victims survive.
- Sudden cardiac arrest can happen any place, at any time—4 out of 5 in the U.S. happen at home.
- CPR is **easy to learn and simple**. After calling 9-1-1, push hard and fast in the center of the chest at 100 beats per minute.
- When a CPR-trained bystander is near, they can **double**, even triple these victims' survival rates by giving victims the help they need until the EMTs arrive.

ABOUT SB 79: TEACHING CPR IN SCHOOLS

The American Heart Association is creating a generation of lifesavers by making sure students learn CPR before they graduate high school.

- *Saves lives:* Teaching students CPR before they graduate would put thousands of qualified lifesavers on our streets every year and could save thousands of lives,
- *Hands-On in Health Class:* **Oregon students are already required to take one-credit of health and to learn about CPR**, but they are not required to learn the psychomotor skills (or "hands-on" skills) that would prepare them to perform it in an emergency.
- *Simple to teach and learn:* In less than the time it takes to watch a 30 minute TV sitcom, we can give students the skills they need to help save a life with CPR.
- *Everyone benefits:* So far, 20 states across the country have passed laws requiring students to be CPR-trained before graduation, and it's paying off. Graduates from just one school in Long Island, N.Y., have saved 16 lives since being trained. **Oregon should be next.**
