Background:

⇒ Requested by the Oregon legislature and DHS

- DHS Aging and People with Disability Services
- ⇒ Completed June –December 2014:

\Rightarrow Data sources:

- Background documents and studies
- Over one hundred people from 11 Oregon counties and 7 states.
 - ✓ Childless adults with disabilities
 - ✓ Key informants in the fields of disabilities, physical and mental healthcare, employment, corrections, and veterans affairs
 - ✓ General Assistance researchers and administrators from multiple states, including Utah, Washington, Nevada, and Vermont.



Study Questions:

- 1. What already exists within Oregon and other states?
- 2. What is the need today?
- 3. What potential program structures and funding options might address the needs of the target population, while also addressing any barriers with the previous program?

Findings:

- ✓ Federal disability benefits are available, but the rigorous and lengthy application process makes them <u>hard to get</u>
- ✓ Childless adults with severe disabilities have <u>multiple</u> <u>needs that make it even more difficult to go through</u> <u>this process on their own</u>
- \checkmark These disabilities and needs can be <u>hidden</u>
- ✓ <u>Resources</u> to meet basic needs of this population are <u>limited</u>, especially in the area of <u>housing</u>

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Findings (Continued):

- ✓ <u>States can provide temporary disability benefits and</u> <u>be reimbursed</u> for them once federal benefits are awarded.
- Administrative <u>costs can be minimized</u> by utilizing existing programs;
- ✓ Administrative costs of such a program could be <u>offset</u> by savings in health care, homeless assistance, and public safety.
- ✓ Can increase federal Social Security benefits flowing into Oregon:
 - National first time success rate for obtaining federal Social Security benefits=30%
 - Success rate reported by multiple Oregon programs = 70%

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Proposed Pilot Program for General Assistance

- ✓ "<u>Housing First</u>" model
- ✓ Enroll and serve participants from the existing, statewide Presumptive Medicaid caseload
- \checkmark Leverage existing staff and resources
- ✓ Gather additional information on costs and potential outcomes of reinstating General Assistance in Oregon.



Comments from GA Study Respondents:

"I was a very proud person and it was difficult for me to ask for help." – Lane County

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"It would be nice to have money for clothes and toiletries." - Multnomah County

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"I feel like a burden to my partner. If I had some financial support, my depression, anger, agitation wouldn't be as bad." - Central OR

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"It is really brutal [on the streets] when you are counting on SSI to be approved and then it isn't over and over again." – Multnomah County

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"After four years of getting denied for services and living in car, I am relieved to now have a place." – Lane County
