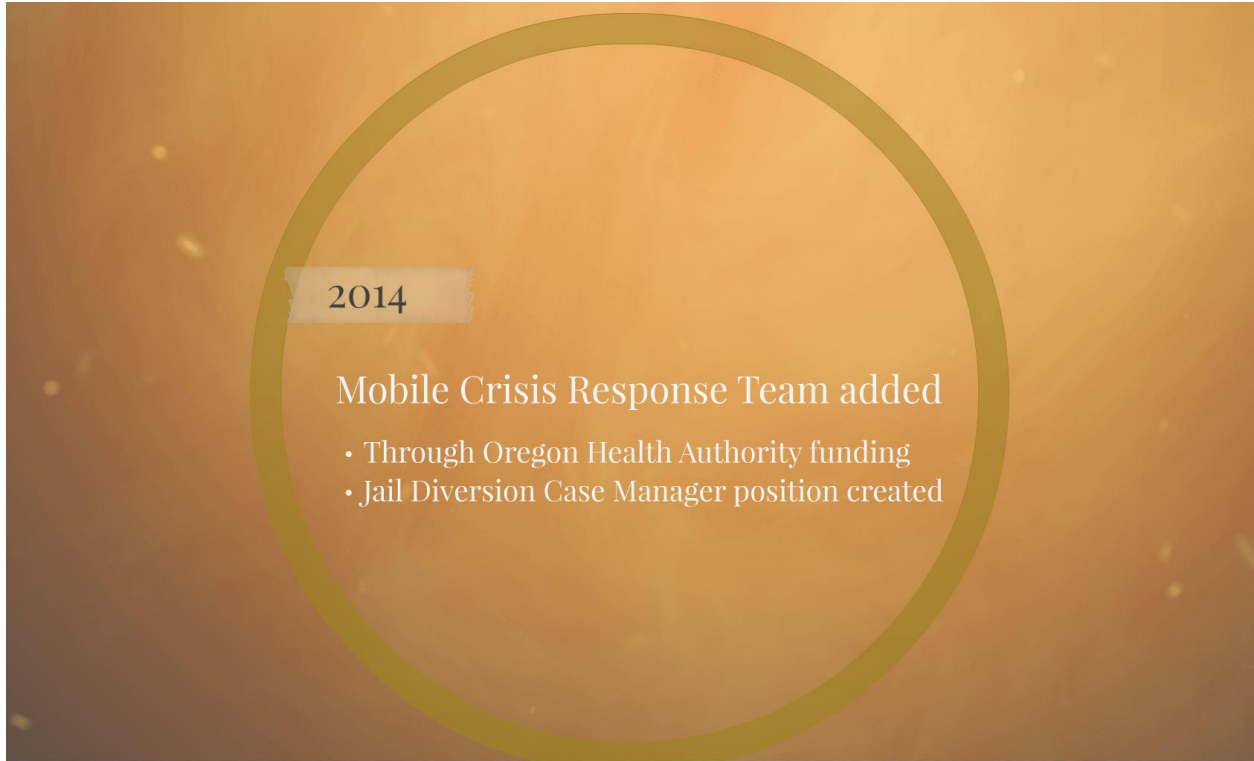

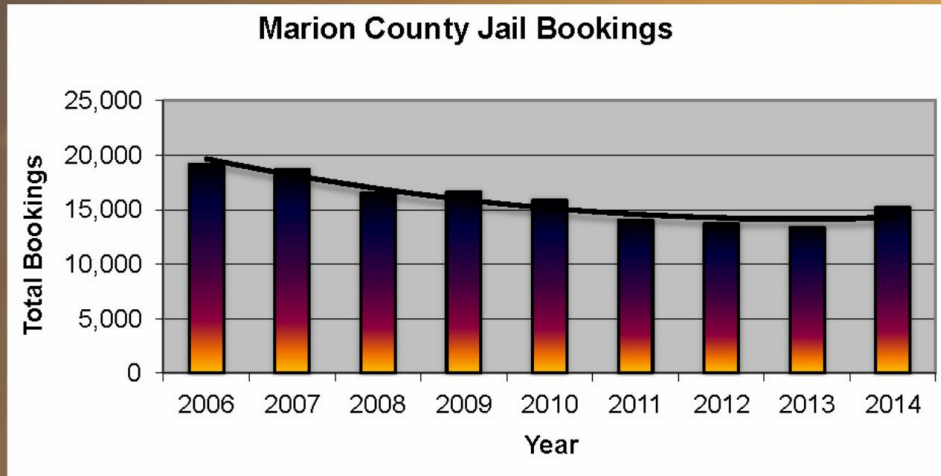
"Frank"

The call for service:

- vehicle crashed into ditch
- hiding in the bushes
- flashbacks to 2005 Iraq
- trying to find his battle buddy

Resolved without use of force.

Crisis Outreach Response Team

2014

455 encounters, taking only 22 to jail.

More than half of those were due to outstanding warrants.

Mobile Crisis Response Team

Crisis evaluations have increased at double the normal rate.

Increases of 200-300 per yer are normal, PCC has seen between 400-500 more the last two years.

Psychiatric Crisis Center

Police Officer Custodies ("POC") are not tracked, but Salem Hospital staff reported a perceived decrease in POCs.

Hospital Emergency Room

Marion County has historically had the second largest population at OSH.

Over the past year, we've reduced the number of admissions (with misdemeanor as highest charge) by 44%.

Feb 2014: 19 admits, 42% felony, 58% misdemeanor

Feb 2015: 14 admits, 75% felony, 25% misdemeanor

Oregon State Hospital

Steady increase over the past four years by about 50 per year.

Last year, we saw a spike of 200 more individuals.
