

Financial Fraud/Consumer Protection Section

Consumer Protection

Protect and Assist Oregon Consumers:

- Educate businesses and consumers
- Assist consumers to resolve disputes
- Ensure businesses treat consumers fairly
- Enforce/litigate when necessary
- Promote competition

Consumer Protection

- Fully self-funded through:
 - Penalties
 - Settlements
- Increasing workload
 - Changes in marketplace (e.g. Internet)
 - Increasing complexity of cases
 - Costs related to electronic discovery and document exchange
 - Addition of new types of enforcement

Medicaid Fraud Control Unit

Medicaid Fraud

Federally-mandated program to address:

- Fraudulent practices in Medicaid Program/Oregon Health Plan
- Physical or financial abuse and neglect of:
 - Persons by Medicaid/OHP providers
 - Residents of long-term care facilities
- Provide training and education



Medicaid Fraud

- Funding:
 - Federal Funding (75% Federal Match)
 - Penalties/Settlements (fund State's 25%)
- Budget Challenges:
 - Increasing sophistication of fraud
 - More referrals of neglect cases/financial abuse





Charitable Activities Section

Charitable Activities

Protecting Charities and Charitable Giving:

- Licensing/Regulation
 - Charities (currently 19,000 registered charities)
 - Professional Fundraising Firms
 - Non-Profit Gaming
- Education
- Enforcement

Charitable Activities

- Funding:
 - Completely fee supported; no General Fund dollars
 - Fee schedules tied to organizational revenues
- Fee Increase:
 - Increasing number of charities
 - Increasing complexity of non-profit activities
 - Abuse of corporate form/structure


Civil Recovery

- Protect and recover money for the State of Oregon
 - Plaintiff lawyers for the State
 - Litigate all claims for money/property owed to state agency, or where agency seeking relief
 - Protect state's interest in bankruptcy/lien foreclosure
 - Enforce Tobacco Statutes/Master Settlement Agreement



Biennial Recoveries for the General Fund

(excluding MSA payments)



*2005-07 – This sum reflects \$22 million recovered in the M/V New Carissa litigation.

2011-13 – This sum reflects unusually large recoveries in the Williams v. Philip Morris and Strawn v. Farmers Insurance litigation. **15

Civil Recovery

- Assist Oregon families and children by representing Division of Child Support
- Protect Oregon's natural resources through criminal prosecutions and civil actions and by providing assistance to DA's and agencies





Protection of Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement Funds

Protection of MSA Income Stream

- Payment: \$160 million per biennium to State Treasury
 - \$80 million per year
 - Payment into perpetuity
- Payment Dispute
 - Tobacco companies withholding funds (\$10+million per year)
 - Entire payment at risk

Protection of MSA Income Stream

"Diligent Enforcement" Requirement

- Regulation of nonparticipating manufacturers
 - Escrow Requirements
 - Reporting Requirements
- Regulation of cigarette sales in Oregon
 - Certification
 - Auditing



Protection of MSA Income Stream

Nationwide Arbitration

- Question: Did Oregon "diligently enforce" its escrow statutes during calendar year 2003?
- Panel of 3 retired federal judges
- Prevailed for calendar year 2003
- Currently engaged for calendar year 2004



Child Advocacy Section

Child Advocacy

Protects Oregon's children and families by providing legal representation to Department of Human Services Child Welfare Program (DHS)

- Represent DHS in juvenile dependency, termination of parental rights, and administrative hearings
- Provide general legal advice to ensure compliance with relevant law
- Assist with policy formulation

Child Advocacy

Factors affecting work:

- Short timelines: Federal Adoption & Safe Families Act
 - Strict federal timelines on placement of children
 - Failure to comply results in loss of funds
- End of Sunset SB 222
 - Requires "full representation" of DHS caseworker
 - Will require FTE for DOJ/budget for DHS




Total Compensation Claims Received

2.5 revenue agents collect \$1.4 million each biennium



District Attorney Victim Assistance Program Grants

36 Grants: \$5,030,516 million allocated in 2013-2015

- Crisis intervention services
- Information and referral
- Court accompaniment
- System advocacy





Child Abuse Multidisciplinary Intervention (CAMI) Grants

36 MDT Grants: \$10,114,441 million granted in 2013-2015

5 RSP Grants: \$1,142,312 million granted in 2013-2015

Services provided:

- Coordinated investigation of child abuse
- Child-sensitive investigations, exams, interviews
- Statewide training for professionals conducting child-abuse assessments





Oregon Domestic and Sexual Violence Services Fund

80 grants totaling \$8.4 million for 2013-2015

Services include: shelter services, safety planning, 24-hour hotline, advocacy, information and referral

Sexual Assault Task Force








The Need We Serve

Department of Justice – General Counsel Division



Program Summary

- Provides a broad range of legal services to over 100 state agencies, boards and commissions
- Contact counsel assigned to each agency
- Emphasis on preventative law and client education
- Legal services ordinarily provided only at agency request



General Counsel Services

- Day-to-day legal advice
- Representation in contested case hearings
- Drafting and reviewing contracts, including mandatory legal sufficiency review
- Formal Letters of Advice and published Attorney General Opinions
- Agency legal trainings

Centralized Legal Services

- Goal is consistent articulation and application of legal policy under direction of the Attorney General.
- Reliable document management key to success.
 - Number of clients
 - Number of attorneys
 - Number of service requests
 - Number of years over which advice has been provided



Portland Harbor Superfund

- Represent agencies who are potentially responsible parties (ODOT and State Lands).
- Represent regulatory agencies (DEQ and ODFW).

Measure 91 Implementation

- Interdivisional task force under direction of GC Deputy Chief Counsel in order to provide consistent advice to
 - Agencies such as OLCC and Department of Agriculture that are responsible for implementing and administering law
 - Agencies whose operations and missions are affected by enactment of Measure 91
 - All agencies regarding general public law issues affected by enactment of Measure 91, *e.g.*, employment law issues



Enterprise-wide Services

- Public Law Conference and other training programs for state agencies on many legal subjects
- Providing training publications including Public Records Manual, Administrative Law Manual, Public Contract Manual
- Pilot "flat-charge" billing model for some state agencies

Public Law Conference

- Two-day training for approximately 450 state employees.
- Covers a broad spectrum of public law, including
 - Public Records and Meetings
 - Public Contracting
 - Employment Law
 - Administrative Procedures Act
 - Rulemaking
 - Contested case proceedings
 - State ethics laws

- Public Records and Meetings Law
- Administrative Law Manual
- Public Contracts Manual

Administrative Services Division


Primary Responsibilities

Provide business support functions:

- Human Resources Services, including Payroll
- Accounting and Budgeting
- Technology Delivery
- Facilities and Operations







Human Resources/Financial Services

- Payroll consolidation with DOJ, Department of Consumer Business Services, and Department of Revenue.
- Automated medical leave tracking system tied to payroll time records.
- Conducted External Review of Financial Services.





Information Services

- Committed to a highly sophisticated information security protocol.
- Implemented Mobile Device Management software to administer all Department mobile devices.
- Eliminated over 300 physical servers.





Operations

- Consolidated two locations for the Child Support Division into two existing DOJ facilities.
- Returned nine state vehicles in the last two years.
- Working to create healthy work environments 25% reduction in SAIF claims.





Major Budget Drivers

- DOJ Program needs and priorities, based on client needs.
- Rapid rate of technology change and security needs.
- Regulatory requirements Affordable Care Act, Internal Revenue Service.





Major Changes

- ASD is preparing for the changes resulting from the Child Support System Project.
- Increasingly mobile DOJ workforce.
- Addition of litigation support function.
- Upgrading Department's website.
- Increasing complexity/frequency of cyber threats.
- Upgrading of litigation software tools.

- Completed functional review of our Financial Services Section.
- Implemented new security technology and process improvement where possible.
- Conducting proof of concept for consolidating Payroll function with two other state agencies.
